Addendum

- 1. The present addendum is submitted in compliance with General Assembly resolution 35/81 of 5 December 1980. It complements the 1991 annual report on operational activities for development of the United Nations system (A/46/206-E/1991/93) and provides detailed statistical data for the year 1990. The addendum contains an overview of the situation with regard to resources channelled through the organizations of the United Nations system and forecasts of resources for the main funding organisations.
- 2. At the reguest of **Member** States, information is also provided on the procurement of goods and **services** through the United Nations system.

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

I. OVERVIEW OF THE PRESENT SITUATION

- 1. Total official development assistance (ODA) from all souraes amounted to \$62.1 billion a/ in 1990 as compared to \$53.1 billion in 1989. Of this amount, multilateral disbursements accounted for \$12.4 billion, of which \$8.5 billion were provided by the organizations of the United Nations system divided between grants (\$4.7 billion or 7.6 per cent) and concessional loans (\$3.8 billion or 6.1 per cent). (See table B-1.)
- 2. Expenditures on operational activities through the United Nations system comprise: development-related grants; concessional loans; non-concessional loanst and refugee. humanitarian and special economic assistance and disaster relief; these expenditures totalled \$7.7 billion in 1990 **b/** and were composed of development grants \$3.8 billion, concessional loans \$3.8 billion. non-concessional loans minus \$0.8 billion and grant-financed refugee, humanitarian, special economic and disaster relief activities \$0.9 billion. (See chart 2 and table B-l.) Excluded from these expenditures, are the management service agreements implemented by UNDP/OPS, which totalled \$108 million in 1990 and were derived from multilateral loans and credits and bilateral resources. THE UN SYSTEM'S SHARE OF TOTAL ODA. 1990





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- 3. The operational activities of the United Nation8 system, in the largest sense, include all of the above. However, a distinction may be made in the great assistance category between development oriented activities and the humanitarian ind relief assistance provided by UNHCR, UNRWA, UNDRO. These two forms of grants assistance may be distinguished from non-conaessional and concessional loans provided by the World Bank, including its IDA facility, and IFAD. c/
- 4. Another important analytical distinction is to group the concessional loans and development grants of the system and to designate these as net transfers of concessional assistance for development. The total came to \$7.6 billion in 1990, of which \$6.7 billion was for individual recipient countries. (See table B-3.)
- 5. Concessional resources (development grants and concessional loans) grew by 16 per cent in 1990 against a net decline in 1969. Geographically, about half of these resources in 1990 were allocated to Africa and over one third to Asia and the Pacific. Activities in Latin America and the Caribbean, in Western Asia, and in the "interregional, global and other" category accounted for virtually all the rest. (See table B-4.)


THE COMPOSITION OF UN SYSTEM ASSISTANCE, 1990 (excluding non-concessional loans)



- The United Nations system's 6. strong focus on assistance to the poorest countries is quite evident. About half of all conaessional development assistance (including grants) in 1990 was provided to countries classified as "least **developed*.** About one third of the total concessional assistance was for countries where the gross national product (GNP) per capita was \$250 or below; three quarters of all concessional development assistance were provided to those where GNP per capita did not exceed \$500. In 1990, IDA net **transfers** amounted to \$3.7 billion representing over a half of total concessional assistance to individual countries. Of that, more than one third was devoted to countries where GNP per capita did not exceed \$250 and over nine tenths to those where GNP per capita did not exceed \$500. (See table B-7.)
- Inclusion of the population 7. factor brings to light another perspective of the distribution of the system's concessional development assistance. Overall, these resources amounted to \$1.26 per capita in 1990. In the poorest countries the figure was much higher, at \$5.24 per capita for countries with GNP per capita below \$250 and at \$1.19 per aapita for countries where GNP per capita did not For countries classified exceed \$500. by the United Nations as "least developed", this figure was at \$7.08 per capita. 
The United Nations system's concessional resources for development: net transfers, 1990





