On inatructiona from my Government, I have the honour to transmit to vou herewith a copy of the letter dated 6 August 1991 (communication No. 201-DSS) from the Minister for Foreign Affair8 of Honduras, Dr. Mario Carias Zapata, addressed to Brigadier-General Victor Suanses Pardo, Chief Military Obsorvor of the United Nations Observer Group in Contral America (ONUCA), urgently requesting the • atabliahment of observation posts along the border between Honduras and Nicaragua (see anger).

Letter dated 6 August 1991 from the Minister for Foreign Affairs o f Honduras addressed to the Chief Military Observer of the United Nations Observer Group in

Central-

I have the honour to write in connection with the armed incidents that have occurred recently in Nicaraguan territory in which personnel of the Sandinist Army have clashed with elements opposed to the Government of that country.

In this connection, I should like to express our concern at the fact that, according to the information which we have received, some of these clashes have occurred in close proximity to the border with Honduras.

In the light of the foregoing, my Government requests ONUCA to act urgently, as is required by the situation, to take all measures which it deems necessary specifically to forestall the possibility of Honduran national territory being used by conflicting forces in contravention of the Esquipulaa II Agreement, the wishes of the Government of Honduras and the norms of international law.

The Government of Honduras therefore suggests that, in accordance with its mandate, ONUCA should proceed to establish as many observation posts along the common border as are needed tor

- 1. Prevent the entry of elements coming from Nicaragua which are seeking to destabilize that country's Government;
- 2. Preventing Honduran national territory from being used in any way by such groups.

Trusting that ONUCA will accede to this request, I take this opportunity to convey to you the renewed assurances of my highest consideration.
