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### Chapter I

## MATTERS CALLING FOR ACTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OR BROUGHT TO ITS ATTENTION

1. In 1992, the Council adopted resolutions and decisions that call for action by the General Assembly. The relevant paragraphs of those resolutions and decisions are summarized below.

## ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONAL MATTERS

## Letter dated 17 July 1992 from the Director-General of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization to the Secretary-General 1/

By decision 1992/267, the Council took note of the letter dated 17 July 1992 from the Director-General of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), to which was annexed UNESCO General Conference resolution 5.6, and decided to transmit it to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session for consideration.

#### OPERATIONAL ACTIVITIES FOR DEVELOPMENT

## Activities of the United Nations system in the Baltic States and the Commonwealth of Independent States 2/

By resolution 1992/40, the Council invited the Secretary-General to prepare a report on ways of ensuring an integrated United Nations system approach to and presence in the Baltic States and the Commonwealth of Independent States and on the steps already taken to do so, which would be annexed to the report for the triennial comprehensive policy review of operational activities of the United Nations system at the forty-seventh session of the General Assembly.

#### COORDINATION QUESTIONS

#### Assistance to the Palestinian people 3/

By resolution 1992/58, the Council recommended to the General Assembly the adoption of the draft resolution reproduced therein.

## Second Industrial Development Decade for Africa, 1991-2000 4/

By resolution 1992/44, the Council, after having recalled General Assembly resolution 44/237 of 22 December 1989 and Assembly decision 46/458 of 20 December 1991, recommended that the Assembly adopt the programme for the Second Decade at its forty-seventh session, also recommended that the Assembly adjust the period for the programme for the Second Decade, established in its resolution 44/237, to cover the years 1993-2002, recommended that the Assembly urge African countries, financial institutions and the specialized agencies of the United Nations system to adopt an integrated approach to the implemenation of the programme, taking full account of the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s, recommended that the Assembly urge the Director-General of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization, the Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa, the institutions and agencies of the United Nations system, the African States and subregional and regional organizations to integrate the relevant provisions of Agenda 21, adopted by the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, in the implementation of the Second Decade, and reiterated its recommendation that the Assembly provide the Economic Commission for Africa with adequate resources to enable it to assist African countries and organizations effectively in the implementation of the programme for the Second Decade.

DEVELOPMENT AND INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC COOPERATION

#### Combating aridity, soil erosion, salinity, waterlogging, desertification and the effects of drought in South Asia 5/

By resolution 1992/55, the Council, after having recalled its resolution 1991/97 of 26 July 1991, urged the Secretary-General, in full compliance with resolution 1991/97, to submit the study undertaken to assess the extent of the problem and its effects on the peoples of the region to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session.

PERMANENT SOVEREIGNTY OVER NATIONAL RESOURCES IN THE OCCUPIED PALESTINIAN AND OTHER ARAB TERRITORIES

## Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli settlements on the Palestinian people in the Palestinian territory, including Jerusalem, occupied since 1967, and on the Arab population of the Syrian Golan <u>6</u>/

By resolution 1992/57, the Council, after having recalled General Assembly resolution 46/199 of 20 December 1991 and having expressed its concern at the establishment by Israel, the occupying Power, of settlements in

the occupied Palestinian territory and other Arab territories occupied since 1967, including the settlements of new immigrants therein, requested the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its forty-eighth session, through the Economic and Social Council, a report on the progress made in the implementation of the resolution.

STRENGTHENING OF INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION AND COORDINATION OF EFFORTS TO STUDY, MITIGATE AND MINIMIZE THE CONSEQUENCES OF THE CHERNOBYL DISASTER

## International cooperation and coordination of efforts to address and mitigate the consequences of the disaster at the Chernobyl nuclear power plant 7/

By resolution 1992/38, the Council, after having reaffirmed its resolutions 1990/50 of 13 July 1990 and 1991/51 of 26 July 1991 and having recalled General Assembly resolutions 45/190 of 21 December 1990 and 46/150 of 18 December 1991, took note of the practical measures that had been taken by the Secretary-General to coordinate the activities of the organs, organizations and programmes of the United Nations system, as well as other measures to implement Assembly resolutions 45/190 and 46/150, and requested the Secretary-General and the United Nations Coordinator of International Cooperation for Chernobyl to report to the Assembly at its forty-seventh session on the implementation of Assembly resolutions 45/190 and 46/150.

