

**Sixth Conference of the High Contracting Parties
to Protocol V on Explosive Remnants of War to
the Convention on Prohibitions or Restrictions
on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons
Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively
Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects**

Final document

I. Introduction

1. Article 10 (1) and (2) of Protocol V on Explosive Remnants of War (ERW) states the following:

“1. The High Contracting Parties undertake to consult and co-operate with each other on all issues related to the operation of this Protocol. For this purpose, a Conference of High Contracting Parties shall be held as agreed to by a majority, but no less than eighteen High Contracting Parties.

2. The work of the conferences of High Contracting Parties shall include:

- (a) Review of the status and operation of this Protocol;
- (b) Consideration of matters pertaining to national implementation of this Protocol, including national reporting or updating on an annual basis;
- (c) Preparation for review conferences.”

2. By resolution A/RES/66/62, the General Assembly of the United Nations emphasized “the importance of the universalization of the Protocol on Explosive Remnants of War (Protocol V),” and welcomed “the commitment of States parties to the Protocol [...] to the effective and efficient implementation of the Protocol [...].” It also requested the Secretary-General of the United Nations “to render the necessary assistance and to provide such services, including summary records, as may be required [...], as well as for any continuation of work after the meetings.”

3. The Fourth Review Conference of the High Contracting Parties to the Convention, CCW/CONF.IV/4/Add.1, encouraged the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V to “continue their much needed work on implementation in the areas of the clearance of explosive remnants of war, including existing explosive remnants of war as referred to in Article 7, recording and transferring information on explosive ordnance and abandoned explosive ordnance under Article 4, generic preventive measures, victim assistance, cooperation and assistance, national reporting as well as the maintenance of the Web-based Information System for Protocol V (WISP.V).”

4. The Sixth Conference for Protocol V was prepared for by a Meeting of Experts, which took place from 25 to 27 April 2012 in Geneva, as decided by the Fifth Conference in paragraph 42 of its Final Document, CCW/P.V/CONF/2011/12.

5. The Fifth Conference decided, as stipulated in paragraph 43 of its final document that the Meeting of Experts should especially focus on the following issues:

(a) Clearance, removal or destruction of ERW, pursuant to Article 3 of the Protocol, and the Article 4 Generic Electronic Template, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Gerdfried Elias, Colonel, of Germany;

(b) Victim assistance, pursuant to Article 8(2) of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Ms. Caroline Woergoetter of Austria, to be assisted by Ms. Danijela Žunec Brandt of Croatia, as Friend of the Coordinator;

(c) Cooperation and assistance and requests for assistance pursuant to Article 7 of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Yevgen Lisuchenko of Ukraine;

(d) National reporting, pursuant to Article 10 (2) (b) of the Protocol under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Amandeep S. Gill of India; and

(e) Generic preventive measures, pursuant to Article 9 and the Technical Annex of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Mario Amadei, Brigadier General, of Italy.

6. The Fifth Conference also decided, as stipulated in paragraph 29 of its final document, that the Secretary-General of the United Nations and President of the Fifth Conference, to exercise their authority to achieve the goal of universality of the Protocol.

7. The First Conference decided, as stipulated in paragraph 42 of its final document, CCW/P.V/CONF/2007/1 that the work of the Meetings of Experts shall be considered by the Conferences of the High Contracting Parties to be held annually.

8. The Fourth Review Conference of High Contracting Parties to the Convention in paragraph 1(iii) of decision 5, CCW/CONF.IV/4/Add.1, decided that the Sixth Conference of Protocol V would be held on 12 and 13 November 2012.

9. The Fifth Conference also decided in paragraph 46 of its final document, to nominate Ambassador Zamir Akram of Pakistan as President-designate of the Sixth Conference, and Ambassador Jüri Seilenthal of Estonia and Ambassador Jan Knutsson of Sweden as Vice-Presidents-designates.

II. Organization of the Sixth Conference

10. The Sixth Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V on Explosive Remnants of War was convened at the Palais des Nations in Geneva on 12 and 13 November 2012.

11. The following High Contracting Parties to Protocol V participated in the work of the Conference: Albania, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belarus, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Cameroon, Canada, Chile, China, Costa Rica, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Estonia, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, Guatemala, Holy See, Hungary, India, Ireland, Italy, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Mali, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Pakistan, Poland, Portugal, Qatar, Republic of Korea, Republic of Moldova, Romania, Russian Federation, Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Slovakia, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine, United Arab Emirates, United States of America and Uruguay.

