

Outsourcing practices

Report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions

- 1. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions has considered the report of the Secretary-General on outsourcing practices (A/55/301), submitted pursuant to General Assembly resolution 54/256 of 7 April 2000. During its consideration of the report, the Committee met with representatives of the Secretary-General who provided additional information and clarification.
- 2. The Advisory Committee recalls that the General Assembly, in its resolution 54/256, endorsed the United Nations guidelines on outsourcing set out in the report of the Secretary-General (A/53/818, sect. III), pending consideration of a report to be submitted to it at its fifty-fifth session defining, in a more detailed way and with justification, the criteria for decisions on which activities and services should or should not be outsourced.
- 3. The Committee notes that in response to that request the Secretary-General has chosen to establish guidelines which would serve as criteria for programme managers on activities that may be considered for outsourcing. The four criteria enumerated in his report (A/55/301), namely, cost-effectiveness and efficiency; safety and security; maintaining the international character of the Organization; and maintaining the integrity of procedures and process, must be considered when evaluating whether an activity is suitable for outsourcing.
- 4. Consequently, according to the Secretary-General, for an activity to be fully or partially outsourced it must be demonstrated that it can be more economically and at least equally efficiently done by an external source; and that the outsourcing would not compromise the safety and security of delegations, staff or visitors or the international character of the Organization or the public perception thereof; and would not result in a breach of established procedures and process.
- 5. The Committee requested clarification on the scope of application covered by the report, but did not receive an adequate reply; this clarification should be provided to the Fifth Committee.

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
