Report of the Economic and Social Council for 2008**

The resolutions and decisions will be issued in final form as *Official Records of the Economic and Social Council, 2008, Supplement No. 1 (E/2008/99)*.



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Chapter I

Matters calling for action by or brought to the attention of the General Assembly

1. In 2008, the Economic and Social Council adopted resolutions and decisions that call for action by, or are to be brought to the attention of, the General Assembly. The relevant paragraphs of those resolutions and decisions are summarized below.

Tobacco or health (item 7 (g))

Smoke-free United Nations premises

2. By its decision 2008/231, the Council, recalling its resolution 2006/42 of 27 July 2006 on smoke-free United Nations premises, recommended that the General Assembly, at its sixty-third session, consider the recommendation set out in that resolution on the implementation of a complete ban on smoking at all United Nations indoor premises, at Headquarters as well as at regional and country offices throughout the United Nations system, and the implementation of a complete ban on sales of tobacco products at all United Nations premises.

Regional cooperation (item 10)

Restructuring of the conference structure of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific

3. By its resolution 2008/7, the Council recommended to the General Assembly the adoption of the resolution contained therein on the restructuring of the conference structure of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, as set out in annex I to the resolution.

4. In the same resolution, the Council also endorsed annexes II, III and IV to the resolution on the conference structure of the Commission; on issues to be addressed by the committees subsidiary to the Commission; and on the terms of reference of the Advisory Committee of Permanent Representatives and Other Representatives Designated by Members of the Commission.

Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli occupation on the living conditions of the Palestinian people in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the Arab population in the occupied Syrian Golan (item 11)

5. By its resolution 2008/31, the Council requested the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its sixty-third session, through the Economic and Social Council, a report on the implementation of the resolution and to continue to include in the report of the United Nations Special Coordinator for the Middle East Peace Process and Personal Representative of the Secretary-General to the Palestine Liberation Organization and the Palestinian Authority an update on the living conditions of the Palestinian people, in collaboration with relevant United Nations agencies.

Human settlements (item 13 (d))

6. By its decision 2008/239, the Council took note of the report of the Secretary-General on the coordinated implementation of the Habitat Agenda (E/2008/64) and

decided to transmit the report to the General Assembly for consideration at its sixty-third session.

Advancement of women (item 14 (a))

Agreed conclusions on financing gender equality and the empowerment of women

7. By its decision 2008/235, the Council decided to transmit to the General Assembly the agreed conclusions contained therein, adopted by the Commission on the Status of Women at its fifty-second session, as an input into the preparations for, and outcome of, the Follow-up International Conference on Financing for Development to Review the Implementation of the Monterrey Consensus, to be held in Doha from 29 November to 2 December 2008.

Social development (item 14 (b))

Social dimensions of the New Partnership for Africa's Development

8. By its resolution 2008/17, the Council requested the Secretary-General to continue to take measures to strengthen the Office of the Special Adviser on Africa, and requested the Office to collaborate with the Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat and to include the social dimensions of the New Partnership in its comprehensive reports to the General Assembly at its sixty-third session.

Crime prevention and criminal justice (item 14 (c))

Preparations for the Twelfth United Nations Congress on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice

9. By its resolution 2008/22, the Council recommended to the General Assembly the adoption of the draft resolution contained therein.

United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (item 14 (e))

Enlargement of the Executive Committee of the Programme of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees

10. By its decision 2008/255, the Council recommended that the General Assembly, at its sixty-third session, decide on the question of enlarging the membership of the Executive Committee of the Programme of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees from 76 to 78 States.

United Nations research and training institutes (item 15)

United Nations Institute for Training and Research

11. By its resolution 2008/35, the Council requested the Secretary-General to submit a report to the General Assembly at its sixty-third session on the issue of financing the core diplomatic training activities of the United Nations Institute for Training and Research.

Chapter II

Special high-level meeting of the Council with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development

1. In accordance with paragraph 2 (a) of General Assembly resolution 61/16 and paragraph 88 of annex I to Assembly resolution 50/227, the Council held a special high-level meeting with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at its 4th and 5th meetings, on 14 April 2008. An account of the proceedings is contained in the relevant summary records (E/2008/SR.4 and SR.5). For its consideration, the meeting had before it a note by the Secretary-General on coherence, coordination and cooperation in the context of the implementation of the Monterrey Consensus of the International Conference on Financing for Development,¹ including new challenges and emerging issues (E/2008/7).
2. At the 4th meeting, on 14 April, the President of the Council made an opening statement.
3. The Secretary-General of the United Nations addressed the meeting.
4. At the same meeting, the following representatives of major institutional stakeholders made statements: Petko Draganov (Bulgaria), President, Trade and Development Board, United Nations Conference on Trade and Development; Ricardo Ochoa, Chief, International Affairs, Ministry of Finance of Mexico, on behalf of the Chairman, Development Committee; Murilo Portugal, Deputy Managing Director, International Monetary Fund; and Willy Alfaro, Director, External Relations Division, World Trade Organization.
5. Also at the same meeting, the Council heard a presentation by Zia Qureshi, Senior Adviser to the Chief Economist, World Bank, on the *Global Monitoring Report 2008*.
6. After the presentation, the Council adjourned its plenary meeting and proceeded with the holding of round tables A, B and C.

Round tables

7. Round table A, on the theme “New initiatives on financing for development”, was co-chaired by Marc Bichler, Director for Development Cooperation and Humanitarian Action, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Luxembourg, and Chair, United Nations Advisers Group on Inclusive Financial Sectors; and Maria Luiza Ribeiro Viotti, Permanent Representative of Brazil to the United Nations. The lead discussant was Philippe Douste-Blazy, Special Adviser to the Secretary-General on Innovative Financing for Development, and Chair, Executive Board of the International Drug Purchase Facility.
8. Round table B, on the theme “Supporting development efforts and enhancing the role of middle-income countries, including in the area of trade”, was co-chaired

by Marisol Argueta de Barillas, Minister for Foreign Affairs of El Salvador, and Juan Pablo de Laiglesia, Director, Agency for International Development Cooperation of Spain. The lead discussant was Lakshmi Puri, Acting Deputy Secretary-General and Director, Division on International Trade in Goods and Services and Commodities, United Nations Conference on Trade and Development.

9. Round table C, on the theme “Supporting development efforts of the least developed countries, including through trade capacity-building”, was co-chaired by Håkon A. Gulbrandsen, State Secretary for International Development, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Norway, and Ismat Jahan, Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations. The lead discussant was Cheick Sidi Diarra, Under-Secretary-General and High Representative for the Least Developed Countries, Landlocked Developing Countries and Small Island Developing States.

Exchange of views among participants

10. At its 5th meeting, on 14 April, the Council resumed the special high-level meeting with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development and held a thematic debate on “Building and sustaining solid financial markets: challenges for international cooperation”. The panellists were Joaquin Almunia, European Commissioner for Economic and Monetary Affairs; Jomo Kwame Sundaram, Assistant Secretary-General for Economic Development; and Christopher Towe, Deputy Director, Monetary and Capital Markets Department, International Monetary Fund.

11. At the same meeting, after the statements by the panellists, an interactive debate ensued, during which statements were made by the representatives of the United States of America and Brazil, and by the observers for Slovenia (as President, Economic and Financial Council, European Union), Antigua and Barbuda, Guinea (on behalf of the Acting Chairman, States Members of the United Nations that are members of the African Group) and Norway.

12. Also at the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime.

13. At the same meeting, statements were made by the Executive Director, World Bank, and the Executive Director, International Monetary Fund.

14. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by representatives of civil society (European Network on Finance and Development and New Rules for Global Finance Coalition).

15. At the same meeting, the Council held a special event on “Financing of climate change mitigation and adaptation” with the participation of the following panellists: Olav Kjørven, Assistant Administrator and Director, Bureau for Development Policy, United Nations Development Programme; Tariq Banuri, Senior Fellow and Director, Future Sustainability Programme, Stockholm Environment Institute; and Lucio Monari, Sector Manager, Sustainable Development Vice-Presidency, World Bank.

16. Also at the same meeting, following the statements by the panellists, an interactive dialogue ensued, during which statements were made by the representatives of the United Kingdom, Belarus, Barbados, Japan, Indonesia,

Portugal, Benin and Brazil, as well as by the observers for Australia, Antigua and Barbuda and India.

17. At the same meeting, a statement was made by the Dean, Board of Directors, World Bank.

18. Also at the same meeting, a statement was made by a representative of civil society (Stamp Out Poverty).

19. The proceedings of the special high-level meeting of the Council with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development were summarized by the President of the Council (A/63/80-E/2008/67).

Closing of the meeting

20. At the 5th meeting, on 14 April, the President of the Council made a statement and declared the special high-level meeting with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development closed.

Chapter III

Special meeting on the global food crisis

1. The Council held a special meeting on the global food crisis at its 7th to 9th meetings, on 20 to 22 May 2008. An account of the proceedings is contained in the relevant summary records (E/2008/SR.7-SR.9).

Natalegawa, Permanent Representative of Indonesia to the United Nations; Hugo Siles Alvarado, Permanent Representative of Bolivia to the United Nations; Abderrahim Ould Hadrami, Permanent Representative of Mauritania to the United Nations; Filipe Chidumo, Permanent Representative of Mozambique to the United Nations; Özhan Üzümcüoğlu, Deputy Permanent Representative of Turkey to the United Nations; Bashar Ja'afari, Permanent Representative of the Syrian Arab Republic to the United Nations; Liu Zhenmin, Acting Permanent Representative of China to the United Nations; Nor-Eddine Benfreha, Minister Plenipotentiary, Permanent Mission of Algeria to the United Nations; Daniel Carmon, Chargé d'affaires a.i., Permanent Mission of Israel to the United Nations; George Talbot, Chargé d'affaires a.i., Permanent Mission of Guyana to the United Nations; Kim Bong-hyun, Acting Permanent Representative of the Republic of Korea to the United Nations; and Archbishop Celestino Migliore, Permanent Observer of the Holy See to the United Nations.

112. At the same meeting, a statement was made by Ivan Piperkov, former Chairperson of the Commission on Population and Development.

113. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by Ndioro Ndiaye, Deputy Director-General, International Organization for Migration; José Mucio Moneiro Filho, President, International Association of Economic and Social Councils and Similar Institutions; and Remigio M. Maradona, Director-General,

Intergovernmental Institution for the Use of Micro-algae Spirulina Against Malnutrition.

114. At the same meeting, statements were made by Annika Soeder, Assistant Director-General, Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

115. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the following non-governmental organizations: All India Shah Behram Baug Society; Legião da Boa Vontade; World Family Organization; and Fundación Diagrama.

F. Ministerial declaration of the high-level segment submitted by the President of the Council

Action taken by the Council

116. At its 20th meeting, on 3 July, the President of the Council introduced the draft ministerial declaration of the high-level segment entitled “Implementing the internationally agreed goals and commitments in regard to sustainable development” (E/2008/L.10).

117. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft ministerial declaration as orally corrected.

118. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Belarus, France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), Bolivia, the United States and Cuba, as well as by the observers for Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China) and Nicaragua.

119. The text of the ministerial declaration read as follows:

“Ministerial declaration

“Implementing the internationally agreed goals and commitments in regard to sustainable development

“We, the Ministers and Heads of Delegations participating in the high-level segment of the substantive session of 2008 of the Economic and Social Council, held in New York from 30 June to 3 July 2008,

“Having considered the themes of the high-level segment, ‘Implementing the internationally agreed goals and commitments in regard to sustainable development’ and ‘Promoting an integrated approach to rural development in developing countries for poverty eradication and sustainable development, taking into account current challenges’,

“Conscious of the multiple, interrelated and mutually reinforcing challenges confronting the international community and their relationship to the themes chosen for the substantive session of 2008 of the Economic and Social Council and the need for a concerted and prompt response,

“Welcoming the holding of the first Development Cooperation Forum and the second annual ministerial review,

“Underscoring the need for coherence and coordination to enhance effectiveness and efficiency in addressing the current challenges and committed to ensuring that the Economic and Social Council discharges in a dynamic manner the responsibilities assigned to it by the Charter of the United Nations and reinforced in the 2005 World Summit Outcome¹ and General Assembly resolution 61/16 of 20 November 2006 on the strengthening of the Council,

“Reaffirming the commitments to the global partnership for development as set out in the United Nations Millennium Declaration,² the Monterrey Consensus of the International Conference on Financing for Development³ and the Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development (‘Johannesburg Plan of Implementation’),⁴

“Having considered the reports of the Secretary-General prepared for consideration at the high-level segment⁵ and the deliberations held in the high-level segment,

“Have adopted the following declaration:

“1. We recognize that we meet at a critical juncture in our efforts to realize the internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals. We further recognize that we face multiple challenges in our efforts to achieve these goals, including financial instability and uncertainty, slowing global economic growth, and rising food and fuel prices, as well as the impacts of environmental degradation and the impacts of climate change. All of these challenges require early concerted action. We are concerned about the negative impacts of these risks on sustained economic growth and sustainable development, particularly in developing countries. We are also concerned that these risks might further widen inequalities both among and within nations.

