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ORGANIZATION OF THE FORTY-SIXTH REGULAR SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND ALLOCATION OF ITEMS

First report of the General Committee

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1. INTHODUCTION

- 1. At its lst meeting, on 18 September 1991, the General Committae considered a memorandum by the Secretary-Qeneral relating to the organisation of the forty-sixth regular session of the Qeneral Assembly, the adoption of the agenda and the allocation of items (A/BUR/46/1 and Add.1). A summary of the discussion will appear in the summary record of the meeting (A/BUR/46/SR.1).
- 2. At the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral in paragraph 3 of his memorandum (A/BUR/46/1), the Qeneral Committee draws the attention of the General Assembly to the provisions reproduced in annexes V, VI, VII and VIII of its rules of procedure.

II. ORQANIZATION OF THE SESSION

A. General Committee

3. The Qeneral Committee took note of the Qeneral Assembly decisions relevant to 1ts work which were brought to the Committee's attention by the Secretary-Qeneral in paragraph 4 of his memorandum (ibid).

B. Rationalization of work

- 4. The Qeneral Committee took note (ibid., paras. 5 and 6) of the measures undertaken by the Secretary-Qeneral in pursuance of the goal of renewal and reform, in particular to reaommendatione 2, 3 and 7 of the Qroup of High-level Intergovernmental Experts to Review the Efficiency of the Administrative and Financial Functioning of the United Nations 1/as reflected in his progress reports on the implementation of Qeneral Assembly resolution 41/213 (A/42/234, A/43/286, A/44/222) as well as a supplementary report submitted to the forty-fifth session of the Assembly (A/45/226). The Committee also took note of Assembly resolution 45/254 of 21 December 1990 on the review of the efficiency of the administrative and financial functioning of the United Nations and resolution 45/264 of 13 May 1991 on the restructuring and revitalisation of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields.
- 5. At the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (A/BUR/46/1,para.7), the Qeneral Committee draws the Qeneral Assembly's attention to paragraph 5 of the annex to resolution 45/45(A/520/Rev.15 and Amend.1, annex VIII) which reads as follows:

"5. The Qeneral Committee should consider, at the beginning of each session of the Qeneral Assembly, recommending that certain Main Committee8 should meet in sequential order, taking into account such matters as the number of meetings required for the consideration of the questions with which they are charged at that session, the organization of the work of the whole session and the problem of participation of smaller delegations."

In this aonneation, the Committee reaommende to the Assembly that, as at recent sessions, the holding of aonaurrent meetings of the Special Political Committee and the Fourth Committee should be avoided, to the extent possible and with the neaeeaary flexibility, during the forty-sixth session.

6. Furthermore, the Qeneral Committee draws the attention of the Qeneral Assembly to the faat that measures introduced to reduce costs relating to overtime continue to be in effect. As a result of these curtailments, the Secretariat will not be able to provide all the services rendered prior to 1986.

C. Closing date of the session

7. In accordance with the provisions of rule 2 of the rules of procedure, the Qeneral Committee recommends to the Qeneral Assembly that the forty-sixth session should recess on Monday, 17 December 1991 and close on Monday, 14 September 1.992,

D. Schedule of meetings

- 8. At the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (A/BUR/46/1, para.10), the Qeneral Connittee recommends to the Qeneral Assembly that morring meetings should start at 10 a.m. promptly for all plenary meetings and meetings of the Main Committee during the forty-sixth session.
- 9. Also at the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (ibid., para.11), the Qeneral Committee recommends that, in order to avoid the late start of meetings, the Qeneral Assembly ehould waive the regufrement of the presence of at least one third of the members to declare a plenary meeting open and permit the debate to proceed and one quarter of the members to declare a meeting of the Main Committee open and permit the debate to proceed. This recommendation would be made on the understanding that such a waiver would not imply any permanent change in the provisions of rules 67 and 108 of the rules of procedure. Furthermore, such a waiver would not affect the provision of the rules concerning the requirement of the presence of a majority of the members for any decision to be taken.
- 10. In this connection, the Qeneral Committee also recommends to the Qeneral Assembly that delegations should be reminded of the utmost importance of punctuality in the interest of ensuring an effective and orderly organisation of work and achieving economies for the United Nations.

E. General debate

- 11. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., paras. 13 and 14), the General Committee recommends that:
- (a) The general debate should begin on Monday, 23 September and end by Thursday, 10 October 1991;
- (b) The list of speakers in the general debate should be closed on Wednesday, 25 September, at 6 p.m.
- 12. On the proposal of the Secretary-General (ibid., pare. 15), the general Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to the decision taken by the Assembly at previous sessions, namely that the practice of expressing congratulations inside the general Aeaembly Hell itself after a speech had been delivered was prohibited. The general Committee decided to recommend to the Assembly that the provision should also apply at the forty-sixth session. In this connection, the General Committee recommends to the Assembly that speakers in the general debate, after delivering their statements, should leave the Assembly Hall through room GA-200 located behind the podium before returning to thair seats.

