IMPLEMENTATION OF GENERAL **ASSEMBLY** RESOLUTION **41/45** CONCERNING THE SIGNATURE AND RATIFICATION OF ADDITIONAL PROTOCOL I OF THE TREATY FOR THE PROHIBITION OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS IN LATIN AMERICA (TREATY OF **TLATELOLCO**)

Report of the First Committee

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. The item entitled "Implementation of General Assembly resolution 41/45 concerning the signature and ratification of Additional Protocol I of the Treaty for the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in Latin America (Treaty of Tlatelolco)" was included in the provisional agenda of the forty-second session 'in accordance with General Assembly resolution 41/45 of 3 December 1986.
- 2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 18 September 1987, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include the item in its agenda and to allocate it to the First Committee.
- 3. At its 2nd meeting, on 1 October, the First Committee decided to hold a general debate on the disarmament items allocated to it, namely, items 48 to 69, followed by statements on specific disarmament agenda items and a continuation of the general debate, as necessary. The deliberations on those items took place between the 3rd and the 31st meetings, from 12 October to 3 November (see A/C.1/42/PV.3-31).
- 4. In connection with item 48, the First Committee had &fore it the following documents:

- (a) Letter dated 18 June 1987 from the Permanent Representative of Guyana to the United Nations addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of the final communique and other documents of the Special Ministerial Meeting of the Co-ordinating Bureau of the Non-Aligned Countries on Latin America and the Caribbean, held at Georgetown, from 9 to 12 March 1987 (h/42/357-S/18935);
- (b) Letter dated 30 September 1987 from the Permanent Representative of Brazil to the United Nations addressed to the Secretary-General (h/42/599);
- (c) Letter dated 23 October 1987 from the Permanent Representative of Zimbabwe to the United Nations addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the final communique of the Meeting of Ministers for Foreign Affairs and Heads of Delegation of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries to the forty-second session of the General Assembly, held in New York from 5 to 7 October 1987 (A/42/681).

### II. CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTION A/C,1/42/L,52

- 5. On 27 October 1987, The Bahamas, Bolivia, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Haiti, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Suriname, Trinidad and Tobago, Uruguay and Venezuela submitted a draft resolution entitled "Implementation of General Assembly resolution 41/45 concerning the signature and ratification of Additional Protocol I of the Treaty for the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in Latin America (Treaty of Tlatelolco)" (A/C.1/42/L.52). The draft resolution was introduced by the representative Of Mexico at the 31st meeting, on 3 November.
- 6. At its 37th meeting, on 9 November, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.1/42/L.52 by a recorded vote of 127 to none, with 6 abstentions (see para. 7). The voting was as follows:

# III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

7. The First Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

Implementat ion of General Assembly resolut ion 41/45 concerning
the signature and ratification of Additional Protocol I of the
Treaty for t-he Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in Latin America

(Treaty of Tlatelolco)

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 2286 (XXII) of 5 December 1967, 3262 (XXIX) of 9 December 1974, 3473 (XXX) of 11 December 1975, 32/76 of 12 December 1977, S-10/2 of 30 June 1978, 33/58 of 14 December 1978, 34/71 of 11 December 1979, 35/143 of 12 December 1980, 36/83 of 9 December 1981, 37/71 of 9 December 1982, 38/61 of 15 December 1983, 39/51 of 12 December 1984, 40/79 of 12 December 1985 and 41/45 of 3 December 1986 concerning the signature and ratification of Additional Protocol I of the Treaty for the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in Latin America (Treaty of Tlatelolco), 1/

Taking into account that within the zone of application of that Treaty, to which twenty-three sovereign States are already parties, there are some ter ri tor ies which, in spite of not being sovereign political entities, are nevertheless in a position to receive the benefits deriving from the Treaty through its Additional Protocol I, to which the four States that de jure or de facto are internationally responsible for those territories may become parties,

Considering that it is not fair that the peoples of some of those territories are deprived of such benefits without being given the opportunity to exprese their opinion in this connection,

Recalling that three of the States to which the Additional Protocol I is opened - thu United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Kingdom of the Netherlands and the United States of America - became parties to the Protocol in 1969, 1971 and 1981, respectively,

- 1. <u>Deployed</u> that the signature of Additional Protocol I by France, which took place on 2 March 1979, has not yet been followed by the corresponding rat if icat ion, notwithstanding the time already elapsed and the pressing invitations which the General Assembly has addressed to it;
- 2. Once more urges France not to delay any further such ratification, which has been requested so many times and which appears all the more advisable, since Prance is the only one of tha four States to which the Protocol is open that is not yot party to it;
- 3. Decides to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-third session en item entitled "Implementation of General Assembly resolution 42/\_\_\_\_concerning the niquature and ratification of Additional Protocol I of the Treaty for the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons in Latin America (Treaty of Tlatelolco)".
