## *Summary*

The thirty-sixth session of the Commission on Population and Development was held at United Nations Headquarters from 31 March to 4 April 2003. Its special theme for this session was “Population, education and development”.

The documents before the Commission included a report on world population monitoring, focusing on the theme of the session. The report provided recent information on selected aspects of population, education and development, covering such topics as: trends in population, education and development; education and entry into reproductive life; the interrelationship between education and fertility; education, health and mortality; and education and international migration. The report found that education plays a key role in national development, in addition to being a prime component of individual well-being. Through education, individuals are empowered to make decisions and to exercise their choices in areas such as work, place of residence, family size, health and lifestyles and personal development. When aggregated, these individual choices and decisions have dramatic consequences for a population.

Other reports presented to the Commission covered the intersessional meeting of the Bureau of the Commission; monitoring of population programmes focusing on population, education and development; the flow of financial resources for assisting in the implementation of the Programme of Action; world demographic trends, programme implementation and progress of work in the field of population in 2002; and the draft programme of work of the Population Division for the biennium 2004-2005.

The Commission heard a statement by the special discussant, Professor Alaka Basu of Cornell University (Ithaca, United States of America), and keynote addresses by Dr. Paul Demeny of the Population Council (New York City, United States of America) and Professor Amartya Sen, Nobel Prize Laureate and Master of Trinity College (Cambridge, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland).

In its consideration of follow-up actions to the recommendations of the International Conference on Population and Development, the Commission adopted two resolutions. In one resolution, the Commission decided that the special theme for its thirty-eighth session, in 2005, should be “Population, development and HIV/AIDS, with particular emphasis on poverty”.

In a second resolution, the Commission requested that the Population Division of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs continue its research and that the United Nations Population Fund continue its programming on the linkages between population, education and development, in close cooperation with all relevant bodies, funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system. The resolution also requested the Population Division to work in close cooperation with all relevant bodies, funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system to contribute its research findings to the implementation of the outcomes relevant to population, education and development of the United Nations conferences and summits. The resolution requested that the findings from that and related research on population, education and development should contribute to the next review and appraisal of the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development, scheduled for 2004, and, as appropriate, to other

relevant conferences and reviews, including the World Summit for the Information Society and the regular reviews of the Dakar Declaration and the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS. The resolution also encouraged the Population Division to disseminate widely the results of its research, as a contribution to greater understanding and awareness of the interrelationships between population, education and development. Finally, the resolution encouraged the United Nations Population Fund to continue its support for population, education and development programmes.

The Commission also decided to take note of the documents submitted at its session (E/CN.9/2003/2-7). The Commission approved the draft provisional agenda for its thirty-seventh session, to be held in New York in 2004, and adopted its report on its thirty-sixth session.

*Noting* the importance of education, especially of young persons and in particular of girls and women, to achieving population and development goals and the contribution, to this end, of the relevant United Nations bodies, funds and programmes, including the United Nations Girls' Education Initiative,

*Bearing in mind* the objectives relevant to population, education and development of the United Nations Millennium Declaration,<sup>6</sup> and the outcome of other major United Nations conferences and summits and their reviews, in particular those relevant to population, education and development,

*Bearing in mind also* the recommendations relevant to population, education and development of the World Education Forum and the World Conference on Education for All<sup>7</sup> and the designation of 2003-2012 as the United Nations Literacy Decade,<sup>8</sup>

*Noting* the critical linkages between population, education and development,

*Noting with concern* the reported recent decline in resource flows for the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development,

1. *Requests* the Population Division of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat to continue its research and the United Nations Population Fund to continue its programming, in close cooperation with all relevant bodies, funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system, including the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, on the linkages between population, education and development, including the relationships between population factors and the attainment of the goals of Education for All, giving attention to the way in which education interacts with health, particularly sexual and reproductive health, including HIV/AIDS, and to the way in which education influences the levels, trends and differentials of mortality, fertility, distribution and mobility, and the role of population and development policies, as well as gender inequalities, in such levels, trends and differentials;

2. *Also requests* the Population Division to work in close cooperation with all relevant bodies, funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system to contribute its research findings to the implementation of the outcomes relevant to population, education and development of the United Nations conferences and summits;