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAMME OF ACTION FOR THE SECOND DECADE TO COMBAT RACISM AND RACIAL DISCRIMINATION

#### Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Second Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination 8/

By resolution 1992/13, the Council, after having recalled its resolution 1991/2 of 29 May 1991 and the proclamation by the General Assembly, in its resolution 38/14 of 22 November 1983, of the Second Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, reaffirmed the importance of achieving the objectives of the Second Decade, recommended that, in 1993, the Assembly proclaim a third decade to combat racism and racial discrimination and requested the Secretary-General to prepare a draft programme of action for the third decade and to submit it to the Assembly at its forty-seventh session, taking into account, <u>inter alia</u>, the elements of the Programme of Action for the Second Decade that had not yet been completed.

## Rights of persons belonging to national, ethnic, religious and linguistic minorities 9/

By resolution 1992/4, the Council, after having recalled Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/16 of 21 February 1992, in which the Commission approved the text of the draft declaration on the rights of persons belonging to national or ethnic, religious and linguistic minorities (E/CN.4/1992/48 and Corr.1, annex I), approved the draft declaration and recommended it to the General Assembly for adoption and further action.

## <u>Declaration on the protection of all persons</u> <u>from enforced disappearance</u> <u>10</u>/

By resolution 1992/5, the Council decided to submit the report of the Working Group on the Declaration on the Protection of All Persons from Enforced Disappearance of the Commission on Human Rights (E/CN.4/1992/19/Rev.1) and the draft declaration to the General Assembly for consideration, with a view to the adoption of the declaration by the Assembly at its forty-seventh session.

## International Covenants on Human Rights 11/

By resolution 1992/11, the Council, after recalling the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and the Optional Protocols to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and reaffirming that all human rights and fundamental freedoms are indivisible and interrelated and that the promotion and protection of one category of rights should never exempt or excuse States from the promotion and protection of the other rights, decided to transmit the report of the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session for consideration under the agenda item entitled "Human rights questions".

## National institutions for the promotion and protection of human rights 12/

By decision 1992/233, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/54 of 3 March 1992, decided to transmit to the General Assembly for adoption the recommendations contained in the report of the International Workshop on National Institutions for the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights (E/CN.4/1992/43 and Add.1 and 2), which are

entitled "Principles relating to the status of national institutions" and contained in the annex to Commission resolution 1992/54.

#### Situation of human rights in Myanmar 13/

By decision 1992/235, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/58 of 3 March 1992, approved the Commission's decision to nominate a special rapporteur to establish direct contacts with the Government and people of Myanmar, with a view to examining the situation of human rights in that country, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

#### Situation of human rights in Cuba 14/

By decision 1992/236, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/61 of 3 March 1992, approved the Commission's request to its Chairman to designate the Special Representative appointed by the Secretary-General pursuant to Commission resolution 1991/68 as its Special Rapporteur to review and report on the situation of human rights in Cuba, and also approved the Commission's request to the Special Rapporteur to report to the Commission at its forty-ninth session on the results of his endeavours pursuant to its resolution 1991/61, and to submit an interim report to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session.

## Situation of human rights in El Salvador 15/

By decision 1992/237, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/62 of 3 March 1992, approved the Commission's request to the Secretary-General to appoint an independent expert to provide assistance in human rights matters to the Government of El Salvador, to consider the human rights situation in the country and the effects of the Peace Agreements on the effective enjoyment of human rights, and to investigate the manner in which both parties apply the recommendations contained in the final report of the Special Representative of the Commission (E/CN.4/1992/32) and those made by the United Nations Observer Mission in El Salvador and the committees established during the negotiation process, and also approved the Commission's request to the independent expert to report on the outcome of his inquiries to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

## Situation of human rights in the Islamic Republic of Iran 16/

By decision 1992/239, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/67 of 4 March 1992, approved the Commission's decision to extend the mandate of the Special Representative for a further year and also approved the Commission's request to the Special Representative to submit an interim report to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session on the human rights situation in the Islamic Republic of Iran and a final report to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

#### Situation of human rights in Afghanistan 17/

By decision 1992/240, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/68 of 4 March 1992, approved the Commission's decision to extend the mandate of the Special Rapporteur for one year and to request him to report to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

#### Situation of human rights in Irag 18/

By decision 1992/241, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/71 of 5 March 1992, approved the Commission's decision to extend the mandate of the Special Rapporteur for a further year and its request to the Special Rapporteur to visit again the northern area of Iraq and to submit an interim report to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and a final report to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

#### Situation of human rights in Haiti 19/

By decision 1992/245, the Council, after having taken note of Commission on Human Rights resolution 1992/77 of 5 March 1992, approved the Commission's request to its Chairman, following consultations with the Bureau, to appoint a special rapporteur with a mandate to report on the situation of human rights in Haiti and to submit an interim report to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and a report to the Commission at its forty-ninth session.

