

Review of the implementation of the recommendations and decisions adopted by the General Assembly at its tenth special session: Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters; United Nations Institute for

Disarmament Research

Proposed programme budget for the biennium 2002-2003

Request for a subvention to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research resulting from the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute on the work programme of the Institute for 2003

Note by the Secretary-General

#### *Summary*

In accordance with the provisions of the statute of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR) (see General Assembly resolution 39/148 H, annex, art. VIII, para. 3), the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR for a subvention of \$227,600 for the year 2003, from the regular budget of the United Nations, is hereby transmitted to the General Assembly for approval. A related provision to finance this subvention for the biennium 2002-2003 was approved by the General Assembly under section 4, Disarmament, of the programme budget for the biennium 2002-2003.

- 1. At its thirty-ninth session, the Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), approved, for submission to the General Assembly, the Institute's programme of work and estimated resource requirements for 2003 (see A/57/335). The present report, reflecting the updated estimates that have since been provided by the Institute to the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, is submitted to the Assembly in the context of its consideration of a subvention of \$227,600 for 2003 from the regular budget of the United Nations.
- 2. In the report of the Secretary-General on the work of the Advisory Board (ibid.), it is stated that the Board expressed the hope that the level of support to UNIDIR would be maintained and reiterated its strong support for an increase in the real value of the subvention to UNIDIR.
- 3. The programme budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2002-2003, under section 4, Disarmament (A/56/6/Add.2, chap. II, sect. 4), contains a provision of \$447,100 representing the United Nations subvention to UNIDIR for 2002-2003. Notwithstanding the inclusion of the necessary provision in the programme budget, a formal request for a subvention of \$227,600 for the year 2003 is submitted to the General Assembly, in keeping with established procedure.
- 4. Under section IV of General Assembly resolution 44/201 B of 21 December 1989, entitled "Subvention from the regular budget to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research", the Secretary-General is required to report annually to the Assembly on the situation of the Institute. In this context, it is reported that the financial situation of the Institute is as follows:
- (a) Funds available at the beginning of 2002 amounted to \$1,011,400. This figure includes an amount of \$124,500, required as operating cash reserve for 2002;
- (b) Total income for 2002 is estimated at \$1,625,700, from the following sources: voluntary contributions and public donations (\$1,345,200); interest income (\$60,000); the subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$219,500); and miscellaneous income (\$1,000). It is also estimated that of the total voluntary contributions and public donations, approximately 58.6 per cent will be used for special projects and 41.4 per cent for other purposes, including administrative costs. The details of the revised estimated contributions from voluntary sources for 2002 and 2003 are provided in annexes I and II, respectively;
- (c) Total revised estimated expenditure for 2002 is \$1,364,200, including a provision of \$54,500 for programme support costs. Requirements for 2003 are estimated at \$1,156,200, inclusive of \$44,200 for programme support costs. The breakdown of 2002 revised estimated expenditures and of estimated resource requirements for 2003 is provided in annex III;
- (d) Available funds at the beginning of 2003 are estimated at \$1,272,900, including an amount of \$171,700 that would be required as operating cash reserve.
- 5. Should the General Assembly decide to approve the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, no additional provision would be required under section 4 of the programme budget for the biennium 2002-2003.
