Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs and Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council

Report of the Secretary-General

Summary

In conformity with General Assembly resolution 70/117, the report provides an outline of the progress made by the Secretariat since the previous report ([A/70/295](#)) in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. The Assembly is invited to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in paragraphs 15 and 27.

I. Introduction

1. The present report has been prepared pursuant to General Assembly resolution 70/117. In paragraph 9 of the resolution, the Assembly commended the Secretary-General for the progress made in the preparation of studies for the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*, including the increased use of the internship programme of the United Nations and further expanded cooperation with academic institutions for that purpose, as well as the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. In paragraph 10, the Assembly noted with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*, as well as the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* and, in paragraph 11, reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*, as well as voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire*, and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the two publications. In paragraph 12, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the *Repertory* and the *Repertoire* and making them available electronically in all their respective language versions. In paragraph 13, the Assembly noted with concern that the backlog in the preparation of volume III of the *Repertory*, although slightly reduced, had not been eliminated, and called upon the Secretary-General to address that issue effectively and on a priority basis, while commending the Secretary-General for progress made in reducing the backlog. In paragraph 14, the Assembly reiterated the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the two publications and, with regard to the *Repertoire*, called upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report of 18 September 1952 ([A/2170](#)). Lastly, in paragraph 15, the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit a report on both the *Repertory* and the *Repertoire* to the Assembly at its seventy-first session.

II. *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*

A. Preparation of supplements to the *Repertory*

2. Bearing in mind the call made upon the Secretary-General, in paragraph 13 of General Assembly resolution 70/117, to address effectively and on a priority basis the backlog in the preparation of volume III of the *Repertory*, the Codification Division of the Office of Legal Affairs, acting as coordinator for the preparation of the *Repertory*, sought to significantly reduce that backlog, in particular regarding volume III, Supplements Nos. 7 to 9 (1985-1999). Research and drafting of a study on Article 49 of the Charter of the United Nations for volume III, Supplements Nos. 7 to 9, was accordingly entrusted to a consultant. Furthermore, regarding that volume, the review of studies on Articles 33 (1) and 53, prepared with the assistance of interns in the Codification Division, is well advanced. Single studies for each of the aforementioned provisions of the Charter address the entire period covered by the three supplements, that is, 1985 to 1999.

3. Progress has also been achieved in the preparation of studies for volume III of Supplement No. 10 (2000-2009). During the reporting period, the review of a study on Article 41, previously drafted with the assistance of the Faculty of Law at the

University of Ottawa, and the review of a study on Article 53, prepared with the assistance of a consultant, were undertaken. Furthermore, as is the case for Supplements Nos. 7 to 9, the preparation of a study on Article 49 was entrusted to a consultant. Work also continues in relation to studies on Articles 104 and 105 for volume VI, in preparation in the Office of the Legal Counsel in the Office of Legal Affairs.

4. Consistent with the decision of the Interdepartmental Committee on Charter Repertory, taken in 2015, that Supplement No. 11 would cover the period 2010-2015 (see [A/70/295](#), para. 5), a total of nine studies were prepared as follows: six studies — on Articles 2 (4), 2 (7) and 4 for volume I, on Articles 41 and 42 for volume III, and on Article 96 for volume VI — were researched and drafted with the assistance of the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa; a study on Article 13 (1) (a) (provisions relating to the codification and progressive development of international law) for volume II was researched and drafted with the assistance of an intern in the Codification Division, in cooperation with the Division for Ocean Affairs and the Law of the Sea and the International Trade Law Division of the Office of Legal Affairs, as well as the Office for Outer Space Affairs; and two studies on Articles 100 and 101 for volume VI were researched and drafted with the assistance of a consultant in the Office of Human Resources Management.

5. As is customary, the Department of Public Information and the Dag Hammarskjöld Library played an important role in supporting the research on the *Repertory*.

6. During the period under review, with the aim of expediting the preparation of studies for the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*, the Codification Division of the Office of Legal Affairs, in its capacity as Coordinator for the preparation of the publication, also undertook and completed the review of the *Manual of Preparation of the Studies for the Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*. In its current streamlined and updated form, the Manual should serve as a useful guidance tool for Secretariat units bearing primary responsibility for the preparation of *Repertory* studies, as well as consultants, academic institutions and interns called upon to contribute to the preparation of future studies.