- 8. Grant assistance for development consists of both financial contributions provided through a range of institutions and the food aid for development projects channelled through WFP, The Resident Coordinator of operational activities for development of the United Nations system assumes overall leadership in the organisation of such assistance at the country level, as well as of some relief aativities.
- 9. The total grant assistance in support of development activities which, as indicated in paragraph 2. amounted to \$3.8 billion in 1990 or 6 per cent of total ODA, war distributed as follows: UNDP, including UNDO-administered funds, \$1,134 million; WFP \$956 million; extrabudgetary (XB) including agency trust funds and government *@self-supporting" funds \$686 million; UNICEF \$584 million; regular budget (RB) \$234 million; and UNFPA \$180 million. (See tables B-2 and B-5.)
- 10. UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF and WFP are members of the Joint Consultative Group on Policy (JCGP). Some \$2.9 billion, or about eight tenths of total United Nations system's development grant expenditures, were channelled through these organisations in 1990. The fifth JCGP member, IFAD, spent \$139 million in net disbursements of development credits. (See table B-l and chart 2.)
- 11. Over two thirds of 1990 country-level expenditures benefited from integrated general policy and management advice from the UNDP resident representative, who also serves as the official field representative for WFP and UNFPA. The UNDP Governing Council holding review authority for the UNDP main programme, UNDP-administered funds and

THE PRINCIPAL CHANNELS OF GRANT - FUNDED ACTIVITIES FOR DEVELOPMENT, 1990




unfpa - was responsible in 1990 for monitoring the expenditure of 35 per cent of grant development activities. (See table B-2.)


12. The sectoral coverage of the system's giant-funded development assistance is wide-ranging with strong emphasis on the following areas of the ACC programme classification categories: health, agriculture/foresty/fisheries, and humanitarian aid and relief. Other areas of importance in 1990 were general development issues, policy and planning; natural resource81 fndustryt populations transport and communications; and education. (See table B-6.)

The application of the term "technical cooperation" to the analysis of operational activities leads to a somewhat different demarcation, in which the food aid of WFP is excluded, but the expenditures on training and consultants which are part of the World Bank loans are included. Such use of World Bank funds amounted to \$1.05 billion gross disbursements in 1990. (See memo item, table B-l). According to this formulation, total United Nations system technical cooperation expenditures were \$3.9 billion, distributed among World Bank, UNDP and URDP-administered funds, XB, UNICEF. It should be noted that RB and UNFPA. while World Bank technical cooperation-type expenditures are larger than those of UNDP, they are made through loans and credits to Governments and represent, on the whole, integral parts of specific investment projects.

THE PRINCIPAL CHANNELS OF 'TECHNICAL COOPERATION' INCLUDING WORLD BANK/IDA,




14. Implementation of the grant-financed development activities is undertaken by 29 organisations and agencies of the system, together with Governments, some non-governmental organisations and other non-United **Nations** entities. The major channels **for** such expenditures in 1990 were: WFP (\$956 million) d/; UNICEF (\$586 million) d/; FAO (\$437 million); WHO (\$361 million); UNDP (\$190 million); DTCD (\$173 million); UNXDO (\$156 million); ILO (\$149 million); UNESCO (\$93 million); World Bank (\$79 million)) ICAO (\$52 million) and IAEA (\$49 million). Government/national execution accounted for \$179 million. The total for all other agencies was \$314 million, (See table B-5.)

15. UNDP (including the UNDP-administered funds) has a central funding and coordinating role for development grant assistance within the United Nations system, and to this effect maintains strong linkages with the relevant agencies on substantive aspects of its work. In addition, the United Nations agencies are responsible *for* the execution of seven tenths of UNDP-funded programmes. UNFPA, though focused on one sector, also channels its expenditures through 13 United Nations agencies, as well as Governmental it also undertakes direct execution for some 14 per cent of its expenditures.

16. Twenty-four **organizations** of the United Nations system are executing agencies for **UNDP**. Five of these agencies, plus Governments and **UNDP**

SHARES IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF GRANT-FUNDED ACTIVITIES FOR DEVELOPMENT, 1990



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
itself, delivered at least \$67 million of UNDP main programme resources in 1990. Their shares of the total delivery for UNDP were: FAO \$175 million (17 per cent); UNDP \$135 million (13 per cent); Governments \$125 million (12 per cent); DTCD \$118 million (12 per cent); UNIDO \$94 million (9 per cent); World Bank \$75 million (7 per cent); world Bank \$75 million (6 per cent). The total of all others amounted to \$246 million (25 per cent). (See table B-5.)

