

# **Appointment of members of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions**

## Note by the Secretary-General

- 1. The Secretary-General has received notification of the resignation of Toshihiro Aiki (Japan) from the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, effective 15 August 2015. Accordingly, the General Assembly will be required to appoint, at its current session, a person to fill the vacancy for the remaining period of the term of office of Mr. Aiki, which expires on 31 December 2016.
- 2. The Government of Japan has nominated Takeshi Akamatsu to fill the vacancy arising from the resignation of Mr. Aiki.
- 3. In a communication dated 10 July 2015, the Secretariat was informed by the Chair of the Group of Asia-Pacific States that the candidature of Mr. Akamatsu had been endorsed by the Group.

Mr. Akamatsu has served in the Japanese Foreign Service for more than 27 years, during which he has developed extensive knowledge and experience regarding, inter alia, public administration and the international development agenda, as well as Africa. He is proficient in English and French.

Mr. Akamatsu, as Principal Deputy Director of the United Nations Administrative Division, as well as Senior Coordinator of the Aid Policy and Management Division, in the Japanese Foreign Ministry, dealt extensively with United Nations administrative and budgetary issues, covering budgetary and administrative aspects of various United Nations funds and programmes. He now leads the Japanese Fifth Committee team in New York during the sixty-ninth session.

His nomination as the first Ambassador of Japan to the Republic of South Sudan, following his posting as the Director of the First Africa Division, is a proof of his extensive knowledge of the African continent. As Ambassador, he has maintained and enhanced cooperation with the United Nations Mission in South Sudan on the ground, in which he played a decisive role in the dispatch of the Japanese Self Defence Force contingent while he was the Director of the First Africa Division.

Mr. Akamatsu has a wide knowledge of development issues based on his experience both in the field and at Headquarters; his thorough understanding of development issues has also been cultivated through the coordination of Japan's official development assistance (ODA) programmes covering both bilateral ODA and multilateral cooperation through various international agencies.