“2. We therefore call for urgent individual and collective actions, both short and long term, to stem the impacts of these risks and place the global economy on a firm sustainable foundation. We need to ensure that our development gains are not reversed and that our future efforts are not undermined. We are determined to take concerted actions to promote progress towards the realization of the internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals.

“3. We reaffirm that development is a central goal by itself and that sustainable development in its economic, social and environmental dimensions constitutes a key element of the overarching framework of United Nations

activities. We recognize that development, peace and security, and human rights are interlinked and mutually reinforcing.

“4. We call for the full implementation of the global partnership for development and commitments made by all countries and request the Economic and Social Council to continue to review the progress made in the implementation of the outcomes of the major United Nations conferences and summits, and their follow-up processes, in the economic, social and related fields, including the Millennium Development Goals and other internationally agreed development goals.

“5. We take note with appreciation of the voluntary initiative of the Government of Bahrain to hold regional consultations on the annual ministerial review of the Economic and Social Council at Manama on 1 and 2 June 2008⁶ and the holding of high-level symposiums by the Governments of Austria, Egypt and Italy, in Vienna, Cairo and Rome, in preparation for the Development Cooperation Forum.

“6. We welcome the enhanced participation of various stakeholders, including from civil society and the private sector, and recognize the need to continue to encourage and facilitate their engagement in efforts to achieve sustainable development.

“7. We welcome the voluntary national presentations made by Belgium, Chile, Finland, the Lao People’s Democratic Republic, Luxembourg, Kazakhstan, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United Republic of Tanzania.⁷

“8. We reiterate our commitment to ensuring the achievement of sustainable development in all countries, integrating economic growth, social development and environmental protection, and to making that goal the central objective of national development strategies and international cooperation. We call on countries that have not yet developed policy frameworks for integrating economic, social and environmental objectives to consider adopting and implementing such frameworks. We recognize that a facilitative international environment and appropriate international cooperation is important in this regard.

“9. We recognize the importance of strengthening indicators that integrate the three pillars of sustainable development.

“10. We reaffirm our commitment to promoting gender equality and the empowerment of women, recognizing that they are key actors in development, and to identifying and accelerating concrete actions towards that end.

“11. We recognize the increasing rate of deterioration of the global environment in many important areas, the continued challenges of environmental protection and the serious implications for sustainable development, and strongly stress the need to address critical issues of long-term global sustainability, taking into account the principles contained in the

Rio Declaration on Environment and Development,⁸ including, inter alia, the principle of common but differentiated responsibilities.

“12. We reiterate the commitments made at the World Summit on Sustainable Development to pursue a more efficient and coherent implementation of the three objectives of the Convention on Biological Diversity⁹ and the achievement by 2010 of a significant reduction in the current rate of loss of biological diversity, which will require action at all levels, including the implementation of national biodiversity strategies and action plans and the provision of new and additional financial and technical resources to developing countries.

“13. We resolve to support and strengthen the implementation of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification in Those Countries Experiencing Serious Drought and/or Desertification, Particularly in Africa,¹⁰ with a view to addressing causes of desertification and land degradation, as well as poverty resulting from land degradation, through, inter alia, the mobilization of adequate and predictable financial resources, the transfer of technology and capacity-building at all levels.

“14. We acknowledge that the global nature of climate change calls for the widest possible cooperation by all countries and their participation in an effective and appropriate international response, in accordance with their common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities and their social and economic conditions.

“15. We reaffirm our commitment to the ultimate objective of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change,¹¹ as contained in article 2 thereof, namely, to stabilize greenhouse gas concentrations in the atmosphere at a level that prevents dangerous anthropogenic interference with the climate system. Such a level should be achieved within a time frame sufficient to allow ecosystems to adapt naturally to climate change, to ensure that food production is not threatened and to enable economic development to proceed in a sustainable manner.

“16. We remain deeply concerned that all countries, in particular developing countries including least developed countries and small island developing States and African countries, face increased risks from the negative effects of climate change and we further stress the need to urgently address adaptation needs relating to such effects.

“17. We reaffirm that responses to climate change should be coordinated with social and economic development in an integrated manner, with a view to avoiding adverse impact on the latter, taking into full account the legitimate priority needs of developing countries for the achievement of sustained economic growth and the eradication of poverty.

“18. We welcome the decisions adopted during the thirteenth session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, held in Bali, Indonesia, from 3 to 15 December 2007, including the Bali Action Plan, which launched a comprehensive process aimed at enabling the full, effective and sustained implementation of the Convention through long-term cooperative action, now, up to and beyond 2012, in order to reach an agreed outcome and adopt a decision at the fifteenth session of the Conference of the Parties.¹² We take note of the work under way in the open-ended ad hoc working group of the parties to the Kyoto Protocol to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change¹³ established under decision 1/CMP.1.¹⁴

“19. We call for efforts by all countries to promote sustainable management of all types of forests. We recognize the need for the provision by the international community of increased support for the efforts of developing countries towards the promotion of sustainable forest management.

“20. We stress the importance of diversifying energy supply by developing advanced, cleaner, more efficient, affordable and cost-effective energy technologies, including fossil fuel technologies and renewable energy technologies, hydro included, and their transfer to developing countries on concessional terms as mutually agreed, and, with a sense of urgency, of substantially increasing the global share of renewable energy sources with the objective of increasing its contribution to total energy supply.

“21. We emphasize that it is essential to address the challenges and opportunities posed by biofuels, in view of the world’s food security, energy and sustainable development needs.

“22. We express our concern at the current situation of soaring food prices and underline that the global food crisis poses a serious challenge to the fight against poverty and hunger as well as to the efforts by developing countries to attain food security and achieve the objectives of reducing by half the number of undernourished people by no later than 2015 and other internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals. We reiterate that the global food crisis has multiple and complex causes and that its consequences require a comprehensive and coordinated response in the short, medium and long term by national Governments and the international community.

