Palestine Refugees in the West Bank

Report of the Secretary-General

1. The present report is submitted pursuant to General Assembly resolution 42/69 J of 2 December 1987, entitled "Palestine refugees In the Wart Bank", the operative paragraphs of which read as follows:

"The General Assembly,

...

"1. <u>Cells once again upon Isreel to abandon those plans</u> and to refrain from any action that leads to the removal and resettlement of Palestine rofugeer in thr West Bank and from the dratruction of their camps;

"2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General, *in* co-operation with the Commissioner-General of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East, to keep thr matter under close supervision and to report to the General Assembly, before the opening of its forty-third session, on any developments regarding this matter, "

2. On 20 January 1988, the Secretary-General addressed a note verbale to the Permanent Representative of Iaraol to the United Nations, in which, inter alia, he drew attention to his reporting responsibility under the rerolution and requested the Permanent Representative to inform him of any steps his Government had taken or envisaged taking in implementation of the relevant provisions of the resolution. In his reply dated 7 July 1988, the Permanent Representative of Israel rtatod as followr: "Jsrael's position on this resolution has been tully set out in statements by Israel's representative to the Special Political Committee on 20 November 1984 (A/SPC/39/PV.35), on 9 November 1985 (A/SPC/40/SR.26), on 15 November 1985 (A/SPC/40/SR.34), on 28 October 1986 (A/SPC/41/SR.14) and in the report of the Secretary-General (A/42/482) dated 18 August 1987."

3. The position of thr Commissioner-General of UNRWA remains as set out in previous reports of the Secretary-General (see, for example, A/41/558 and A/40/615) that he would not object if refugees in the camps voluntarily sought better housi g, whether by improving existing housing or moving into new housing. He would, however, strongly object if any pressure or coercion were used to make refugees move or comply with any scheme, As pointed out in earlier reports, refugees will not lose eligibility for UNRWA's services by the mere fact of relocation outside the camps, As at 30 June 19:8, of the 385,634 registered refugees in the West Bank, 285,723 live outside the camps,
