

China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation and Promotion of Right to Development

Development is an eternal theme of human society, and eliminating poverty is key to the promotion and realization of the right to development. China, as the world's largest developing countries, regards the rights to subsistence and development as its primary and basic human rights. Since the Reform and Opening-Up, over 8 hundred million Chinese people have moved out of poverty. By 2020, China will achieve the goal of eliminating poverty for all rural residents by current standards, completing the No Poverty target ten years ahead of UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

As one of the largest NGOs in China, China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation's domestic work focuses on four areas: education, health, livelihood and emergency response. By the end of 2019, we had supported over 40 million people. In addition, we have carried out international programs in Asia and Africa to promote UN Sustainable Development Goals, respecting the locals while sharing China's poverty reduction practices and experience. By the end of 2019, we had input about 200 million RMB, benefiting over 900,000 person-times.

We call for increasing attention from the international society to the subsistence and development of people in developing countries, especially the livelihood of the most vulnerable, and timely establishment of mechanisms that ensure the right to development.
