

Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs and Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council

Report of the Secretary-General

Summary

In conformity with General Assembly resolution 62/69, the present report outlines the progress made by the Secretariat since the last report (A/62/124) in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. The Assembly is invited, in paragraphs 13 and 25 of the present report, to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in sections II.G and III.F.

I. Introduction

The present report has been prepared pursuant to General Assembly resolution 62/69. In paragraph 8 of the resolution, the Assembly commended the Secretary-General for the progress made in the preparation of studies of the Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs, including the increased use of the internship programme and the wider cooperation with academic institutions for this purpose, as well as the progress made towards updating the Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council. In paragraphs 9 and 10, the Assembly noted with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the updating of the Repertoire, as well as the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the Repertory, and reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to those trust funds and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the two publications. In paragraph 11, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the Repertory and the Repertoire and making them available electronically in all their respective language versions. In paragraph 12, the Assembly reiterated the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the two publications and, with regard to the Repertoire, called upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report of 18 September 1952 (A/2170). Finally, in paragraph 13, the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit a report on both the Repertory and the Repertoire to the Assembly at its sixty-third session.

II. Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs

A. Preparation of supplements to the Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs

- 2. Since the last report (A/62/124), the Secretariat finalized and submitted for translation and publication volume V of Supplements Nos. 8 and 9 in July 2008. Consequently, in respect of volume V, Supplements Nos. 1 to 9 have been brought to completion and made available on the website of the *Repertory* (www.un.org/law/repertory). Seven other volumes are in different stages of preparation. In particular, during the period under review, work progressed with respect to volume II of Supplements Nos. 7, 8 and 9, and volume IV of Supplements Nos. 8 and 9. Work is also under way on three studies for volume VI of Supplements Nos. 8 and 9. However, lack of resources continued to affect the progress of work in some departments and the pace in the preparation of studies on certain Articles of the Charter of the United Nations has been considerably slowed down.
- 3. As a means of addressing the backlog on volume III of Supplements Nos. 7, 8 and 9 (1985-1999), Articles have been identified for which studies of the *Repertoire* and the *Repertory* overlap. In such cases, in accordance with a decision taken by the Interdepartmental Committee on Charter Repertory, cross-references have been provided to the studies of the *Repertoire*, where appropriate.
- 4. In addition, advance versions of several studies pertaining to individual Articles, which have been finalized and are awaiting completion of the respective volumes, continued to be made available on the Internet by the Secretariat.

- 5. The current status of the publication (original *Repertory* and supplements thereto), which should, as a whole, consist of 50 volumes (1946-2005), is as follows: 28 volumes have been published 1 and 6 volumes have been finalized and submitted for translation and publication. 2 Consequently, the work to be completed comprises 16 volumes, 7 of which are in different stages of preparation.
- 6. Annex I to the present report sets out the responsibilities of individual Secretariat units for the preparation of *Repertory* studies on individual Articles. Annex II provides information on the status of the *Repertory*.

B. Availability of Repertory studies on the Internet

- 7. Studies from 34 complete volumes, including the 6 volumes in processing for publication, as well as studies on individual Articles of the Charter from 7 volumes not yet complete are available on the United Nations website for the *Repertory*. The electronic version of the *Repertory* has proven indispensable in reducing the backlog in the *Repertory* by making individual studies available before the issuance of the respective supplement volumes. A full-text search feature is available, providing the user with the opportunity to search all the studies instantaneously for any word or combination of words. This search engine is available in the three languages of the publication, namely English, French and Spanish.
- 8. Currently, all studies available in English are on the Internet, with a considerable number of them also available in French and Spanish. In compliance with the request of the General Assembly that all versions of the *Repertory* be made available electronically, a large number of additional studies in French and Spanish have been placed on the Internet since my previous report. Furthermore, a number of studies have been prepared in French in cooperation with academic institutions. The Secretariat will continue to make available electronically all three language versions of the finalized *Repertory* studies.