12. The following High Contracting Parties to the Convention participated in the work of the Conference as observers: Bangladesh, Cambodia, Cuba, Greece, Israel, Japan,

Kazakhstan, Lesotho, Montenegro, Morocco, Philippines, Serbia, Sri Lanka, Togo, Turkey Uganda and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

13. The following States Signatories participated in the work of the Conference as observers: Egypt, Nigeria and Viet Nam.

14. The representatives of Angola, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Guinea, Indonesia, Iraq, Kuwait, Lebanon, Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand and Yemen participated in the work of the Conference as observers.

15. The representatives of the following organizations also took part in the work of the Conference as observers: European Union, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS), United Nations Office for Disarmament Affairs (UNODA) Geneva Branch, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining (GICHD).

16. The representatives of the following non-governmental organizations and other entities also took part in the work of the Conference as observers: Action on Armed Violence, Geneva Call, Global Action to Prevent War, Human Rights Watch, Mines Advisory Group (MAG) and Sussex Centre for the Individual and Society (SCIS).

III. Work of the Sixth Conference

17. The Sixth Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V on Explosive Remnants of War was opened on 12 November 2012 by the President of the Fifth Conference, Ambassador Mikhail Khvostov of Belarus.

18. The Conference held four plenary meetings. At its first plenary meeting, the Conference confirmed the nomination of Ambassador Zamir Akram of Pakistan as President of the Sixth Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V. It also confirmed the nominations of Ambassador Jüri Seilenthal of Estonia and Ambassador Jan Knutsson of Sweden as Vice-Presidents-designates.

19. At the same plenary meeting, the Conference adopted its agenda, (CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/1) and programme of work (CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/2). In confirming its Rules of Procedure, as contained in annex II of the final document of the First Conference (CCW/P.V/2007/1), the Conference suspended Rule 12 and agreed that only paragraph 3 of Article 10 would apply until an agreement addressing the contradiction between Rule 12 of the Rules of Procedure and paragraph 3 of Article 10 of Protocol V is reached.

20. At the same plenary meeting, the Conference adopted the arrangements for meeting the costs of the Conference, as recommended by the Fifth Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V.

21. Mr. Bantan Nugroho, Head of the Implementation Support Unit, served as Secretary-General of the Conference, and Ms. Hine-Wai Loose, Political Affairs Officer, Implementation Support Unit, served as Secretary.

22. The Conference received a message from Mr. Ban Ki-moon, Secretary-General of the United Nations, which was delivered by Mr. Kassym-Jomart Tokayev, Director General of the United Nations Office of Geneva and Secretary-General of the Conference on Disarmament.

23. The following States participated in the general exchange of views: Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Chile, China, Cuba, Ecuador, France, Holy See, India, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Lesotho, Montenegro, Poland, Qatar, Republic of Korea, Russian

Federation, South Africa, Switzerland, United Kingdom and Yemen. The following organizations participated: European Union, United Nations Mine Action Service (on behalf of the United Nations Inter-Agency Coordination Group on Mine Action) and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC).

24. Pursuant to the decision by the First Conference to establish a database on Protocol V, in accordance with its Article 10 (2) (b), consisting of the national reports, annual or immediate updates of the national reports, and/or summary cover pages, if applicable, on matters pertaining to the implementation of Protocol V, as stipulated in paragraphs 24 to 28 of its final document (CCW/P.V/CONF/2007/1), the Conference had before it national annual reports from the following States: Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belarus, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Ecuador, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Guatemala, India, Ireland, Italy, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Malta, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Pakistan, Poland, Portugal, Qatar, Republic of Korea, Republic of Moldova, Romania, the Russian Federation, Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine, and United States of America.

25. During the course of the meeting the Conference considered documents CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/1 to CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/9 as set out in annex III. The documents of the Conference are available in all official languages through the Official Document System of the United Nations at <http://documents.un.org>, and the website of the CCW Protocol V at <http://www.unog.ch/ccw>.

