Election of six members of the Executive Board of the World Food Programme

Note by the Secretary-General

Addendum

1. The Executive Board of the World Food Programme has 36 members, elected from among the States Members of the United Nations and the States members of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO). In accordance with General Assembly resolution 53/223 of 7 April 1999 and FAO Conference resolution 6/99 of 13 November 1999, the Economic and Social Council and the Council of FAO elect 18 members of the Executive Board each, according to the pattern set out in General Assembly resolution 53/223.
2. The Economic and Social Council is to elect, at its resumed organizational session for 2007, six members of the Executive Board for a three-year term beginning on 1 January 2008 to fill the vacancies that will occur on 31 December 2007 upon the expiration of the terms of the following members: Australia, China, Cuba, Ethiopia, Norway and Tunisia.
3. The six members are to be elected according to the following pattern:¹
 - Two members from the States included in List A
 - One member from the States included in List B
 - One member from the States included in List C
 - Two members from the States included in List D
4. The 18 members of the Executive Board elected by the Economic and Social Council are listed in annex I to the present note. Annex II lists the members of the Executive Board elected by the FAO Council for the information of the Economic