F. Explanations of vote, right of reply and length ofstatements

- 13. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., pare, 16), the General Committee draws the attention of the general Assembly to paragraphs 6, 7 and 8 of its decision 34/401 (A/520/Rev.15, annex VI), which read as follows:
 - "6. Explanations of vote should be limited to ten minutes.
 - "7. When the same draft reaclution is considered in a Main Committee and in plenary meeting, a delegation should, as far as poeaible, explain its vote only once, i.e., either in the Committee or in plenary meeting, unless that delegation's vote in plenary meeting is different from its vote in the Committee.
 - "8. Delegations should exercise their right of reply at the end of the day whenever two meetings have been scheduled for that day and whenever euch meetings are devoted to the consideration of the same item."
- 14. Furthermore, in connection with the length of statements, with a view to streamlining the procedure8 of the General Assembly and as a cost-saving measure, the general Committee draws the attention of the Assembly, as it did at recent sessions, to rules 72 and 114 of the rules of procedure and paragraph 22 of annex VI thereto for appropriate aation in plenary meeting and the Main Committees.

G. Records of meetings

- 15. As at past sessions (A/BUR/45/1, para.18), verbatim records will continue to be provided during the forty-sixth session for the plenary meetings of the Assembly and meetings of the First Committee and summary records will be provided to the Qeneral Committee, the Credentials Committee and the other Main Committees of the Assembly. In accordance with the recommendation of the Special Committee on the Rationalisation of the Prooedures and Organization of the Qeneral Assembly (A/520/Rev.15, annex V, para. 108 (b)), the Qeneral Committee recommends that the Assembly should maintain for the forty-sixth session the practice whereby the Special Political Committee may obtain, on specific request, transcriptions of the debates of some of its meetings, or portions thereof. These transcriptions, which would not be part of the official records of the Committee, would be provided as the required services became available. Furthermore, the Qeneral Committee wishes to draw the Assembly's attention to paragraphs 8 and 9 of its resolution 38/32 E of 25 November 1983, which read as follows:
 - "8. <u>Decides</u> that the practice of reproducing statements <u>in extenso</u> as separate documents shall be discontinued for all its subsidiary organs that are entitled to summary records;
 - "9. Decides further that any enceptions to this rule may be made by the body concerned only if the statements are to serve as bases for discussion and if, after hearing a statement of the relevant financial implications, the body decides that one or more statements in extenso may be included in the summary record, or reproduced as separate documents or as annexes to authorized documents;"

In this aonneotion, the Qeneral Committee also recommends to the Qeneral Assembly that the practice not to reproduce in extense statements made in a Main Committee should be maintained for the forty-sixth session.

H. Concluding statements

- 16, At the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (A/BUR/46/1, para.20), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paragraph 17 of its decision 34/401, which reads as follows:
 - "17. To save time at the end of the session, the practice of making aonaluding statements in the Qeneral Assembly and its Main Committees should be dispensed with except for statements by the presiding officers."

I. Questions related to the programme budget

17. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., paras. 21 and 22), who referred to rule 153 of the rules of procedure, the Qeneral Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paregraphs 12 and 13 of its decision 34/401, which read as follows:

"12. It is imperative that Main Committees should allow sufficient time for the preparation of the estimate of expenditures by the Secretariat and for its consideration by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and the Fifth Committee and that they should take this requirement into account when they adopt their programme of work.

"13. Furthermore:

- "(a) A mandatory deadline, not later than 1 December, should be established for the submission to the Fifth Committee of all draft resolutions with financial implications;
- "(b) The Fifth Committee should, as a general practice, consider accepting without debate the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions on the financial implications of draft resolutions up to a prescribed limit, namely, \$25,000 on any one item;
- "(c) Firm deadlines should be set for the early submission of the reports of subsidiary organs which require consideration by the Fifth Committee;
- "(d) A minimum period of forty-eight hours should be allowed between the submission and the voting of a proposal involving expenditure in order to allow the Secretary-General to prepare and present the related Ltatement of administrative and financial implications."

The General Committee also draws the attention of the Assembly to paragraph 6 of its resolution 35/10 A of 3 November 1980, which reads as follows;

- "6. Decides that all proposals affecting the schedule of conferences and meetings made at sessions of the General Assembly shall be reviewed by the Committee on Conferences when administrative implications are being considered under the requirements of rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the Assembly.@*
- 18. Also at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para.21), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to regulation 4.9 of the Regulations Governing Programme Planning, the Programme Aspects of the Budget, the Monitoring of Implementation and the Methods of Evaluation (resolution 37/234, annex), which reads as followse
 - "Regulation 4.9. No Council, Commission or other competent body shall take a decision involving either a change in the programme budget approved by the General Assembly or the possible requirement of expenditure unless it has received and taken account of a report from the Secretary-General on the programme budget implications of the proposal."