7. The current status of the publication is as follows: 28 volumes have been published¹ and 15 have been finalized and submitted for translation and publication.² Consequently, from among the 56 volumes of which the publication as a whole (original *Repertory* and Supplements Nos. 1 to 11 thereto) should consist, work remains to be completed on 13, 6 of which pertain to Supplement No. 11 (2010-2015), on which work has begun (see para. 4 above), and 4 to Supplement No. 10 (2000-2009), which are at different stages of preparation (see para. 3 above). The other three volumes on which work remains to be completed correspond to volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9.

8. Annex I to the present report sets out the responsibilities of individual Secretariat units for the preparation of *Repertory* studies on individual Articles of the Charter. Annex II provides information on the status of the *Repertory*.

B. Availability of *Repertory* studies on the Internet

9. Studies from 43 complete volumes, including the 15 volumes in processing for publication, are available on the United Nations website for the *Repertory* (www.un.org/law/repertory). Advance versions of several studies on individual Articles for volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9, as well as a considerable number of studies for Supplement No. 10 that have been finalized and are awaiting completion of the respective volumes, continued to be made accessible on the website. The electronic version of the *Repertory* includes a full-text search feature, providing users with the opportunity to search all the studies instantaneously for any word or combination of words in the three languages of the publication (English, French and Spanish).

10. Currently, all studies available in English are on the Internet, and most of them are also available on the Internet in French and Spanish. Finalized studies awaiting publication are placed on the Internet in the language in which they have been prepared (English for most of them and French for some of them). The Secretariat will continue to make available electronically all three language versions of the finalized *Repertory* studies.

C. Cooperation with academic institutions

11. The well-established cooperation with the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa continued for the sixth consecutive year and contributed to the preparation of six studies on Articles 2 (4), 2 (7) and 4 for volume I, Articles 41 and 42 for volume III, and Article 96 for volume VI of Supplement No. 11 (see para. 4 above).

D. Trust fund

12. In its resolution 70/117, the General Assembly reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund established pursuant to its resolution 59/44, in order to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*. Accordingly, a note verbale was sent to all permanent missions to the United Nations, reminding them of the possibility of making voluntary contributions to the trust fund and inviting them to bring the question of funding for the *Repertory* to the attention of private institutions and individuals that might wish to assist in that regard. The Secretary-General welcomes with appreciation the contribution to the trust fund of \$10,000 from Turkey received since the issuance of the previous report on 6 August 2015.

13. During the period under review, a consultant financed through the trust fund was recruited to work on the preparation of studies on Article 49 for volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9 and Supplement No. 10. The further use of consultants for the preparation of studies pertaining to volumes that are nearing completion is envisaged. Additional contributions to the trust fund are strongly encouraged, so as to allow the Secretariat to effectively eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*.

E. Recommendations of the Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization

14. The Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization considered the question of the *Repertory* and the *Repertoire* at its session held from 16 to 24 February 2016. In paragraph 78 of its report ([A/71/33](#)), the Special Committee recommended, with regard to the *Repertory*, that the General Assembly should commend the Secretary-General for the progress made in the preparation of studies, including the increased use of the internship programme of the United Nations and further expanded cooperation with academic institutions for that purpose; note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*; reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund so as to further support the Secretariat in carrying out the effective elimination of that backlog, as well as the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions; note with concern that the backlog in the preparation of volume III of the *Repertory*, although slightly reduced, had not been eliminated, and call upon the Secretary-General to address that issue effectively and on a priority basis, while commending the Secretary-General for progress made in reducing the backlog; and reiterate the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertory*.

F. Conclusions

15. With regard to the *Repertory*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:

(a) To note the current status of the publication, including the progress made in the preparation of *Repertory* studies and in their posting on the Internet in three languages (English, French and Spanish);

(b) To consider the recommendations of the Special Committee (see para. 14 above) concerning the increased use of the internship programme of the United Nations and the further expanded cooperation with academic institutions for the preparation of studies; voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory* so as to further support the Secretariat in carrying out the effective elimination of that backlog; the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, and at no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; the call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions, and to continue to address effectively and on a priority basis the elimination of the backlog in volume III of the *Repertory*; and the reiteration of the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertory*;

(c) To note the progress made towards the elimination of the backlog through the utilization of the trust fund; and to strongly encourage States to make additional contributions to the trust fund.

III. *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*

A. Mandate and preparation

16. The *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution 686 (VII) of 5 December 1952, continues to provide a record of the evolving practice and procedure of the Security Council in the framework of the Charter of the United Nations and the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council. Most recently, by its resolution 70/117, the General Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report dated 18 September 1952 (A/2170).

17. In paragraph 9 of its resolution 70/117, the General Assembly commended the Secretary-General for the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire*. In paragraph 12, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the *Repertoire* and making it available electronically in all its respective language versions.

