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#### PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1986-1987

### Standards of accommodation for air travel

## Report of the Secretary-General

- 1. In accordance with paragraph 4 of General Assembly resolution 32/198 of 21 December 1977, as amended by section X of resolution 35/217, of 17 December 1980, section III of resolution 37/237 of 21 December 1982 and section VII of resolution 39/236 of 18 December 1984, and decision 40/455 of 18 December 1985, the Secretary-General submits herein his annual report on the implementation of these resolutions, noting all first-class travel and exceptions made to the rules on standards of accommodation for air travel, including details of resultant additional costs of, and reasons for, such exceptions. The report covers travel for the period 1 July 1986 to 30 June 1987.
- 2. The table below provides information on the expenditures for first-class travel as requested in General Assembly decision 40/455. Such expenditures are presented in three categories, in respect of: (a) the travel of one member of each delegat ion attending sessions of the Assembly, who is entitled to first-class air travel in accordance with Assembly resolution 32/198? (b) other travel by non-Secretariat officials; and (c) travel of Secretariat officials other than the Secretary-General, according to their entitlement.

<sup>4.</sup> The figures on the cost of travel reported in the above tables in respect of other non-Secretariat officials and Secretariat officials represent those journeys that were either entirely by first-class or only partially by first-class because one or more legs of the journey involved flights of less than nine hours. In the latter cases, the coat was calculated as the sum of the cost of return travel by business class from the point of origin to the farthest point of destination plus the difference between the published first-class and business-class fares for each leg of the itinerary actually flown by first-class.

- 5. The Secretary-General exercised his discretion in making exceptions to the rules or etandards of accommodation for air travel in accordance with paragraph 3 of General Assembly resolution 32/198 as amended by section VII of Assembly resolution 39/236, in 43 cases. Of these, 41 involved first-class travel (none of which were by Concorde) and 2 involved business-class travel. During the previous reporting period, July 1985 to June 1986, the number of exceptions was 56, 44 involving first-class travel and 12 involving business class. The exceptions approved in the current reporting period were as follows; 1/

7. The total additional coats incurred by the Organisation as a result Of exceptions to the current rules during the period July 1986 to June 1987 was \$35,650. The corresponding additional costs in the preceding reporting period was \$38,060.

# Travel entitlement for members of the United Nations Scientific Committee on the Effects of Atomic Radiation

- 8. In view of questions raised by the United Nations Board of Auditors egarding the travel entitlement for members of the United Nations Scientific Committee on the Effects of Atomic Radiation, this issue is raised in this report for appropriate decision by the General Aseembly.
- 9. Members of the Committee have been provided first-class travel in accordance with the provisiona of resolution 2145 (XXI) of 20 December 1966, which was adopted by the General Assembly at its twenty-first session after consideration of the report of the Secretary-General on the "Standards of air travel accommodation". 2/In paragraph 11 of his report, the Secretary-General had recommended the reinstatement of first-class travel entitlement to all members of organs and subsidiary organs serving in their individual, personal or expert capacity. He had further enumerated in annex I to said report the list of organs and subsidiary organs involved, which specifically included the Committee.
- 10. In March 1986, however, the United Nations Board of Auditors, in an audit observation, had questioned the validity of extending first-class air accommodation to members of the Committee. They specifically referred to paragraph 1 of General Assembly resolution 913 (X) of 3 December 1955, which stated that the Committee was to be composed of scientists designated by specified Governments to be their representatives. In light of that, the Auditors concluded that the scientists sitting in the Committee were not persons serving in their individual capacity but were representatives of Governments and that, as such, they were only entitled to economy-class accommodation (or the class immediately below first, for flights exceeding nine hours) in accordance with the provisions of Assembly resolution 2245 (XXI).

11. It may be assumed that the Secretary-General in his proposal and the General Assembly in its 1966 decision had considered the Committee members to have the dual status of being scientific experts and government representatives. In the light, however, of the nature of the observation made by the Board of Auditors, this matter is presented to the General Assembly for its consideration.

- 1/ Unless otherwise indicated, the exc eptions granted were for the use of first-class. The dots included in a given itinerary indicate that some legs of the itinerary were by the regular standard of accommodation and no exception was involved.
