# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INDUSTRIAL CLASSIFICATION

A Proposed International Standard Industrial Classification

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#### PART I

#### INTRODUCTION

- 1. The Statistical Commission as part of its programme looking toward the development of comparable statistics among the various countries of the world, expressed the view "that priority should be given to standardization in the field of industrial classification". (E/264). The Statistical Commission accordingly elected a Committee on Industrial Classification whose responsibilities were to:
  - (a) consider the data collected from governments regarding their industrial classification statistics now in use or under consideration by them together with any explanatory notes which may be available; (E/264, paragraphs 39 and 40)
  - (b) plan and consider a future programme of work in this field; (E/264, paragraphs 39 and 40)
  - (c) consider proposals on a standard industrial classification from a group of experts especially selected for this purpose (E/409).
- 2. The Economic and Social Council on 29 March 1947, after considering the report of the Commission on this subject, adopted the following resolution:

"HAVING NOTED with approval the recommendations of the Statistical Commission regarding its programme for the development of an international standard industrial classification,

AUTHORIZES the Statistical Commission to invite individual experts, not more than seven in number, to work with the Committee on Industrial Classification established by the Commission to make proposals to the Commission on a standard industrial classification." (E/409)

- 3. In accordance with these instructions the Committee submits the attached report to the Commission and makes the following suggestions as to future procedure:
- (a) That the report should be circulated to all member governments and to the Specialized Agencies with a request that they should forward /their views

their views and comments on the proposals to reach the Secretariat not later than 1 February 1948.

- (b) That a further meeting of the Committee on Industrial Classification should be arranged for a date in February 1948 at which these comments could be considered and a final draft prepared.
- (c) That the Statistical Commission authorize the Chairman to request the Secretary-General to invite experts in this field to work with the Committee on Industrial Classification. The following individual experts are suggested as an initial group to which others may be added upon nomination by members of the Commission to the Chairman.

  - (ii) V. S. Kolesnikoff
- (iii) N. McKellar
  - (iv) A. Skaug
- Having considered the principles enunciated by the Committee of Statistical Experts of the League of Nations concerning statistics of the gainfully occupied population, the Committee on Industrial Classification endorses the principles outlined in the League of Nations report on "Statistics of the Gainfully-Occupied Population", "Studies and Reports on Statistical Method No. 1", document C.226.M.128.1938.II.A. The Committee on Industrial Classification in following the lead of the Committee of Experts of the League of Nations proposes a classification of branches of economic activity (industry) which may be used for all purposes for which such a classification is appropriate. Thus while the classification as a whole will ordinarily be required for a census of population or other inquiry covering all branches of economic activity, the relevant sections may be used in more limited surveys obtaining their data from either individuals or establishments, for example: censuses of manufacturing, mining, agriculture, distribution, etc., as well as surveys of employment, unemployment, industrial accidents and similar subjects.
- 5. It is recognized that the requirements for industrial data for purposes /of international

of international comparison do not necessarily coincide with the domestic requirements of any one nation for such information. The attached classification is not, therefore, identical with that of any country. There is no reason that it should exactly parallel any domestic classification.

- 6. The purpose of this proposed international standard industrial classification is not to supersede existing national classifications, but to provide an up-to-date framework for the international comparison of statistics of national governments. The classification may be recommended for use as it stands by countries wishing to adopt for the first time a classification of industries. In the cases of countries that already have classification systems, a desirable degree of comparability may be achieved simply by a regrouping of the figures shown under the national classification, but, in these cases it is considered essential that all the necessary elements for such a regrouping be obtainable from national statistics.
- 7. While agreeing in general with the principles set forth by the Committee of Experts of the League of Nations, it is felt that the experience gained during the past ten years indicates the need for further elucidation and clarification of certain points. It is therefore proposed that the following definition of an establishment and statement of general principles be adopted:

#### A. Definition of Establishment

An establishment is generally defined as a single physical location where business is conducted or where services or industrial operations are performed; for example, a factory, mill, store, mine, farm or a business or profession carried on by an individual working on his own account. Where a single physical location comprises two or more units which are engaged in distinct or separate activities for which different industry classifications are provided, each such unit shall be treated as a separate establishment. Whenever it is practicable to do so, units which maintain separate payroll and inventory records should be regarded as separate establishments. An establishment may include

/departments

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departments which are accessory to the main function of the concern; for example, a woodworking shop in an automobile factory, a printing shop in a paper box factory. In such a case, the establishment is assigned as a unit to the manufacture of automobiles or paper boxes respectively.

