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Annex I

Thank you for your letter dated 13 October 2003 in which you convey the Security Council's view that the Department of Peacekeeping Operations should administer the United Nations Mission in Côte d'Ivoire (MINUCI) as a "Special Political Mission" for budgetary and other purposes.

I have taken careful note of the view of the Security Council on this matter. Since the matter also relates to the administrative and budgetary aspects of a United Nations field operation, I have transmitted it to the attention of the President of the General Assembly. As the Security Council is aware, the Charter under Article 17 (2) assigns to the General Assembly the responsibility to apportion the expenses of the Organization.

I welcome the Security Council's willingness to consider the possible reinforcement of MINUCI, as indicated in your letter, and I understand that the Council has already begun consultations in this regard. I hope that the Council will reach an early agreement on such reinforcement.

Annex II

Your report to the Security Council (S/2003/374) provided several options to address insecurity in Côte d'Ivoire. The Security Council in its resolution 1479 (2003) selected option (b) recommended in your report and established the mandate for the United Nations Mission in Côte d'Ivoire (MINUCI), which was not a peacekeeping operation. This conclusion is supported by the negotiating history of the resolution. Therefore, the Council recalls that the Department of Peacekeeping Operations is to administer MINUCI as a Special Political Mission for budgetary and other purposes and take appropriate action to ensure that all issues related to MINUCI are so acknowledged.

In the course of upcoming consultations on the renewal of the mandate of MINUCI as it nears its November expiration, Security Council members will review, among other issues, the possible designation of MINUCI as a peacekeeping mission and will evaluate the possible reinforcement of the United Nations presence in Côte d'Ivoire.
