Joint Declaration on Nuclear Policy by the Government of the Argentine Republic and the Government of the Federative Republic of Brazil, Isigned on 187 July, at Viedma, Argentina

Considering the commitments undertaken in the joint declarations on nuclear policy signed at Foz do Iguaçu and Brasilia,

## Dec ide:

- 1. To emphasize that the historic visit of President José Sarney to the Pilcaniyeu uranium enrichment plant, which is a legitimate source of pride for Argentine science and technology, marks an important milestone in the building of mutual confidence and in the framework of the unswerving commitment of the two nations to use nuclear energy exclusively for peaceful purposes;
- 2. To reiterate their satisfaction with the significant progress made by the joint working group on nuclear policy set up **by the** Declaration of Iguazu at its periodic meetings;
- 3. To underscore the importance of a broad and free-flowing exchange of information of common interest and of experience in respect of the joint bilateral nuclear projects;
- 4. To stress the **progress** made in improving the legal and technical aspects of nuclear co-operation;
- 5. To draw attention to the importance of the managerial meetings that have been neld and that testify to the active participation of public and private enterprise in thenuclear association process, thus broadening the spectrum of co-operation by integrating the industries of the two countries.