- 17. UNDP and UNDP-administered funds financed 42 per aent of the technical cooperation expenditures of 23 of the above-mentioned United Nations system organizations in 1990, excluding UNDP itself. When expenditures for UNFPA are added, the result is that the Governing Council had within its purview, for these 23 institutions, the funding of 49 per cent of their expenditurea on operational activities, for a total of \$897 million.
- 18. At the same time, the significance to United Nations agencies of the UNDP central funding role, and of the Governing Council, must be seen in relation to both the volume and the distribution of **RB** and **XB** expenditures. together, these expenditures, which are implemented according to the mandates and procedures of each agency, are almost as great as the resources managed by UNDP. WHO is mandated to devote at least 60 per cent of its regular budget resources to development cooperation, and has by far the largest RB programme. That of IAEA represents an even greater proportion of its expenditures on technical cooperation. FAO and WHO also have The combination of major XB support.

RB and XB expenditures for WHO, IAEA and FAO was \$639 million in 1990, representing 69 pet cent of the total disbursed through those three agencies, (See table B-5.)

19. UNICEF is a special case. Although a self-funding agency, it received in 1990 some UNFPA funds and UNDP-administered resources, totalling 82 million. The net profit from the sale of its greeting cards amounted to \$90 million la 1990. (See memo item, table A-1.)

II. FUTURE TRENDS

20. At the request of the Director-General, the main funding organizations of the United Nations system provided a summary of the outlook for resources for the coming two years.

World Bank

- 21. In fiscal year 1991 (1 July 1990 to 30 June 1991) new commitments from both the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank) and the International Development Association (IDA) totalled \$22.7 billion, compared with a combined total in fiscal year 1990 of \$20.7 billion, World Bank loans for fiscal year 1991 totalled \$16.4 billion, while the total for XDA credits was SDR (special drawing rights) 4.6 billion (\$6.3 billion equivalent). Respective totals in fiscal year 1990 were \$15.2 billion and SDR 4.3 billion (\$5.5 billion equivalent).
- 22. The World Bank lending to Eastern Europe in fiscal year 1991 was 60 per cent higher than the previous year approximately \$2.9 billion compared with \$1.8 billion. Combined World Bank and IDA lending to Europe, Middle East and North Africa the World Bank region which includes Eastern Europe totalled \$6.5 billion compared with \$3.9 billion a year earlier. New commitments from World Bank and IDA lending to Africa were \$3.4 billion compared with \$3.9 billion in fiscal year 1990. The combined total for countries in Asia was \$7.5 billion compared with \$6.4 billion the previous year. For countries in Latin America and the Caribbean, commitments were \$5.2 billion compared with \$5.9 billion in fiscal year 1990.
- 23. IDA gross disbursements reached a record level of \$4.5 billion, up from \$3.9 billion in fiscal year 1990. However, World Bank gross disbursements declined from \$13.9 billion to an estimated \$11.2 billion in fiscal year 1991, mainly due to the absence of large debt reduction operations in the Bank's lending programme. World Bank/IDA net disbursements totalled \$6.2 billion in fiscal year 1991 compared with \$9.4 billion the previous year; IDA net disbursements were up at \$4.2 billion compared with the previous total of \$3.7 billion.
- 24. In November 1990, the global Environment Fazility (GEF), to be implemented jointly by the Bank, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), was established. The three-year pilot programme, which will start with initial commitments of about \$1.6 billion, has as its goal the provision of concessional resources to help finance programmes and projects in developing countries in four areas: protection of the oaone layer, of biodiversity, and of international waters, and the limitation of emissions of greenhouse gases. At the end of the fiscal year, 20 countries had contributed a total of about \$600 million to the GEF core fund.

- 25. Continuity of assistance to the adjusting, low-income countries in sub-Saharan Africa was guaranteed through the launching of the second phase of the special programme of assistance (SPA II). For the second phase of the programme, which covers the three-calendar-year period 1991-1993, 18 donors pledged \$7.4 billion in cofinancing and coordinated financing to support adjustment programmes in these countries. Commitments by IDA during the same period are expected to reach almost \$3 billion.
- 26. In **February** 1991, the African Capacity Building Initiative (**ACBI**) was established. Co-sponsored by the Bank, UNDP, and **the** African Development Bank (**AfDB**), ACBI aims at building and strengthening local capacity **for economic** analysis and management.