3. *Further requests* that the findings from that and related research on population, education and development should contribute to the next review and appraisal of the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development<sup>1</sup> and, as appropriate, to other relevant conferences and reviews, including the World Summit for the Information Society and the regular reviews of the Dakar Declaration and the Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS;<sup>9</sup>

4. *Encourages* the Population Division, in close cooperation with all relevant bodies, funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system, to disseminate widely the results of its research, as a contribution to greater understanding and awareness of the interrelationships between population, education and development;

5. *Encourages* the United Nations Population Fund, in close cooperation with relevant partners, to continue its support for population, education and development programmes so as to accelerate the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development.

## Chapter II

### **Follow-up actions to the recommendations of the International Conference on Population and Development**

3. The Commission on Population and Development held a general discussion on item 3 of its agenda, entitled "Follow-up actions to the recommendations of the International Conference on Population and Development", at its 1st and 2nd meetings, on 31 March and 2 April 2002. It had before it the following documents:

(a) Concise report of the Secretary-General on world population monitoring, 2003: population, education and development (E/CN.9/2003/2);

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on the monitoring of population programmes focusing on population, education and development, 2003 (E/CN.9/2003/3);

(c) Report of the Secretary-General on the flow of financial resources for assisting in the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (E/CN.9/2003/4).

(d) Statement submitted by the Asian Forum of Parliamentarians on Population and Development, a non-governmental organization in special consultative status with the Economic and Social Council (E/CN.9/2003/NGO/1).

4. At the 1st meeting, on 31 March, introductory statements were made by the Director of the Population Division, Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat; the Chief of the Population Studies Branch of the Population Division; the Senior Technical Officer of the Reproductive Health Branch of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA); and the Senior Resource Flows Officer of the Population and Development Branch of UNFPA.

5. At the same meeting, the special discussant for the item, Alaka Basu of Cornell University, made a statement.

6. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the United States of America and Japan, and by the observers for Morocco (on behalf of the Group of 77 and China) and Greece (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union and the acceding countries of Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia, the associated countries of Bulgaria, Romania and Turkey, and the European Free Trade Association country Liechtenstein).

7. At the 2nd meeting, on 31 March, statements were made by the representatives of Brazil, the Russian Federation, Pakistan, China, Guyana, Indonesia, Algeria and India, and by the observers for Canada, Switzerland and Ethiopia.

8. At the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific.

9. Also at the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of Partners in Population and Development, an intergovernmental organization.

## **Action taken by the Commission**

### **Population, education and development**

10. At the 7th meeting, on 4 April, the Vice-Chairman of the Commission, Alfredo Chuquihuara (Peru), reported to the Commission on the work undertaken in the informal working group and also introduced a draft resolution (E/CN.9/2003/L.5) entitled "Population, education and development".

11. At the same meeting, the Commission adopted the draft resolution (see chap. I, sect. B, resolution 2003/1).

12. After the adoption of the draft resolution, a statement was made by the representative of the United States of America.

### **Special theme for the Commission on Population and Development in 2005**

13. At the 7th meeting, on 4 April, the Vice-Chairman of the Commission, Alfredo Chuquihuara (Peru), reported to the Commission on the work undertaken in the informal working group and also introduced a draft decision (E/CN.9/2003/L.3) entitled "Special theme for the Commission on Population and Development in 2005".

14. At the same meeting, the Commission adopted the draft decision (see chap. I, sect. B, decision 2003/1).

### **Documents considered by the Commission under agenda item 3**

15. At the 7th meeting, on 4 April, on the proposal of the Chairman, the Commission took note of the documentation submitted under agenda item 3 (see chap. I, sect. B, decision 2003/2).

## Chapter III

### **National experience in population matters: population, education and development**

16. The Commission considered item 4 of its agenda, entitled “National experiences in population matters: population, education and development”, at its 3rd to 6th meetings, on 1 and 2 April 2002.

17. At the 3rd meeting, on 1 April, statements in the general debate were made by the representatives of the Russian Federation, Belgium, Guyana, Malaysia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Gambia, Poland and China, and the observer for Sweden.