“23. The global food situation calls for a strong commitment from Governments as well as from all other stakeholders. We call upon all donors and the United Nations system to increase their assistance to developing countries, in particular least developed countries and those that are most negatively affected by high food prices. We welcome the holding of the High-level Conference on World Food Security: The Challenges of Climate Change and Bioenergy in Rome from 3 to 5 June 2008 and note the importance of the

implementation of its outcome. We also welcome the convening of a special meeting of the Economic and Social Council on the global food crisis from 20 to 22 May 2008. We take note of the recent establishment by the Secretary-General of the High-level Task Force on the Global Food Crisis and encourage its continued engagement with Member States.

“24. We reiterate the urgency of accelerating progress in the implementation of the priorities for action in water, sanitation and human settlements agreed at the thirteenth session of the Commission on Sustainable Development by providing access to safe drinking water and sanitation services, building partnerships for capacity-building and technology transfer, improving the efficiency of water utilities, engaging stakeholders in the implementation process, strengthening monitoring and reporting and implementing integrated water resources management, through raising public awareness; and integrating water and sanitation strategies into national development plans, mobilizing adequate financial resources and using available financial resources more efficiently and ensuring targeted, effective implementation by all relevant actors, including incorporation of a gender perspective and effective monitoring of implementation, in order to reach the 2015 objective of halving the proportion of people who are unable to access or afford safe drinking water and the proportion of people without access to basic sanitation.

“25. We recognize the important role of cities and other urban areas and the challenges of urbanization. We therefore call for promoting sustainable urbanization, improving lives of slum-dwellers and encouraging practical solutions to these challenges.

“26. We reaffirm the importance of investing in infrastructure for rural development and agriculture. We further recognize the importance of non-farming economic activities in eradicating poverty in rural areas. In this regard, we recognize the in-depth discussion at the sixteenth session of the Commission on Sustainable Development and we look forward to recommendations of the Commission at its seventeenth session that will advance rural development.

“27. We recognize that agriculture plays a crucial role in addressing the needs of a growing global population and is inextricably linked to poverty eradication, especially in developing countries. Integrated and sustainable agriculture and rural development approaches are therefore essential to achieving enhanced food security and food safety in an environmentally sustainable way.

“28. We recognize the crucial importance of enhanced access of the rural poor, women and men, to productive assets, in particular land and water, and stress that priority attention should be given to the adoption of policies and the implementation of laws that guarantee well-defined and enforceable land- and water-use rights and promote legal security of tenure, while recognizing the existence of different national laws and/or systems of land access and tenure.

“29. We call for the full, timely and effective achievement of the goals and targets of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for

the Decade 2001-2010,¹⁵ the Almaty Programme of Action: Addressing the Special Needs of Landlocked Developing Countries within a New Global Framework for Transit Transport Cooperation for Landlocked and Transit Developing Countries,¹⁶ the Programme of Action for the Sustainable Development of Small Island Developing States,¹⁷ and the Mauritius Strategy for the Further Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Sustainable Development of Small Island Developing States¹⁸ so as to address the special needs of least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States.

“30. We recognize that poverty and inequality are a concern for all countries regardless of their level of development. We also recognize that middle-income countries are still faced with significant areas of poverty and that efforts to address these challenges should be supported.

“31. We emphasize the need for continued, coordinated and effective international support for achieving the development goals in countries emerging from conflict and in those recovering from natural disasters.

“32. We remain concerned that many countries in Africa are currently not on track to achieve, by 2015, any of the goals set out in the United Nations Millennium Declaration and, in this regard, emphasize that concerted efforts and continued support are required to fulfil the commitments to address the special needs of Africa. We welcome the efforts by development partners to strengthen cooperation with the New Partnership for Africa’s Development¹⁹ and the progress made by the African countries in fulfilling their commitments in respect of the implementation of the New Partnership. In this regard, we look forward to the convening of the high-level meeting on the theme: ‘Africa’s development needs: implementation of various commitments, challenges and the way forward’, scheduled for 22 September 2008, which will review the implementation of all commitments made by and to Africa with a view to comprehensively addressing the special development needs of the continent.

“33. We call upon all countries to promote good governance, which is essential for sustainable development, and reaffirm that sound economic policies, solid democratic institutions responsive to the needs of the people and improved infrastructure are the basis for sustained economic growth, poverty eradication and employment-creation and that freedom, peace and security, domestic stability, respect for human rights, including the right to

development, the rule of law, gender equality and market-oriented policies and an overall commitment to just and democratic societies, are also essential and mutually reinforcing.

“34. We reaffirm that good governance at the international level is fundamental for achieving sustainable development; that in order to ensure a dynamic and enabling international economic environment, it is important to promote global economic governance through addressing the issue of the international finance, trade, technology and investment patterns that have an impact on the development prospects of developing countries; and that, to that end, the international community should take all necessary and appropriate measures, including ensuring support for structural and macroeconomic reform, achieving a comprehensive solution to the external debt problem and increasing the market access of developing countries.

“35. We reaffirm the commitments made in the Doha Ministerial Declaration,²⁰ the Hong Kong Ministerial Declaration²¹ and the decision of the General Council of the World Trade Organization of 1 August 2004²² to meaningfully integrate the developing and the least developed countries into the multilateral trading system and call for the successful and early conclusion of the Doha Round of trade negotiations, with the full realization of the development dimensions of the Doha Work Programme.²³

“36. We call for the early conclusion and successful development-oriented outcome of the Doha Round of trade negotiations, adhering fully to the agreed mandate in the Doha Ministerial Declaration, within the framework adopted by the General Council of the World Trade Organization in its decision of 1 August 2004 and the Hong Kong Ministerial Declaration.

“37. We reaffirm our commitment to promote, facilitate and finance, as appropriate, access to, and the development, transfer and diffusion of, environmentally sound technologies and corresponding know-how, in particular to developing countries and countries with economies in transition, on favourable terms, including on concessional and preferential terms, as mutually agreed, as set out in chapter 34 of Agenda 21.²⁴

“38. We recognize that appropriate, affordable and sustainable agricultural technologies can play an important role in helping Member States alleviate poverty, eradicate hunger and mitigate the global food crisis, and call upon the international community to make greater efforts to promote development and transfer of appropriate technologies.

“39. We strongly stress that increased financial resources should be mobilized for meeting the priority objectives of sustainable development.