#### Improvement of the status of women in the Secretariat 20/

By resolution 1992/14, the Council, after having recalled the Nairobi Forward-looking Strategies for the Advancement of Women, requested the Secretary-General to ensure that the findings of the comprehensive study of the barriers to the advancement of women and a full action programme for the advancement of women in the Secretariat for the period 1991-1995 were submitted to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session.

#### SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT QUESTIONS

## Implementation of General Assembly resolution 46/152 concerning operational activities and coordination in the field of crime prevention and criminal justice 21/

By resolution 1992/22, the Council, after having recalled General Assembly resolution 46/152 of 18 December 1991, recommended to the Assembly at its forty-seventh session that it take favourable action on the proposals to be submitted by the Secretary-General pursuant to Assembly resolution 46/152 relating to the strengthening of the United Nations crime prevention and criminal justice programme, recommended the establishment, within programme 29 of the medium-term plan for the period 1992-1997, of a subprogramme on operational activities, planning and overall coordination in the field of crime prevention and criminal justice, and recommended that the Assembly consider arrangements for funding programme support, taking into account the practices elsewhere in the United Nations system.

#### The role of cooperatives in the light of new economic and social trends 22/

By resolution 1992/25, the Council, having recalled General Assembly resolution 44/58 of 8 December 1989, recommended that the Assembly proclaim an international day of cooperatives to be observed on the first Saturday of July 1995, marking the centenary of the International Cooperative Alliance, and that it consider the possibility of observing an international day in future years, and recommended that the Assembly, to the extent possible within existing resources, request the Secretary-General to maintain and increase the support provided by the United Nations to the programmes and objectives of the international cooperative movement and, in his next report, to indicate the progress made towards that goal.

#### Social development 23/

By resolution 1992/27, the Council, recalling General Assembly resolution 46/139 of 17 December 1991 and Council decision 1991/230 of 30 May 1991, recommended that the Assembly convene a world summit for social development, at the level of head of State or Government, to be held in early 1995, also recommended that the Assembly, at its forty-seventh session, take action on the proposed summit, including appropriate decisions on its agenda, means of preparation and other relevant modalities, and requested the Secretary-General to carry out consultations on the resolution and present an oral report to the Assembly at its forty-seventh session.

## Voluntary Fund for the United Nations Decade of Disabled Persons 24/

By decision 1992/276, the Council recommended to the General Assembly the adoption of the proposal of the Secretary-General to continue in the period beyond the United Nations Decade of Disabled Persons, the operation of the Voluntary Fund for the United Nations Decade of Disabled Persons, henceforth to be called the United Nations Voluntary Fund on Disability.

ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW SUBSIDIARY BODIES OF THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL

## Establishment of new subsidiary bodies of the Economic and Social Council 25/

By resolution 1992/62, the Council, after having reaffirmed General Assembly resolution 46/235 of 13 April 1992 and Council decision 1992/218 of 30 April 1992, invited the Assembly, at its forty-seventh session, to consider any relevant institutional changes and recommendations made by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at its eighth session and by the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development regarding, in particular, the Committee on Natural Resources and the Committee on New and Renewable Sources of Energy and on Energy for Development.

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#### Chapter II

#### HIGH-LEVEL SEGMENT OF THE COUNCIL

1. At its second regular session of 1988, the Council decided, with a view to formulating and elaborating action-oriented recommendations, that it should undertake annually in-depth discussions of major policy themes, to be selected on the basis of a multi-year work programme derived, <u>inter alia</u>, from the priorities set out in the medium-term plan of the United Nations and the work programmes of other relevant United Nations bodies (resolution 1988/77).

2. In its resolution 45/264 of 13 May 1991, the General Assembly decided that during the substantive session of the Economic and Social Council there would be a high-level segment of four days open to all Member States in accordance with Article 69 of the Charter, with ministerial participation, devoted to the consideration of one or more major economic and/or social policy themes to be determined at the organizational session, taking into account the Economic and Social Council multi-year work programme. It also decided that there would be a one-day policy dialogue and discussion on important developments in the world economy and international economic cooperation.

3. At its organizational session for 1992, the Council decided that the high-level segment should be devoted to the consideration of the following major theme: "Enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system"; that, without prejudice to the provisions of General Assembly resolution 45/264, the duration of the high-level segment with ministerial participation for 1992 should be one to three days; and to invite the Secretary-General, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 45/264, to provide as a contribution to the high-level segment his views and recommendations on the selected theme (decision 1992/203).

