Siguiendo instrucciones de mi Gobierno, tengo el honor de remitirle adjunto el texto de un artículo publicado en el semanario británico The Observer, en la edición del domingo 17 de mayo de 1987, bajo el título "Namibia Uranium may fuel Iran's A-bomb" ("El uranio de Namibia puede servir de combustible para la bomba atómica del Irán"). Dicho artículo corrobora el hecho de que el régimen del Irán continúa comprando uranio procedente de la mina de Rössing, en el territorio numibiano ocupado desde hace tiempo por el régimen racista de Sudáfrica. El Gobierno del Irán posee el 10% de las acciones de dicha mina.

Agradeceré tenga a bien hacer distribuir la presente carta y su anexo como documento de la Asamblea General en relación con los temas 33, 36, 47 y 51 de la lista preliminar, y como documento del Consejo de Seguridad.

Namibia uranium may fuel Iran's A-bomb

IRAN is secretly buying uranium from a Britishoperated mine in Namibis, despice Ayatollah Khomeini's strong opposition to South African occupation of the territory.

The france Government also has a shortholding in the mine at Rassing, which is operated by London-based Rio Testo-Zine.

Nuclear experts are surprised that less has constanted to buy transium from Rousing for the past eight years, while the Shah's ambitious power programme has not come to

traition. Some observers fear that Khomeini's Government may be trying to develop an atomic bomb.

Our inquiries have revealed that two Iranian officials, Ghafour Moheeni and Rahhari Khazzi, six on the board of Rousing Uranium. The London office of RTZ, which is responsible for the mine's operation, would not comment on the role of the two uses.

called for the cancellation of contracts for Rossing uranium. Britain's Central Electricity Generating Board had a controversial contract for Rossing uranium until 1984, but this was not renewed because of both falling demand and the political sensitivity of important from Namibia.

Although Iran has signed the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, Khomeini's Government is worried by Iraq, its main protagonist in the Middle Bast.

The Iraqis had an advanced programme of nuclear research at Townithet, tear Beghdad, which was bombed by the Israelia in 1981.
