RESOLUTION ON NAMIBIA

The Council of **Ministers** of the Organization **of** African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session **in Addis** Ababa, Ethiopia, **from** 17 to 22 July, 1909,

Having considered the report of the Co-ordinating Committee for the Liberation of Africa, as well as the report of the Secretary-General on the Situation in Southern Africa and having taken note of the information provided by the South West African People's Organization (SWAPO),

<u>Havingalso seriouslyreviewed</u> the unfolding events relating to the implementation of United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978).

<u>Deeply disturbed</u> by the racist Pretoria regime's designs and schemes to manipulate the implementation of Namibia's independence process in favour of its puppets and collaborators in flagrant violation of the letter and spirit of United Nations Security Council 435 (1978),

Further reiterating its resolutions, decisions and recommendations on the struggle for the liberation of Namibia being waged by SWAPO and its all-round support to that struggle,

Reaffirming the inalienable rights of the Namibian people to freedom and independence in conformity with the OAU and UN Charters,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> about the deteriorating security situation, especially widespread cases of murder, intimidation and hararsment of SWAPO members, supporters and sympathizers by the notorious elements of the South African murder squads:

- WELCOMES the commencement of the implementation of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978);
- 2. DEPLORES the inadequate deployment of UNTAG in Namibia at the start of the implementation of United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978) in April 1989, which enabled racist South Africa's army of occupation to hunt down and massacre SWAPO combatants based in Namibia;
- 3. CALLS UPON the United Nations Secretary General to take all measures, including increasing the military component of UNTAG to 7500 as provided for in United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978), so as to ensure racist South 'Africa's compliance with the resolution and create conditions for free and fair elections in Namibia;
- 4. STRONGLY CONDEMNS the decision to deploy racist South African forces on the eve of Namibia's transition to independence, and the unwarranted military attacks against SWAPO combatants awaiting confinement to base in accordance with the provisions of United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978), as well as the atrocities committed against the civilian population in Namibia;

- 5. HAILS the timely initiatives taken by the People's Republic of Angola, Republic of Cuba, SWAPO, the Frontline States as well as the measures taken by President MoussaTRAORE, Current Chairman of the OAU in April 1989, aimed at bringing to an end the crisis engineered by the racist Pretoria regime and the subsequent carnage and other atrocities committed against the People of Namibia;
- 6. STRONGLY CONDEMNS racist South Africa's continued machinations, especially the integration of the Koevoet murder squads in the South West Africa Police Force, which is supposed to maintain law and order during the period of transition to Namibia's independence aimed at preventing SWAPO from winning the independence elections scheduled for November 1989;
- 7. DEMANDS the immediate **demobilization** of all **Koevoot** elements from the **police** force and the dismantling of their **crumand** structure in accordance with the provisions of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978);
- 8. DECIDES to follow closely developments in Namibia and, in the event of continued violations by racist South Africa, of the provisions of UN SecurityCouncil Resolution 435 (1978) thereby threatening to wreck prospects for free and fair independence elections in Namibia, to convene an emergency session to consider appropriate action:

- 9. CALLS UPON the United Nations Secretary
 General to urgently ensure the overdue
 release of all Namibian political prisoners
 held by South Africa and the repeal of all
 oppressive and discrimanatory laws and
 regulations as provided for in United
 Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978);
- 10. FURTHER CALLS UPON the United Nations Secretary-General to ensure that the voting system of proportional representation to be used in Namibia be straight-forwaru and simple so as to be understood by the Namibian people who have never participated in a democratic election!
- 11. APPEALS to the International Community to urgently extend all necessary assistance to the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) and SWAPO, to facilitate the speedy repatriation of all Namibian exiles so as to enable them participate in the elections;
- 12. REAFFIRMS the inalienable right of the **people** of Namibia to national independence and sovereignty in a non-fragmented and United **Namibia**, including **Walvis** Bay and the Penguin and other off-shore islands in accordance with United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978);

- 13. STRONGLY RECOMMENDS that the United Nations discharge its full responsibility in ensuring its supervision and control of the elections, and that the Special Representative of the United Nations Secretary General proceed with the step by step implementation process only after he has satisfied himself that it will lead to free and fair elections as stipulated in the United Nations Plan for the independence of Namibia:
- 14. EXPRESSES satisfaction with the solidarity shown by the International Community with the just struggle of the people of Namibia and EXPRESSES its profound gratitude to all the States which are participating in the United Nations Transitional Assistance Group (UNTAG);
- 15. ENCOURAGES the UN Secretary-General and UNTAG and URGES them to pursue their efforts to ensure the full implementation of Resolution 435.
- 16. CALLS UPON the United Nations to exercise its full responsibility in implementing Resolution 435 (1978) on Namibia, without any deviations and not to allow South Africa to manipulate the interpretation of this resolution to its own advantage;
- 17. CALLS UPON the International Community and all democratic forces to monitor closely Namibia's independence process that to extend all necessary assistance to the people of Namibia to realize genuine independence;

SWAPO and to take necessary measures to fully cover the election events in Namibia.

RESOLUTION ON SOUTH AFRICA

The Council ofilinisters of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session, in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1909,

<u>Having considered</u> the Report of the **Co-ordinating** Committee for the **Liberation** of Africa and the report of the Secretary-General on Southern Africa,

Having further beenbriefed by the ANC and the PAC on the current developments inside South Africa,

Gravely concerned over the extension of the state of emergency, passing of death sentences on opponents of Apartheid, continued datention without trial and intensified repression of all opponents of the minority racis: regime,

Further concerned about thede ericriting health of political prisoners and detainees ir. Apartheid prisons,

<u>Deeply outraged</u> at the use of poisonous chemicals by the <u>Apartheid</u> regime against members of the Liberation **Movements** and the mass democratic movements.

Having noted the so-called S-year manifesto of the
racist National Parcy,

Aware that the impending September 1989 elections are confined to the white minority population of South Africa,

Deeply concerned over the growing military co-operation between racist South Africa and Chile, Israel and Taiwan,

Convinced that current economic sanctions against the **Apartheid** regime **are** having the intended effects,

Further concerned at the continued aggression and destabilization against the Fr intline and other neighbouring States by the racist regime of South Africa:

- 2. **DEMANDS** the **immediate end** to the judicial murders perpetrated by the racist **regime** on South African partriots whose real status according. to **relevant** Geneva Conventions is that **of** prisoners of **var**;
- 3. FURTHER CONDEMNS the continued incarceration of political prisoners and detainees;
- 4. **DEMANDS the unconditional** release of Comrade Nelson M3nae.I.a and all other political prisoners and detainees:

- 5. FURTHER DEMANDS the immediate and urrconditional unbanning of the NNC, PAC and all anti-Apartheid organizations;
- G. SUPPORTS the campaign launched by Comrade Zephania Yothopsng, together with the International Red Cross, against South Africa's abject prison conditions which have directly resulted in ComradesMandela and Mothopeng contracting tuberculosis, and DEMANDS that all prisoner8 and detainees in racist jails have access to proper medical caret
- 7. STRONGLY CONDEMNS the use of poisonous chemicals by the racist regime against members of the Liberation Movements and massdemocratic organization;
- 8. CATEGORICALLY REJECTS the so-called National Party's 5-year manifesto as it aims at entrenching and perpetuating white domination;
- 9. REAFFIRMS that only an election based on one person one vote to a single unitary chamber can lead to the establishment of a non-racial and democratic South Africa:
- 10. STRONGLY CONDEMNS the growing military dooperation between racist South Africa and Chile,
 Israel, Taiwan as well as certain Western
 countries, and accordingly CALLS for the strict
 observance of the UN Security Council's arms
 embargo against South Africa;

- 11 REITERATES the appeal to the International Community to impose comprehensive and mandatory sanctions against the racist Pretoria regime;
- 12. STROUGLY URGES the fintsrnational Banking
 Community not to reschedule this foreign debt
 of Apartheid South Africa and CALLS ON Pretoria's
 major trading partners to end double taxation
 agreements with racist South Africa, terminate
 trade credit guarantees and oppose gold loans
 and swaps;
- 13. CALLS UPON the International Community to continue and expand all-round isolation of Apartheid South Africa;
- 14. STRONGLY SUPPORTS the decisions of the UN General Assembly to convene a Special Session on Apartheid end its destructive consequences in Southern Africa in December 1989;
- 15. HAILS the timely initiatives of the Association of African Jurists (AAJ) to set up in Groce (Senegal) at the end of this year, an International Tribunal to axamine the crimes of Apartheid and EXPRESSES SUPPORT for this undertaking;
- 16. CALLS UPONOAU Member States and the International Community to increase all-round support to the National Liberation Movements and to further isolate the Apartheid regime.

