Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004)

Note verbale dated 23 December 2005 from the Permanent Mission of Cuba to the United Nations addressed to the Chairman of the Committee

The Permanent Mission of Cuba to the United Nations presents its compliments to the Chairman of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004) and, with reference to his letter dated 31 August 2005, has the honour to submit herewith Cuba's response to the matrix received (see annex), together with the following comments:

- Although the covering note accompanying the matrix is dated 31 August 2005, the Mission did not receive the matrix until 21 September 2005.
- Cuba does not object to the use of information it has supplied pursuant to international disarmament instruments to which it is a party by the Committee established pursuant to Security Council resolution 1540 (2004) in its examination of compliance with that resolution. However, for that exercise to be useful, the context in which the information has been provided must be respected, and the neutrality, objectivity and impartiality which must be the hallmark of the work of all United Nations organs must be preserved. Cuba wishes to point out that unnecessary duplication and overlap must be avoided, and that the mandate conferred on each body to carry out its functions must be adhered to, with the aim of preventing the de facto imposition of non-proliferation verification arrangements which erode the role and function of the systems emanating from existing treaties, including the role of such bodies as the International Atomic Energy Agency and the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.
- Cuba confirms that it is a State free of any form of weapons of mass destruction or means of delivery. It will continue to be fully committed to the goal of general and complete disarmament and to non-proliferation in all its aspects.
- It should be noted that, in some cases, the titles of the various sections of the matrix do not correspond exactly with the terms appearing in resolution 1540 (2004), creating confusion for the respondents. Examples are some of the headings dealing with possession of nuclear, chemical or biological weapons

and their means of delivery or the production of substances or materials which could be used for such purposes.

• The matrix received uses terms and concepts whose scope the Committee should further explain, because no clear definition of them exists. Examples include "catch-all clause", "intangible transfers" and "inclusion of technologies".

The Mission requests that this note and its annex should be circulated as documents of the Security Council.