#### В. General Principles

- (a) The minimum list of industries is a classification of industries and not of occupations or commodities.
- (b) The classification is by industries irrespective of the kind of ownership. For example, industries operated by governmental authorities are classified by the character of the industry and not by the kind of ownership.
- (c) Each individual establishment is taken as the unit for classification and the classification of an individual establishment is determined by the principal product produced or handled or service rendered by the establishment. It is recommended that the principal product or service be determined by the proportion of gross revenue attributable to the produce or service. In case of the absence of information on value of product or service, the use of employment data is permissible; however, where possible every effort should be made to obtain data on value of product or service.

In the case of surveys obtaining data from individuals, each individual is assigned to an industry class on the basis of the nature of business of the establishment in which he works. An unemployed person is classified according to the nature of business of the establishment in which he was last employed for a significant period. A person with no previous employment history, but who is looking for work, is assigned to Division 9 - Activities Not Adequately Described.

(d) Some establishments have separate operating units engaged in making articles (such as containers or packing) to be used primarily in the distribution of their own products. It is proposed that such /units be

units be classified under the same headings as the establishments for which they are working.

- 8. It should be noted that in the new classification all notations are made in terms of arabic numbers. This change from the notational system adopted in the League of Nations classification has been instituted in the belief that it will be more universally accepted. Alphabets differ in various parts of the world and therefore letter references are sometimes not fully understood, whereas arabic numbers are universally recognized.
  - 9. In addition, the numeric system used to identify divisions, major groups and sub-groups in the new classification are arranged on a decimal system.

    This meets the requirements of offices using punch cards and mechanical sorting and tabulating equipment, and at the same time provides a means whereby the proposed classification can be indefinitely expanded without changes in the basic outline or in the basic system of major groups and sub-groups.
  - 10. The whole field of industry is divided into nine major divisions. Each major division is assigned its permanent 1-digit number, except Manufacturing which, because of the great number of major industrial groups, receives two 1-digit numbers (2 and 3).
  - 11. Each major division has ten available sub-divisions (called major groups) and these are identified with 2-digit numeric notations. The first digit indicates the major division and the second number identifies the major sub-division of that division. The number of major groups within a major division varies from 1 to 10.
- 12. Major groups, in turn, can be sub-divided into 3-digit groups, the first digit identifying the major division, the first and second taken together indicating the major groups, and the first, second and third taken together identifying the industry class.
- 13. In cases where a major group is not sub-divided into groups, the title of the major group is also used as the title of the 3-digit group with "O" added to the identification number of the major group. For example,

  Major Group 72, Communication, has no further sub-division and the number 720 identifies the 3-digit group Communication. If it is decided to establish a /number

number of detailed sub-divisions - say, postal service, telephone, telegraph, and radio - then the major group and its sub-divisions would be identified as follows:

14. Special attention of the Statistical Commission is called to the fact that no matter how adequately the classification is developed, its full usefulness as an instrument to obtain internationally comparable data can be achieved only if the various users assign similar units, (establishments, individuals, etc.) to the same category. It is therefore recommended that as soon as the necessary data can be obtained an alphabetic index of principal products, services, etc., be developed and issued as a supplementary report.

15. Since 1938 considerable attention has been given in many countries to problems of industrial classification. These studies have indicated the need for certain modifications in the classification proposed by the League's Committee of Statistical Experts. The table which follows presents a summary of the changes which have been incorporated in the present report.

#### Division O. - AGRICULTURE, FORESTRY, HUNTING, AND FISHING

To include all forms regardless of kind of cwnership and type of operation. A farm for purposes of industrial classification is defined as all land used wholly or partly for agricultural production; that is, growing of field crops, fruits, nuts, seeds, vegetables, flowers, both in the open and under glass, tea plantations, rubber plantations and the production of livestock, milk, and wool, poultry and eggs, honey, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, etc.

Should a more detailed classification be desired, it is recommended that it should be based upon the principal product, and not upon type of ownership or organization.

To include also agricultural services such as inspection and protection services; cotton ginning and compressing; corn shelling; hay baling; threshing; animal husbandry; and horticultural services.

#### FORESTRY AND LOGGING

#### 021 Forestry

To include timber tracts; reforestation; and gatherings of all kinds of crude materials, such as gums from spruce, chestnut, cherry, and rubber trees; barks; herbs, wild fruits, moss, and balsam needles.