United Nations Development Programme

- 27. Voluntary contributions to the **core programme** for 1991 are estimated at \$1,017 million at United **Nations** exchange rates prevailing in August 1991. Contributiona pledged **to UNDF-administered** funds are **estimated** at \$66 million. **With** non-core entrabudgetary **resources** of an additional \$200 million (excluding management services), total **resources** channelled **through UNDP** would amount **to approximately \$1,300** million for 1991.
- 28. This level of income will allow UNDP to *oarry* out the **1987-1991** country and intercountry **programmes as** approved (\$3,675 million).
- 29. Non-core **resources** continue to be an increasingly important and a welcome **source** of additionality **for specific countries** and themes. All such **oost-sharing** and trust-funds arrangements are executed within the **context** of **either a** oountry or intercountry **programme**, thus supporting the development priorities of **recipient Governments**.

United Nations Population Fund

- 30. Income to the general resources of UNFPA for 1991 is estimated at \$216.4 million as at 30 June, representing an increase of approximately 2 per cent over 1990. In addition, supplemental extrabudgetary resources for specific projects and programmes through multi-bilateral and other financing are expected to reach \$10.0 million, bringing the total amount of new financial resources available to UNFPA for the year 1991 to \$226.4 million. During the course of the year this figure will be adjusted as the value of the United States dollar fluctuates.
- 31. In the work plan for 1992-1995 and the **request** for approval authority presented to and approved by the **UNDP** governing Council at its thirty-eighth session in June 1991, UNFPA projected its income for 1992-1995 for **general** resources at \$1,216.0 million (\$262.0 million in 1992, \$288.0 million in 1993, \$317.0 million in 1994, and \$349.0 million in 1995). This reflects an increase of 10 per cent per annum.

- 32. The five-year income growth scenario for 1992-1995 is based on three principal factors: (a) the continuing increase in the number of donors to UNFPA general resources, as well as the continuing trend in the growth of general resources which began in 1987; (b) the resurgence of interest as expressed by the June 1991 Governing Council in paragraph 15 of decision 91/36, in the issue of population growth and its interrelationship with the environment and overall economic and social development; and (c) thr financial resources required by UNFPA to achieve through an orderly programme expansion the goals and objectives expressed in General Assembly resolution 45/216 of 21 December 1990 on the importance of mobilising and increasing resources for population activities, paragraph 19 of the June 1991 Governing Council decision 91/35 on UNFPA, and the Amsterdam Declaration on a Better Life for Future Generations, adopted by the International Forum in the Twenty-first Century held at Amsterdam in November 1989 which identified specific goals and objectives to be achieved by the year 2000.
- 33. It should also be noted that, as in the case for 1990, the inaome estimates for the current work plan 1992-1995 do not include a contribution from the United States, If and when the United States Government decides to contribute once again to UNFPA, the income estimates would be revised upwards. In addition, the inaome will have to be adjusted during the course of the plan period, as the value of the United States dollar fluctuates.

United Nations Children's Fund

- 34. UNICEF forecasts total income to general resources for 1991 to be \$501 million at July 1991 exchange rates. For the period 1992-1994 total general resources income is forecast to increase at an average annual rate of 5.8 per cent. The primary sources of general resources income are described below.
- 35. Although most Governments increased their local currency contributione to UNICEF in 1991, the increased value of the United States dollar is expected to cause an overall decrease in income from Governments acompared to 1990. Based on actual pledges and latest expectations, government contributiona to UNICEF in 1991 are estimated to be \$388 million. For the period 1992-1994, UNICEF forecasts an average annual growth rate of 5.2 per cent.
- **36.** UNICEF forecasts non-government contributions to increase by \$1 million a year, from 825 million in 1991 to \$28 million in 1994.
- 37. UNICEF records the net income from the Greeting Card Operation as income to UNICEF, Net GCO income includes income from the sale of GCO products, private sector fund-raising, and special fund-raising events and new initiatives, UNICEF expects to record income from GCO of \$81 million in 1991 and that income from GCO will increase to \$97 million by 1994.
- 38. UNICEF receives contributions to supplementary funds for programmes/projects as well as for emergency relief. The 1991 forecast for supplementary funds income is \$220 million for programmes/projects and