“40. We reaffirm that each country must take primary responsibility for its own development and that the role of national policies and development strategies cannot be overemphasized in the achievement of sustainable development. We also recognize that national efforts should be complemented by supportive global programmes, measures and policies aimed at expanding the development opportunities of developing countries, while taking into account national conditions and ensuring respect for national ownership, strategies and sovereignty.

“41. We reiterate that in our common pursuit of growth, poverty eradication and sustainable development, a critical challenge lies in ensuring the necessary internal conditions for mobilizing domestic savings, both public and private, sustaining adequate levels of productive investment and increasing human capacity. A crucial task is to enhance the efficacy, coherence and consistency of macroeconomic policies. An enabling domestic environment is vital for mobilizing domestic resources, increasing productivity, reducing capital flight, encouraging the private sector, and attracting and making effective use of international investment and assistance. Efforts to create such an environment should be supported by the international community.

“42. We acknowledge efforts by developed countries to increase resources for development, including commitments by some developed countries to increase official development assistance. However, we note with concern the overall decline in official development assistance in 2006 and 2007, and call for the fulfilment of all official development assistance-related commitments, including the commitments made by many developed countries to achieve the target of 0.7 per cent of gross national income for official development assistance by 2015 and to reach the target of at least 0.5 per cent of gross national income for official development assistance by 2010, as well as the target of 0.15-0.20 per cent of gross national income for official development assistance to least developed countries, and urge those developed countries that have not yet done so to make concrete efforts in this regard in accordance with their commitments.

“43. We welcome the efforts of some developed countries, which are on target to meet the commitments made in terms of increased official development assistance.

“44. We further welcome recent efforts and initiatives to enhance the quality of aid and to increase its impact, including the Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness, and resolve to take concrete, effective and timely action in implementing all agreed commitments on aid effectiveness, with clear monitoring and deadlines, including through further aligning assistance with countries' strategies, building institutional capacities, reducing transaction costs and eliminating bureaucratic procedures, making progress on untying aid, enhancing the absorptive capacity and financial management of recipient countries and strengthening the focus on development results.

“45. We also emphasize the special importance of a timely, effective, comprehensive and durable solution to the debt problems of developing countries, since debt financing and debt relief can contribute to economic growth and development.

“46. We welcome the fact that the Heavily Indebted Poor Countries Initiative and the Multilateral Debt Relief Initiative have enabled heavily indebted poor countries to increase their expenditures on health, education and other social services consistent with national priorities, development plans and internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals.”

Closure of the high-level segment

120. At the 20th meeting, on 3 July, the President of the Council made a concluding statement and declared the high-level segment of the substantive session of 2008 of the Council closed.

Chapter V

Coordination segment

The role of the United Nations system in implementing the ministerial declaration of the high-level segment of the substantive session of 2007 of the Economic and Social Council

1. The Council considered agenda item 4 at its 22nd to 25th and 43rd meetings, on 7, 8, 9 and 24 July 2008. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/2008/SR.22, 23, 24, 25 and 43). The Council had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Secretary-General on the role of the Economic and Social Council in the integrated and coordinated implementation of and follow-up to the outcomes of the major United Nations conferences and summits, in the light of relevant General Assembly resolutions, including resolution 61/16 (A/63/83-E/2008/77);

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on the role of the United Nations system in implementing the Ministerial Declaration of the high-level segment of the 2007 substantive session of 2007 of the Economic and Social Council (E/2008/21).

2. At the 22nd meeting, on 7 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde) made an opening statement.

3. At the 22nd and 24th meetings, on 7 and 8 July, the Assistant Secretary-General for Policy Coordination and Inter-Agency Affairs, Department of Economic and Social Affairs, made an introductory statement.

Panel discussion

Working towards food security: the United Nations system approach

4. At the 22nd meeting, on 7 July, the Council held a panel discussion on the theme “Working towards food security: the United Nations system approach”. Opening remarks were made by the Vice-President of the Council, Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde).

5. The following panellists made presentations: John Holmes, Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator, in his capacity as Coordinator of the High-level Task Force on the Global Food Security Crisis; Themba Masuku, Director, Liaison Office, Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations; Allan Jury, Director, Division of External Relations, World Food Programme; Julia Howard, Executive Director, Partnership to Cut Hunger and Poverty in Africa; and Christopher Delgado, Adviser, Agriculture and Rural Development, World Bank.

6. Panel discussion

Rural development and the challenges of social welfare: a country-level perspective

7. At the 23rd meeting, on 8 July, the Council held a panel discussion on the theme “Rural development and the challenges of social welfare: a country-level perspective”. Opening remarks were made by the Vice-President of the Council, Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde).

8. Presentations were made by Bunmi Makinwa, Director, Africa Division, United Nations Population Fund; and Allan Jury, Director, Division of External Relations, World Food Programme.

9. The panellists responded to comments made by the representatives of the United States, the Republic of Korea, Bolivia, the Philippines, Algeria and Mozambique, and by the observer for the United Republic of Tanzania.

Dialogue with the Chairpersons of the functional commissions

The role of the Economic and Social Council in addressing violence against women in all its forms and manifestations

10. At its 24th meeting, on 8 July, the Council held a dialogue with the chairpersons of the functional commissions on the theme “The role of the Economic and Social Council in addressing violence against women in all its forms and manifestations”. The round table was chaired by the Vice-President of the Council, Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde) and moderated by the Chairperson of the Commission on the Status of Women, Olivier Belle (Belgium).

11. Presentations were made by the following panellists: the Chairperson of the Commission on Population and Development (via video link); the Vice-Chairperson of the Commission on Social Development; and by the Chairperson of the Statistical Commission.

12. The Chairpersons of the functional commissions responded to comments made by the representatives of the Philippines, France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), El Salvador, the Congo, Indonesia, Belarus, Brazil, the Republic of Korea, the United States and the Netherlands.

Round table discussion

Coherence: strengthening the normative and operational link in the work of the United Nations on rural employment

13. At its 25th meeting, on 9 July, the Council held a round table discussion on the theme “Coherence: strengthening the normative and operational link in the work of the United Nations on rural employment”. 15. The panellists responded to comments made by the representatives of France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), El Salvador and New Zealand, and by the observer for Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China).