4. At its resumed organizational session for 1992, the Council considered the programme of work of the Council and decided that the high-level segment should take place from 6 to 8 July 1992. It further decided that:

(a) The meeting of 6 July would be reserved for statements by Ministers and other high-level representatives;

(b) The one-day policy dialogue with executive heads of multilateral financial and trade institutions of the United Nations system would take place on 7 July and executive heads would be requested to circulate their statements beforehand;

(c) Heads of delegation would be requested to make no more than three interventions of no longer than five minutes each during the three-day period, and would be requested to circulate their main statements beforehand;

(d) The high-level segment would take place in the Economic and Social Council Chamber, which was a suitable venue for round-table discussions and dialogue among the participants. Throughout the segment, the President of the Council would be expected to take a leading role in stimulating interaction among the participants, summarizing the discussions as they progressed and initiating the successive stages of the dialogue (decision 1992/217). 5. The high-level segment was held from 6 to 9 July 1992. The Council had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Committee for Development Planning on its twenty-eighth session (E/1992/27); 1/

(b) World Economic Survey, 1992 (E/1992/40 and Corr.1 and 2); 2/

(c) Report of the Secretary-General on strengthening the operational activities of the United Nations system, including the governance and financing aspects thereof (E/1992/64);

(d) Report of the Secretary-General entitled "Enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system" (E/1992/82 and Add.1).

6. At the 13th meeting of the Council (1st meeting of the high-level segment), on 6 July, the President of the Council and the Secretary-General made statements.

7. The Council then adopted the agenda for the high-level segment as contained in document E/1992/100 and the proposals for the organization of work (see Council decision 1992/223, para. 3). The agenda as adopted was as follows:

- 1. Adoption of the agenda.
- 2. Enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system.
- 3. Policy dialogue and discussion on important developments in the world economy and international economic cooperation with heads of multilateral financial and trade institutions of the United Nations system.
- 4. Conclusion of the high-level segment with the presentation of a summary by the President.

8. At the 13th meeting, the Council began its discussion on enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system (agenda item 2).

9. The Permanent Representative of Pakistan read out a statement for the Minister of State for Economic Affairs of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77).

10. Statements were also made by the Minister of Overseas Development of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community); the Minister for External Relations and International Development of Canada; the Minister for External Relations of Cuba; the Under-Secretary of State for International Development Cooperation of Sweden; the Secretary of State for International Cooperation and for Latin America of Spain; the State Secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Norway; the Assistant Secretary of State of the United States of America; the Vice-Secretary of State, Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation of Germany; the Secretary of State, Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Finland; the Minister for Cooperation and Development of France; the Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs of Mexico; the State Secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Denmark; the State Secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Romania; the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade of Australia; and the Deputy Foreign Minister of the Russian Federation.

At the 14th meeting, on 6 July, statements were made by the Deputy Prime Minister of the Government of Croatia; the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Bulgaria; the Minister for Development Cooperation, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands; the First Vice-Chairman of the Council of Ministers of Belarus; the Minister of Planning of Morocco; the Under-Secretary of State, Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Poland; the Director-General for International Cooperation, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Argentina; the Deputy Foreign Minister of Malaysia; the Minister of State for Finance and Economic Planning of Uganda; the Vice-Minister of Economics, Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Colombia; the Parliamentary Secretary of Foreign Affairs and Deputy Foreign Minister of the Bahamas; the Director of International Organizations, Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Switzerland; the President of the Council of Ministers, Minister for Foreign Affairs of Peru; and the Federal Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs of Yuqoslavia.

12. The President of the Council summarized the main points made during the discussion on 6 July and initiated an exchange of views among delegations. Statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), Finland and the Netherlands.

13. Statements were also made by the Director-General of the World Health Organization and the Director-General of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

14. At the 15th meeting, on 7 July, the Council began its policy dialogue and discussion on important developments in the world economy and international economic cooperation with heads of multilateral financial and trade institutions of the United Nations system (agenda item 3).

15. Statements were made by the President of the World Bank, the Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund, the Director-General of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development. During the meeting these representatives responded to questions raised during the exchange of views. 16. During the exchange of views, statements were made by the representatives of Canada, Ethiopia, Morocco, Malaysia, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community) and Finland.

17. The Chairman of the Committee for Development Planning made a statement.

18. The Director-General of the World Health Organization and the Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund also made statements.

19. The President of the Council made a statement.

20. At the 16th meeting, on 7 July, the Council continued its policy dialogue. Statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), Mexico, the Philippines, Benin, the United States of America, Japan, Romania, Argentina, Norway, Brazil, Colombia, Sweden, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Algeria, Australia and Finland.

21. The President of the World Bank, the Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund and the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development responded to questions raised during the exchange of views.

22. The President of the Council also made a statement.

23. The Council thus concluded consideration of agenda item 3 of the high-level segment (Policy dialogue and discussion on important developments in the world economy and international economic cooperation with heads of multilateral financial and trade institutions of the United Nations system).

24. At the 17th meeting, on 8 July, the Council resumed consideration of agenda item 2 (Enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system).

25. Statements were made by the representatives of China, Austria, the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Philippines, Algeria, the Syrian Arab Republic, Madagascar and Turkey. Statements were also made by the observers for Kenya, the Republic of Korea, Cameroon and Senegal.

26. The Director-General of the International Labour Organisation and the Director-General of the World Health Organization made statements. The Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund, the Executive Director of the United Nations Population Fund and the Administrator of the United Nations Development Programme also made statements.

27. At the 18th meeting, on 8 July, the Council continued its consideration of agenda item 2. Statements were made by the representatives of Japan, Jamaica, India, Brazil, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Poland, Chile, Suriname, Benin and Ecuador. The observers for Venezuela, Indonesia, Nicaragua, New Zealand and Saudi Arabia also made statements.

28. The Secretary-General of the United Nations made a concluding statement.

29. The President informed the Council that he had decided to establish an ad hoc open-ended working group of the Council, for the purpose of holding consultations in September, prior to the opening of the forty-seventh session of the General Assembly, on enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system. The President also stated that, in order to adequately reflect the ideas and views of all speakers, he would present his summary at the 19th meeting of the Council.

#### B. PRESIDENT'S SUMMARY OF THE HIGH-LEVEL SEGMENT

30. At the 19th meeting, on 9 July, the President made the following concluding summary statement:

In accordance with the relevant provision of General Assembly resolution 45/264, the high-level segment of the Council was held at United Nations Headquarters from 6 to 9 July 1992. It was devoted to the theme "Enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system".

A broad convergence of views appears to have emerged on several key aspects of this theme. The present juncture was seen as a defining moment which provided a unique opportunity for strengthening international development cooperation. The United Nations system was expected to play a pivotal role in this endeavour and, to that end, its capacity and effectiveness needed to be enhanced.

The objectives of securing peace, development and justice mandated by the Charter of the United Nations were seen as indivisible and equally essential. International development cooperation and the eradication of poverty were inextricably linked with the preservation of peace and security and the two needed to be pursued with equal vigour and in an integrated manner.

Members were concerned about the stalled world economy. Stress was placed on the persistent problems of limited access to markets and technology, excessive debt burdens in many countries, inadequate official development assistance and a generally unfavourable international economic environment that continued to hamper development. Africa and the least developed countries faced an especially difficult situation, which was intensified by drought and refugee flows. Output and income levels in the transition economies of Eastern Europe were falling sharply due to the difficulties of transition. Recovery from recession in the developed economies seemed weak and fragile.

A concerted global effort to reinvigorate growth and development, on a sustained and sustainable basis, was seen as the first priority. The call was made for an opening of markets through a successful and balanced outcome of the Uruguay Round, an easing of the debt burdens of low-income and middle-income countries and increased official development Development Association (IDA) with a real increase in its resources. Special attention must be paid to the problems of the African and least developed countries. It was recalled that the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s, a new development programme for Africa, was adopted in December 1991 by the General Assembly (resolution 46/151, annex, sect. II). It was noted that the New Agenda was a political instrument of mutually reinforcing responsibility and commitment by the international community and the African countries to foster African economic and social development in the last decade of the twentieth century.

It was observed that a reduction in tensions provided a welcome opportunity to Governments to reduce military expenditures in all countries and release resources for growth and development.

Concern was expressed that resources might be diverted from development assistance to support the transition in Eastern European and newly independent States. Assurances were given that no such diversion had taken place and that resources for development assistance and support for the transition economies would be kept separate.

A successful transition and restoration of growth in Eastern European and newly independent States were seen as beneficial for growth and development in the world economy. Several speakers highlighted the urgency of international support for political and economic reforms in the region.

Many delegates referred to an emerging vision of development as human-centred, equitable and socially and environmentally sustainable, with eradication of poverty highlighted as its priority objective. More effective policy coordination with broader participation was seen as an important means of creating a more favourable international economic environment for development.