RESOLUTION ON THE AFRICAN ANTI-APARTHEID C MMITTEE

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1989,

Noting that in pursuance of the recommendations of Declaration AHG/ST.2 (XXIII) of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government and Resolution CM/Res.1097(XLVI) of the Council of Ministers of the OAU adopted in July 1907 in AddisAbaba, the Constituent General Assembly of the African Anti-Apartheid Committee was held in Braszaville, the People's Republic of the Congo from 12 to 14 January, 198%

Recalling that the major objective of the Constituent General Assembly of the African a.vti-Apartheid Committee were to provide a continental framework for co-ordinating the activities of national anti-Apartheid Committee for the total eradication of Apartheid and effectively support the liberation struggle in Southern Africa,

Expressing the wish to promote and strengthen cooperation between the Organization of African Unity and the
Africananti-Apartheid Committee:

1. NOTES and EXPRESSES SATISFACTION at the establishment of the African anti-Apartheid Committee, a Non-Governmental Organization with its headquarters in Brazzaville, the People's Republic of the Congo;

- 2. FURTHER TAKES NOTE of the will of the African anti-Apartheid Committee to closely cooperate with the Organization of African Unity and the United Nations so as to intensify the anti-Apartheid struggle in Southern Africa;
- 3. RECOMMENDS to the African anti-Apartheid
 Committee to harmonize its activities with
 those of the United Nations Special antiApartheid Committee, the bodies of the United
 Nations System and their International Organizations concerned;
- 4. CALLS UPON the OAU Secretary-General to hold consultations with the Secretary-General of the African anti-<u>Apartheid</u> Committee with a view to defining the **modalities** for establishing appropriate co-operation links between the Organisation of African Unity and. the said Committee:
- 5. REQUESTS the OAU Secretary-General after holding consultations with the Secretary-General of the African anti-Apartheid Committee, to make recommendations to the Fifty-first Ordinary Session of the Council of Ministers in order to establish effective co-operation between the OAU and the African anti-Apartheid Committee.

RESOLUTION ON FRONTLINE AWD OTHER NEIGHBOURING STATES

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1989,

<u>Having considered</u> the report of the Co-ordinating Committee Cor the Liberation of Africa and the report of the Secretary-Generalon Southern Africa,

<u>Gravely concerned</u> over the *ever* volatile situation in Southern Africa and the continued acts of aggression, intimidation and **destabilization** against the Frontline and other neighbouring States by the racist Pretoria regime,

Fully cognizant of the enormous sacrifices which the Frontline States continue to make in the course of the struggle for the total liberation of Africa:

- 1. COMMENDS the Frontline States for their sacrifices and support to the ANC, PAC and SWAPO in their legitimate struggle to realize the total liberation of Africa;
- 2. HAILS the emplacement of a Frontline States
 Observer Mission in Namibia and INVITES
 that Mission to continue to closely cooperate with the OAU Representative in
 Namibia:

- 3. **CONDEMNS** racist South Africa's continued acts **of** aggression, intimidation and destabilization against the Frontline and other Neighbouring States;
- 4. FURTHER CONDEMNS the racist **Pretoria** regime for **its**continued support for the armed bandits in Mozambique and the **atrocities** being perpetrated **against** the People **91**:
 Mozambique;
- **5.** CALLS UPON the International Community to **exert** pressure on South Africa to stop its support **for** the armed bandits in Mozambique **as** well **as** acts of **aggression**, intimidation and destabilization against the Frontline and other neighbouring States;
- 6. REITERATES ITS APPEAL to the International Community to increase financial and material assistance to the Frontline and other Neighbouring States to enable them withstand South Africa's acts of aggression, intimidation, blackmail and destabilization.

RESOLUTION ON AFRO-ARAB CO-OPERATION

The Council of Ministers of the Organisation of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1989,

Havingconsidered the report of the Secretary-General on Afro-Arab Co-operation contained in Document CM/1566 (L),

Bearing in mind the Declarations and Programme of Action adopted by the First Afro-Arab Summit held in Cairo, Arab Republic of Egypt, from 7 - 9 March, 1977,

<u>Determined</u> to promote and strengthen Afro-Arab Cooperation in all *areas*,

<u>Considering</u> the recommendations of the Tenth Ordinary Session of the Standing Commission for Afro-Arab Co-operation held in **Kuwait** State of Kuwait, from 18-20 June, 1989,

<u>Considering</u> Resolution CM/Res.993 (XL) of February 1984 defining among other things, the composition of the OAU Committee of 12 on Afro-Arab Co-operation:

- 1. TAKES NOTE of the Report of the Secretary-General on Afro-Arab Co-operation:
- 2. ENDORSES the recommendations of the Tenth Ordinary Session of the Standing Commission on Afro-Arab Co-operation and CALLS UPON the Secretary-General to hold the necessary consultations with the Secretary-General of the League of Arab States and the other parties concerned with A view to ensuring the implementation of these recommendations;

- 2. EXPRESSES ITS PROFOUND GRATITUDE **to** the State **of** Kuwait **for** the efforts deployed and the excellent facilities provided which contributed to the success of the Tenth Ordinary Session of the Standing Commission;
- 4. **COMMENDS** the **Member** States and the two Secretaries General of the **Organization** of African Unity and the League **of Prab** States, for the efforts deployed to hold the Tenth Ordinary Session of the Standing Commission under the best possible conditions;
- 5. CALLS UPON the OAU Secretary-General to conduct studies and take the necessary steps in close co-operation with his counterpart of the League of Arab States and in consultation with the Specialized African and Arab Institutions, for the implementation of the following specific projects:
 - a) proposed establishment of an Afro-Arab Financial Investment Institution:
 - i) preparation of the Draft Statutes,
 - ii) organization of a special meeting of African and Arab Ministers of Finance in Washington D.C. in September 1989 during the annual conference of the World Bank and the INF, to consider the said statutes and determine the modalities for contributing financially to the capital of the Institution;

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iii) Involvement of ADB and BADEA in this project.

- b) draft framework agreement for investment promotion and guarantee;
- c) meeting of African and Arab Investors;
- d) draft framework agreement for the establishment of an Afro-Arab Preferential Trade Area;
- e) organization of the First Afro-Arab Trade Fair in October 1990; the following 8 OAU Member states were selected to serve on the Joint Afro-Arab Trade Fair Organizing Committee: Burundi, Congo, Liberia, Uganda, Sudan, Togo, Tunisia and Zimbabwe;
- f) organization of an Afro-Arab Seminar on Food Security;
- g) opening of the Afro-Arab Cultural Institute in 1991 and provision of an initial budget of US\$500,000 to be contributed by the three organizations viz: OAU, LAS and ALECSO;
- h) intensification of exchange of programmes and information among the specialised African and Arab Institutions.
- 6. REQUESTS the Secretary-General to hold all necessary consultations with his counterpart of the League of Arab States and all interested parties, with a view to convening the First Session of the Afro-Arab Ministerial Conference, as early as possible:

- 7. RENEWS ITS THANKS to the Republic of Sudan for its continued willingness to host the First Session of the Afro-Arab Ministerial Conference:
- 8. FURTHER REQUESTS the Secretary-General to hold all necessary conaultations with his countsxpart of the League of Arab States and all interested parties, with a view to convening the Eleventh Session of the Standing Commission on Afro-Arab Co-operation, in New York in October 1989;
- 9. REQUESTS the Secretary-General in close co-operation with his counterpart of the League of Arab States to carry out a study on the ways and means of rationalizingthe functioning of Afro-Arab Cooperation structure3 with a view to enhancing their performance and simplifying their procedures;
- 10. DECIDED to designate the Arab Republic of Egypt as a member of the OAU Committee of Twelve on Afro-Arab Co-operation, to represent the Worth African sub-region for the rest of the currant term:
- 11. REQUESTS the Secretary-General to submit a report on the implementation of this cenolution to the next Session of the Council of Ministers.

RESOLUTION ON THE SITUATION IN THE MIDDLE EAST

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in AddisAbaba, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1989,

<u>Havingconsidered</u> the report of the Secretary-General of the Organization of African Unity on the Middle East as contained in Document CM/1544 (L),

<u>Guided</u> by the principles and purposes of the Charters of the OAU and the United Nations, and by the common determination of the African and Arab peoples to fight: jointly to safeguard their independence,

Recalling the **successive** resolutions adopted previously by the Assembly of Heads of **State** and Government, and the Council of **Ministers** of the **OAU** on the situation in the Middle East,

Noting with deer, concern that inspite of the many resolutions adopted particularly by the United Nations General Assembly, the Security Council, the Organization of African Unity and the Non-Aligned Countries urging Israel to withdraw from Arab territories occupied since 1907, including Jerusalem, not only has Israel persistently refused to comply with these resolutions but continue to pursue its expansionist, repressive and occupationist policy,

Affirming its concern over Inrael's continued policy of thwarting the efforts aimed at finding a just solution to the Palestinian problem within the framework of an international peace conference)

Notingwith concern that the collusion between the Zionist regime of Israel and the Apartheid regime of South Africals aimed at promoting, tha policy of terrorism and liquidation of the Palestinians and Arabs in the occupied territories on one hand and the majority of the population of South Africa and Namibia on the other:

- 1. REAFFIRMS all previous resolutions adopted by all the Sessions of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government and the Council of Ministers of the OAU on the Middle East Ouestion and Palastine:
- 2. FURTHER REAFFIRMS ITS SUPPORT for the struggle of the Arab countries, victims of Israeli aggression, and its support for the Palestinian people in their just legitimate struggle to recover their usurped rights and their occupied territories; and REAFFIRMS ITS FULL and EFFECT. (VE SUPPORT for the struggle of the Palestinian people under the leadership of its sole legitimate representative, the Palestine Liberation Organization;
- 3. AFFIRMS ITS SUPPORT for the efforts of the Special Committees on Palastine, affiliated to the United Nations, the Non-aligned Movement and the Committee of Seven in the League of Arab States;

- 4. STRONGLY CONDENNS Israel, the occupying power:

 for not complying with the provisions of the
 Fourth Geneva Convention of 12 August 1949,
 on the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of
 War:
- 5. CONDEMNS VIGOROUSLY the confiscation of Palestinian territories, the establishment of settlements by Israel in Palestine and other occupied Arab territories;
- 6. MAKES AN URGENT APPEAL to the international community to exert an effective pressure on Israel in all fields until it complies with the principles of international law and put and end to its occupation of Palestinian and other occupied territories)
- 7. REITERATES 'ITS REQUEST to the Security Council to take the necessary measures to secure international protection for the Palestinian people in the occupied territories until they are able to exercise their inalienable rights;
- 8. STRONGLY SUPPORTS the convening of an International Conference with mandatory power on the situation in the Middle East under the auspices of the United Nations with the supervision of the Permanent Members of the Security Council as well as all the parties concerned including the Palastine Liberation Organization, as a party on equal footing with other parties;

- 9. STRONGLY CONDEMNS the continued occupation of Southern Lebanon and CALLS for the implementation of Resolution 825 adopted in 1978 by the United Nations Security Council stipulating respect of the territorial integrity of Lebanon and the immediate evacuation from occupied Lebanese territories)
- 10. COMMENDS the efforts deployed by the Committee of Three, comprising Algeria, Morocco and Saudi Arabia, which was set up by the Extraordinary Arab Summit Conference, held in Casablanca from 23 to 26 May, 1989, to create favourable conditions for the establishment of the unity and sovereignty of Lebanon and CALLS UPON all the parties concerned to support its efforts;
- 11. CONSIDERS NULL AND VOID any measures taken by Israel in the occupied Arabterritories, aimed at exploiting their resources and REQUESTS all States, International Organizations and investment agencies not to recognize Israel's authority over these territories and not to cooperate with it, in any form whatsoever in its illegal exploitation of these resources;
- 12. REJECTS nll attempts and initiatives that ignors the inalienable rights of the Palestinian people, and which aim at aborting the heroic uprising of the Palestinian people and by-passing the Palestine Liberation Organization, the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinian people;

- 13. STRONGLY CONDEMNS tha alliance between the racist Tel Aviv and Pretoria regimen and their co-operation in the field of nuclear energy and armament which threatens security and peace in Africa and in the Middle East, and therefore CALLS UPON Member States to deploy all efforts to prevent these two racist regimes from implementing their planar
- 14. WELCOMES the cease-fire between Iraq and Iran and hopes that the peace talks will lead to the full implementation of Security Council Resolution No. 598;
- 1s. REQUESTS the OAU Secretary-General to monitor the devalopments in the Middle East Question and to report to the next Ordinary Session of the Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity.

RESOLUTION ON THE QUESTION OF PALESTINE

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia from 17 to 22 July, 1909,

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General
on the question of Palestine as contained in Document
CM/1545 (L),

Recalling the resolutions adopted by the previous sessions of the Council of Ministers and the Assembly of Heads of State and Government on the Question of Palestine and the problem of the Middle East,

Guided by the principles and objectives of the OAU and the Charter of the UN and the joint struggle against Zionism and Racism in order to attain freedom, independence and peace,

Further recalling all relevant resolutions of the United Nations and the Non-Aligned Movement on the Question of Palestine and the problem of the Middle East,

Noting the relevant reports of the United Nations **Committee** on the exercise by the Palestinian people of their inalienable rights,

Referring to the Resolutions of the Palestinian

National Council at its Nineteenth Extra-ordinary Session held
in Algiers from 12 to 15 November, 1988, and to the speech of
the Head of State of Palestine, Mr. Yasser Arafat before the
United Nations General Assembly meeting in its Forty-third
Session in Geneva from 22 September to 15 December, 1988,

Reaffirming the legitimacy of the struggle of the Palestinian people under the leadership of the PLO, its sole legitimate representative in order to retrieve their land and exercise their full national rights,

Following attentively and with deep concern the continued heroic popular uprising of the Palestinian people in the occupied territories to put an end to the Israeli occupation and to regain their national and inalienable rights, including their right to repatriation, self-determination and the establishment of their independent Palestinian State with Jerusalem as the Capital,

Noting with deep concern the continued escalation of Israeli aggressive repression against the Palestinian people and their leadership inside and outside the occupied territories.

Noting further with deep concern the alliance of the Zionist regime of Israel and the Apartheid regime of South Africa, both countries adopting a terrorist policy against the Palestinian people and the Arabs in the Arab and Palestinian occupied territories on one hand, and the peoples of South Africa and Namibia on the other.

Noting with profound indignation the statements made by Israeli Ministers, including the recent one by Minister Sharon calling for the physical elimination of President Yasser Arafat, and other PLO leaders,

Gravely concerned by the threats in that they constitute fresh acts of aggression on the part of Israel against any African or Arab country;

1. REAFFIRMS all the previous resolutions and recommendations adopted by the Assembly of Heads of State and Government and the Council of Ministers on the Question of Palestine;

2. FURTHER REITERATES!

- (a) the inalienable rights of the Palestinian people to return to their homes and in Palestine from which they were displaced and recover their property;
- (b) the inalienable right of the Palestinian people to self-determination without any outside interference and the establishment of their independent Sovereign Palestinian State on their homeland with Jerusalem as Capital;
- 3. DEMANDS the immediate unconditional withdrawal of Israel from all Palestinian occupied territories including Jerusalem, and CALLS ON the UN and more specially the Security Council, to take all the necessary measures to put an end to Israeli occupation of the Palestinian territories and extend the International Protection through UN machinery, to the Palestinian people and place the occupied Palestinian territories under the supervision of the United Nations for a specific period as part of the peace process;
- 4. CONSIDERS that the Resolutions adopted by the Nineteenth Session of the National Palestinian Council held in Algiers from 12 to 15 November, 1988, which led to the proclamation of the State

of Palestine, its acceptable of the United Nation8 Security Council Recolutione 242 (1967) and 336 (1973) are a positive contribution to the efforts for the restoration of a just and lasting peace through the organization of an International Peace Conference under the auspice8 of the United Nations:

- 5. CALLS UPON those States which recognized the State of Palestine to endorse itt application to join the United Nations Organization and its Specialised Agencies]
- 6. AFFIRMS its support for the Palestinian Peace
 Initiative approved by the Palestinian National
 Council at its Nineteenth Session held in Algiers
 in November 1988, and announced by President
 Yasser Arafat before the UN General Assembly in
 December 1988, initiative based on the Arab Peace
 Plan and International Law and approved by the
 Extra-ordinary Arab Summit held in Casablanca,
 from 23 to 26 May, 1989 and WELCOMES international
 support for this initiative)
- SUPPORTS the stand taken by the Palestinians

 according to which elections should be held in the
 occupied territories after the withdrawal of

 Israel from these and, under international
 supervision as part of the overall peace process
 for the plan proposed by Israel aims at
 undermining the popular Palestinian uprising,
 by-passing the Palestine Liberation Organisation
 and circumventing the inclienable rights of the
 Palestinian people;

- 8. EXPRESSES ITS UNCONDITIONAL SUPPORT for the legitimate popular upriming of the Palestinian people in the occupied Palestinian territories and CALLS ON Member States to urgently provide the PLO with concrete assistance to enable it to continue to support the uprising of the militant Palestinian people in the occupied Palestinian territories:
- 9. STRONGLY CONDEMNS Israel, the occupying power for its policy of repression, aggression, terrorism, torture and deportation aimed at suppressing the Palestinian people in the occupied territories; for its continued policy of occupation, confiscation of land and exploitation of water resources; policy of deportation, detention bone breaking, causing of abortion, use of toxic gas and chemical weapons, burial and burning of people, all the above constituting a flagrant violation of the Universal Declaration on Human Rights, International Law and the Fourth Geneva Conventioar
- 10. CONDEMNS the death call made by some Israeli leaders and in particular a Minister, Sharon, and CALLS for the .igilance of the International Community to prevent the implementation of .hese threats:
- 11. CALLS ON THE United Nations, particularly on the **Security** Council to take the **necessary measures** to ensure the release **of** Palestinian prisoners in the occupied Palestinian territories, the return **of** deporteesr to put an end to the terrorism

practised by the Israeli occupation authorities against the Palestinian people to see to the application of Security Council Resolution8

Nos. 605, 607, 606 adopted in 1988 and Resolution

No, 661 adopted in 1989 and to the implementation of the Geneva Convention on this matter)

- 12. REITERATES ITS SUPPORT for the need to convene an International Conference for Peace in the Middle East in accordance with the provisions of the relevant resolutions of the UN General Assembly particularly the Resolution adopted on 13 December, 1988, Conference to be eld with the participation of the Permanent Members of the UN Security Council and the parties concerned including the PLO, the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinian people, on an equal footing with other parties;
- 13. CALLS ON the Secretary-General of the Organization of African Unity to follow up the developmenta of the Palestinian Question and submit a report on them to the forthcoming Session of the OAU Council of Ministers.

RESOLUTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE COMORIAN ISLAND OF MAYOTTE

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 - 22 July, 1989,

Having considered the report contained in Document CM/1543 (L) Part II,

Recalling the relevant CAU Resolutions on the Question of the Comorian Island of Mayotte particularly Resolution CM/Res.1152 (XLVIII),

Recalling further therelevant resolution+ and decisions of the United Nations, the Mon-Aligned Movement, the Islamic Conference and the League of Arab States,

Recalling finally the programme of action recommended by the OAU Ad Hoc Committee of 7, contained in DOC/CTTEE 7 (MAYOTTE) Rec. 1 - 9 (II) adopted in Moroni in November, 1989,

Reiterating the legitimacy of the claims of the Comorian Governmentralating to the reintegration of the Comorian Island of Mayotte into the Federal Islamic Republic of Comoros,

Aware of the state of insecurity prevailing in the region, resulting from the presence in and control of the Comorian Island of France:

1. TAKES NOTE of the Report contained in Doc. CM/1543 (L) Part: I I;

- 7. REAFFIRMS the sovereignty of the Federal Islamic Republic of Comoros overthe Conorian Island of Mayotte;
- 3. EXPRESSES ITS CONCERN over the blatant intransigence of the French Government regarding the legitimate claims of the Comorian Government and the relevant resolutions of the DAU, the UN, the Islamic Conference, the Non-Aligned Novement and the League of Arab States;
- 4. FURTHER REAFFIRMS its solidarity with the Comorian people in their determination to regain their political unity, as well as to defend their national sovereignty and territorial integrity;
- 5. INVITES all OAU Hember States to do everything possible individually and collectively to inform and sensitize French and International public opinion to the question of the Comorian Island of Mayotte so as to convince the French Government to end its illegal occupation of this island:
- national community to categorically condamn and reject all forms of consultations to be held by France in the Comorian Territory of Mayotte, on the International Legal Status of Island, since the referendum on self-determination neld on 22 December, 1374 remains the only valid framework of consultation applicable to the entire Archipelago;

- 7. ALSO APPEALS to all ONU Member States and the international community to condemnand reject any initiative which France may take to involve the Comorian Island of Mayotte in any demonistrations that would separate it from tha Federal Islamic Republic of Comoros;
- 3. IMANDATES the OAU Ad Hoc Committee of Seven on the Question of the Comorian Island of Mayotte, as well a8 the UAU General Secretariat to resume dialogue with the French authorities in order to pursue its efforts to restore the Comorian Island of Mayotte to tha Federal Islamic Republic of Comoror within the ehortert possible time;
- 9. REQUESTS that the question of the Comorian Island of Mayotte remains on the agenda of all meetings of the OAU, the UN, the Non-Aligned Novement, the Islamic Conference and the League of Arab States until the Comorian Island of Mayotte is restored to the Federal Islamic Republic of Comoros;
- 10. FURTHER REQUESTS the **OAU** Secretary-General to submit **a** report therson to the next **Session** of **the** Council of Ministers.

The Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 2.2 July, 1989,

Having considered the report of the Tenth Ordinary
Session of the OAU Defence Commission, contained in Document
CM/1546 (L),

Bearing in mind Decision AHG/DEC 113 (XVI) Rev.1 on tha establishment of an OAU Defence Force,

Recalling its Resolution CM/Res.1073 (XLIV) on the need to conduct an in depth study of the implications of the establishment of an African Jefence Organ,

<u>Determined</u> to promote and **harmonize** co-operation among the Member States of the **OAU** in military matters, pursuant to **the** objectives of the **Organisation**,

Taking into account the recommendations of the Defence Commission in favour of the establishment of an African Defence Organ,

Convinced that only a concerted political will of the OAU Member States can help the Organization of African Unity to establish, a body capable of intervening rapidly in a state of crisis:

1. TAXES NOTE of the report of the Tenth Ordinary Session of the Defence Commission, contained in Document CM/1546 (L);

- 2. EXPRESSES ITS PROFOUND GRATITUDE to the Government and people of the Socialist Peoples Libyan Arab Jamahiriya for the excellent arrangements made thus ensuring the success of the deliberations of the Tenth Ordinary Session, of the Defence Commission;
- 3. **REAFFIRMS** the decision in principle to establish an African Defence Organ and REQUESTS the Defence Commission to pursue its studies on the modalities of establishing such an Organ, by analysing and assessing the budgetary implications;
- 4. APPEALS to all Nember States to promote and intensify their co-operation in military matters, with the aim of fostering solidarity, ensuring mutual assistance, complementarity and independence:

Bearing in mind the relevant provisions of the Charter of the OAU, particularly those on the inviolability of borders existing at the time of independence, the principle of non-interference in the affair8 of other Nember States and respect of Human and Peoples' Rights:

1. PAYS GLOWING TRIBUTE to the happy initiative taken by His Excellency General Moussa Traora, President of the Republic of Mali and Current Chairman of the OAU, to restore harmony between the two brotherly countries and which contributed to ease tension;

- 2. ENCOURAGES the Governments of the two brotherly countries to show political will to pursue, within a spirit of African brotherhood and solidarity, the negotiation 880 as to arrive, through peaceful means, at a solution to the dispute opposing them, in conformity with the principles and purposes of the Charter of the OAU;
- 3. RECOMMENDS to the Twenty-fifth Session of the OAU Assembly of Heads of State and Government to request the Current Chairman of the OAU to pursua the on-going mediation efforts, at the head **of** an Inter-African Committee, requested to assist him in his mediation for a comprehensive and peaceful settlement of the crisis, on the basis of the basic principle8 enshrined in the Charter of the OAU, particularly, the principle of inviolability of border8 existing at the time of independence, the principle of non-interference in the affaris of other Member States and the respect for Human and Peoples' Rights.

RESOLUTION ON THE REACTIVATION OF NORTH-SOUTH DIALOGUE

Havingconsidated the report of the ONU Permanent Steering Committee, contained in Document CM/1552 (L),

<u>Deeply concerned</u> *overtha* peraistent critical economic **situation** in Africa,

Convinced that a **better climate** in international economic relations could **contribute** to the **recovery** of the world economy and, thus, to the economic recovery and development of **Africa**,

Further convinced that regular consultations between developeri and developing countries on overall economic issues of mutual interest and environment problems could, in a spirit of interdependence, play a decisive role in reactivating the North-South dialogue:

hAILS the recent initiative taken in Paris by the Presidents of Egypt, Senegal and Venezuela as well as the Prime Minister of India towards starting a new round of regular consultations at Summit level between ceveloped and developing countries on global economic and environmental issues;

- 2. CONSIDERS that this initiative can promote a more fruitful North-South Dialogue and ENCOURAGES its promoters to pursue the efforts necessary to translate their ideas into action:
- 3. **RECOMMENDS** that the **Assembly** of Heads of **State** and **Government** mandate its Chairman to take the *necessary* steps to **enable** Africa to contribute to the reactivation of **North**-South dialogue as advocated in the **Paris** Initiative.

RESOLUTION ON NEGOTIATIONS FOR A FOURTH ACP/EEC CONVENTION

The Council of Ministers of the Organisation of African Unity, meeting at its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July 1989,

Having considered the report of the Seventeenth Session of the Permanent Steering Committee, particularly the item relating to the current negotiations for a fourth ACP/EEC Convention,

Recalling its resolution CM/Res.1194(XLIX) adopted at its Forty-ninth Ordinary Session,

<u>Conscious</u> of the fact that <u>Lome</u> Convention constitutes a very important framework for North-South Co-operation, *given* its special and differential treatment for ACP *states*,

<u>Concerned</u> about the continued deterioration of the economic situation in **ACP** countries and the fact that the structure **ACP/EEC** co-operation particularly with regard **to** commercial co-operation has not meaningfully changed since Lome I,

Noting that **EEC** total imports from **ACP** states have continued to decline and that **commodity** prices have been falling in real terms while the quantum of EDF resources has remained too low to have **a** meaningful impact on **ACP** countries,

<u>Concerned</u> about the likely effects on the EEC/ACP co-operation arrangements in the face of the proposed 1992 European Single Market,

Convinced that the present negotiations for a Fourth ACP/EEC Convention are aiming at preserving, consolidating and expanding an efficient and effective co-operation between the EEC and the ACP for the mutual benefit of our various countries8

1. REQUESTS the AC' negotiators to ensure that improvement on previous conventions be not confined to broad generalities concerning objectives

and scope of co-operation, but cover substantially areas that are of major concern for ACP countries;

- 2. REQUESTS FURTHER that ACP negotiators ensure that the STABEX system under the Fourth ACP/EEC Convention compensates for losses incurred on foreign exchange earnings from export commodities of the ACP states;
- 3. REITERATES the fact that a long-term strategy aimed at improving production, marketing and distribution of commodities as well as local processing remains a key element in solving the present range of problems faced by ACP countries and in this regard requests the negotiators to ensure that Lome IV includes a substantial technical and financial assistance from EEC to ACP states)
- 4. RECOMMENDS "the Memorandum of Africa's commodities problems and recommended measures for the revitalization and diversification of the section" to serve as guidelines on negotiations on commodities;
- 5. CALLS UPON the ACP negotiators to ensure that EEC countries commit themselves to halting and reversing protectionism as well as eliminating the escalation of tariff and non-tariff barriers affecting the exports of ACP states;
- 6. FURTHER CALLS UPON the negotiators to ensure relaxation of the rules of origin which in their present form discourage processing of ACP raw materials destined for the EEC market;
- 7. REAFFIRMS its previous decisions and resolutions relating to the issues under negotiations such as regional co-operation, human rights, situation in Southern Africa, external indebtedness and dumping of toxic wastes which should continue to serve as African position in the on-negotiations;

- 8. ENDORSES the African Alternative Framework on Structural Adjustment Programmes adopted by the African Ministers of Economic Planning and Finance as constituting the guidelines on negotiations on Structural Adjustment Programmes,

Recalling Resolutions AHG/Res. 133 (XX), CM/Res. 962 (XLI), CM/1006 (XLII) on the modalities for operating the Fund,

Bearing in mind the statutes of the Special Fund especially the provisions of Article 7 paragraphs 3 and 4 and Article 2 paragraph (1) and (ii) of the Rules of Procedure of the Policy Committee of the Fund,

<u>Considering</u> the Decisions and Recommendations adopted by the Policy Committee at its Eighth Ordinary Session held in **Addis** Ababa, Ethiopia, from 30 June to 1 July 1989.

Noting with satisfaction with commendable activities carried out by the Fund on behalf of Member States affected by drought and famine,

- 1. TAKES NOTE of the report of the Secretary-General;
- 2. TAKES NOTE of the decisions and recommendations adopted by the Policy Committee and THANKS members of the Committee and the Secretary-General for the relentless efforts made to ensure the proper functioning of the Fund;

- 3. EXPRESSES GRAVE CONCERN over the lack of contributions during the period under review and RENEWS ITS APPEAL to Member States to make voluntary contributions and to those which had made pledges to honour their commitments;
- 4. **CONGRATULATES** the Secretary-Qeneral and the Steering Committee of the Fund on measures taken to mobilise new financial resources and URQZS the Secretary-Qeneral to take the necessary measures to ensure the implementation of the decisions of the Policy Committee;
- 5. REQUESTS the Secretary-General, in particular, to take the necessary steps to sensitise the non-governmental organisations in order to mobilise financial resources for the Fund;
- 6. APPEALS once **more** to **Member States** which have been awarded subventions and/or grants, to submit **periodic report% on** the implementation of the project% financed by the Fund to enable it ensure the follow-up and the evaluation of such **projects**;

Concerned that the flow of concessional resources to the continent has not been commensurate with the requirements and efforts being made by African countries to implement policy reforms and structural adjustment **programmes**,

Recognising the vital role which the African Development Fund is playing in Africa's socio-economic recovery and transformation and that the international community is fully aware of the need for providing increased concessional resources to enable the African Development Fund to contribute more effectively to the economic and social development of the African countries,

- 1. APPEALS to the international donor community to increase substantially the Sixth Replenishment of the African Development Fund over the level of the Fifth Replenishment and to increase the grant portion of finance for technical assistance;
- 2. PRECIATES the continuing efforts made by the management of the African Development Bank towards finding lasting solutions to the African external debt problemr
- **3.** REQUESTS the management of the African Development Bank to intensify its efforts in mobilizing additional external concessional resources from developed countries for the economic and social recovery and development of Africa.

Recalling the United Nations General Assembly
Resolution 43/27, urging African countries to "increase their efforts in the search for a viable conceptual and practical framework for economic structural adjustment programme in keeping with the long-term development objectives and strategies at the national, sub-regional and regional level!'

Concerned with the unabated deterioration in the economic and social conditions in African countries in **spite** of the commendable efforts of African Governments to implement policy reforms and to undertake Stabilization and Structural Adjustment Programmes, often with the support of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank,

<u>Convinced</u> that African countries must continue to adjust their economies but at the same time ensure that any adjustment will bring about structural transformation and sustained growth and development,

Having considered the African Alternative Framework for Structural Adjustment Programmes for Socic-Economic Recovery and Transformation (AAF-SAP) and ECA Conference of Ministers Resolution 676 (XXIV) and Addis Ababa Joint Statement by African Ministers of Finance on the "African Alternative Framework for Structural Adjustment Programmes for Socio-Economic Recovery and Transformation (AAF-SAP)":

- 1. COMMENDS the timely initiative of Africa's
 Ministers of Economic Development and Planning
 and Ministers of Finance for the preparation of
 the African Alternative Framework for Structural
 Adjustment Programmes for Socio-Economic Recovery
 and Transformation (AAF-SAP);

Recognizing that IFAD, one of the few international institutions which is the direct result of the negotiations to establish the New International Economic Order and in which developing countries have a two-thirds majority of the votes is carrying out fts mandate effectively and efficiently,

Recording their deep appreciation to thuindustrialized countries and to the overwhelmingmajority of developing countries which are Members of IFAD who, through their committed response to the Council's appeal made in Resolutions quoted above, have ensured a substantial level of contributions to IFAD's recently agreed Third Replenishment,

Underlining the necessity to ensure that on the basis of IFAD'spresentstructure and operations, ways and means should be agreed upon to secure asound und largely self-sustaining financial base for IFAD, thus ensuring the effective pursuit of its mandate long into the future:

- URGES those few countries outstanding to inform 1FAD of their contributions as soon as possible, but, in any event, before 15 September, 1989;
- 2. CALLS ON all developing. countries who contribute to international Financial Institutiona to give priority in the distribution of their financial contributions to those institutions ouch as IFAD in which they have a controlling interest.

Recalling all previous resolutions of the OAU on Africa's Commodity Problem which inter alia, calls on all commodity producing and consuming countries to nogetiate effectively International Commodity agreements and arrangeaents in order to ensure stable and remunarative prices for producers and secured supply far consumers,

<u>Concerned</u> about recent difficulties **confrcnting** negotiations of African **Coffoe** Producers in their effort to negotiate and conclude **with their** consumer partnurs a new International Coffee Agreement,

Gravely concerned over steop decline in coffee prices as a result of the suspension of the quota system of the International coffee agreement and the serious damages this situation is inflicting on the economies of African Coffee Producers,

Appreciative of the stand taken by EEC in support of a new coffee agreement:

- STRONGLY URGES all contracting parties to the agreement to transmit to the UN Secretary-General formal notification of their acceptance to the extender? agreement before 30th Septembr, 1989;
- 2. APPEALS to all contracting parties part' ularly the consumer countries to come to the augotiating table to secure an effective new agreement over the next 24 months:
- 3. REQUESTS the OAU Secretary-General to communicate this resolution to the Executive Director of the International Coffee Organization for dissemination to all contract; agarties of the International Caffee Agreement.

Recalling its Resolution CM/Res.1153 (XLVIII) on Dumping of Nuclear and Industrial Wastes in Africa and CM/Res.1199 (XLIX) on the Qlobal Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of Hazardous Wastes respectively,

Noting that the Basel Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of Hazardous Wastes and their disposal as well as the Final Acts were adopted by the Conference of Plenipotentiaries at Basel, Switzerland, on 22 March, 1989,

Commending the solidarity of Member States and their high level representation at the Conference in response to the request of the Current Chairman, President Moussa Traore of Mali and its appeal contained in Resolution CM/Res.1199 (XLIX),

Recognizing that, despite the laudable **afforts** deployed by the African Group during the Conference, there are still **some** inadequacies in the Base1 Convention.

Aware of the fact that OAU Member State6 have not signed the Base1

Convention in compliance with the decision of the African Group at the Conference,

Conscious of the grave **consequences** that the dumping of **hazardous** wastes can have on the social and economic development of Africa in the field of environmental preservation,

Recognizing the **need** to draw ψ an African Convention on the Control and Traneboundary Movement ψ Haaardous **Wastes** in the Continent:

- 1. COMMENDS Member States which have promulgated laws prohibiting all form of illegal transboundary movements of hazardous wastes into their countries and CALLS UPON those who have not already done so to enact similar laws;
- 2. REQUESTS the African countries in collaboration with the other members of the African, Carribean and Pacific (ACP) Group of States to continue to urge their EEC partners in the current negotiations for Lome IV Convention, the need for A total prohibition on the export of all illegal transboundary movements of hazardous wasces from the EEC to ACP group of states:
- 3. MANDATES the Secretary General of the CAU to undertake consultatione with the view to adopting a common position on the Basel Convention:
- 4. CHARGES the Secretary General of the CAU to continue the preparation and the holding in Bamako, Mali, of the OAU Pan-African Coordinating Conference on environment and lasting development, as initiated by the out-going Current Chairman. RESOLUTION ON THE REFUGEE SITUATION IN AFRICA

The Council of Ministers of the Organisation of African Unity, meeting in its Fiftieth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 17 to 22 July, 1959,

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General of the Organisation of African Unity on the Activities of the Organisation of African Unity General Secretariat in relation to the refugee situation in Africa as well as the Report on the Activities of the OAU Commission of 15 on Refugees,

Recalling the fact that refugee influxes have continued to occur in various parts of the continent,

Aware of the continuing human suffering in Southern Africa caused by apartheid and destabilisation policies of the racist Pretoria regime and by the activities of its surrogate armed bandits' operation, in particular, in Angola and Mozambique,

Considering the serious nature of the refugee phenomenon in the Horn of Africa and the **Sudan** as well as the ongoing **efforts** undertaken by the countries concerned with a view to achieving the voluntary return of the refugees as a means to ensure stability in the region,

Noting with satisfaction the necessary measures taken by both the General Secretariat and the OAU Commission of 15 on Refugees, especially the fact-finding missions undertaken to twenty nine OAU Member States by the Commission and the Financial assistance extended by the General Secretariat to some of the seriously effected countries,

Noting with deep gratitude the readiness and willingness with which OAU Member States have always received refugees,

Noting with appreciation the humanitarian assistance extended to countries of aaylum by the international community.

Recalling Resolution CM/Res.987 (XLIII) and CM/Res.1022 (XLIII) on the Root Causes of Refugees in Africa,

Mindful of the recent developments regarding the implementation of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978) under which Namibian exiles are currently being repatriated to their country, and the participation, in an Observer capacity of the Organisation of African Unity in the self-determination process of Namibians,

Recalling OAU Council of Ministers Resolution CM/Res.1022 (XLIII) on the OAU Special Refugee Contingency Fundr

- 1. COMMENDS both the Secretary-General of the Organization of African Unity and the OAU Commission of 15 on Refugees and TARES NOTE of the useful reports presented on the situation of Refugees in Africa;
- 2. CONGRATULATES the OAU Commission on Refugees for having successfully carried out fact-finding missions to twenty-nine OAU Member States and for the far-reaching, concrete and action oriented recommendations mader
- it has continued to render to refugees and displaced persons as well as to the countries of asylum and CALLS ON the donor community, in particular, to respond positively and adequately to the serious impact imposed by the presence of large number of refugees

and dissphaeedpersonsnonothetheciocie commic environment, by providing increased and additional resources from mediumere—related development acttiiviitiess in the medium and long-termphases;

- APPLAUDS the United Nations and, in particular, the Office of the United Rations Nigh Commission for Refugees for the efforts made in favour of repatriation of Namibians and the facilities provided in Namibia for the reception of Namibian returnees under the UN Security Council Resolution 435 of 1970;
- 5. APPEALS to Member States concerned to create the necessary conducive atmosphere in order to reduce the incidence of asylum-seeking in Africa and to encourage voluntary repatriation of refugees to their countries of origin, once the conditions that caused their axile have disappeared:
- 6. REQUESTS Member States which are in a position to do so to grant naturalization rights to refugees and also to integrate those refugees who so wish, and who for specific reasons cannot return to their countries of origin;

- 7. REQUESTS the Secretary-General of the **DAU** in collaboration with the Secretary-General of the United Nations and the UN high Commissioner for Refugees to prepare a well documented studyon the root-causes of refugees in Africa for submission to the Fifty-second Ordinary Session of the OAU Council of Ministers;
- a. REQUESTS the Secretary-General of OAU in collaboration with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees to take up the question of resettlement with OAU Member States with few or no refugees at all with a view to securing resettlement and transit facilities for the refugees:
- 9. REQUESTS FURTHER the Steering Committee of the International Conference on the Plight of Refugees, Returnees and Displaced Persons in Southern Africa (SARRED) to monitor and follow closely the implementation of the OSLO Declaration and Plan of Action:

- and the UN **High Commissioner** for Refugees to redouble their *efforts* in reactivating ICARA II process:
- 11, COMMENDS the countries of the Horn of Africa and the Sudan as well as UNNICR for the assistance provided to the refugees and returnees and CALLS ON the international community to further increase its assistance and to actively support the efforts underway to promote voluntary repatriation through the current peace process in the region;
- 12. EXPRESSES ITS DEEP GRATITUDE and APPRECIATION to the countries of asylum which have continued to receive and provide fcod, sanctuary and security to the refugees in the spirit of African brotherhood and solidarity;
- 13. EXPRESSES ITS INDIGNATION at the continuing unwanton acts ofdestabilization and destruction perpetrated by the racist Pretoria regime and its surrogate armed bandits against the Frontline and other neighbouring States;
- 14. CALLS ON the OAU Observer Mission and the UNHCR Offices in Namibia to continue to monitor developments regarding the rehabilitation of the returnees until such time that they can go back to their homes;
- 15. APPROVES the recommendation of the OAU Commission of Fifteen on Resugees to increase the OAU Special Refugee Contingency Fund to 2% of the total OAU regular budget, effective 1990/1991 Fiscal Year.

ANNEX II

Declaration OnNamibia adopted by the Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity at its twenty-fifth ordinary session, held at Addis Ababa from 24 to 26 July 1989

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July, 1989, reviewed the developments in Namibia since the start of the implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 435 on the Independence of Namibia.

- 2. The Assembly recalled the eventapreceding the commencement of the implementation process, including the insistence by the Permanent Members of the Security Council to reduce the size of the military component of UNTAG from the original level of 7,500 contained in Resolution 435 to 4,650. They noted with regret that the reduction of UNTAG force in large measure contributed to the failure of the United Nations to prevent the events prior to and immediately after the 1st April, 1989, which resulted in needless lose of life of Namibians.
- 3. Maving examined the process for the independence of Namibia during the last three months, it has 'become clear that the present size of UNTAG is far from sufficient to guarantee even the minimum conditions of free and fair elections in Namibia.
- 4. The Assembly was particularly disturbed that Pretoria has been permitted to continue its non-compliance with the legally binding provisions of Resolution 435 which, among other things, provided for the disbandment of all ethnic and paramilitary forcer including the destruction of their command structures. As a result the Apartheid regime has openly defined the United Nations byresising the disolution of its Koevoet murder squads

which have been integrated into the South West Africa Police and continue to terrorize Namibians and to intimidate SWAPO supporters in order to impede them from registering as voters. The Assembly stressed that Pretoria's continued policy of intimidation and terrorization has also delayed the repatriation of Namibian refugees.

- 5. The Assembly further recalled that according to Resolution 435 the responsibility to ascertain the "suitability" of the personnel to serve in the South West Africa Police rests with the special representative of the Secretary-General. In this regard, they stressed that Koevoet murdersquads are by training, disposition and proven history patently unsuitable to serve as policemen. It, therefore, urges the special representative of the Secretary-General to demand that Koevoet be dishanded Inmediately and those elements already integrated into the South West Africa Police including their former Commander General Mans Dreyer he removed there from forthwith.
- 6. It noted with concern that in order to justify the integration into the South West Africa Police and deployment of Koevoet the Pretoria regime has continued its spurious allegations of inf litration of SNAPOcombatants. The most recent of ouch allegations by South Africa which was made on 14th July has once again proved to be baseless and unfounded. In view of the prevailing situation, they reject the argument by the Administrator-General that the Koevoet-infested South West Africa Police would be suitable foi providing protection to SWAPO loadership.
- 7. It observed that **South Africa** has so far refused to release **Namibian** political **prisoners** held in its -jails, as provided for in Resolution 435. It expressed **indignation** at *Pretoria's* continued defiance of Security Council. It called upon the Security **Council** to force the Pretoria regime to abide by the provision8 of Pesolution 435.

- 8. The Assembly of Heads of State expressed profound concern at the Anti-SWAPO bias of the South African controlled media in Namibia which has made amockery of the impartiality issue.
- 9. It further noted with concern that the present plane for the conduct of voting appear to contain loopholes which could permit cheating, for example, centralised counting of votes which necessitates rovement of ballot boxes from polling stations, registration of non-Namibians, absence of voters' registers of polling stations, etc... In this connection, it urged the Secretary-General to inform the International Community how his special representative intends to "supervise and control" the electoral process in Namibia in order to ensure that it is free and fair as provided for in Security Council Resolution 435.
- 10. The Assembly of Heads of State and Government renewed its willingness to continue close cooperation with UN Secretary-General throughout the process in implementation of Resolution 435 with the aim of achieving free and fair elections leading to genuine independence of the territory.
- 11. The Assembly expressed satisf action with the solidarity shown by the International Community with the just struggle of the People of Namibia and expresses its profound gratitude to all the Stater which are participating in the United Nations Transitional Assistance Group(UNTAG).
- 12. The Assembly encouraged the UN Secretary-General and UNTAG and urges them to pursue their efforts to ensure the full implementation of Resolution 435.

The Assembly of **Beads** of State and Government, meeting in ite 25th Ordinary Session from 24 to 26 July, 1989 in **Addis Ababa**, Ethiopia,

Recalling the relevant provisions of the Lagos Plan of Action and more particularly its Final Act,

Reaffirming the commitment to the principles and objectives of promoting and strengthening economic cooperation and integration as a launching pad for an endogenous, self-sustaining and self-reliant development of Member States within the framework of the establishment of the African Economic Community,

Convinced of the urgent need for a rational reorganization of the African economic space through
strengthened existing regional economic groupings and
through the coordination and harmonization of projects and
programmes of African inter-governmental organizations
under their own aegis.

Recalling inter alia the relevant provisions of the Declaration adopted during the 25th Anniversary of the Organization,

<u>Cognizant</u> of the steps and practical measures adopted by the Permanent Steering Committee since its 15th Session to accelerate the process of establishing the community (Doc. PSC/RAPT(XV)):

- 1. APPROVES the Conclusions and Recommendations of the 15th Session of the Permanent Steering Committee (Doc. CM/1521 (XLIX - PART I Annex II)) as endorsed by the 49th Session of the Council as regards specially;
 - a) The concept, content and scope of the Community;
 - b) The stages and modalities- for the
 project implementation;
 - c) The institutional machineries;
 - **d)** The practical and transitional measures;
 - e) The indicative calendar for the realization of the project.
- 2. PAYS TRIBUTE to the Out-going Current
 Chairman for his particular attention to
 the issues concerning African economic
 integration and for the efforts deployed
 for launching and giving a dynamic

- the necessary steps, with the technical and financial assistance of the relevant African and international organizations especially the ECA, the ADB and the UNDP to pursue the sensitization and popularization campaign with African Member States on the concept, content, scope and dimensions of the African Economic Community:
- 6. CALLS UPON the OAU, ECA Secretariats and the ADB to coordinate and pool their efforts and resources so as to provide, a joint Secretariat, the required logistic and technical support to the Permanent Steering Committee in the process of establishing the African Economic Community;
- 7. URGES all Member States and existing economic groupings to take an active part in the meetings of the PSC devoted to the consideration of the draft Treaty of the Community;

- 8. EXPRESSES ITS APPRECIATION for the initiatives being undertaken at inter-regional and intra-regional levels by the Current Chairmen of the existing economic groupings to promote cooperation among African IGOs;
- 9. REITERATES ITS APPEAL to all Member States to adopt firm measures to harmonize and rationalize the activities of co-operation organizations in the same region within the overall development strategy of existing economic groupings while keeping in mind the specificity of each IGO and its contribution towards the achievement of the objectives of the Final Act of Lagos;
- 10. DIRECTS the OAU Permanent Steering Committee to study with the technical assistance of the ECA and the ADB the ways and means for promoting and strengthening co-operation between existing economic groupings with focus to inter-regional projects while coordinating and harmonizing their activities and URGES international organizations of the UN System, especially the UNDP, to extend adequate financial and technical assistance to the Economic Groupings in order to strengthen their internal capacities in line with their adopted objectives and defined priorities;
- 11. COMMENDS UNDP for the financial, technical and logistic support the latter continues to provide with a view to promoting and strengthening economic co-operation and integration on the Continent within the framework of the Project On the establishment of the African Economic Community

Having considered the report of the Ninth Meeting

- 1. SOLEMNELY DECLARES the years 1991 2000 a8 the Second Industrial Development Decade for Africa, for the purpose of accelerating further the industrialization of Africa launched during the first Industrial Development Decade for Africa:

Reaffirming its commitment to the African Position on Africa's External Debt Crisis and its conviction of the efficacy of an international conference in tackling Africa's external debt crisis,

Concious of the need for careful preparation for the international conference, as well as the international seminar on the African Common Position scheduled for Cairo, Arab Republic of Egypt from 28 - 30 August, 1989.

Having considered the report of the activities of
the Contact Group submitted by H.E.General Moussa TRAORE,
President of the Republic of Mali and Chairman of the
Twenty-fourth Assembly:

- 1. EXPRESSES PROFOUND APPRECIATION to H.E. General Mouasa TRAORE, President of the Republic of Mali and Chairman of the Twenty-fourth Assembly of his untiring effort in bringing the African Common Position to the attention of the international community with a view to convening an international conference on Africa's external indebtedness:
- 2. TAKES NOTE of the arrangements for the international seminar scheduled for Cairo, Egypt trom 28 30 August, 1989 and URGES all Member States to designate high level experts in banking, finance and monetary fields to participate in the Seminar:
- 3. RENEWS ITS CALL for the convening of an International Conference on Africa's External Indebtedness and, to that end, RENEWS also the mandate to the Current Chairman to deploy all effort towards the organization of the Conference;

RESOLUTION ON THE DECLARATION **OF** AN AFRICAN YEAR OF **THE** ENVIRONMENT

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July, 1989,

 \underline{Aware} of the extreme gravity of problems related to the **environment** of the future of mankind and the survival of our societies.

Gravely concerned about the continuous degradation of the environment throughout the world in general and in Africa in particular, which has resulted in imbalances in the land, forest, coastal and maritime ecosystems, the warming of the earth, climatic changes with dire consequences on the economic activities of world population and the destruction of the ozone layer,

Firmly convinced that to **overcome** the challenge posed by the ecological problems, there is need to pool all scientific, technical and financial resources possible only through international **co-operation**,

Recalling with interest that the Cairo Programme on Co-operation among African Countries in Environmental Matters adopted in December 1985 by the African Ministerial Conference on Environment contains the measures and solutions devised by Africa to solve the problems and challenges facing the Continent,

Further recalling that the aims and objectives of the Cairo Programme which aims at putting an end to the environmental degradation developing the food crop production capacity of the continent achieving energy self-sufficiency and restoring the balance between population and resources, constitutes a global plan which should be further considered to emphasize the major priorities taking into account the financial capabilities of our Member States,

Taking into account the Kampala Declaration on Lasting Development in Africa, adopted on 16 June, 1989, by African Ministers of the Environment, Planning and Education, in which the Ministers pledged that their countries would initiate "reforms and innovations leading to development of policies and methods which would be ecologically sound, economically durable and socially acceptable",

Fully aware that it is primarily incumbent on our countries to provide the financial resources required for the Cairo Programme and other responsibilities, before appealing for external assistance and taking. advantage of the capital of good will of the international community,

Anxious to perpetuate the concept of environment in the economic, social and cultural development process of African nations, and to focus attention on the environment sector in relation to the other national sectors, and to establish links among all the Ministerial Departments, with a view to the environment in a determining position in the decision-making process,

Bearing in mind Resolutions CM/1153(XLVIII) on the dumping of nuclear and industrial wastes in Africa and CM/Res.1199 (XLIX) on the Global Convention on the Control of the Cross Border Movement of Hazardous Wastes:

- 1. DECLARES 1991 the African **Year** of the Environment;
- 2. INVITES *Member* States to adopt the following measures:
 - 1) At the National Level
 - Set up a National Committee to organize the African Environment Year and involve all active sectors of the nation;

11) At the Africa Level

- to create an Advisory Working Party at the OAU comprising experts of various regions of the Continent to:
- a) rationalize and co-ordinate all projects on the protection of the Ervironment included in the Cairo Programme;
- b)assess the environmental risks inherent in the projects programed.
- 3. INVITES the OAU General Secretariat to collaborate in the execution of the proejcta proposed in this connection:
- 4. REQUESTS the OAU Secretary-General to present a report at the next Summit on the implementation of this resolution.

RESOLUTION ON CONFERENCE **OF** AFRICAN MINISTERS OF **EDUCATION**

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session at Addis Ababa. Ethiopia, Prom 24 - 26 July, 1989,

Noting the meeting of the Ministers of Education of Sub-Salaran Africa held at Abuja, Nigeria in July, 1989, atwhich a number of recommendations were adopted on measures to improve the educational systems in Africa,

Recognizing that there are serious problemo affecting the educational systems in Africa, especially the inability to maintain high standards and to make education available to more people, ... the face of increasing demands for education and of dwindling resource8 available to governments to sustain it,

<u>Concerned</u> that these **problems** are posing political, social and economic **difficulti**, for governments in **sub**-Saharan **Africa**,

<u>Convinced</u> that education in science and technology are indispensible for industrialization and rapid economic development in Africa:

1. WELCOMES the recent *tudy conducted by the World Bank on education in sub-Saharan Africa and its attendant problems:

1 . . .

- 2. RECOMMENDS that MemberStates should continue to make their best efforts to increase significantly the level of their investments in education, in order to maintain the high standards of education and improve its spread in their countries;
- 3. CALLS UPON OAU Member States to co-operate more effectively, with one another in collaboration with the relevant organs, organizationa and bodies within the United Nations' System through enhanced exchange, of information and experience, in order to tackle the basic problems affecting education in Africa, including scarcity of resources, and thereby increase the capacity of governments to deli-rer adequately educational services, within the context of goals and objectives established by governments;
- 4. INVITES OAU Member States to increase the level of resources available for the promotion of education in the field of science and technology at all level5 in their countries and in this regard they should participate effectively in the activities of the Third World Network of Scien-tific Organizations, the South Commission, and other organizations with similar objectives and principles:
- 5. DECIDES to establish a Conference of Arrican
 Ministers of Education under the aegies of the
 Organization of African Unity, which should
 meet at Jeast every two years.