C. Cooperation with academic institutions

9. The well-established cooperation with Columbia University Law School continued for the fifth consecutive year and four students contributed to the preparation of studies pertaining to volume II of Supplements Nos. 7, 8 and 9. Furthermore, the collaboration project established with French-speaking academic institutions (University of Paris X — Nanterre, University of Paris I — Sorbonne, University of Paris II — Assas, University of Nice, Centre d'études et de recherches internationales et communautaires (CERIC) — University of Aix-en-Provence, Free University of Bruxelles and University of Genève/Institut universitaire de hautes études internationales), in order to contribute to the preparation of studies on certain Articles, continued to give results and some further advance versions of such studies were placed on the Internet, in French, after their review by the Secretariat. These studies concern Articles 10, 11 and 12 for Supplements Nos. 7 and 8; Article 14 for

Supplement No. 9; Article 61 for Supplements Nos. 8 and 9; and Article 62 (4) for Supplements Nos. 8 and 9. Furthermore, several other studies are currently under preparation, corresponding to volume II of Supplements Nos. 7, 8 and 9. These studies are expected to be completed in the coming months.

D. Trust fund

10. In its resolution 62/69, the General Assembly reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund established pursuant to its resolution 59/44, in order to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*. Accordingly, a note verbale was sent to all permanent missions to the United Nations reminding them of the possibility to make voluntary contributions to the trust fund and requesting them to bring the question of funding for the *Repertory* to the attention of private institutions and individuals who might be able to assist in that regard. The Secretary-General welcomes with appreciation the contributions to the trust fund received from the following Member States: Albania (\$1,500), Guinea (\$785) and Turkey (\$5,000).

E. Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization

11. The Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization considered the item on the Repertory and the Repertoire at its last session, held from 25 February to 5 March and on 7 March 2008. In its report (A/63/33, para. 13), the Special Committee recommended, inter alia, with respect to the Repertory, that the General Assembly commend the Secretary-General for the progress made in the preparation of studies, including the increased use of the internship programme of the United Nations and the further expanded cooperation with academic institutions for this purpose; note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the Repertory; reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions; and reiterate the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the Repertory.

F. Interdepartmental Committee on Charter Repertory

12. The Interdepartmental Committee on Charter Repertory, convened on 3 April 2008, noted recent outstanding progress made in the preparation of the studies of the *Repertory* and observed with appreciation that the backlog in volumes I and V had been totally eliminated. It was also observed that in view of the small gaps remaining to complete volumes II and IV, efforts should continue to that end. The Committee agreed with the proposal that the money deposited in the trust fund to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory* should be used primarily to finalize certain volumes that were near completion, by hiring some consultants who would prepare, in one or two months, isolated studies, for example within volumes II, IV and VI.

G. Conclusions

- 13. With respect to the *Repertory*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:
- (a) To note the current status of the publication, including the progress made in the preparation of *Repertory* studies and in their posting on the Internet in three languages (English, French and Spanish);
- (b) To consider the recommendation of the Special Committee (see para. 11 above) concerning the increased use of the internship programme of the United Nations and the further expanded cooperation with academic institutions for the preparation of studies; voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*; the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; the call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and the desirability of making it available electronically in all its language versions; and the reiteration of the Secretary-General's responsibility for the quality of the *Repertory*;
- (c) To express appreciation for the contribution received to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog of the *Repertory*.

III. Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council

A. Mandate and preparation

- 14. The *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution 686 (VII) of 5 December 1952, continues to provide a record of the evolving practice and procedure of the Security Council in the framework of the Charter of the United Nations and the Council's provisional rules of procedure.
- 15. In accordance with the "two-track" approach, most recently endorsed by the General Assembly in its resolution 62/69, the Secretariat has continued to focus on the Security Council's contemporary practice, in which Member States have expressed the most interest, while concurrently ensuring progress in coverage of the Council's earlier practice. Currently, the Secretariat is working on the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth Supplements to the *Repertoire*, covering the periods 1996 to 1999, 2000 to 2003 and 2004 to 2007, respectively. Since the "two-track" approach entails the simultaneous preparation of two or even more supplements to the *Repertoire*, its implementation has constituted a considerable challenge for the Secretariat.
- 16. Furthermore, the activities of the Security Council and its subsidiary organs have been increasing both in pace and complexity, as the Council has continued to diversify its agenda to include conflict prevention and post-conflict peacebuilding, as well as thematic issues such as justice and the rule of law, small arms and the protection of civilians in armed conflict. As a result, the Council is now giving in-depth consideration to nearly 50 agenda items each year and touching upon new dimensions in the interpretation and application of the Charter. At the same time, the Council is taking initiatives aimed at greater transparency, streamlined working

methods and enhanced cooperation with other principal organs of the United Nations. The Secretariat has made careful efforts to capture all those evolving as well as expanding dimensions in the work of the Council in the supplements to the *Repertoire*, within the context of the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of the Secretary-General's report of 18 September 1952 (A/2170).