Reference was made to adjustment programmes and economic reform policies, including more open and liberalized trade policies, being pursued by a large number of developing countries, and there was a call for commensurate international support - particularly on trade and finance - to ensure their success. The need for integrating social goals, including the advancement of women and protection of vulnerable groups, into adjustment programmes and development strategies was stressed. The proposal for a world summit for social development received broad support.

Another element that was stressed by many speakers was the need for good governance at both the national and international levels. Democratic principles of popular participation, protection of human rights, accountability and transparency were seen as necessary to sustain short-term adjustment as well as long-term development.

The continuing process of restructuring and reform of the United Nations system was noted and the need for further progress was underscored. The overall objectives of restructuring should be carried out in keeping with the guiding principles contained in General Assembly resolution 45/264. Caution was expressed against redefining the development priorities of developing countries or limiting the scope of development cooperation carried out through the United Nations to technical cooperation.

Measures taken to strengthen the functioning of the system in the humanitarian assistance field, including the establishment of a new department in the United Nations, were welcomed.

The view was expressed by many delegations that the establishment, as a follow-up to the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, of the high-level Commission on Sustainable Development, would have an impact on the overall reform of the United Nations role in the economic, social and related fields.

There was broad acceptance of the need to review the relationship between the functioning of the various parts of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields in order to optimize its impact, efficiency and effectiveness. The importance of better coordination of United Nations activities in these areas was also stressed, with particular reference to cross-sectoral issues, including (in the framework of a unified approach at the field level) the enhancement of the role and effectiveness of the resident coordinator. Also, the regional dimension of development was emphasized by a number of speakers and they called for an enhanced role for the regional commissions.

Governance and financing of operational activities were seen as interrelated. Proposals made by the Secretary-General, as well as other suggestions, including the Nordic countries' proposal (see E/1992/91), were noted.

The importance of ensuring adequate, stable and assured resources for operational activities and preserving the principle of neutrality of the United Nations funding programmes was stressed. It was emphasized that the national priorities and strategies of the recipient countries must be respected. Proposals were advanced for establishing a system by which the financing for the operational activities would be provided by a combination of assessed, negotiated and voluntary contributions.

Broad attention was also paid to the need for a closer and improved relationship between the United Nations and its agencies and the Bretton Woods institutions. The importance of complementary collaboration and better two-way communication among them was stressed, with organizations focusing their work on areas where they had a comparative advantage.

The role of the Administrative Committee on Coordination was seen as central in bringing about better coordination and coherence in the functioning of the United Nations system. Efforts being made under the leadership of the Secretary-General to strengthen its role were welcomed.

On the basis of the statements made during the high-level segment, further consultations with members of the Council and discussion with members of the Bureau, I have decided to establish an ad hoc open-ended working group of the Council for the purpose of holding consultations in September, prior to the forty-seventh session of the General Assembly, on enhancing international cooperation for development: the role of the United Nations system. At these consultations, recommendations should be developed for consideration by the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session and for appropriate action, taking account of the report of the Secretary-General on the subject (E/1992/82 and Add.1), statements at the high-level segment, the summation of the President of the Economic and Social Council at the conclusion of the segment, the Nordic project common memorandum contained in document E/1992/91, and related relevant documents.

The working group should pay due attention to the implications for the working of the United Nations system of the International Development Strategy for the Fourth United Nations Development Decade (General Assembly resolution 45/199, annex), the Declaration adopted at the eighteenth special session of the General Assembly (General Assembly resolution S-18/3, annex), the Cartagena Commitment reached at the eighth session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, the New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s and the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, which are important guidelines for the working group. Account should also be taken of the ongoing process of restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields in accordance with General Assembly resolution 45/264 and other relevant resolutions.

In company with the members of the Bureau, I shall undertake consultations with members of the Council in order to determine the modalities for the meetings of the working group, including arrangements for the Council to receive the recommendations of the working group for transmission to the General Assembly. I propose to convene a first meeting of the working group to discuss organizational matters before the conclusion of the Council's work.

The Council considered the question of coordination of the policies and activities of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system related to assistance in the eradication of poverty and support to vulnerable groups, including assistance during the implementation of structural adjustment programmes at its substantive session (agenda item 3 (a)). It had before it the report of the Secretary-General on assistance in the eradication of poverty and support to vulnerable groups, including assistance during the implementation of structural adjustment programmes (E/1992/47).

2. The Council considered the item at its 19th to 23rd, 40th and 42nd meetings, on 9, 10, 13 and 30 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.19-23, 40 and 42).

3. At the 19th to 23rd meetings, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At the 19th meeting, on 9 July, it heard an introductory statement by the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Development.