#### 022 <u>Logging</u>

To include logging camps for felling and cutting trees, and rafting of logs. To include also logging contractors.

#### 03 030 EURTING, TRAPPING, AND GAME PROPAGATION

Eunting and trapping wild animals for commercial purposes;

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O3 O30 game propagation for commercial purposes. Not to include establishments operating a guide service for sportsmen.

O4 O40 FISHING

Fishing in inland and ocean waters; operation of cyster teds; whaling. To include also fishery services such as fishery inspection and protection service, and the operation of fish hatcheries.

#### Division 1. - MINING AND QUARRYING

Extraction of minerals which occur in nature as either solids, liquids, or gases, and which may be organic or inorganic. Underground and surface mines, quarries, and oil wells with all supplemental operations for dressing and beneficiating ores and other crude minerals are to be included in this Division. Contractors' services preparatory to actual operations of mines, quarries, and oil wells to be classified with Construction (400).

#### 11 110 COAL MINING

Mines primarily engaged in the extraction of anthracite and of bituminous and other soft coals. This Major Group also shall include establishments which break, wash, or grade coal. Production of coke and coke by-products to be classified in Manufacturing.

Mines engaged in the extraction of metalliferous ores and in the dressing and beneficiating of ores.

Establishments primarily engaged in mining and quarrying such materials as asbestos, gypsum, salt and sulphur; and all other non-metallic minerals except coal, stone, clay, sand and gravel.

#### Divisions 2-3. - MANUFACTURING

To include establishments engaged in the mechanical or chemical transformation of inorganic or organic substances into new products, whether the work is performed by power-driven machines or by hand, and whether it is done in a factory or in the worker's home. Establishments engaged in assembling component parts of manufactured products are also considered manufacturing if the new product is neither a structure nor other fixed improvement.

The materials used by manufacturing establishments may be purchased directly from producers, obtained through customary trade channels, or secured without recourse to the market by transferring the product from one establishment to another which is under the same ownership. Manufacturing production is usually carried on for the wholesale market, for interplant transfer, or to order for industrial users, rather than for direct sale to the domestic consumer.

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Printing, publishing, and industries servicing the printing trades are classified as manufacturing industries.

Establishments engaged in repair work are classified with the appropriate class in the manufacturing division.

Auxiliary units, such as power plants, laboratories, repair shops, garages, or warehouses, operated by a manufacturing establishment for its own use, are classified according to the primary activity of the manufacturing establishment. Central and district administrative offices are included with the manufacturing establishment when they are not primarily wholesale outlets.

#### FOOD MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES (NOT INCLUDING BEVERAGE INDUSTRIES)

Establishments manufacturing foods for human consumption and certain related products such as chewing gum, spices, manufactured ice, and prepared feeds for animals and fowls.

#### Slaughtering, Preparation and Preserving of Meat

Abattoirs and meat packing plants; establishments engaged in killing, dressing, packing, and canning poultry, rabbits, and small game for the trade.

#### 202 Manufacture of Dairy Products

Establishments prinarily engaged in manufacturing creamery butter, natural cheese, condensed milk, ice cream and ices, and special dairy products such as processed butter, processed cheese, and malted milk,

#### 203 Canning and Preserving of Fruits and Vegetables

Vegetables including fruit and vegetable juices; manufacturing and canning soups, preserves, jams and jellies, pickles and sauces. To include also establishments engaged in quick-freezing fruits, vegetables, and other foods.

Macaroni, spaghetti, vermicelli and noodles not to be included but to be classified with Miscellaneous Food Preparations (309).

#### 207 Sugar Factories and Refineries

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing raw sugar, syrup, and granulated or clarified cane sugar from sugar cane; as well as manufacturing sugar from sugar beets. To include also sugar refineries.

#### 208 Manufacture of Cocoa, Chocolate and Sugar Confectionery

Establishments manufacturing candy and other confections such as chocolate candies, chocolate-covered bars, marshmallows, fudge, candied and crystallized fruits, candy-covered nuts, salted nuts, stuffed dates and similar products; also manufacturing chocolate and cocoa butter from cocoa beans and other chocolate and cocoa products. Manufacturing of chewing gum also to be included.

#### 209 Miscellareous Food Preparations

To include establishments manufacturing all kinds of food preparations not elsewhere classified.

