ANNEX

Declaration on East-West relation8 issued by the Head8 of State8 and Government8 of the twelve State8 member8 of the European Community meeting in the European Council at Copenhagen on 4 and 5 December 1987

1. The European Council welcome8 the important proapecte of an improvement in East-West relations and acknowledge8 that the forthcoming summit in Washington, D.C., will mark a significant step forward in these relations.

2. The agreement on global elimination of United States and Soviet land-based intermediate range nuclear missiles will be a milestone, eliminating for the first time an entire class of weapons. The Twelve hope that this agreement will enter into force soon.

They consider it essential that this achievement in nuclear arm8 control should give further impetus to substantive progress in the whole range of present and future bilateral United States/Soviet and multilateral negotiation8 on arm8 control and diearmament.

3. The Twelve will continue to seek, through the process of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe, more secure and more co-operative relation8 between the participating States. All the undertakings made in Helsinki and Madrid should be fully implemented.

Respect for human right8 and freedom8 is a prerequisite for confidence, understanding and co-operation. The Twelve are determined that the Vienna meeting should benefit all individuala in the 35 countries involved.

The Twelve wish to build upon the achievement8 of the Stockholm Conference on Confidence- and Security-Building Measures and Disarmament in Europe and will contribute to the elaboration of a further set of confidence- and security-building measures. They will work recolutely towards a stable and secure balance of conventional force8 in Europe at a lower level.

4. In all this, the Twelve will co-operate closely with other countries that share their ideals, value8 and objectives.