Role of the Economic and Social Council in the integrated and coordinated implementation of the outcomes of and follow-up to major United Nations conferences and summits, in the light of relevant General Assembly resolutions, including resolution 61/16

20. At its 43rd meeting, on 24 July, the Council had before it a draft resolution submitted by the Vice-President of the Council, Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde), on the basis of informal consultations, entitled “Role of the Economic and Social Council in the integrated and coordinated implementation of the outcomes of and follow-up to major United Nations conferences and summits, in the light of relevant General Assembly resolutions, including resolution 61/16” (E/2008/L.29).

Panel discussion**Humanitarian challenges related to global food aid, including enhancing international efforts and cooperation in this field**

7. At its 33rd meeting, on 17 July, the Council held a panel discussion on the theme “Humanitarian challenges related to global food aid, including enhancing international efforts and cooperation in this field”. The Vice-President of the Council, Park In-kook (Republic of Korea), chaired the panel discussion and made an opening statement.

8. The moderator, John Holmes, Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator, made an introductory statement.

9. The following panellists made presentations: John M. Powell, Deputy Executive Director of the World Food Programme; Ismat Jahan, Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations; Louise Cord, Sector Manager of the Poverty Reduction Group at the World Bank; Jama Gulaid, Representative of the United Nations Children’s Fund in Swaziland; and Jim Butler, Deputy Director-General of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

10. The panellists engaged in a dialogue with the delegations of Brazil, Malaysia, France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), Australia, the Philippines, Finland, Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China) and the Republic of Korea and the delegations of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and the World Meteorological Organization and the representative of the Office of the Special Adviser on Africa.

Strengthening of the coordination of emergency humanitarian assistance of the United Nations

12. At the 42nd meeting, on 24 July, the representative of Brazil, also on behalf of the Republic of Korea, introduced a draft resolution entitled “Strengthening of the coordination of emergency humanitarian assistance of the United Nations” (E/2008/L.28).

13. At its 45th meeting, on 25 July, the Council had before it draft resolution E/2008/L.28. At the same meeting, the representative of Brazil orally revised paragraph 11 of the draft resolution by replacing the words “the independent study on the use of foreign military assets in disaster relief mentioned in the report of the Secretary-General” with the words “the report of the Secretary-General on the use of foreign military assets in disaster relief”.

14. The representative of France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union) requested a vote on the draft resolution.

15. Also at the 45th meeting, draft resolution E/2008/L.28, as orally revised, was adopted by a vote by show of hands of 38 to none, with 13 abstentions. See Council resolution 2008/36.

16. Before the draft resolution was adopted, statements were made by the representatives of the Republic of Korea, France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union) and Japan; after it was adopted, statements were made by the representatives of Liechtenstein, the United States of America, Canada, the Russian Federation, Brazil, Uruguay, New Zealand and Pakistan, and by the observers for Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), the Syrian Arab Republic and Mexico.

At its 38th meeting, on 22 July, the Council had before it a draft resolution submitted by the representative of Mexico entitled "Follow-up to the International Conference on Financing for Development" (E/2008/L.16). The representative of Mexico orally revised the draft resolution by replacing, in paragraph 2, the words "and the outcome of the Doha Review Conference" with the words "following the outcome of the Doha Review Conference".

9. At the same meeting, a statement was made by the observer for Guinea.

10. At its 42nd meeting, on 24 July, following a statement by the representative of Mexico, the Council adopted draft resolution E/2008/L.16, as orally revised. See Council resolution 2008/14.

2. Review and coordination of the implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2001-2010

11. For its consideration of item 6 (b), the Council had before it the annual progress report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2001-2010 (A/63/77-E/2008/61).

Action taken by the Council

12. Under agenda item 6 (b), the Council adopted resolution 2008/37.

Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2001-2010

13. At its 44th meeting, on 25 July, the Council had before it a draft resolution submitted by the Vice-President of the Council, Jean-Marie Hoscheit (Luxembourg), entitled "Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2001-2010", which was contained in an informal paper.

14. At the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of Benin.

15. Also at the same meeting, the representative of Kenya, in his capacity as facilitator of the draft resolution, made a statement and orally revised the draft resolution.

16. Also at the 44th meeting, statements were made by the observers for Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China) and Bangladesh, after which the Council decided to defer action on the draft resolution to its next meeting.

17. At its 45th meeting, on 25 July, the Council adopted the draft resolution entitled "Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed

Countries for the Decade 2001-2010” (E/2008/L.38). See Council resolution 2008/37.

B. Coordination, programme and other questions

20. At the 36th meeting, on 21 July, an introductory statement was made by the Assistant Secretary-General for Policy Coordination and Inter-Agency Affairs, Department of Economic and Social Affairs (under agenda items 7 (a) and 7 (b)). At the same meeting, an oral presentation was made by the Under-Secretary-General for Internal Oversight Services.

21. At the 39th meeting, on 22 July 2008, an introductory statement was made by the Chairman of the Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Haiti and Permanent Representative to the United Nations, John McNee (Canada) (under agenda item 7 (d)). At the same meeting, an introductory statement was made by the Chairman of the Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Guinea-Bissau and Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Dumisani Kumalo (South Africa) (under agenda item 7 (f)).

22. At the 40th meeting, on 23 July, an introductory statement was made by the Assistant Secretary-General and Special Adviser on Gender Issues and Advancement of Women, Division for the Advancement of Women (under agenda items 7 (e), 13 (k) and 14 (a)).

Panel discussion

An inclusive and coherent approach to climate change: the role of the United Nations system

23. At its 36th meeting, on 21 July, the Council held a panel discussion on the theme “An inclusive and coherent approach to climate change: the role of the United Nations system”. The panel discussion was chaired by the Vice-President of the Council, Jean-Marc Hoscheit (Luxembourg), who made an opening statement.

24. The following panellists made presentations: Robert Orr, Assistant Secretary-General for Policy Planning, Executive Office of the Secretary-General; and Thomas Stelzer, Assistant Secretary-General for Policy Coordination and Inter-Agency Affairs, Department of Economic and Social Affairs.

25. An interactive dialogue ensued, in which statements were made by the representatives of El Salvador, the United States, France (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), Indonesia, the Republic of Korea and Poland, and by the observer for Antigua and Barbuda (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China).

26. Statements were also made by the representatives of the World Meteorological Organization, United Nations Industrial Development Organization and the World Bank.

27. The representative of the United Nations Environment Programme also made a statement.

28. The panellists responded to comments and questions addressed to them, after which the Vice-President made concluding remarks.