#### BEVERAGE INDUSTRIES

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Includes establishments producing distilled spirits, wine,

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209 malt liquors, soft drinks and carbonated beverages.

211 Distilling, Rectifying and Blending of Spirits

Establishments which distil or blend alcoholic liquors such as whiskey, brandy, rum, gin, cordials, and prepared mixed drinks (cocktails).

212 Wine Industries

Establishments engaged in the production of wines, cider, and perry.

213 Breweries and Manufacturing of Malt

Establishments engaged in the production of malt liquors such as beer, ale, porter and stout.

214 Soft Drinks and Carbonated Water Industries

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Establishments manufacturing non-alcoholic beverages such as soft drinks and carbonated mineral waters.

22 220 TOBACCO MANUFACTURES

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Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing cigarettes, cigars, smoking and chewing tobacco and snuff. Stemming, redrying and other operations connected with preparing raw-leaf tobacco for manufacturing also to be included.

MANUFACTURE OF TEXTILES

To include establishments engaged in performing any of the following operations: (1) processing textile fibres to prepare them for spinning; (2) manufacturing yarn, thread, woven fabrics, knit fabrics, laces, braids, carpets and rugs, knit garments made on knitting machines; (3) dyeing and finishing fabrics, yarn and fibres; (4) coating, waterproofing, and otherwise treating fabrics; (5) manufacturing cordage, ropes and twine.

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231 Primary Textile Mills Other Than Knitting Mills

To include scouring and combing plants; yarn and thread mills; broadwoven fabric mills; narrow fabrics and other small wares mills; dyeing and finishing establishments; carpet and rug factories; lace mills, and other primary textile manufacturing establishments.

232 Knitting Mills

To include hosiery mills and other knitting mills.

233 Cordage, Rope, and Twine Factories

Establishments manufacturing rope, cable, cordage, twine, and related goods from hemp, jute, cotton, paper, flax, and other fibres.

239 Textile Mills Not Elsewhere Classified

To include mills engaged in manufacturing linoleum and other hard-faced floor coverings with textile base; artificial leather, oilcloth and other impregnated and coated fabrics; felt factories.

MANUFACTURE OF WEARING APPAREL AND OTEER MADE-UP TEXTILE GOODS

Industries manufacturing footwear, gloves, hats, clothing, apparel, accessories and all kinds of made-up textile goods.

241 Manufacture of Wearing Apperel Except Footwear

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing wearing apparel by cutting and sewing fabrics, leather, fur and other materials, in fur-dressing and dyeing and in manufacturing umbrellas and walking sticks. Important products of this group are: underwear and outer-wear; millinery; hats; fur goods; gloves and mittens; suspenders, garters and related products; robes and dressing gowns; raincoats and other waterproof outer garments; leather and sheep-lined clothing; apparel belts regardless of material; handkerchiefs; academic caps

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and gowns; vestments; theatrical costumes. Establishments primarily engaged in cleaning and pressing articles of wearing apparel to be classified in Group 844, Laundries and laundry service; cleaning and dyeing.

242 Manufacture of Footwear Except Rubber Footwear

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing all kinds of footwear, leggings, and overgaiters made of leather, fabrics, plastics, wood and other materials. Manufacturing of rubber footwear to be classified in Major Group 30, Manufacture of Rubber Products.

243 Repair of Footwear

Establishments primarily engaged in repairing boots and shoes (cobbling).

244 Manufacture of Made-Up Textile Goods

Establishments that do no weaving and are primarily engaged in making up curtains, draperies, and other house furnishings such as sheets, pillowcases, napkins, tablecloths, comfortables, blankets, bedspreads, pillows, laundry bags, and slip covers; textile bags; canvas products; trimmings; embroideries; banners, flags, and pennants. To include also stitching, and tucking plants.

250 MANUFACTURES OF WOOD AND CORK EXCEPT MANUFACTURE OF FURNITURE

To include sawmills, veneer mills, lath mills, shingle mills, cooperage stock mills, planing mills, plywood mills, and establishments engaged in wood preserving and manufacturing finished articles made entirely or mainly of wood or wood substitutes. Manufacture of wood furniture to be classified in Furniture Manufacturing Industries (Major Group 26); pianos and wooden musical instruments to be classified with Musical Instruments Industries (Group 396); caskets and coffins to be

To include all paper and paperboard mills; and establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing articles of pulp, paper and paperboard.