IV. Conclusions and recommendations

A. Universalization

26. The Sixth Conference welcomed the States, which have consented to be bound by Protocol V since the Fifth Conference in 2011: Burundi, Lao People's Democratic Republic, South Africa and Turkmenistan. The Conference also welcomed the announcements of Cuba and Montenegro of their progress towards joining Protocol V. The Sixth Conference welcomed the efforts undertaken by the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Presidents of the Fifth and Sixth Conferences to Protocol V, the Coordinators, individual High Contracting Parties, regional organizations and the Implementation Support Unit to promote universalization of Protocol V.

27. The Conference recommended that the Secretary-General of the United Nations and the President-designate of the Seventh Conference, on behalf of the High Contracting Parties, exercise their authority to achieve the goal of universality of Protocol V. To this effect, the Conference requested the President-designate to consider reporting to the sixty-eighth session of the United Nations General Assembly on his endeavours. The Conference also called on the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V and the CCW Implementation Support Unit to promote wider adherence to Protocol V, pursuant to the Accelerated Plan of Action on Universalization of the Convention and its annexed Protocols as adopted by the Fourth Review Conference of the High Contracting Parties to the Convention.

B. Clearance, removal or destruction of Explosive Remnants of War

28. The Conference took note of the report by the Coordinator on Clearance, Removal or Destruction of ERW, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/5.

29. The Conference decided:

(a) To continue the consideration of clearance, removal or destruction of ERW in the context of meetings of experts and the conferences of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V;

(b) To address capacity building in the areas of surveillance, clearance, removal and destruction of ERW at the national and community levels;

(c) To encourage High Contracting Parties to include information in reporting forms B and H on steps taken by them to implement the provisions of Article 4¹ concerning the recording, retaining and transmission of information, and the steps taken to issue appropriate instructions and operating procedures and to provide training to its personnel pursuant to the provisions of Article 11; and

(d) To further encourage High Contracting Parties to share their practices and experiences on how they give effect to their obligation to record, retain and transmit information on the use or abandonment of explosive ordnance, including such practices and experiences when participating in coalitions or alliances.

C. Victim assistance

30. The Conference took note of the report by the Coordinator on Victim Assistance, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/6 and Amend.1.

31. The Conference decided:

(a) To provide adequate time to the continued consideration of victim assistance at the Meetings of Experts and Conferences of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V;

(b) To amend national reporting template F (cooperation and assistance) by Form F bis “Steps taken by States which have ERW victims to implement the relevant provisions of Article 8(2): Victim Assistance”, as supported by the Meeting of Experts in 2012;

(c) For High Contracting Parties to continue to promote data collection and needs assessment, in particular with regard to disaggregated data on gender and children as well as information on the needs of families of victims, and for High Contracting Parties in a position to do so, to provide cooperation and assistance;

(d) For the Meeting of Experts to continue to review the implementation of the Plan of Action on Victim Assistance in order to assess progress and make recommendations to the Seventh Conference for further improving assistance for victims, including their social and economic integration, and fostering a culture of implementation in the area of victim assistance;

(e) For High Contracting Parties to continue to promote the Plan of Action on Victim Assistance in the wider CCW community; and

(f) For High Contracting Parties to informally exchange, if appropriate, experiences and practices of Protocol V with regard to victim assistance with relevant international legal instruments.

D. Cooperation and assistance and requests for assistance

32. The Conference took note of the report by the Coordinator on Cooperation and Assistance and Requests for Assistance, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/7, Corr.1 and Amend.1.

33. The Conference decided:

(a) The consideration of cooperation and assistance, and of requests for assistance, to remain as a priority issue in the context of the Meetings of Experts and Conferences of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V;

(b) To continue to utilise the small group meeting with affected States to discuss in detail their priorities and challenges in the area of cooperation and assistance. Also, to invite donor countries to join the small group meeting;

(c) To encourage High Contracting Parties, relevant international organizations and institutions which might be in a position to do so, to consider providing assistance in response to requests submitted under Article 7 of the Protocol, or in response to needs identified in other ways, including during the Meetings of Experts;

(d) To encourage States which have submitted requests for assistance to continue to provide regular updates on the status of those requests; and

(e) To encourage all High Contracting Parties which have provided assistance and cooperation to submit information on such efforts in their national annual reports, especially those States engaged in cooperation between affected and developing States.

E. National reporting

34. The Conference took note of the report by the Coordinator on national reporting, pursuant to Article 10 (2) (b) of the Protocol, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/4.