4. At the same meeting, statements were made by the Director-General of the World Health Organization, the Director-General of the International Labour Organisation and the Director-General of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. Statements were also made by the Assistant Administrator of the United Nations Development Programme, the Deputy Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund and the Executive Director of the World Food Programme.

5. Statements were also made by the representatives of Japan, the Russian Federation, Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), Bolivia, Canada, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), Peru and Argentina.

6. At the 20th meeting, on 9 July, statements were made by the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, the Executive Secretary of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, the Executive Director of the United Nations Population Fund, the Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean, the Acting Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa, the Executive Secretary of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia, the Population Programme Coordinator of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the representative of 7. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community) and China. The observer for Norway also made a statement.

8. At the 21st meeting, on 10 July, statements were made by the Special Representative of the World Bank to the United Nations, the Special Representative of the International Monetary Fund to the United Nations, the President of the International Fund for Agricultural Development and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

9. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Benin, Suriname, Mexico, the United States of America, Bangladesh and the observer for Switzerland.

10. At the 22nd meeting, on 10 July, a statement was made by the representative of the United Nations Environment Programme. Statements were also made by the representives of Chile, the Philippines and Algeria.

11. At the same meeting, the President of the Council made a statement.

12. At the 23rd meeting, on 13 July, statements were made by the representative of Austria and the observer for Venezuela.

13. At the 21st to 23rd meetings, the members of the Council entered into a dialogue with the executive heads of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system that were present.

14. At the 40th meeting, on 30 July, the President informed the members of the Council that the results of the coordination segment of the substantive session of 1992 would be summarized in a concluding statement by the President of the Council (see annex IV).

The Council considered the question of coordination of the policies and activities of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system related to the prevention and control of HIV/AIDS and programmes addressed to the mitigation of its negative socio-economic consequences at its substantive session (agenda item 3 (b)). It had before it the following documents:

17. The Council considered the item at its 23rd to 25th, 40th and 42nd meetings, on 13, 14, 30 and 31 July. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.23-25, 40 and 42).

18. At the 23rd to 25th meetings, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At the 23rd meeting, on 13 July, it heard an introductory statement by the representative of the World Health Organization.

19. At the same meeting, statements were made by the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Development and the representatives of the United Nations Children's Fund, the United Nations Office at Vienna and the United Nations Development Programme. Statements were also made by the representatives of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), Sweden (on behalf of the Nordic countries) and Japan.

20. At the 24th meeting, on 13 July, statements were made by the representatives of the United States of America and Canada and by the representative of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, a non-governmental organization in consultative status with the Council, category I.

21. At the 25th meeting, on 14 July, the Council heard a statement by the representative of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. Statements were also made by the representatives of Australia, the Russian Federation, Austria and Botswana and the observers for Guatemala and Uganda.

22. At the 23rd to 25th meetings, the members of the Council entered into a dialogue with the executive heads of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system that were present.

23. At the 40th meeting, on 30 July, the President informed the members of the Council that the results of the coordination segment would be summarized in the concluding statement of the President of the Council (see annex IV).

1. The Council considered the question of technical cooperation among developing countries as a modality in the formulation, preparation, execution and evaluation of the projects implemented by the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system in the economic, social and related fields at its substantive session (agenda item 5). It had before it the report of the Secretary-General on technical cooperation among developing countries as a modality in the formulation, preparation, execution and evaluation of the projects implemented by the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system in the economic, social and related fields (E/1992/75).

2. The Council considered the item at its 30th, 36th and 41st meetings, on 17, 22 and 30 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.30, 36 and 41).

3. At the 30th meeting, on 17 July, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At that meeting, the Council heard introductory statements by the Director of the Special Unit for Technical Cooperation among Developing Countries of the United Nations Development Programme and the Director of the Technical Cooperation Policy Division of the Department for Economic and Social Development.

4. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), China, Canada, Chile, Bangladesh and Jamaica. Statements were also made by the representatives of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and the World Health Organization.

