RACISM, RACIAL DISCRIMINATION, XENOPHOBIA AND ALL FORMS OF DISCRIMINATION

<u>Pakistan</u>, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Organization of the Islamic Conference:

1999/... <u>Defamation of Islam</u>

The Commission on Human Rights,

Recalling that all States have pledged themselves, under the Charter of the United Nations, to promote and encourage universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion,

Reaffirming that discrimination against human beings on the grounds of religion or belief constitutes an affront to human dignity and a disavowal of the principles of the Charter of the United Nations,

Reaffirming also the call of the World Conference on Human Rights for all Governments to take all appropriate measures, in compliance with their international obligations and with due regard to their respective legal systems, to counter intolerance and related violence based on religion or belief,

Alarmed at the serious instances of intolerance, discrimination and acts of violence based on religion or belief, including acts of violence, intimidation and coercion motivated by religious extremism, occurring in many parts of the world and threatening the enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Alarmed at the negative stereotyping of Islam and the tendency to associate human rights violations and terrorism with Islam,

<u>Underlining</u> the importance of creating conditions to foster greater harmony and tolerance within and among societies, and conscious of the importance of education in ensuring tolerance of and respect for religion and belief.

<u>Welcoming</u> the designation by the General Assembly of the year 2001 as the United Nations Year of Dialogue among Civilizations,

Expressing its appreciation in this context of the joint efforts of the member States of the Organization of the Islamic Conference and the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights in organizing the seminar entitled "Enriching the Universality of Human Rights: Islamic Perspectives on the Universal Declaration of Human Rights" on 9 and 10 November 1998, thereby facilitating a better understanding of Islam and promoting dialogue between civilizations,

Emphasizing that non-governmental organizations, religious bodies and communities have an important role to play in the promotion of tolerance and the protection of freedom of religion or belief,

- 1. Expresses its concern at the use of the print, audiovisual or electronic media or any other means to spread intolerance against Islam;
- 2. <u>Expresses its appreciation</u> of the efforts of many countries and societies to combat ignorance of and intolerance towards Islam;
- 3. <u>Urges</u> all States, within their national legal framework, in conformity with international human rights instruments, to take all necessary measures to combat hatred, discrimination, intolerance and acts of violence, intimidation and coercion motivated by religious intolerance, including attacks on religious places, and to encourage understanding, tolerance and respect in matters relating to freedom of religion or belief;

- 4. <u>Invites</u> the High Commissioner, in this context, to formalize the holding of regular seminars to promote a dialogue among cultures within the Commission thus contributing to a better understanding of the universality of human rights;
- 5. <u>Calls upon</u> the Special Rapporteur on religious intolerance to continue to devote attention to attacks against Islam and attempts to defame it in his report to the Commission at its fifty-sixth session;
- 6.  $\underline{\text{Decides}}$  to remain seized of this matter at its fifty-sixth session.

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