18. Pursuant to the mandate provided by the General Assembly, the Secretariat has continued to make progress in the preparation of supplements to the *Repertoire*. In the past year, the Secretariat finalized the drafting of the eighteenth Supplement (2012-2013). All 10 parts of that Supplement have been completed and made available electronically in an advance version on the Security Council website.

19. In 2016, the Secretariat commenced the research for and drafting of the nineteenth Supplement (2014-2015). The Secretariat has finalized the drafting of parts I, IX and X of that Supplement. Part I, on the consideration of questions under the responsibility of the Security Council for the maintenance of international peace and security, has been reviewed and an advance version posted online. The Secretariat has commenced research for parts II and VI, and the drafting of parts III, V and VII. The groundwork for the drafting of the twentieth Supplement (2016-2017) is being carried out systematically by continuously recording the decisions and most contemporary practice of the Security Council in an internal database.

20. The Secretariat has continued to produce the *Repertoire* in an expeditious manner, optimizing the limited resources available. The continuous training of staff, the further development of internal databases, and the systematization of data collection and data analysis have enhanced its ability to prepare the *Repertoire*.

21. Notwithstanding the continued challenges in terms of editing, translating, indexing and publishing the supplements, there has been considerable improvement in those processes, which has enabled different offices within the Secretariat to overcome resource constraints and reduce delays in publication.

B. Availability of *Repertoire* studies on the Internet

22. The Secretariat has continued to post advance versions of drafted supplements on the *Repertoire* section of the Security Council website, allowing access to information as swiftly as possible. In addition, the website contained a broad range of research tools relating to the preparation of the *Repertoire*, such as tables and graphs featuring the mandates of all current peacekeeping operations and field-

based political and peacebuilding missions, the relevant provisions of decisions of the Security Council in relation to cross-cutting agenda items, namely children and armed conflict, women and peace and security, and protection of civilians, as well as the annual “Highlights of Security Council practice”. In 2016, the “Highlights of Security Council practice” for 2015 was presented in an interactive format. The tables and graphs enhance the ability of researchers and others interested in the work of the Council to systematically analyse the practice of the Security Council in the above-mentioned areas. The website’s search function had been further updated to make it more user-friendly, reliable, accurate and effective.

23. The Secretariat has also continued to provide information in response to questions received directly and through the *Repertoire* section of the Security Council website relating to the current and past practice of the Council and its subsidiary organs. During the reporting period, it responded, in a timely and accurate fashion, to communications and requests for information from Member States, as well as from officials of the United Nations system and staff of other international organizations, non-governmental organizations, students, academic scholars and researchers, and the private sector.

C. Publication in language versions (print and electronic)

24. Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 55/222, the twelfth to sixteenth Supplements (1993-2009) are scheduled to be made available on the *Repertoire* section of the Security Council website in the remaining official languages by the end of 2016. Different offices of the Secretariat continue to make every effort to ensure that the Secretariat is able to post the latest supplements to the *Repertoire* in the six official languages as soon as they are available.

D. Resources

25. The preparation and publication of the *Repertoire*, as well as the maintenance of its website in all official languages, would not have been possible without the continuing support of the General Assembly. At the same time, in an environment of financial constraint, voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* remain an important element for sustaining progress on the *Repertoire*, maintaining its website and continuing to improve the accessibility of information about Security Council practice.

26. The infusion of extrabudgetary resources has enabled the Secretariat to retain the services of temporary staff assisting in the preparation of the *Repertoire*. Since the previous report, contributions to the trust fund have been received from China and Turkey. In addition, China and Saudi Arabia have contributed by each sponsoring an associate expert in the Security Council Practices and Charter Research Branch, who made valuable contributions to advancing the work on the *Repertoire*. In order to continue to attain that goal, the Secretary-General invites Member States to continue to support the work of the Secretariat on advancing the *Repertoire* through their voluntary contributions.

E. Conclusions

27. With respect to the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, in the light of the foregoing, and the recommendations made by the Special Committee at its session held from 16 to 24 February 2016, the General Assembly may wish:

- (a) To note the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire*;
- (b) To note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* and to reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund in order to allow the Secretariat to maintain the progress achieved in the updating of the *Repertoire* in past years;
- (c) To note the continuing efforts to make the *Repertoire* available in electronic form in all official languages on the United Nations website;
- (d) To note with appreciation the support that Member States have extended by sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, associate experts to assist in updating the *Repertoire*, and to encourage other Member States in a position to do so to consider providing such assistance.
