PREVENTION OF AN ARMS RACE IN OUTER SPACE

## Report of the First Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. Pablo Emilio SADER (Uruguay)

#### T. TNTRODUCTION

- 1. The item entitled "Prevention of an arms race in outer space" was included in the provisional agenda of the forty-sixth session of the General Assembly in accordance with Assembly resolution 45/55 A of 4 December 1991.
- 2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 20 September 1991, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include the item in its agenda and to allocate it to the First Committee.
- 3. At its 2nd meeting, on 10 October 1991, the First Committee decided to hold a general debate on the disarmament items allocated to it, namely, items 47 to 65. The deliberations on those items took place between the 3rd and 24th meetings, from 14 to 30 October (see A/C.1/46/PV.3-24).Consideration of and action on draft resolutions on those items took place retween the 25th and 37th meetings, from 4 to 15 November (see A/C.1/46/PV.25-37).
- **4. In connection** with item 57, the First Committee had before it the following **document:**

  - II. CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTION A/C.1/46/L.25
- 5. On 1 November 1991, Argentina, Brazil, China, Egypt, Ethiopia, Indonesia, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Ireland, Jordan, Mexico, Myanmar, Nigeria, Peru, Sri Lanka, Sweden, Venezuela, Viet Nam and Yugoslavia submitted a draft resolution entitled "Prevention of an arms race in outar space" (A/C.1/46/L.25), which was later also sponsored by Afghanistan, Algeria, Bolivia, Costa Rica, India, the Lao People's Demogratic Republic and Ukraine. The draft resolution was introduced by the representative of Egypt at the 31st meeting, on 7 November.
- 6. At its 34th meeting, on 12 November, the Committee voted on draft resolution A/C.1/46/L.25 as follows: 2/
- (a) Operative paragraph 9 was adopted by a recorded vote of 107 to 1, with 26 abstentions. The voting was as follows:

(b) Draft resolution A/C.1/46/L.25, as a whole, was adopted by a recorded vote of 135 to none, with 1 abstention (see para. 7). The voting was as follows:

### III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

7. The First Committee recommends to the Gental Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

## Prevention of an arms race in outer space

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the commor interest of all mankind in the exploration and use of outer space for peaceful purposes,

Reaffirming the will of all States that the exploration and use of outer space, including the Moon and other celestial bodies, shall be for peaceful purposes, shall be carried out for the benefit and in the interest of all countries, irrespective of their degree of economic or scientific development, and shall be the province of all mankind,

Reaffirming also provisions of articles III and IV of the Treaty on Principles Governing the Activities of States in the Exploration and Use of Outer Spaae, including the Moon and Other Celestial Bodies, 3/

Recalling the obligation of all States to observe the provisions of the Charter of the United Nations regarding the use or threat of use of force in their international relations, including in their space activities,

Reaffirming further paragraph 80 of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, 4/in which it is stated that in order to prevent an arms race in outer space further measures should be taken and appropriate international negotiations held in accordance with the spirit of the Treaty,

Recalling its previous resolutions on this issue and the Declaration adopted by the Ninth Conference of Heads of State or Government of Non-Aligned Countries, held at Bolgrade from 4 to 7 September 1989, 5/ and taking note of the proposals submitted to the General Assembly at its tenth special session and at its regular sessions, and of the recommendations made to the competent organs of the United Nations and to the Conference on Disarmament,

Recognizing the grave danger for international peace and security of an arms race in outer space and of developments contributing to it,

Emphasizing the paramount importance of strict compliance with existing arms limitation and disarmament agreements relevant to outer space, including bilateral agreements, and with the existing legal regime concerning the use of outer apace,

Considering also that wide participation in the legal regime applicable to outer space could contribute to enhancing itseffectiveness,

Noting that bilateral negotiations between the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and the United States of America have continued since 1965 with the 'declared objective of working out effective agreements aimed, inter alia, at preventing an arms race in outer space,

Welcoming the re-establiehmeat of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Prevention of an Arms Raae in Outer Space at the 1991 session of the Conference on Disarmament, in the exercise of the negotiating responsibilities of this sole negotiating body on disarmament, to continue to examine and identify, through substantive and general consideration, issues relevant to the prevention of an arms race in outer apace,

Noting also that the Ad Hoc Committee on the Prevention of an Arms Race in Outer Space, taking into account its previous efforts since its establishment in 1985 and seeking to enhance its functioning in qualitative terms, continued the examination and identification of various issues, existing agreements and existing proposals, as well as future initiatives relevant to the prevention of an arms race in outer space, 6/ and that this contributed to a better understanding of a number of problems and to a clearer perception of the various positions,

Emphasizing the mutually complementary nature of bilateral and multilateral efforts in the field of preventing an arme race in outer space, and hoping that concrete results will emerge from these efforts as soon as possible,

Convinced that further measures should be examined in the search for effective and verifiable bilateral and multilateral agreements in order to prevent an arms race in outer space,

Recalling in this context its resolution 45/55B of 4 December 1990 which, interalia, reaffirmed the importance of confidence-building measures as means conducive to ensuring the attainment of the objective of the prevention of an arms race in outer space,

1. Reaffirms the importance and urgency of preventing an arms race in outer space and the readiness of all States to contribute to that common objective, in conformity with the provisions of the Treaty on Principles, Governing the Activities of State6 in the Exploration and Use of Outer Space, including the Moon and Other Celestial Bodies,

- 2. Reaffirms its recognition, as stated in the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Prevention of an Arms Race in Outer Space, that the legal regime applicable to outer space by itself does not guarantee the prevention of an arms race in outer space, that this legal regime plays a significant role in the prevention of an arms race in that environment, the need to consolidate and reinforce that regime and enhance its effectiveness, and the importance of the strict compliance with existing agreements, both bilateral and multilateral; 2/
- 3. Emphasizes the necessity of further measures with appropriate and effective provision8 for verification to prevent an arms race in outer spacer
- 4. Calls upon all States, in particular those with major space capabilities, to aontribute actively to the objective of the peaceful use of outer space and of the prevention of an arms race in outer apace and to refrain from actions contrary to that objective and to the relevant existing treaties in the interest of maintaining international peace and security and promoting international cooperation;
- 5. Reiterates that the Conference on Disarmament, as the single multilateral disarmament negotiating forum, has the primary role in the negotiation of a multilateral agreement or agreements, as appropriate, on the prevention of an arms rate in outer space in all its aspects;
- 6. Requests the Conference on Disarmament to consider as a matter of priority the question of preventing an arms race in outer space;
- 7. Also requests the Conference on Disarmament to intensify its consideration of the question of the prevention of an arms race in outer space in all its aspects, building upon areas of annivergence and taking into account relevant proposals and initiatives, including those presented in the Ad Boo Committee at the 1991 session of the Conference and at the forty-sixth session of the General Assembly;
- 8. Recognizes, in this regard, the relevance of considering measures on confidence-building and greater transparency and openness in space an stated in the report of the Ad Hoc Committee;
- 9. <u>Further requests</u> the Conference on Disarmament to re-establish an ad hoc committee with an adeguats mandate at the beginning of its 1992 session and to continue building upon areas of convergence with a view to undertaking negotiations for the conclusion of an agreement or agreements, as appropriate, to prevent an arms race in outer space in all its aspects;
- 10. Urges the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic8 and the United States of America to pursue intensively their bilateral negotiationa in a

constructive spirit with a view to reaching early agreement for preventing an arms race in outer space, and to advise the Conference on Diearmament periodically of the progress of their bilateral session so as to facilitate its work;

11. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-seventh session the item entitled "Prevention of an arms race in outer space".