17. Within the limits of the resources available to it, the Secretariat has continued its efforts at producing the *Repertoire* in the most expeditious manner consistent with accuracy and balance by resorting to several efficiency-enhancing initiatives. A few examples of such initiatives include specialized training of staff, allowing for the sharing of information and knowledge on similar chapters in various supplements to the *Repertoire*; careful review of the contents of all 12 chapters in a single supplement to reduce redundancies and streamline material covered in the individual chapters; further enhancement of databases to capture and retrieve the mounting body of past and current practices and procedures of the Security Council; and updating of internal editorial guidelines to capture staff expertise and experience and ensure consistency.

B. Availability of Repertoire studies on the Internet

- 18. With respect to the past practice of the Security Council, following publication of the eleventh Supplement to the *Repertoire* (1989-1992) and the posting on the website of an advance version of the twelfth Supplement (1993-1995), the Secretariat has been working towards the completion of the thirteenth Supplement (1996-1999). All chapters of this volume will be posted in an advance version by September 2008.
- 19. Regarding coverage of the Council's contemporary practice, work on the fourteenth Supplement (2000-2003) is proceeding apace. All procedural and constitutional chapters of this volume have been posted in an advance version and the entire volume is expected to be completed in 2009.
- 20. The Secretariat is continuing to work on the fifteenth Supplement (2004-2007). Several procedural chapters of this volume are available on the website in an advance version. It is expected that several more procedural and constitutional chapters will be posted in an advance version by the end of 2008.
- 21. By closely tracking and recording contemporary practice of the Security Council in internal databases, the Secretariat has systematically been laying the groundwork for the preparation of the sixteenth Supplement, covering a two-year period (2008-2009). The progress on this Supplement will depend on the continued availability of resources, which is considered further below.

C. Publication in language versions (print and electronic)

22. In compliance with General Assembly resolution 55/222, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to publish the future supplements to the *Repertoire* in all six official languages, the tenth Supplement was published accordingly and the eleventh and twelfth Supplements have been submitted for translation. All completed language versions have been posted on the *Repertoire*

website, which exists in all official languages.³ In addition, the Secretariat has digitalized and posted the original and subsequent nine Supplements of the Frenchlanguage *Repertoire*, previously available only on a limited basis in hard copy.

D. Advance publication

23. To allow access to information as quickly as possible, the Secretariat has posted on its website finalized chapters of the *Repertoire* in an advance version. All chapters of the twelfth Supplement and individual chapters of the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth Supplements are accessible on the website (see annex III to the present report).

E. Resources

24. The preparation and production of the *Repertoire* would not have been possible without the continued support of the General Assembly. Research assistance from interns has also served as an important resource for the work on the *Repertoire*. Voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* remain an important element for sustaining progress in a situation of financial constraint. The Secretariat is grateful to those Member States which have contributed to the trust fund, thereby making it possible to retain the services of temporary staff assisting in the preparation of the *Repertoire*. In addition, the many years of sponsorship by Germany and Italy, and now also by Norway, of associate experts who continue to make a valuable contribution to advancing the work on the *Repertoire*, have helped the Secretariat move closer to its goal to update the publication. That challenge, however, remains to be met fully. Member States are therefore encouraged to continue supporting the *Repertoire* through their voluntary contributions.

F. Conclusions

- 25. With respect to the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:
 - (a) To note the progress made towards the updating of the Repertoire;
- (b) To note the implementation of efficiency-enhancing measures to expedite the preparation of the *Repertoire*;
- (c) To note the continued posting of the *Repertoire* in electronic form in all language versions on the United Nations website;
- ${\rm (d)} \quad \hbox{To reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the $\it Repertoire$;}$

(e) To note with appreciation the support which Germany, Italy and Norway have extended by sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, associate experts to assist in the preparation of the *Repertoire*, and to encourage other Member States in a position to do so to consider providing such assistance.