Panel discussion

The Economic and Social Council and the Peacebuilding Commission

29. At its 39th meeting, on 22 July, the Council held a panel discussion on the theme “The Economic and Social Council and the Peacebuilding Commission”. The panel discussion was chaired by the Vice-President of the Council, Jean-Marc Hoscheit (Luxembourg), who made an opening statement.

31. Statements were made by the representatives of Portugal, Angola, Benin, Indonesia, Cape Verde, El Salvador and the Netherlands.

32. The panellists and the Vice-President made concluding remarks.

At its 38th meeting, on 22 July, the Council had before it a draft resolution submitted by the Vice-President, Jean-Marc Hoscheit (Luxembourg), on the basis of informal consultations, entitled "The need to harmonize and improve United Nations informatics systems for optimal utilization and accessibility by all States" (E/2008/L.18).

43. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft resolution. See Council resolution 2008/6.

4. Long-term programme of support for Haiti

44. The Council considered agenda item 7 (d) at its 39th and 40th meetings, on 22 and 23 July.

45. For its consideration of agenda item 7 (d), the Council had before it the report of the Economic and Social Council Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Haiti (E/2008/90).

Action taken by the Council

46. Under agenda item 7 (d), the Council adopted resolution 2008/10.

Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Haiti

47. At the 39th meeting, on 22 July, the representative of Canada, on behalf of Benin, Brazil, Canada, Chile,¹ Haiti, Spain,¹ and Trinidad and Tobago,¹ introduced a draft resolution entitled “Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Haiti” (E/2008/L.15).

48. At the 40th meeting, on 23 July, the Secretary of the Council read out a statement of programme budget implications relating to the draft resolution.

49. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft resolution. See Council resolution 2008/10.

50. Also at the same meeting, after the adoption of the draft resolution, a statement was made by the representative of Haiti.

5. Mainstreaming a gender perspective into all policies and programmes in the United Nations system

51. The Council considered agenda item 7 (e) jointly with items 14 (a) (Advancement of women) and 13 (k) (Women and development) at its 40th meeting, on 23 July.

52. For its consideration of agenda item 7 (e), the Council had before it the report of the Secretary-General on mainstreaming a gender perspective into all policies and programmes of the United Nations system (E/2008/53) (see also under agenda item 14 (a)).

53. No action was taken by the Council under the item.

64. After the adoption of the draft decision, a statement was made by the representative of Canada, also on behalf of Australia and New Zealand.

Report of the Secretary-General on the Ad Hoc Inter-Agency Task Force on Tobacco Control

65. At its 39th meeting, on 22 July, on the proposal of the Vice-President of the Council, Jean-Marc Hoscheit (Luxembourg), the Council decided to take note of the report of the Secretary-General on the progress made by the Ad Hoc Inter-Agency Task Force on Tobacco Control (E/2008/59). At the 38th meeting, on 22 July, the representative of Cuba, on behalf of Algeria, Bolivia, Burundi,¹ Chile,¹ Congo, Cuba, Namibia,¹ Nigeria,¹ Pakistan, Saint Kitts and Nevis,¹ Saint Lucia, the Solomon Islands,¹ South Africa,¹ the Sudan, the Syrian Arab Republic,¹ the United Republic of Tanzania,¹ and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of)¹ introduced a draft resolution entitled “Support to Non-Self-Governing Territories by the specialized agencies and international institutions associated with the United Nations” (E/2008/L.17). Subsequently, Angola, China and Dominica¹ joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

75. At the 42nd meeting, on 24 July, the Council adopted draft resolution E/2008/L.17 by a roll-call vote of 27 to none, with 20 abstentions. See Council resolution 2008/15. The voting was as follows:²

Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli occupation on the living conditions of the Palestinian people in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the Arab population in the occupied Syrian Golan

95. At the 43rd meeting, on 24 July, the representative of Algeria, also on behalf of Bahrain,¹ Cuba, Djibouti,¹ Egypt,¹ Iraq, Jordan,¹ Kiribati,¹ Lebanon,¹ Mauritania, Morocco,¹ Qatar,¹ Saudi Arabia, South Africa,¹ the Sudan, the United Arab Emirates,¹ Yemen¹ and Palestine,³ introduced a draft resolution entitled “Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli occupation on the living conditions of the Palestinian people in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the Arab population in the occupied Syrian Golan” (E/2008/L.26) and orally corrected operative paragraph 12 by inserting the word “mother” before the word “homeland”. Subsequently, Indonesia and Malaysia joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

96. At the 44th meeting, on 25 July, the representative of Algeria orally revised the draft resolution as follows:

(a) After the sixteenth preambular paragraph, the following new preambular paragraph was inserted:

“*Emphasizing* the importance of the safety and well-being of all civilians, and calling for the cessation of all acts of violence, including all acts of terror, provocation, incitement and destruction, and all firing of rockets,”;

(b) In the nineteenth preambular paragraph, after the words “damaged institutions”, the words “and promote good governance” were inserted, and at the end of the paragraph the words “and to ameliorate economic and social conditions” were added;

(c) At the end of paragraph 5, the words “and expresses deep concern at any actions that threaten the integrity of the border crossings and the distribution of fuel” were added.

97. At the same meeting, the Council adopted draft resolution E/2008/L.26, as orally revised, by a roll-call vote of 49 to 2, with 2 abstentions. See Council resolution 2008/31. The voting was as follows:

(e) In paragraph 11, before the word “Parties”, the word “States” was inserted.

197. At the same meeting, the Secretary of the Council read out a statement of programme budget implications relating to the draft resolution.

198. Also at the same meeting, the Council adopted draft resolution E/2008/L.31, as orally revised. See Council resolution 2008/33.

199. After the draft resolution was adopted, statements were made by the representative of the United States and the observer for Kyrgyzstan (see E/2008/SR.44).

Chapter X

1. The Council held its organizational session for 2008 at United Nations Headquarters on 14 January, 5 and 8 February (1st to 3rd meetings); its special high-level meeting with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at United Nations Headquarters on 14 April 2008 (4th and 5th meetings); its resumed organizational session at United Nations Headquarters on 29 April, 12 and 20 June (6th, 10th and 11th meetings); its special meeting on the global food crisis at United Nations Headquarters from 20 to 22 May 2008 (7th to 9th meetings); its substantive session at United Nations Headquarters from 30 June to 25 July 2008 (12th to 45th meetings); and its resumed substantive session at United Nations Headquarters from _____ to _____ (_____ to _____ meetings).