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\$75 million for emergencies for a total of \$295 million. For the period 1992-1994, UNICEF forecasts an average growth rate of 8.0 per cent for non-emergency aontributions. Although every year there is a need for emergency assistance somewhere in the world, it is impossible to predict what specific amount of emergency assistance will be required in future periods. For planning purposes, the financial plan of UNICEF assumes contributions for emergencies at a minimum of \$50 million per year for 1992-1994,

World Food Programme

- 39. As at 1 April 1991, 82 donors had pledged a total of \$US 1,203 million to the regular resources of the Programme for the previous biennium, 1989-1990, and 35 donors had announced pledges totalling \$US 829 million for the new biennium, 1991-1992. The latter represents 55 per cent of the target of \$US 1,500 million for the regular resources of the Programme for the current biennium.
- 40. The combined total resources aontributed or pledged to WFP for 1989-90 in the form of regular resources, contributions to the International Emergency Food Reserve and aontributions to the protracted refugee operations (PRO) end the special Afghanistan operation amounted to \$US 1,760 million as at 1 April 1991, thus exceeding the projected value of resources (namely \$US 1,600 million) by some \$US 160 million.
- 41, For the current biennium, 1991-1992, combined total multilateral resources contribute4 or pledged to WFP amounted to \$US 1,082 million as at 1 April 1991. In the light of previous experience, it is anticipated that total general resources available to WFP for the 1991-1992 biennium could reach \$US 2,000 million by the end of the biennium, excluding special sub-trust funds, with much of the increase being comprised of resources for protracted refugee operations.

International Fund for Agricultural Development

- 42, The agreement to establish IFAD entered into force on 30 November 1977 after pledges to the initial resources of \$US 1 billion were reached,
- 43. Under the First Replenishment of IFAD resources, a total of \$US 1,100 million were pledged by Member Governments: \$US 620 million by Category I countries; \$US 450 million by Category II countries; and \$US 30 million by Category III countries, of which \$US 20 million was in convertible currencies.
- 44. Due to the delay in reaching agreement by Category I and Category II on the level of the Second Replenishment, the period covering the First Replenishment, that is, 1981-1983, was extended by one year to cover 1984. After prolonged negotiations, which continued for more than two years, agreement was reached between the two major donor categories on the Second Replenishment. On 23 January 1986 the IFAD Governing Council unanimously adopted resolution 37/IX on the replenishment of IFAD resources for the period

1985-1987 with an amount of \$US 460 million (\$US 276 million from Category I and \$US 184 million from Category II), Category III countries pledged \$US 27.6 million.

- 4s. At the reconvened Twelfth Session of the Governing Council in June 1989, agreement on the Third Rep? aishment was reached at a level of \$US 522.9 million. However, and after receipt of additional pledges from Category III, which Category I acuntries had agreed to match on a three-to-one basis, pledges as at January 1990 amount to \$US 566.6 million, with Category I contributing \$US 186.6 million in core acuntributions and \$US 191.5 million in supplementary contributions, Category II \$US 124.4 million; and Category III \$US 64.1 million.
- 46. In response to the persisting emergency situation in the mid-1980s in sub-Saharan countries due to drought and desertification, the IFAD Governing Council and Executive Board decided to complement the regular programme of IFAD in the African region by launching a Special Programme for Sub-Saharan African Countries Affected by Drought and Desertification, which became effective in 1986. The fund-raising campaign mobilised about \$US 300 million in additional resources over a three-year period.
- 47, By the end of 1990, IFAD had committed almost all of the resources from aontributions to the Sgeaial Programme. Thanks to the resources of the Special Programme. IFAD has been able to increase the level of its assistance to Africa from about 33 per cent in 1983 to about 55 per cent of its total annual lending during the 1986-1990 period. At the same time, an equitable allocation of regular resources to the other regions of the world has been ensured.
- 48. With this in mind, the Governing Council has requested the President to carry out consultations with donor countries to mobilise resources for a Second Phase of the Programme. Consultations already undertaken provided enccuraging results: France has pledged \$US 40 million and Kuwait \$US 15 million, Other acuntries have indicated their willingness to make substantial pledges in the near future. For SPA II, IFAD is aiming at a level comparable to that achieved under the First Phase which amounted to \$US 300 million. Additionally, the Governing Council at its recently concluded Fourteenth Session has authorized the President and IFAD Executive Board to commence operations to implement the Second Phase.
- 49. Under the Second Phase, the IFAD Special Programme, with a targeted approach, can play an effective role in channelling much needed resources to small holder farmers, nomadic pastoralists and other rural groups who constitute over three fourths of the population in sub-Saharan Africa. Poverty alleviation through environmental preservation will be the main objective of the Second Phase of the Special Programme.

