**Proposed programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009**

**Request for a subvention to the United Nations Institute  
for Disarmament Research resulting from the  
recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute  
on the work programme of the Institute for 2008-2009**

**Note by the Secretary-General**

*Summary*

In part IV, paragraph 2, of its resolution 60/248, the General Assembly endorsed the proposal that the request for a subvention to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR) be submitted for review and approval by the Assembly on a biennial basis in the context of its consideration of the proposed programme budget for the related biennium.

In this context, and in accordance with the provisions of the statute (see resolution 39/148 H, annex, article VIII, para. 3) and the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute, the General Assembly is requested to approve a subvention in the amount of \$485,500 for UNIDIR from the regular budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2008-2009. The related provision is included in the proposed programme budget for 2008-2009 under section 4, Disarmament.



1. At its forty-eighth session, the Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), approved, for submission to the General Assembly, the report of the Director of the Institute on its activities for the period from August 2006 to July 2007 and the proposed programme of work and estimated resource requirements for 2007 and 2008 (see A/62/152). The present report, reflecting the updated estimates that have since been provided by the Institute for review by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, is submitted to the Assembly in the context of its consideration of a subvention to UNIDIR for 2008-2009 from the regular budget of the United Nations.

2. Through the aforementioned report of the Director of UNIDIR, the Board of Trustees recommended continuation of a subvention from the United Nations regular budget. Such a subvention is important for ensuring the independence of the Institute.

3. The proposed programme budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2008-2009, under section 4, Disarmament (A/62/6 (sect. 4) and Corr.1), contains a provision of \$485,500, representing the United Nations subvention to UNIDIR for the biennium. This amount will be subject to subsequent recosting in accordance with the established procedures.

4. Under section IV of resolution 44/201 B, entitled "Subvention from the regular budget to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research", the Secretary-General is required to report annually to the General Assembly on the situation of the Institute. In this context, the updated financial situation of the Institute (details of which are included in annexes I through IV to the present note) may be summarized as follows:

(a) Funds available at the beginning of 2007 amounted to \$1,667,700. This figure includes an amount of \$284,500 required as an operating cash reserve;

(b) Total income for 2007 is estimated at \$2,328,800 from the following sources: voluntary contributions and public donations (\$2,013,800); interest income (\$40,000); inter-organizational contributions (\$13,000); and the subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$262,000). It is also estimated that of the total voluntary contributions and public donations, approximately 71.3 per cent will be used for special projects and 28.7 per cent for other purposes, including administrative costs;

(c) Total revised estimated expenditure for 2007 is \$2,593,600, including a provision of \$111,000 for programme support costs. Requirements for 2008 are estimated at \$2,163,300, inclusive of \$92,000 for programme support costs;

(d) Available funds at the beginning of 2008 are estimated at \$1,402,900, inclusive of an amount of \$311,800 as an operating cash reserve.

5. It would be recalled that the General Assembly in its resolution 60/248 endorsed the proposal that the request for a subvention to the Institute be submitted for review and approval by the Assembly on a biennial basis in the context of its consideration of the proposed programme budget for the related biennium.

**6. Accordingly, the General Assembly is requested to approve a subvention to UNIDIR of \$485,500 (before recosting) from the regular budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2008-2009, the provision for which has been included under section 4, Disarmament, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium.**