RESOLUTION FOR AN ENDURING ALLEVIATION OF AFRICA'S DEBT PROBLEMS

the Assembly of Heads of State and Government meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July, 1989,

Recalling the Lagos Plan of Action and the Final **Act** of **Lagos** adopted by the Assembly of **Heads of** State and Government at **its** Special **Session at** Lagos, Nigeria in 1980,

Noting the African Priority Programme for Economic Recovery (APPER) and the United Nations *Programme* of Action for Africa's Economic Recovery and Development (UNPAAERD),

Recalling also the Assembly of Heads of State and Government meeting at its Special Session on Africa's External Indebtudness in 1987 at which it was decided to convene an International Conference on Africa's External Debt Problems,

Gravely Concerned with Africa's economic situation which continues to worsen in spite of the determined efforts made by Member States to deal with the dismal state of their economies, especially the excruciating debt burden, which has stunted growth and development and engendered political instability in some African countries:

- 1. WELCOMES the various debt initiatives, especially the recent **debt** cancellation offers by President Francioia Mitterand of France and President **George** Rush of the United States;
- 2. RECOGNIZES, however, that much more **debt** relief has to **be** granted to the debt-distressed **countries** in Africa;

- 3. CALLS UPON the international community to urgently evolve a more comprehensive strategy to address all aspects of Africa's debt problems, both official and commercial loans, on an enduring basis;
- 4. URGES creditor countries to write-off the official debt owed from them by African countries, in view of their generalised poverty and the attendant economic structures that are fragile and obsolete together with the low per capita incomes which now make them qualify as low-income or debt-distressed countries;

5. RECOMMENDS THAT:

- (a) the World **Rank** should make at least SO per cent of the resources **undr** IDA-Ninth Replenishment available to African countries to relieve their debt burden; and
- (b) the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Dank should make resources available under the SAF, ESAP and the sub-Saharan African Facility to countries with overdue debt service obligations to the two institutions, so that repurchases can be undertaken by the affected countries with the advantage of enjoying the relief inherent in those facilities;
- 6. URGES the developed countries to establish a Special AID Consultative Group under the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa, with the active support of the World Bank, IMF and the African Development Bank (ADB);

7. URGES FURTHER the donor and creditor countries to provide financial assistance under the Special Aid Consultative Group to distressed African countries, and that the proceeds of the financial assistance • hould be used to effect debt service obligation8 to those institutions where debt cannot be rescheduled or written off;

8. RECOMMENDS also:

- (a) the establishment of an international debt purchasing institution or agency, under the aegis of the IMF and the World Bank to purchase the exirting commercial bank debt of African countries at substantial discounto reflooting market rates, while the discounts so realised rhould be passed on to the obligors; rnd
- (b) that the transactions should be financed partly with voluntary contributions from the developed countries and with uncommitted resources under the specialised facilities of the World Bank and the IMF, with low or no conditionality attachment;
- 9. URGES also the creditor countries, in the meantime, to take urgent necessary action to moderate interest rates, 80 a8 to prevent a further build-up in Africa's debt stock;
- 10. INVITES Af ricar countries which are not already doing so to embark on appropriate comprehensive structural reform and to atrengthen their macroeconomic management, in order to reverse capital flight, stimulate sustained growth and enhance tal: nce-of-payments viability.

RESOLUTION ON ANGOLA

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July, 1989,

Taking cognizance of the initiatives of the Frontline States, and other African Heads of State to bring about national reconciliation, peace and harmony in the People's Republic of Angola, and the Peace Plan for Angola,

<u>Welcoming</u> the unanimous **decision** of the Central **Committee** of the MPLA Labour **Party to** endorse the **Peace Plan**,

Further welcoming the **proclamation** of a **cease-fire** in the People's Republic **of** Angola,

Having heard the report of the Current Chairman of the Summit of African Heads of State held in Qbadolite, Zaire on 22 June, 1909,

Further noting the statement of the President of the People's Republic of Angola on the Peace Plan for national reconciliation in Angola,

Taking note of the Gbadolite Declaration on Angola which aims at national reconciliation in the People's Republic of Angola,

Taking note of the Report on the mission of the 1989 Ministerial Delegation to Washington D.C., and,

Taking further note of the position of the Bush Administration to continue to provide military and financial assistance to UNITA:

1. EXPRESSES IT8 APPRECIATION to all those involved *in* the initiative for peace in the **People's** Republic of Angola, particularly to the Outgoing

Chairman, President Moussa Traorr of Mali, to the Presidents of the Frontline States, and among others the Presidents of the Republics of Zaire, Burundi, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Cape Verde, Chad, Congo, Cote d'Ivoire, Gabon, Guinea Bissau, Nigeria, Rwanda, the Republic of Sao Tome and Principe, and His Majesty the King of Morocco,

- a. FURTHER EXPRESSES ITS DEEP APPRECIATION to President

 Jose Eduardo Dos Santos, the Central Committee of the MPLA-Labour Party
 and the People of Angola, for their commitment to national
 reconciliation, to peace and brotherhood in Angola;
- 3. WELCOMES the Ghadolite Declaration on Angola, and the Proclamation of a ceasefire in the People's Republic of Angola)
- 4. TAKES **NOTE** of the **Report** on the mission of the 1989 **Ministerial** Delegation to Washington **D.C.**;
- 5. CALLS UPON the Administration of President George Bush to discontinue all military and financial assistance to UNITA:
- 6. FURTHER CALLS UPON the members of the congress of the United States to oppose any and all assistance to UNITA and to support the efforts of Africa to bring peace and national reconciliation in the People's Republic of Angola;
- 7. ENDORSES the Plan for Peace and Reconciliation in the People's Republic 0 f Angola;
- **8.** CALLS UPON **the** International Community to support the initiatives **for national** reconciliation *in* the People's Republic **of** Angola,

RESOLUTION ON EXTERNAL RESOURCE FLOWS

The Assembly of the Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July 1989,

Recalling the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development 1985-1990 adopted by the UN General Assembly in June 1986 which, inter-alia, called upon the international community to make every effort to provide sufficient resources to support and supplement the African development effort,

<u>Concerned</u> that the flow of concessional resources to the Continent has not been commensurate with the requirements to fully support the efforts being made by African countries to implement policy reforms and structural adjustment programmes,

<u>Appreciative</u> of the contributions so far made by the international community towards resources mobilization for economic recovery and transformation,

Recognising the vital role which these resources are playing in Africa's socio-economic recovery and development and that the international community is fully aware of the need for providing increased concessional resources to support the economic and social development of the African countries:

1. APPEALS to **the** international donor community to:

- (a) increase sunstantially the sixth replenishment of the African Development Fund over the level of the fifth replenishment and to increase the grant portion of finance for technical assistance;
- (b) increase substantially the ninth replenishment of the International Development Association (IDA) over the level of the eighth;
- (c) extend the Multi-Donor Special Programme for Africa beyond 1990; and
- (d) recognize the need to create additional and separate facilities to provide concessional financial support to the African middle-income non-IDA-eligible countries, whose needs the present international arrangements are unable to provide on appropriate terms;
- 2. APPRECIATES ***he** continuing efforts made by the **Management** of the African Development Bank to find lasting solutions to the external debt problem;
- 3. REQUESTS the Managements of the African Development Bank and of the International Financial Institutions to intensify their efforts in mobilizing concessional resources from the developed countries to support the economic and social recovery and development of Africa.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE AFRICAN COMMISSION ON HUMAN AND PEOPLES' RIGHTS

The Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity, meeting in its Twenty-fifth Ordinary Session in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, from 24 to 26 July, 1989,

<u>Considering</u> that the promotion and protection of Human and Peoples' Rights are essential ingredients for the advancement of African citizens and peoples and constitute a significant contribution to the **realization** of their development aspirations,

Expressing satisfaction with the inauguration of the Headquarters and the Permanent Secretariat of the Commission in Banjul, Republic of the Gambia, on 12 June, 1989,

Noting the request of the Commission for appropriations for its promotional activities, increase in the emoluments for the Members of the Commission and the recruitment of staff to enable the Commission effectively carry out its assigned task,

<u>Resolved</u> to provide the Commission with the resources necessary for its effective functioning with the view to attaining its assigned objectives:

- 1. ADOPTS the report on the activities of the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights for the period 1988 1989 and authorises that it be published;
- 2. EXPRESSES ITS GRATITUDE to the Republic of The Gambia for the material and other facilities offered the Secretariat of the Commission to enable it become operational:
- 3. COMMENDS the Chairman and Members of the Commission for the excellent work **accomplished** and URGES them to continue in the same manner:
- 4. FURTHER URGES Member States who have not yet done so to ratify the African Charter on Human and Peoples' rights;
- 5. REQUESTS the Secretary-General, in collaboration with the Advisory Committee on Administrative, Budgetary and Financial Matters to find, prior to the next financial year, appropriate solutions to the budgetary, financial and personnel problems raised by the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights.