35. The Conference decided:

(a) All High Contracting Parties and observer States are encouraged to submit national reports;

(b) High Contracting Parties are encouraged to use the Guide to National Reporting, which was adopted by the Fourth Conference;

(c) The Meeting of Experts in 2013 to continue its examination of the reporting forms and the Guide to National Reporting and in particular to examine the potential overlap between Forms E and F; and

(d) The Coordinator on National Reporting with the assistance of the CCW Implementation Support Unit to consider how to encourage High Contracting Parties to report on their obligations relating them clearly as required with the national reporting form.

F. Generic preventive measures

36. The Conference took note of the report by the Coordinator on Generic preventive measures, pursuant to Article 9 and the Technical Annex of the Protocol, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/3.

37. The Conference decided:

- (a) To consider what further contribution Protocol V could provide to the safe and secure storage of ammunition in peace time;
- (b) For the Coordinator on Generic Preventive Measures, with the support of the CCW Implementation Support Unit, to follow-up with those High Contracting Parties which have not reported on their implementation of generic preventive measures;
- (c) To continue the practice of addressing one specific technical issue directly related to the implementation of Article 9 and part 3 of the Technical Annex of Protocol V; and
- (d) To invite all High Contracting Parties to share during the 2013 Meeting of Experts their national technical approaches and experiences in implementing Article 9 and part 3 of the Technical Annex of Protocol V. High Contracting Parties may indicate how the Guide² has contributed to the implementation of part 3 of the Technical Annex.

G. Follow-up

38. The Conference decided that the next Meeting of Experts shall take place from 10 to 12 April 2013 in Geneva.

39. The Conference decided that this meeting should especially focus on the following issues:

- (a) Clearance, removal or destruction of ERW, pursuant to Article 3 of the Protocol, and the Article 4 Generic Electronic Template, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Ivan Grinevich of Belarus, and Friend of the Coordinator, Mr. Gerfried Elias, Colonel, of Germany;
- (b) Victim assistance, pursuant to Article 8 (2) of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Fernando Guzmán of Chile, and Friend of the Coordinator, Ms. Caroline Woergoetter of Austria;
- (c) Cooperation and assistance and requests for assistance pursuant to Article 7 of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Yevgen Lisuchenko of Ukraine;
- (d) National reporting, pursuant to Article 10 (2) (b) of the Protocol under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Lode Dewaegheneire, Major Aviateur, of Belgium; and
- (e) Generic preventive measures, pursuant to Article 9 and the Technical Annex of the Protocol, under the overall responsibility of the Coordinator, Mr. Mario Amadei, Brigadier General, of Italy.

40. The Conference also decided that, in implementing the Accelerated Plan of Action on Universalization of the Convention and its annexed Protocols as adopted by the Fourth Review Conference of the High Contracting Parties to the Convention, the Meeting of Experts should consider the issue of the universalization of Protocol V under the overall responsibility of the President-designate of the Seventh Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V.

² The text of the guide is reproduced in document CCW/P.V/CONF/2010/6/Add.1. The guide was adopted by the Fourth Conference of the High Contracting Parties, which recommended that it be implemented in the national systems of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V as best practice.

41. The Conference decided to nominate Mr. Jan Knutsson, Ambassador of Sweden as President-designate of the Seventh Conference, and Ms. Katerina Sequensova, Ambassador of the Czech Republic and a representative of the Non-aligned Movement as Vice-Presidents-designate.
42. The Conference decided that the Meeting of Experts should address the contradiction between paragraph 3 of Article 10 of Protocol V and Rule 12 of the rules of procedure with a view to making a recommendation on this matter to the Seventh Conference and that this issue should be under the responsibility of the President-designate of the Seventh Conference.
43. The Conference considered and approved a provisional agenda of the Seventh Conference, as contained in annex I. The Conference adopted the estimated costs of the 2013 Meeting of Experts and Seventh Conference, as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/9 and CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/8/Rev.2. The dates for the Seventh Conference would be determined by the 2012 Meeting of High Contracting Parties to the Convention.
44. At its fourth plenary meeting, the Sixth Conference of the High Contracting Parties to Protocol V on Explosive Remnants of War adopted its final document as contained in CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/CRP.1, as orally amended, which is being issued as document CCW/P.V/CONF/2012/10.
