秘书处说明

一. 导言

1. 在其第VIII/7号决定中，缔约方大会请秘书处，以可得资源为限，尽可能地进一步增强其与各国际和区域组织及多边环境协定在那些与《巴塞尔公约》具有相关性的领域中开展的合作与协调。在同一决定中，缔约方大会还请秘书处寻求在世界贸易组织的贸易与环境事项委员会中获得观察员地位，并在获得此种地位的申请提交世界贸易组织、并得到其批准后向《巴塞尔公约》各缔约方作出相应的通报。

二. 执行情况

2. 在2007—2008两年期内，秘书处与各国际组织和非政府组织在国际和区域

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UNEP/CHW.9/1。

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为节省开支，本文件仅作少量印发。请各位代表自带所发文件与会，勿再另行索要文件副本。

两级开展了一些合作活动。这些活动在本说明的附件一中作了介绍¹。

3. 为贯彻执行第VIII/7号决定，秘书处于2007年1月18日向贸易与环境事项委员会主席提交了一项申请，寻求巴塞尔公约秘书处在该委员会中获得观察员地位。自那时以来，秘书处一直在暂行基础上作为观察员出席该委员会的各次会议，但该委员会迄今尚未就这一申请作出最后决定。

三. 提议采取的行动

4. 缔约方大会或愿考虑通过一项措辞大致如下的决定：

缔约方大会，

1. *请* 秘书处在那些与《巴塞尔公约》相关的各个领域内进一步增强其与其他国际和区域组织及多边环境协定之间的合作与协调，其中包括那些在文件UNEP/CHW.9/15的附件中列述的各个领域和组织；

2. *还请* 秘书处继续做出努力，争取在世界贸易组织的贸易与环境事项委员会中获得观察员地位，并在其申请得到世界贸易组织的批准之后向《巴塞尔公约》各缔约方作出相应的通报；

3. *进一步请* 秘书处向缔约方大会第十届会议汇报本决定的贯彻执行情况；

4. *请* 各缔约方在国家和区域两级开展协调，以期支持秘书处为增强在各方之间开展国际合作而做出的努力。

These activities include the development of guidelines on environmentally sound management of mercury wastes with emphasis on the development of sound disposal and remediation practices; and the development of capacity building and technical assistance programs to reduce and prevent pollution from mercury. • The secretariat contributed to the overarching framework of UNEP Global Mercury Partnership and participated in related international meetings. • The secretariat and UNEP-Chemicals are consulting each other on a regular basis and exchange views and information on all topics of common interest, including the preparation of UNEP documentation on chemicals and waste management, the participation and collaboration of respective staff in meetings, the development of joint cooperation activities, such as on mercury and POPs.
UNEP-GEF Unit	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • SBC and the UNEP-GEF Unit work closely on the development of project proposals on POPs for submission to the GEF for co-funding and for the implementation of the funded activities. Collaboration has focused until now on POPs (PCBs) and more proposals are under preparation in this field. • SBC, as part of the UNEP delegation, participates regularly in the conference calls of the GEF POPs task force. • Discussions are being held between the two units for the development of joint activities in other areas of work that are eligible for GEF funding.

Specifically, collaboration will focus on: (a) a promotional campaign that engages existing and prospective partners of the Secretariat of the Basel Convention; (b) a strategy to develop and market stories of success through multiple media platforms; (c) a Web strategy for the Basel Convention regional centres and the Secretariat of the Basel Convention (consistent branding while maintaining individuality) to improve reach and impact; (d) a strategy for Web-based technical assistance, and other mechanisms, to foster national implementation of the Basel Convention; and (e) a donor education campaign that includes the use of film and other media.</p>