III, PROCUREMENT ACTIVITIFS OF THE UNITED NATIONS SYSTEM

A . Procurement of goods and services

- 50. Information and data provided in appendix II show that the measures adopted by organizations, in the context of the Inter-Agency Procurement Working Group and through the Inter-Agency Procurement Services Office (IAPSO) and in response to the recommendations of the General Assembly in its resolution 42/196 of 11 December 1987, are producing Positive results, but should be rendered more systamatia and call for the full acoperation of all organizations concerned if these results are to be maintained and further improved.
- 51. Total procurement in 1990 reached some \$US 1,136 million as compared to \$US 1,007 million in 1989, of which \$US 320 million represented total procurement in developing countries. In percentage terms, the increase in total procurement was 12.8 per cent over 1989, with procurement of equipment increasing by 10.7 per cent and procurement of professional services through subcontracts increasing by 24.50 per cent.
- 52. Procurement from major suppliers (United States, Japan, Germany, United Kingdom, Italy, France and Switzerland) amounted in 1990 to SUS 587 million or 51.7 per cent of total procurement, as compared to \$US 533 million in 1989 or 52.9 per cent of total procurement.
- 53. Procurement from undorutilized major donor countries (Canada, Denmark, Finland, the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden) amounted to \$US 136.2 million in 1990 representing 12 per cent of total agency procurement. Compared to the amount of \$US 117 million recorded in 1989, this represents an increase of 16.2 per cent.

B. Food aid triangular transactions, trilateral operations and local purchases

- 54. WFP is the largest procuring agency in the United Nations system with its more than \$US 300 million worth of yearly purchases of food and transport services.
- **55.** Since 1985, WFP has bought nearly \$US 500 million worth of food in developing countries, in the process making the largest contribution to South-South trade within the United Nations system. For poor countries with surpluses of certain commodities, these purchases provide much-needed foreign exchange; they also promote regional trade over the longer term.
- 56. In 1990, WFP bought 735,000 tons of food worth \$US 155 million for distribution in developing countries. In terms of tonnage, this is nearly 10 per cent more than the previous record of 1989, although the amount spent was just under the 1989 figure of \$US 157 million because of lower food prices, In addition to using its own cash, the Programme made purchases from

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funds provided through the Food Aid Convention and the International Emergency Food Reserve, and by bilateral donors and other United Nation8 agencies.

Nearly 6 out of every 10 tone - a total of \$US 91 million - were bought in developing countries. In all, WFP purchased food from 48 developing countries in 1990. In Africa alone, WFP spent a reaord \$US 52.7 million in 1990 to purchase 260,000 tons of food. More purchases would have been made in developing countries if some funds had not been tied by donors to purchases in developed countries.

NOTE ON STATISTICAL INFORMATION

General note

1. Coverage, definition and sources for the figures used in this report are consistent with those for previous years' reports in this series.

Modifications have been made to data presentation, column headings and table titles in the interest of greater clarity and internal consistency. Explanations of special cases, or of instances in which table totals do not match, have been given attention in the footnotes to tables.