#### Pulp, Paper, and Paperboard Mills

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Manufacture of pulp from wood, and from rags and other fibres; the conversion of these pulps into any kind of paper or paperboard.

#### Manufacture of Articles of Pulp, Paper, and Paperboard

Establishments primarily engaged in the manufacture of paper and paperboard into converted paper products such as coated paper, paper bags, paper boxes and other paper containers, cards, envelopes, and wallpaper. To include also manufacture of all kinds of pressed and moulded pulp goods such as pulp plates and utensils.

#### 28 280 PRINTING, PUBLISHING, AND ALLIED INDUSTRIES

Establishments primarily engaged in printing,
lithographing, and publishing newspapers, periodicals, books,
maps, atlases, sheet music, and directories; commercial or
public printing establishments; commercial lithographing;
establishments manufacturing greeting cards; bookbinding;
blank-book making; paper ruling; manufacturing looseleaf
devices and library binders, and other establishments primarily

To include also establishments rendering service for the printing trade such as typesetting, engraving, and etching steel and copper plates; making woodcuts; photo-engraving; electrotyping and stereotyping.

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#### MANUFACTURE OF LEATHER AND LEATHER PRODUCTS EXCEPT FOOTWEAR

Industries engaged in tanning, currying and finishing hides and skins, and in manufacturing leather products except footwear. Manufacture of footwear to be classified in Group 242.

#### 291 Tanneries and Leather Finishing Plants

Establishments primarily engaged in tanning, currying and finishing all kinds of leather and in embossing and japanning leather; to include also manufacturing leather belting and leather packing.

# 292 Manufacture of Leather Products Except Footwear and Other Wearing Apparel

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing leather products except footwear and other wearing apparel such as luggage, handbags, pocketbooks, card, cigarette and key cases, coin purses, checkbook covers, saddlery, harness, whips and other articles made of leather or leather substitutes.

Manufacturing of boot and shoe cut stock and findings also to be included.

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#### MANUFACTURE OF RUBBER PRODUCTS

Establishments manufacturing from natural or synthetic rubber, gutta percha, balata, or gutta siak, all kinds of rubber products such as tires, rubber footwear, mechanical rubber goods and rubber sundries. To include also

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establishments engaged in reclaiming rubber from used tires, scrap, and miscellaneous waste rubber by manufacturing processes which result in a product that is sold for mixing with crude natural rubber and synthetic rubber as an extender. To include also establishments manufacturing rebuilt and retreaded rubber tires.

#### 31 310 MANUFACTURE OF CHEMICALS AND CHEMICAL PRODUCTS

Industries producing basic chemicals and industries manufacturing products by predominantly chemical processes. Chemical industries include three general classes of establishments: (1) manufacturing basic industrial chemicals such as acids, alkelies, salts, and organic chemicals; (2) manufacturing chemical products to be used in further manufacture such as synthetic fibres, plastic materials and elastomers, including synthetic rubber; crude animal and vegetable oils, dry colours, and pigments; and (3) manufacturing finished chemical products to be used for ultimate consumption such as drugs, cosmetics, and soaps; or materials and supplies such as paints, fertilizers, and explosives to be used in other industries. Great variety of differences in organization of chemical industries from country to country makes it inadvisable to recommend any sub-division of this very important Major Group.

32 MANUFACTURE OF PRODUCTS OF PETROLEUM AND COAL

Includes such establishments as petroleum refineries, coke ovens and others engaged in manufacturing products from petroleum and coal.

#### 321 Petroleum Refineries

To include petroleum refineries producing gasoline, fuel oils, lubricants, illuminating oils, and other products from

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crude petroleum and its fractionation products. To include also the manufacture of petroleum and petroleum products from coal.

Coke Ovens

329 Manufacture of Miscellaneous Products of Petroleum and Coal

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing asphalt paving and roofing materials; fuel briquettes and packaged fuel; lubricating oils and greases made outside of petroleum refineries.

MANUFACTURE OF NON-METALLIC MINERAL PRODUCTS EXCEPT PRODUCTS OF PETROLEUM AND COAL

This group includes establishments manufacturing clay products; glass and glass products; pottery, china, and earthenware; cement and other non-metallic mineral products.

Establishments engaged in manufacturing structural clay products such as brick, tile, pipe, crucibles, architectural terra cotta; stove lining, chimney pipes and tops.

333 Manufacture of Pottery, China, and Earthenware

Establishments primarily engaged in the manufacture of all types of hydraulic cement, such as Portland, natural, masonry, puzzolan, fibro and Roman.