J. Documentation

- 19. On the proposal of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/46/1, pare. 23), the General Committee draws the Qeneral Assembly's attention to paragraph 28 of its decision 341401, which reads as follows:
 - "28. The Qeneral Assembly, including its Main Committees, ehould merely take note of those reports of the Secretary-Qeneral or subsidiary organs which do not require a decision by the Assembly and should neither debate nor adopt resolutions on them, unless apeoifically requested to do so by the Secretary-General or the organ concerned."
- 20. Furthermore, the Qeneral Committee took note of the proposal by the Secretary-Qeaeral that the Committee should examine further the question of how to respond to the increasing volume of documentation (ibid., para. 24).

K. Resolutions

- 21. At the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (ibid., para.25), the Qeneral Committee draws the Qeneral Assembly's attention to paragraph 32 of its decision 34/401, which reads as follows:
 - "32. Whenever possib? 6, resolutions requesting the discussion of a question at a subsequent session should not call for the inclusion of a separate new item and such discussion should be held under the item under which the resolution was adopted."
- 22. Furthermore, at the suggestion of the Secretary-Qeneral (ibid., paras. 26 and 27), the Qeneral Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to recommendation 3 (f) of the Qroup of High-level Intergovernmental Experts, which reads as follows:
 - "(f) Efforts should be made to reduce the number of resolutions adopted by the Qeneral Assembly. Resolutions should request reports of the Secretary-Qeneral only in cases where that would be indispensable for facilitating the implementation of these resolutions or the continued examination of the question.**

The Committee also draws the attention of the Qeneral Assembly to paragraphs 1 and 10 of the annex to resolution 45/45 (A/520/Rev.15 and Amend.1, annex VIII).

L. Special conferences

- 23. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/46/1, para.28), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to recommendation 6 of the Committee on Conferences, 2/ adopted by the Assembly in paragraph (b) of its decision 34/405, which reads as follows:
 - "(L) The Committee, taking into account difficulties encountered in ensuring adequate preparation of meetings, including timely distribution of documentation, as well as the ability of Member States to participate fully, recommends—that the General Assembly should instruct the Main Committees to review the number of special conferences of the United Nations already proposed and scheduled in their respective fields of activity prior to deciding upon the scheduling of new and additional special conferences, thus bearing in mind the relevant portions of General Assembly resolution 33/55."

The General Committee also draws the Assembly's attention to recommendation 2 (d) of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts, which reads as follows:

"Until 1978, a number of resolutions had requested that only one major conference be scheduled annually. The decision of the General Assembly that no more than five speafal conferences should take place in a given year and that no more than one special conference should be convened at the same time should be strictly implemented.*

24. Furthermore, at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para.29), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to the relevant provisions of recommendation 4 of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts which reads as follows:

"The existing principle that United Nations bodies should meet at their respective established headquarters, as provided for in General Assembly resolution 40/243 of 18 December 1985, should be strictly enforced. Whenever the Assembly accepts an invitation from the Government of a Member State to hold a conference or meeting away from established headquarters, the additional cost should be borne in full by that Government. The methods of budgeting these costs should be improved so as to ensure that all additional costs are accounted for."

M. Meetings of subsidiary organs

25. The General Committee, in the light of recommendations submitted by the Committee on Conferences (A/46/374/Add.1 and Add.1/Corr.1 and Add.2), recommends to the General Assembly that the following subsidiary organs should be authorised to meet during the forty-sixth session:

- 29. With regard to <u>item 76</u> of the draft agenda (Question of the Mal agasy islands of Glorieuses, Juan de Nova, Europa and Bassas da India), the General Committee decided to recommend that the consideration of the item should be deferred to the forty-seventh session and that the item should be included in the provisional agenda of that session.

- 30. In connection with item 105 of the draft agenda (Question of East Timor), the General Committee decided to recommend that the consideration of the item should be deferred to the Forty-seventh session and that the item should be inaluded in the provisional agenda of that session,

The General Committee also draws the attention of the Assembly to the relevant paragraphs of resolution 39/88B and resolution 45/45(A/520/Rev.15 and Amend.1, annexes VII and VIII), Paragraph 5 of the annex to resolution 39/88 8 reads as follows:

"5. The Chairmen of the Main Committees should take the initiative, in the light of past experience, to propose the grouping of similar or related items and the holding of a single general debate on them."

Paragraph 6 of the annex to resolution 45/45 reads as follows:

- "6. In making recommendations as to how agenda items should be allocated to the Main Committees and the plenary of the general Assembly, the General Committee should ensure the best use of the expertise of the Committees."
- 33. Taking into aaoount the recommendations in section III above regarding the inclusion of items in the agenda, the General Committee approved the allocation of items contained in paragraph 45 of the Secretary-General's memorandum (A/BUR/46/1 and Add.1) with the fc.lowing modifications:
