

Pakistani Grooming Gangs in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland

Pakistan origin men operating grooming gangs targeting white girls is finally acknowledged event by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland government. Most abusers of the 1,400 girls therefore came from Pakistani background.

In Rotherham, the Casey Report also found that the majority of abusers were of Pakistani ethnicity and the majority of victims were white. This was "a matter of fact". Rotherham Council was scared of mentioning ethnicity and confronting that there was "a race issue here."

The scale of the abuse in small towns; the total failures of the authorities due to fears of being seen as racist; and the close-knit groups of family, friends and work colleagues who deliberately preyed on girls from another community would still make these the worst race hate crimes in 21st-century in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

A 2020 study titled "Group Localized Child Sexual Exploitation Offenders: Who and Why?" showed that people of Muslim and especially Pakistani heritage were significantly over-represented in group-based localized child sexual exploitation. What's more, there's plenty of evidence from prosecutions that the abusers chose their victims for racial reasons. They were "white girls"

Despite prosecution after prosecution, there is still a complete unwillingness to have a conversation about this problem. The vicious reaction to Suella Braverman's (accurate) comments reveal, this crisis will only worsen. The whole matter had hitherto been downplayed by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland police and authorities for 'political correctness'.
