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REVIEW OF THE EFFICIENCY OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL FUNCTIONING OF THE UNITED NATIONS

Prototype of a new format of the medium-term plan

Report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions

1. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions has considered the report of the Secretary-General on the prototype of a new format of the medium-term plan contained in document A/49/301. In the course of the Committee's deliberation, the Controller provided additional information on the subject.
2. As stated in paragraph 1 of the report of the Secretary-General, the prototype of a new format of the medium-term plan has been prepared in response to section I.B of General Assembly resolution 48/218 A of 23 December 1993, in which the Assembly reiterated its request to the Secretary-General to submit the prototype to the Assembly at its forty-ninth session, through the Committee for Programme and Coordination and the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions.
3. The Advisory Committee recalls that the Committee for Programme and Coordination, during the second part of its thirty-fourth session, considered and welcomed the proposed new format of the medium-term plan, which would consist of a perspective and a programme framework for a period of four years, beginning in 1998. The observations and recommendations of the Committee for Programme and Coordination on the new format of the medium-term plan are contained in its report. 1/
4. The prototype of the medium-term plan, as submitted by the Secretary-General, takes into account the recommendation of the Committee for Programme and Coordination that the current medium-term plan should be replaced by a document containing the following elements:

(a) A perspective, which would be a concise forward-looking policy document. It would contain an analysis of persistent problems and challenges and emerging trends that would need to be addressed by the international community within the next four to six years and the role of the Organization in that undertaking. The perspective would indicate broad priority areas for the work of the Organization; it would be amended only if pressing needs of an unforeseeable nature arose during the period covered;

(b) A programme framework, which would list only major programmes and subprogrammes and would provide guidelines against which the preparation and implementation of the budget would be assessed. The narrative of each programme should consist of a brief one-page chapter detailing its objectives and mandates. The programme framework should be reviewed regularly every two years in the off-budget year in an effective manner to reflect new mandates.

5. In paragraph 6 of his report, the Secretary-General outlines his vision of a perspective, which would cover a period of four years, beginning 1998. The Advisory Committee, bearing in mind section I.B of General Assembly resolution 48/218 A (see A/49/301, paras. 2 and 3), believes that a six-year cycle for the perspective would be more consistent with the use of the perspective as a "forward-looking policy document". At the same time, the Committee points out that there are several issues related to the perspective that require further clarification by the Secretary-General, considering the requirements outlined in paragraph 4 (a) above. For example, it is not clear how "broad priority areas for the work of the Organization" will be determined, what the criteria will be for amending the perspective and what the exact meaning could be of "pressing needs of an unforeseeable nature".

6. In paragraphs 7 to 13 of his report, the Secretary-General describes the programme framework. The Committee notes from paragraph 10 of the report, that "the programme framework would be congruent with organizational lines". As stated in paragraph 7 of the report, "congruence would also enhance accountability by ensuring that responsibility is clearly identified for the delivery of a programme and for achieving the results the programme is meant to produce". The Advisory Committee points out that while the structure of the medium-term plan can be congruent with organizational lines, it should always be recognized that it emanates from legislative mandates. In this connection, the Advisory Committee notes the recommendation of the Committee for Programme and Coordination that "the relevant legislative mandates should be indicated in the narrative of the programmes". ^{2/} The Advisory Committee points out that regulation 3.6 of the Regulations and Rules Governing Programme Planning, the Programme Aspects of the Budget, the Monitoring of Implementation and the Methods of Evaluation stipulates that the medium-term plan shall be presented by programme and objective, and not by organizational unit, and that rule 103.6, paragraph (d) (iv), which applies to substantive activities, reads as follows:

"The subprogramme structure shall be based on objectives rather than on the internal administrative structure of the Secretariat unit responsible for the programme".

These provisions would have to be amended to conform to the new structure of the medium-term plan, if adopted.

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7. The Committee points out that the relationship between the programme framework and the budget outline needs to be indicated, since both documents will be submitted in the off-budget year. The Advisory Committee cautions against any merger of the two in order to avoid the development of a full-scale budget exercise one year before the proposed programme budget itself is actually presented.

8. The Advisory Committee also points to the need to ensure that the text of the proposed programme budget is consistent with and makes explicit reference to the objectives stated in the medium-term plan. To this end, relevant indicators in the proposed programme budget should, to the extent possible, be described with reference to programme objectives.

9. The Advisory Committee notes from paragraph 12 of the report of the Secretary-General that the new format of the medium-term plan would lead to a consolidation of subprogrammes and to a reduction in their number. In this connection, the Advisory Committee notes that in its report the Committee for Programme and Coordination stated its understanding that "annexes I and II to document A/49/301 were for illustrative purposes only". ^{3/} The Advisory Committee was provided with additional information on the relationship between programmes in the current medium-term plan and the proposed new format, which is reproduced in annex I below. The Committee was also provided with a timetable for the introduction of new procedures related to the medium-term plan, which is reproduced in annex II below. The Committee requests the Secretary-General to provide information to the General Assembly on the implementation of this schedule thus far. The Advisory Committee trusts that in the process of consolidation, all mandates will be preserved unless it is specifically decided otherwise by the respective intergovernmental bodies. Furthermore, the Committee requests the Secretary-General to clearly explain the rationale for the consolidation of subprogrammes and the criteria for dividing certain programmes among organizational units.

10. The Advisory Committee shares the view of the Secretary-General that the usefulness of the medium-term plan as currently conceived "has been increasingly called into question both within the Secretariat and among Member States" (A/49/301, para. 2). The Advisory Committee therefore recommends approval of the proposed new format of the medium-term plan, provided that the observations of the Advisory Committee reflected in the above paragraphs, if approved by the General Assembly, are fully taken into account. It is also the understanding of the Advisory Committee that, should the Assembly approve the proposal of the Secretary-General, he will submit for consideration by the Assembly the necessary revisions to the Regulations and Rules Governing Programme Planning, the Programme Aspects of the Budget, the Monitoring of Implementation and the Methods of Evaluation.
