

Press release on the assignment of Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative compliant country status to the Republic of Kazakhstan

The International Board of the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative, which met in Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire, on 17 October 2013, considered Kazakhstan's compliance with the standards established by the Initiative, concluding a process begun by the International Secretariat and Board on 15 August 2013.

The International Board took the decision to designate Kazakhstan a "compliant country", in recognition of the extremely successful outcome of its efforts to put the Initiative into practice.

Kazakhstan had made its original commitment to introduce the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative standards in 2005. The purpose of the standards is to achieve transparency in connection with the income which companies and Governments derive from extractive industries. Compliance with the Initiative is a highly valued mark of international and political standing, and of determination to combat corruption.