Industries engaged in manufacturing machinery apparatus and supplies for the generation, storage, transmission, transformation and utilization of electric energy. Important products: electrical generating, transmission and distribution apparatus; electrical appliances; insulated wire and cable; electrical equipment of motor vehicles, aircraft and railway locomotives and cars; electric lamps; communication

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37 370 equipment and related products including radios; electric
batteries; X-ray and therapeutic apparatus; electronic tubes.

MANUFACTURE OF TRANSPORTATION EQUIPMENT

To include establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing or repairing equipment for the transportation of passengers and cargo by land, air, and water.

#### 381 Ship Building and Repairing

Includes shipyards and boat yards engaged in building and repair work.

#### 382 Menufacture of Railroad Equipment

Establishments primarily engaged in building and re-building locomotives of any type or gauge, and railroad and trolley cars for freight and passenger service. This includes the manufacture of locomotives and cars by railway companies and repair work done in such locomotive shops.

#### 383 Manufacture of Motor Vehicles

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing or assembling complete motor vehicles such as passenger automobiles, commercial cars and buses, trucks and truck trailers, universal carriers, and special purpose motor vehicles (ambulances, taxi cabs, etc.). Includes also establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing motor vehicle parts and accessories such as brakes, clutches, axles, gears, transmissions, wheels, frames, etc. Does not include tires and tubes (Group 300), automobile glass (Group 332), batteries (Group 370).

#### Repair of Motor Vehicles and Cycles

Establishments primarily engaged in the repair of automobiles, motor trucks, cycles, and any specialized repair

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384 work such as auto tops, electrical repairs, etc.

#### 385 Manufacture of Bicycles

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing bicycles, tricycles and bicycle parts such as saddles, seat posts, frames, gears, and hendle bars.

#### 386 Manufacture of Aircraft

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing airplanes, gliders, and aircraft parts such as propellers, pontoons and under-carriages. Aircraft repair is included in this industry. The manufacture of aeronautical instruments is classified in Group 391.

389 Manufacture of Transportation Equipment Not Elsewhere Classified

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing transportation equipment not elsewhere classified, such as animal-drawn vehicles, hand-carts, wheelbarrows, etc.

#### MISCEILANEOUS MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES

To include industries not allocable to any other major group in the field of manufacturing.

391 Manufacture of Professional, Scientific and Controlling Instruments

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing mechanical measuring, laboratory and scientific instruments; surgical, medical, and dental instruments, equipment and supplies.

392 Manufacture of Photographic and Optical Goods

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing optical instruments and lenses, ophthalmic goods, photographic equipment and supplies.

393 Manufacture of Watches and Clocks

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing watches and clocks.

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#### Watch and Clock Repair

Establishments primarily engaged in the repair of watches and clocks.

#### 395 Manufacture of Jewellery

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing jewellery, silverware and plate-ware, using precious metals.

#### 396 Manufacture of Musical Instruments

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing musical instruments such as pianos, string instruments, wind instruments, percussion instruments; phonograph records.

Manufacture of phonographs is included with Radios, in Group 370.

#### 399 Menufacturing Industries Not Elsewhere Classified

Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing products not classified in any other class, such as toys, sporting and athletic goods; pens, pencils, and other office and artists materials; costume jewellery and costume novelties; feathers, plumes, and artificial flowers; buttons; brooms and brushes; lamp shades; morticians goods; hair working; tobacco pipes and cigarette holders; models and patterns; identification plates, badges, emblems, and tags; beauty shop and barber shop equipment; signs and advertising displays.

Establishments engaged in construction or repair of buildings; highways and streets, including grade separations, alleys, sidewalks, driveways, small bridges and culverts done on the same contract; heavy construction of such projects as sewers and water mains, railway roadbeds, railroads, piers,

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tunnels, subways, elevated highways, bridges, viaducts, dams, drainage projects, sanitation projects, aqueducts, irrigation and flood-control projects, gas mains, hydroelectric plants, pipe lines, water-power projects, and all other types of heavy construction; marine construction such as dredging, under-water rock removal, pile driving, land reclamation, harbour and waterways and construction; oil-well, gas-well and water well drilling; airports, athletic fields; radio towers; golf courses; parking areas; swimming pools; tennis courts; telephone lines; and all other construction, whether undertaken by private bodies or governmental authorities. To include also special-trade contractors such as carpenters, plumbers, plasterers, electricians, etc., in the field of construction.