Definitions and explanations

- 2. For information on the sources of data, see paragraph 45 of the first (1981) annual report (A/36/478, annex) and the footnotes to the tables.
- 3. The data represent final figures for 1990. Should any further revisions or updating later prove **necessary**, this **would** be communicated to the General Assembly.
- 4. Data on contributions **refer to** contributions received from Governments and other sources by organisations in the United Nations system, and the net profits from the UNICEF Greeting Card Operation. Data on other income, related to **resource** transfers from one agency of the system to another, interest and so on, **are** excluded.
- 5. Data on expenditures and disbursements represent the support provided by organizations to the programmes and projects of developing countries; administrative, programme and other support costs, where identifiable, are excluded.
- 6. UNICEF and WFP carry out both development assistance and some activities which are of a humanitarian or emergency character. Because of the difficulty of separate identifications, the related contributions and expenditures are all grouped under development assistance.
- 7. With regard to loans, **net disbursements** represent **gross** disbursements less repayment of **principal**; net transfers represent net disbursements less interest and **other** charges.
- 8. The expression "United Nations funds and programmes" refers to the funds and programmes listed by the General Assembly for participation in the annual United Nations Pledging Conference for Development Activities to the resources for operational activities of the organisational entities of the United Nations (see table B-5), and to other United Nations trust funds pertaining to development activities.

- 9. The designations employed and the presentation of the material in the present report do not imply the expression of any opinion whatsoever on the part of the Secretariat of the United Nations concerning the legal status of any country, territory, city or area or of its authorities, or concerning the delimitation of its frontiers or boundaries.
- 10. The term "country** as used in the present report also refers, as appropriate, to territories or areas.
- 11. References to dollars (\$) are to United States dollars unless otherwise stated. A full stop is used to indicate decimals. Two dots (..) indicate that data are not available or are not separately reported. Parentheses () indicate a deficit or decrease, except as otherwise indicated. A dash (-) indicates that the mount is nil or negligible or the item is not applicable. A hyphen (-) between dates representing years signifies the full period involved, including the beginning and end years.
- 12. Details and percentages in tables do not necessarily add to totals, because of rounding.





APPENDIX II

A. 1990 annual statistical report on agency procurement activities a/

- 1. At the initial **request** by the Director-General **for** Development and **International** Eaonomia Cooperation in 1994, IAPSO prepared a statistical report on **1982/1983 agency** procurement, which served as a basis for the **Director-General's report** on operational activities for Development of the United **Nations** system, submitted to the thirty-ninth session of the General Assembly (A/39/417). The **General** Assembly, by resolution **39/220** of 18 December 1984, established the need **for** such reporting on a recurrent **basis** and oncouraged agencies to cooperate with **IAPSO** in this important exercise. The statistical **report** is being prepared by IAPSO annually on the basis **of** reguler follow-ups with the reporting agencies.
- 2. At the thirty-sixth session of the UNDP Governing Council, IAPSO was requested to include data on other components of technical cooperation such as experts, consultants, national professional project personnel, fellowships and volunteers, thus providing a more complete picture of national return flow, This was also pursued by the Director-General in November 1990 by a letter addressed to all organisations of the United Nations system.

Proparatory work

- 3. In preparation of this year's report, IAPSO issued a letter on 10 October 1990 to all orgenieations of the United Nations system, requesting that data be submitted on supplied computer diskettes, providing statistics broken down by country of procurement, country of origin, and subconcrects by country of head office. At the request of the Governing Council as well as the Director-General, agencies were also requested by letter on 4 December 1990 to provido statistics pertaining to experts, consultants, volunteers by country of nationality and assignments along with fellowships by country of nationality and plaaement.
- 4. In order to present a more complete picture of the above statistics, UNDP field offices were also requested to provide data on procurement, international and national project personnel, United Nations Volunteers, fellowships related to government-executed projects, along with housekeeping expenses which cover all costs connected with the running of the field offiaes. Housekeeping expenditures pertaining to the agency'6 headquarters have not been included.

General comments

5. In general, responses from the various organisations of the United Nations system have been encouraging, except for data related to country of origin. It has again not been possible to present complete statistical data for country of origin, since 10 agencies have not been able to provide this

information. The procurement volume of these agencies represents 67 per cent of the total ● quipmont component. Several other agencies which did report both and ountry of procurement and oduntry of origin were unable to provide complete data for the latter.

6. The enclosed report is based on the data received from 33 reporting agencies along with the necessary feedback from 99 UNDP field offices concerning Government • xoautod projects and housekeeping expenses.
