

## Statement by the Secretary-General and plenipotentiary representatives of the States Parties to the Treaty on Collective Security concerning the situation on the Korean peninsula

Dangerous tension is building up on the Korean peninsula and around it, which, one way or another, affects the interests of many States. The military and political threats, the advancement of various preconditions for negotiations and the whipping up of passions are having a most negative effect on stability and security in the region and in the world as a whole.

Both on account of their geographical proximity to what is taking place and in accordance with their principled position in favour of just political solutions to disputed situations, the States Parties to the Treaty on Collective Security welcome the agreement to begin six-party negotiations and wish them success. They appeal to all those involved to show the utmost restraint, goodwill and a sense of responsibility during the negotiating process.

Individual and collective efforts are now vital to reduce the tension and create favourable conditions for a speedy political settlement with a view to preserving the non-nuclear status of the Korean peninsula, strengthening the regime of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and ensuring regional and international security.

For our part, our States intend vigorously to facilitate this.