18. At the 4th meeting, on 1 April, statements in the general debate were made by the representatives of the Netherlands, Ireland, Algeria, Pakistan, Indonesia, Nicaragua, France, Kenya, El Salvador, Mexico, India and the Islamic Republic of Iran, and the observers for South Africa and Tunisia.

19. At the 5th meeting, on 2 April, statements in the general debate were made by the representatives of Egypt, Ghana, Bangladesh, Uganda and the Philippines, and the observers for the Dominican Republic and Cuba.

20. At the 6th meeting, on 2 April, statements were made by the representatives of Austria, Cameroon and Peru, and the observers for Portugal and Spain.

#### **Keynote addresses**

21. At its 3rd meeting, on 1 April, the Commission heard a keynote address by Paul Demeny of the Population Council, which was followed by a discussion in which the delegations of France, the United States of America, Italy, Mexico, the Philippines, El Salvador and Tunisia took part.

22. At its 5th meeting, on 2 April, the Commission heard a keynote address by Amartya Sen, Nobel Prize Laureate and Master of Trinity College, Cambridge, which was followed by a discussion in which the delegations of Bangladesh, India, Mexico and Spain and the representative of UNFPA took part.

## Chapter IV

### **Programme implementation and future programme of work of the Secretariat in the field of population**

23. The Commission held a general discussion of item 5 of its agenda, entitled "Programme implementation and future programme of work of the Secretariat in the field of education", at its 6th meeting, on 2 April 2003. It had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Secretary-General on world demographic trends (E/CN.9/2003/5);

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on the programme implementation and progress of work in the field of population in 2002: Population Division, Department of Economic and Social Affairs (E/CN.9/2003/6);

(c) Draft programme of work of the Population Division for the biennium 2004-2005 (E/CN.9/2003/7).

24. At the same meeting, introductory statements were made by the representative of the Population Division and the Chief of the Fertility and Family Planning Section of the Population Division.

25. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the Russian Federation, the United States of America, China and Ghana.

26. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the Office of the Regional Commissions in New York (on behalf of the Economic Commission for Europe), the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean and the Economic Commission for Africa.

27. Also at the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of the African Union.

28. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the World Bank, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

### **Action taken by the Commission**

29. At the 7th meeting, on 5 April, on the proposal of the Chairman, the Commission took note of the documents submitted under agenda item 5 (see chap. I, sect. B, decision 2003/2).

## Chapter V

### **Provisional agenda for the thirty-seventh session of the Commission**

30. At the 7th meeting, on 4 April 2003, the Director of the Population Division introduced the draft provisional agenda for the thirty-seventh session of the Commission (E/CN.9/2003/L.2/Rev.1).

31. At the same meeting, the Commission decided to recommend the draft provisional agenda contained in document E/CN.9/2003/L.2/Rev.1 to the Economic and Social Council for adoption (see chap. I, sect. A).

## **Chapter VI**

### **Adoption of the report of the Commission on its thirty-sixth session**

32. At its 7th meeting, on 4 April 2003, the Commission adopted the draft report on its thirty-sixth session (E/CN.9/2003/L.4), as introduced by the Vice-Chairman-cum-Rapporteur.

33. At the same meeting, the Commission also authorized the Vice-Chairman-cum-Rapporteur to finalize the report by incorporating therein the proceedings of its 7th meeting.

## Chapter VII

### Organization of the session

#### A. Opening and duration of the session

34. The Commission held its thirty-sixth session at United Nations Headquarters from 31 March to 4 April 2003. The Commission held 7 meetings (1st to 7th).

35. The session was opened by the Chairman of the thirty-fifth session, Antonio Golini (Italy).

36. Opening statements were made by the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat, the Executive Director of the United Nations Population Fund and the Director of the Population Division.

#### B. Attendance

37. The session was attended by 42 States Members of the Commission. Observers for other States Members of the United Nations and for 1 non-member State also attended. Representatives of the specialized agencies, intergovernmental organizations and non-governmental organizations also attended. The list of participants is contained in annex I.

41. At the same meeting, the Commission took note of the report.
