### Report of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Elaboration of a Convention against Transnational Organized Crime on its second session, held in Vienna from 8 to 12 March 1999

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## **I. Introduction**

1. The Ad Hoc Committee on the Elaboration of a Convention against Transnational Organized Crime was established by the General Assembly in its resolution 53/111 of 9 December 1998. In its resolution 53/114 of 9 December 1998, the Assembly called upon the Ad Hoc Committee to devote attention to the drafting of the main text of the Convention, as well as of international instruments addressing trafficking in women and children, combating the illicit manufacturing of and trafficking in firearms, their parts and components and ammunition, and illegal trafficking in and transporting of migrants, including by sea.

## **II. Organization of the session**

### **A. Opening of the session**

2. The Ad Hoc Committee on the Elaboration of a Convention against Transnational Organized Crime held its second session in Vienna from 8 to 12 March 1999. The Ad Hoc Committee held 10 meetings.

3. At its first session, held in Vienna from 19 to 29 January 1999, the Ad Hoc Committee had decided to devote attention at its second session to the drafting of articles 1-3 of the Convention and to carry out a first reading of the additional international legal instrument on trafficking in women and children.

4. The second session of the Ad Hoc Committee was opened by its Chairman, who stressed the importance of maintaining the constructive spirit of negotiation that had been demonstrated at the first session. The Chairman also referred to a symposium on the draft Convention, organized by the Italian Senate and the Office for Drug Control and Crime Prevention of the Secretariat, held in Rome on 26 and 27 February 1999. The Chairman noted that the symposium had been attended by a number of government ministers from various regions and had afforded an opportunity to reiterate the political commitment of States to the draft Convention and to the conclusion of the negotiating process by the year 2000.

5. The representative of Japan announced that his Government had earmarked a voluntary contribution to the United Nations Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice

Fund, amounting to \$200,000, in order to facilitate the drafting of the Convention. The representative of Japan stated that his Government would consult with the Secretariat regarding the appropriate use of its contribution and expressed the hope that other Governments would also consider making similar voluntary contributions. The Chairman and the representatives of many States expressed their appreciation to the Government of Japan for its generosity.

6. At the first session of the Ad Hoc Committee, several delegations had expressed concern about the accuracy of the terms used in the translation of documents into some of the official languages and had recommended that the Secretariat undertake the compilation of a glossary of terms. At the second session, the Secretariat announced that the compilation of the glossary was under way, with the support of the Translation Service. The Secretariat intended to distribute a first draft of the glossary to the Ad Hoc Committee at its third session. States could then review it and submit their input to the Secretariat with a view to finalizing the glossary by the fourth session. The glossary would ultimately be included in the official records of the Ad Hoc Committee.

### **B. Attendance**

7. The second session of the Ad Hoc Committee was attended by representatives of 95 States. Also attending the second session were observers for entities maintaining permanent observer missions to the United Nations, organizations of the United Nations system, institutes of the United Nations Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice Programme network, intergovernmental organizations and non-governmental organizations. A list of participants is contained in annex I to the present report.

### **C. Adoption of the agenda and organization of work**

8. At its 19th meeting, on 8 March 1999, the Ad Hoc Committee adopted the following agenda for its second session:

1. Opening of the second session of the Ad Hoc Committee.
2. Adoption of the agenda and organization of work.

3. Consideration of the draft United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime, with particular emphasis on articles 1-3.
4. Consideration of the additional international legal instrument against trafficking in women and children.
5. Adoption of the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on its second session.

- “(a) The nature of the offence;  
 “(b) The transnational character of the offence;  
 “(c) Whether money-laundering is involved;  
 and  
 “(d) Whether the offence required significant planning or means for its commission.]”

13. The Chairman proposed that the list of offences included in paragraph 3 of article 2 be removed from the draft text of the Convention and that, as a compromise solution, a list of offences, which could be either indicative or exhaustive, such as the list originally contained in paragraph 3 of article 2, could be included either in an annex to the Convention or in the *travaux préparatoires*. Those proposals were accepted by the Ad Hoc Committee. The list from paragraph 3 of article 2 is contained in an attachment to the revised version of the draft Convention.