#### Division 5. - PRODUCTION AND SUPPLY OF ELECTRICITY, GAS AND HEAT; WATER SUPPLY

51 510 ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER

> Generation, transmission, and distribution of electric energy for heating, power and lighting purposes.

52 520 GAS MANUFACTURE AND DISTRIBUTION

> Establishments engaged in distributing natural gas and manufacturing gas and distributing it through mains to domestic and commercial consumers.

530 53 WATER SUPPLY

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Establishments distributing water.

54 540 STEAM HEAT AND POWER

> To include companies primarily engaged in producing and distributing steam for heating and power purposes.

> > Division 6. - COMMERCE

WHOLESALE AND RETAIL TRADE

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Auxiliary units such as power plants, garages, repair shops, werehouses operated by distribution establishments in connection with wholesaling or retailing operations are classified according to the primary activity of the distribution establishment.

#### 611 Wholesale Trade

Includes establishments primarily engaged in performing such functions as wholesale merchants, industrial distributors, exporters and importers; sales branches and sales offices maintained by manufacturing enterprises; agents, commodity brokers and commercial merchants; petroleum bulk tank stations; assemblers, buyers, and co-operative marketing associations for the selling of farm products at wholesale.

#### 612 Retail Trade

Includes merchants primarily concerned with retail dealing, that is, selling merchandise for personal or household consumption.

#### 62 620 BANKS AND OTHER FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Institutions performing banking or closely related functions such as currency exchanges, safe-deposit companies, clearing house associations, corporations for banking abroad, and agencies of foreign banks; credit agencies other than banks such as rediscount and financing institutions, mortgage companies, industrial loan institutions, agricultural credit agencies, sales finance and industrial credit companies, and personal credit companies; investment companies; holding companies; security brokers and dealers, commodity brokers and dealers in commodity futures; exchanges and exchange clearing houses; and other financial establishments such as those engaged in patent buying and licensing, and those

To include all types of real estate operations, that is, operators, developers, and agents.

#### Division 7. - TRANSPORT, STORAGE AND COMMUNICATION

Enterprises primarily engaged in passenger and freight transport by railway, highway, water, or air; establishments furnishing services related to transport; warehouses which sell their services to persons other than the owners of the warehouse; enterprises furnishing telephone, telegraph, radio or other communication services. Radio broadcasting studios are classified in 832, Theatres and Theatrical Services.

#### TRANSPORT

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Railroad transport; urban and suburban transport systems; road transport; water transport; air transport; other transport; and services incidental to transportation.

#### 711 Railroad Transport

Companies furnishing transportation by railroad, and services allied to railroad transport, such as eleeping-car service, dining-car service and railway express.

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#### Tramway and Omnibus Operators

Urban and suburban bus lines, street railways (tramways, elevated, underground).

#### 713 Inter-Urban Bus Lines

Establishments primarily engaged in providing long distance transportation of passengers by bus.

#### 714 Road Transport Not Elsewhere Classified

Establishments primarily engaged in the operation of fixed facilities for road transport such as toll roads, highway bridges and terminals; road transport other than bus lines; establishments providing taxicabs and other cabs, automobiles and carriages for hire, and delivery stables; establishments engaged in freight transport by road.

#### 715 Water Transport

Companies engaged in freight and passenger transport by water. To include also companies furnishing services incidental to water transport, such as operating and maintaining piers, docks, and associated buildings and facilities, stevedoring, maintenance and operation of canals, salvaging distressed vessels, and salvaging the cargoes of distressed vessels.

#### 716 Air Transport

Companies primarily engaged in furnishing transport by air and also those operating airports and flying fields.

Companies primarily engaged in operating airplanes for hire also to be included. Air navigational facilities such as radio beacons, flying control centres and radar stations to be included.

#### 717 Services Incidental to Transport

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Companies furnishing services incidental to transportation such as forwarding; packing and crating; arrangement of transportation; rental of railroad cars; inspection, sampling and weighing connected with transport. Operation of stockyards providing pens, feed, and selling areas for livestock temporarily held either pending sale or in transit to or from the market are also to be included.

#### 719 Transport Not Elsewhere Classified

Companies engaged in pipeline transportation of petroleum and gasoline for a fee. To include also all transport establishments not elsewhere classified.