A. Organizational session

Opening of the Council

2. At its 1st meeting, on 14 January 2008, the President of the Council for 2007, Dalius Čekuolis (Lithuania), opened the meeting and made a statement.
3. At the same meeting, following his election by acclamation, the President of the Council for 2008, Léo Mérorès (Haiti), made a statement.
4. Also at the same meeting, the Secretary-General of the United Nations addressed the Council.

Election of the Bureau

5. At its 1st meeting, on 14 January, pursuant to paragraph 2 (k) of its resolution 1988/77, the Council elected by acclamation the following persons as Vice-Presidents of the Council for 2008: Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima (Cape Verde); Kim Hyun Chong (Republic of Korea); Andrei Dapkiunas (Belarus); and Jean-Marc Hoscheit (Luxembourg).
6. At its 10th meeting, on 12 June, the President of the Council made a statement that, in accordance with rule 22 of the rules of procedure of the Economic and Social Council, the Group of Asian States had endorsed the candidacy of Park In-kook, Permanent Representative of the Republic of Korea to the United Nations in New York, to continue with the unexpired term of Kim Hyun Chong, who had to return to his capital. The Council then elected by acclamation Park In-kook as a Vice-President of the Council for the remainder of its 2008 session.

Agenda

7. At its 1st meeting, on 14 January, the Council adopted the provisional agenda of its organizational session for 2008 (E/2008/2) (see annex I).

Action taken by the Council

8. At its organizational session for 2008, the Council adopted eight decisions concerning organizational matters. See Council decisions 2008/202 to 2008/209.

Report of the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights on its thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh sessions

9. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council decided to take note of the report of the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights on its thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh sessions (E/2007/22). See Council decision 2008/202.

Proposed date of the special high-level meeting of the Economic and Social Council with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development

10. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council decided that its special high-level meeting with the Bretton Woods institutions, the World Trade Organization and the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development would be held at United Nations Headquarters on 14 April 2008. See Council decision 2008/203.

Provisional agenda for the substantive session of 2008 of the Economic and Social Council

11. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council, having considered its proposed basic programme of work for 2008 and 2009 (E/2008/1), approved the proposed provisional agenda and documentation for the substantive session of the Council for 2008 (E/2008/1, sect. I), as orally corrected (see annex I). See Council decision 2008/204.

Basic programme of work of the Economic and Social Council for 2008

12. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council, having considered its proposed basic programme of work for 2008 and 2009 (E/2008/1), decided to take note of the list of questions for inclusion in the programme of work of the Council for 2008 and documentation for each agenda item (E/2008/1, sect. II). See Council decision 2008/205.

Working arrangements for the substantive session of 2008 of the Economic and Social Council

13. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council decided on the following working arrangements for its substantive session of 2008 (see Council decision 2008/206):

- (a) The high-level segment would be held from 30 June to 3 July 2008;
- (b) Dialogue with the Executive Secretaries of the regional commissions would be held on 7 July 2008;
- (c) The coordination segment would be held from 7 to 9 July 2008;
- (d) The operational activities segment would be held from 10 to 14 July 2008;
- (e) The humanitarian affairs segment would be held from 15 to 17 July 2008;

- (f) The general segment would be held from 18 to 24 July 2008;
- (g) The conclusion of the work of the Council would be held on 25 July 2008.

Operational activities segment of the 2008 substantive session of the Economic and Social Council

14. At its 2nd meeting, on 5 February, the Council decided that the work of the operational activities segment of its substantive session of 2008 should be devoted to the progress on and implementation of General Assembly resolution 62/208 on the triennial comprehensive policy review of operational activities for development of the United Nations system. See Council decision 2008/207.

Theme for the 2008 thematic discussion of the Economic and Social Council

15. At its 3rd meeting, on 8 February, the Council, recalling its decision 2007/213, in which it decided to include a discussion on promoting an integrated approach to rural development in developing countries for poverty eradication and sustainable development as part of the work of its substantive session of 2008, decided that the theme for the 2008 thematic discussion of the high-level segment would be "Promoting an integrated approach to rural development in developing countries for poverty eradication and sustainable development, taking into account current challenges". See Council decision 2008/208.

Theme for the item on regional cooperation of the 2008 substantive session of the Economic and Social Council

16. At its 3rd meeting, on 8 February, the Council decided that the theme for the item on regional cooperation of the 2008 substantive session would be "The regional dimension of the themes of the high-level segment for 2008". See Council decision 2008/209.

B. Resumed organizational session

17. At its resumed organizational session for 2008, the Council had before it the agenda and related documentation of its resumed organizational session (E/2008/2/Add.1 and Corr.1, E/2008/9 and Add.1-13).

Action taken by the Council

18. At its resumed organizational session for 2008, the Council adopted one resolution and four decisions concerning organizational matters. See Council resolution 2008/1 and decisions 2008/210 to 2008/213.

Venue and dates of the twenty-fifth session of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia

19. At its 6th meeting, on 29 April, having considered the letter dated 27 February 2008 from the Executive Secretary of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia informing the Council of the offer of the Government of Yemen to host the twenty-fifth session of the Commission, the Council expressed its gratitude

to the Government of Yemen for its generous offer and approved the holding of the twenty-fifth session of the Commission in Sana'a from 26 to 29 May 2008. See Council resolution 2008/1.

Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the Specialized Agencies: revised draft annex relating to the World Tourism Organization

20. At its 6th meeting, on 29 April, the Council decided to take note of resolution 545 (XVII) of the General Assembly of the World Tourism Organization and to recommend the revised draft annex contained in the resolution to the World Tourism Organization for final approval. See Council decision 2008/210.

Report of the Secretary-General on financing of the Committee of Experts on International Cooperation in Tax Matters

21. At its 6th meeting, on 29 April, the Council decided to defer its consideration of the report to its substantive session of 2008. See Council decision 2008/211.

Economic and Social Council event to discuss relief to development

22. At its 6th meeting, on 29 April, the Council decided, with regard to the event to discuss relief to development, that (see Council decision 2008/212):

- (a) The theme of the event would be “Coordination in the transition phase between emergency relief and sustainable recovery”;
- (b) The event would be an informal activity held on the morning of 15 July 2008;
- (c) The event would consist of one panel discussion and there would be no negotiated outcome.

Theme for the humanitarian affairs segment of the 2008 substantive session of the Economic and Social Council

23.