14. The above list would need to be supplemented with proposals from States. The Chairman called upon all interested States to consult with each other in order to reach agreement on the contents of the list. A list was informally circulated by some delegations at the second session and is included in the attachment to the revised version of the draft Convention.

15. Some delegations expressed their preference for including the list in an annex to the Convention. Others expressed their preference for no list at all.

16. The Ad Hoc Committee discussed articles 2 *bis* and 3. The comments and proposals made during the second session are reflected in the revised version of the draft Convention.

17. The Ad Hoc Committee also completed a first reading of articles 24 to 30 of the draft Convention. The comments and proposals made during the second session are reflected in the revised text of the draft Convention.

18. The Ad Hoc Committee requested the Secretariat to carry out an analytical study on provisions of national laws relevant to the Convention concerning offences punishable by deprivation of liberty, with an indication of the number of years of imprisonment. The study should be based on information to be solicited from Member States. Member

## D. Documentation

9. At its second session, the Ad Hoc Committee had before it, in addition to the documents prepared by the Secretariat, documents containing proposals and contributions submitted by the Governments of Argentina, Australia, Austria, Canada, Colombia, Cuba, Japan, Kuwait, Mexico, Poland, the Russian Federation, Singapore, the United Arab Emirates, the United States of America and Uruguay, and by the Council of the European Union. The list of documents is contained in annex II.

## III. Discussion on the draft Convention

10. The Ad Hoc Committee based its work on a document containing the draft United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime (A/AC.254/4/ Rev.1) and on proposals and contributions submitted by Governments (A/AC.254/5/Add.3 and 4). The Chairman noted that the revised text contained in document A/AC.254/4/Rev.1 had been the result of discussions and consultations held during the first session.

11. The Ad Hoc Committee concluded its discussion on article 1. The agreed text was included in the new version of the draft Convention.\*

12. In discussing article 2, the Ad Hoc Committee agreed that elements from paragraph 2 of the previous version could be useful to it in its consideration of other provisions, such as those pertaining to mutual legal assistance. Paragraph 2 of article 2 of the previous version reads as follows:

“[2. Among the circumstances that may be taken into account in deciding whether there are reasonable grounds to believe that a criminal organization is involved are the following:

States would also be asked to indicate whether their legislation qualified offences as serious and, if so, what criteria were used and which crimes were considered serious. Member States should submit the information before 30 April 1999 with a view to the study being completed and made available to the Ad Hoc Committee at its fourth session.

#### **IV. Discussion on the additional international legal instrument on trafficking in women and children**

19. The delegate of Argentina introduced amendments to the revised draft Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Women and Children, supplementary to the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime (A/AC.254/L.17).

20. The Ad Hoc Committee based its discussion on a document containing the revised draft Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Women and Children, Supplementing the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime (A/AC.254/4/Add.3/Rev.1). That text was a proposal submitted by Argentina and the United States of America pursuant to the commitment those States had made at the first session of the Ad Hoc Committee. The Ad Hoc Committee carried out a first reading of articles 1 and 2 of the draft Protocol. The comments and proposals made during the second session are reflected in the revised text of the draft Protocol.\*

21. The observers for the International Labour Organization and two non-governmental organizations made statements.

22. During the first reading of the draft Protocol, there was discussion on whether the Protocol would address trafficking in women and children or trafficking in persons. The Secretariat was requested to clarify the question of whether, by considering trafficking in persons, the Ad Hoc Committee would be departing from the mandate given to it by the General Assembly and, if that were the case, whether it would be competent to do so. The Secretariat undertook to explore the matter and to inform the Ad Hoc Committee of its findings.

#### **V. Adoption of the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on its second session**

23. At its 28th meeting, on 12 March 1999, the Ad Hoc Committee adopted the report on its second session (A/AC.254/L.18).

24. At the same meeting, the Ad Hoc Committee approved the provisional agenda and proposed organization of work for its third session, to be held in Vienna from 28 April to 3 May 1999 (A/AC.254/L.18/Add.1).\*\* It was also decided that at its third session it would devote one day to the consideration of the international legal instrument addressing illicit manufacturing of and trafficking in firearms, their parts and components and ammunition.