#### 72 720 STORAGE AND WAREHOUSING

To include establishments engaged in storage of farm products, furniture, household goods, or commercial goods of any nature, when such storage is offered as an independent service.

#### 73 730 COMMUNICATION

Establishments furnishing communication services to the public whether by wire or radio and whether intended to be received audibly or visually. Also to include postal service. Companies rendering services for the exchange or recording of messages are also to be included.

#### Division 8. - SERVICES

#### 81 810 GOVERNMENT SERVICE

Establishments maintained by central or local governments to carry on their primary activities. This would include such organizations as the armed forces, police and regular governmental departments. This group is not to include governmental activities in the field of transport, communication, education, health, production, marketing, and

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the operation of financial institutions, all of which along with others of like kind to be classified in the appropriate industry class.

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#### COMMUNITY AND BUSINESS SERVICE

Public or private establishments furnishing services to the community and to business enterprises.

#### 821 Educational Services

Establishments furnishing formal academic or technical courses; and non-profit educational and scientific research agencies. To include also establishments furnishing related educational services such as special non-degree-granting schools, correspondence schools, music and dancing schools. Dancing schools are not to be confused with dance halls, ball rooms, and dance studies primarily furnishing entertainment.

#### 822 Medical and Other Health Service

Establishments primarily engaged in furnishing medical, surgical and other health services.

#### 823 Religious Organizations

Religious organizations and their establishments maintained for worship or for promotion of religious activities. Other establishments operated by religious organizations such as hospitals, educational or charitable institutions, and reading rooms are to be classified in the appropriate industry class.

#### 824 Welfare Institutions

Organizations operating on a non-profit membership basis for the promotion of the welfare of communities such as Red Cross, YMCA, YWCA, Salvation Army, Community Chests,

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Major Group Group 82 824 Travellers Aid Societies, children's aid societies, day nurseries, charitable organizations, and similar institutions. 825 Legal Service Offices of barristers, advocates and solicitors furnishing legal service to individuals or organizations. 826 Business Services Establishments primarily engaged in selling services to business enterprises: consulting engineers, architects, accountants, auditors and bookkeepers; advertising, credit reporting, adjustment and collection of bills, duplicating, blueprinting, photostating, addressing, mailing, stenographic services, compiling and selling classified mailing lists, and all other kinds of business services. 827 Trade Associations and Labour Organizations

Trade associations, chambers of commerce, boards of trade, labour organizations.

#### 829 Community Service not Elsewhere Classified

Libraries, museums, botanical and zoological gardens; political organizations; civic, social, and fraternal associations and social clubs. Establishments providing garbage and sewage disposal and other sanitary services.

#### RECREATION SERVICE

Industries engaged in motion picture production, distribution, and projection, and industries furnishing other recreation services.

#### 831 Motion Picture Production, Distribution, and Projection

Establishments primarily engaged in the production of motion pictures, in motion picture distribution, and in the operation of motion picture theatres. To include also those

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engaged in performing services allied with motion picture production and distribution such as motion picture film processing, editing, renting and repairing motion picture equipment as well as establishments operating casting bureaus.

#### 832 Theatres and Theatrical Services

This industry includes commercially operated theatres, opera companies, concert organizations and stock companies.

Also includes services such as theatrical employment agencies, booking agencies, etc. Also included are radio-broadcasting studios.

#### 833 Recreation Services Other than Theatres and Motion Pictures

Dance halls and studios; bowling alleys; billiards and pool parlours; baseball and football clubs; cricket clubs and hockey clubs; athletic fields and sports promoters, golf clubs; bathing beaches; swimming pools; ice-skating and roller-skating rinks; riding academies; gymnasiums and tennis courts; dance bands, orchestras, and entertainers operating on a contract or fee basis; race-tracks; amusement parks; exhibition, carnivals, and coin-operated amusement-device parlours; shooting galleries; circuses; and other establishments furnishing amusement or entertainment on payment of a fee or admission charge.

Establishments primarily engaged in providing services generally involving the care of the person or his apparel.

Private households which employ workers on or about the premises in the occupations usually considered as demestic

#### 846 Portrait and Commercial Photographic Studios

Establishments primarily engaged in portrait photography, in film developing and print processing of films except standard motion picture films, and in photography for advertising agencies, publishers and other industrial users.

#### 849 Personal Service Not Elsewhere Classified

Establishments primarily engaged in providing services such as undertaking, shoe shining, chimney cleaning; window
