ANNEX

Declaration of the European Council on the International Role of the European Community adopted at Rhodes on 2 and 3 December 1988

1. Reaffirming it8 commitment to achieve concrete progress toward8 European Unity on the basis of the Single European Act,

Determined to strengthen and $\bullet \boxtimes \Rightarrow \odot \blacksquare \Omega$ the role of the European Community and its member States on the international political and economic stage, in co-operation with all other States and appropriate organisations.

And aware that the completion of the internal market in 1992, which is already inspiring a new dynamism in the Community's \bullet aonomia life, will equally affect the Community's political and economic rolr in the world.

The European Council reaffirms that the Single Market will be of benefit to Community and non-Community countries alike by ensuring continuing \bullet anomia growth. The internal market will not close in on itself. The Europe of 1992 will be a partner and not a "fortress Europe". The internal market will be a decisive factor contributing to greater liberalisation in international trade on the basis of the GATT principles of reciprocal and mutually advantageous \bullet mangemants. The Community will continue to participate actively in the GATT Uruguay Round, committed as it is to strengthening the multilateral trading system. It will also continue to pursue, with the United States, Japan and the otherr Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) partners, policies designed to promote sustainable non-inflationary growth in the world economy.

2. The Community and its member States will continue ta work closely and co-operatively with the United States to msintrin and deepen the -solid and comprehensive transatlantic relationship. Closer political and eaonomia rolationr with Japan and the other industrialized countrier will also be developed. In particular, the Community wishes to strongthen and to expand relations with European Free Trade Association countries 8nd all other European nations that share the same ideals and objectives. Open and constructive dialogue and co-operation will be actively pursued with other counttier or regional groups of the Middle East and the Mediterranean, Africa, the Caribbean, the Pacific, Aria and Latin America, with special • mQha8is on interregional co-operation.

3. The European Council emphasizes the need to improve social and economic conditions in less developed countrier and to promote structural adjustment, both through trade and aid. It also recognizes the importance of a continuing policy to tackle the problem8 of the highly indebted countrier on a case-by-case basis. It look8 forward to the successful conclusion of the negotiation8 for the renewal of the Convention between the European Community and its 66 African, Caribbean and Pacific partners during the coming year.

4. The European Community and its member State8 are determined to play an active role in the preservation of international peace and security and in the

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solution of regional conf licts, in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations. Europa cannot hut actively demonstrate it8 solidarity to the great and spreading movement for democracy and full support for the principles of *the* Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The Twelve will endeavour to strengthen the • ffeotivena88 of the United Nation8 and to contribute actively to it8 peace-keeping role.

5. Against the background Of improved East-West relations, the European Council welcomer the readiness of the European members of the Council for Mutual Economic Assistance to develop relations with the European Community and reaffirms its willingness to further economic relations and co-operation with them, taking into account each country's specific situation, in order to use the opportunities available in a mutually beneficial way.

The European Council reaffirms its datarmination to act with renewed hope to overcome the division of our continent and to promote the Western valuer and principles which member States have in common.

To this affect, we will strive to achieve:

(a) Full respect for the provisions of the Helsinki Final Act and further progress in the process of the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europa, including an early and successful conclusion of the Vienna follow-up meeting;

(b) The • Stablishmant of a secure and stable balance of conventional forcer in Europa at 8 lower level, the strengthening of mutual confidence and militery transparency and the conclusion of a global and verifiable ban on chemical weapons;

(C) Promotion of human rights and fundamental freedoms, free circulation of people end ideas and the \bullet rtablirhmant of morr open societies; promotion of human and cultural exchanges between East and West;

(d) The davalopment of political dialogue with our Eastern ne. , hours.

6. The European Community and the Twelve are determined to make full use of the provisions of the Single European Act in order to strengthen solidarity among them, co-ordination on the political and \bullet COnOmic aspects of security, and consistency between the external policies of the European Community and the policies agreed in the framework of the European Political Co-operation. They will strive to reach swift adoption of common positions and implementation of joint action.

7. The European Council invites all countries to ombark with the European Community a8 world partner on an historic effort to leave to the next generation a continent and a world more Secure, more just and more free.

Eurovean Political Co-operation

1. EAST-WEST RELATIONS

Within the framework of East-West relations, the European Council had an in-depth **Jiscussion** of the overall relations with the Soviet Union and the countries **of** eastern Europe based on **var**. **Jus** contributions concerning the political and economic fields. Ministers of Foreign Affairs have been entrusted with ensuring the necessary follow-up.

The European Council has approved a paragraph on East-West relations, to be included in the text **of** a declaration on the international role of the European Community and its member States, which it has decided to make public at the end of its meeting in Rhodes.

2. MIDDLE EAST

Arab-Israeli conflict

The European Council had a thorough discussion on the situation in the Middle East. It reaffirmed the positions expressed by the Ministers of Foreign Affairs in their declaration of 21 November 1988, as well as in the declaration of 30 November 1988.

<u>Lebanon</u>

The European Council reaffirmed the importance it attaches to the election of a President of the Lebanese Republic.

It supports the efforts that the Lebanese are currently undertaking in order to search for a consensus which constitutes the condition for the maintenance of the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of Lebanon.

The European Council considers it essential that the international community continue to demonstrate an active interest in Lebanon and in the election of the President.

It expresses the view that the United Nations could, in particular, if that would be useful, contribute to the satisfactory holding of the Presidential election.

3. CYPRUS

The European Council had a discussion **on** the Cyprus problem. It acknowledged the fact that the tragic division of the island remains unchanged and reaffirmed the previous declaration of the Twelve, which supports without any reservation the independence, sovereignty, territorial integrity and unity of Cyprus.

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While expressing its satisfaction at thr resumption of thr dialogue between thr two communities, thr European Council \square \square \square \square \square \square \square the wish that the dialogue should aontinur and lead to an \square rrly settlement of the problem on the basis of the above-mentioned principles rnd thr relevant United Nations resolutions.