5. At the same meeting, the Council entered into a dialogue and exchanged views on the item.

#### Technical cooperation among developing countries

6. At the 36th meeting, on 22 July, the representative of Pakistan, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.29) entitled "Technical cooperation among developing countries", which read as follows: "The Economic and Social Council,

"<u>Reaffirming</u> the continued validity and importance of all the recommendations of the Buenos Aires Plan of Action 1/ in promoting technical cooperation among developing countries,

"<u>Reaffirming further</u> the recommendation that the entire United Nations development system must be permeated by the spirit of technical cooperation among developing countries and that all the organizations of the United Nations system should play a prominent role as promoters and catalysts of technical cooperation among developing countries, <u>2</u>/

"<u>Recalling</u> General Assembly resolutions 45/191 of 21 December 1990 and 46/143 of 17 December 1991 on developing human resources for development,

"<u>Recognizing</u> that increased cooperation is taking place among developing countries and their institutions through the sharing of expertise, experience and facilities,

"<u>Recognizing also</u> that technical cooperation among developing countries is an effective tool for implementing development programmes and projects through the use of relevant experience and expertise,

"<u>Reiterating</u> that developing countries have a primary responsibility for promoting technical cooperation among themselves, and that developed countries and the United Nations system should assist and support such activities and should play a prominent role as promoters and catalysts of technical cooperation among developing countries, in accordance with the Buenos Aires Plan of Action,

"Taking note with appreciation of the recent measures taken by organizations of the United Nations system to identify technical cooperation among developing countries as a priority theme, provide increased support to promotional activities and arrange for monitoring progress in applying technical cooperation among developing countries through the mechanisms established for project appraisal and approval,

"<u>Concerned</u>, however, that the application or use of the modality of technical cooperation among developing countries since the adoption of the Buenos Aires Plan of Action has not been widespread and is still marginally applied in the implementation of programmes and projects,

"1. <u>Calls upon</u> all parties in the development effort to make concerted, planned and vigorous endeavours to benefit from the comparative advantage offered by the utilization of the capacities of developing countries, by giving their full support and first consideration to the use of the modality;

"2. <u>Urges</u> all parties to enhance the scope, opportunities and application of the modality of technical cooperation among developing countries in work carried out at all stages of the project cycle;

"3. <u>Requests</u> all parties to increase support activities aimed at increasing awareness in government institutions, private sectors and non-governmental organizations, of the relevance and comparative advantage of the modality of technical cooperation among developing countries;

"4. <u>Calls for</u> increased use by developed country partners of consultants from developing countries so as to improve the cost-effectiveness of projects and programmes and enhance the relevance of operational activities for development;

"5. <u>Urges</u> the United Nations Development Programme and other organizations of the United Nations development system to improve and expand data and information on existing capacities in developing countries through the Information Referral System (INRES) and enhance access to such information;

"6. <u>Also urges</u> the United Nations Development Programme and other organizations of the United Nations development system to intensify their support in developing national capacity-building for human resources development in developing countries;

"7. <u>Invites</u> all organizations of the United Nations development system to further review their policies and practices to facilitate the use of technical cooperation among developing countries in the design, formulation, implementation and evaluation of programmes and projects supported by them;

"8. <u>Also invites</u> all countries and organizations of the United Nations development system to promote and facilite the use of the modality of technical cooperation among developing countries in regional, subregional and interregional programmes and projects;

"9. <u>Urges</u> developing countries to adopt explicitly stated national policies and measures favourable to the greater use of technical cooperation among developing countries in the implementation of national development activities and projects;

"10. Further urges developing countries to make greater use, in the context of technical cooperation among developing countries, of equipment and services from developing countries and to consider a review, as appropriate, of existing procurement policies and practices in this regard;

"11. <u>Invites</u> developing countries to strengthen the national focal point mechanisms for technical cooperation among developing countries to enable them effectively to promote technical cooperation among developing countries and monitor progress in the application of the modality;

"12. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Economic and Social Council at its substantive session of 1994 on his assessment of the implementation of the present resolution."

7. At the 41st meeting, on 30 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. José Lino Guerrero (Philippines), introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.39), submitted on the basis of the informal consultations held on draft resolution E/1992/L.29. In introducing the draft resolution the Vice-President revised operative paragraph 8 by deleting the words "stated national policies and measures favourable to the" after the words "<u>Urges</u> developing countries to encourage".

8. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft resolution, as orally revised. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/41.

9. In the light of the adoption of draft resolution E/1992/L.39, draft resolution E/1992/L.29 was withdrawn by the sponsors.

#### **B. COORDINATION QUESTIONS**

## 1. Reports of the coordination bodies

10. The Council considered the question of reports of the coordination bodies at its substantive session (agenda item 6 (a)). It had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Committee for Programme and Coordination on the first part of its thirty-second session  $(\lambda/47/16 \text{ (Part I)}); 3/$ 

(b) Report of the Chairmen of the Committee for Programme and Coordination and the Administrative Committee on Coordination on the twenty-sixth series of Joint Meetings of the two Committees (E/1991/143);

(c) Annual overview report of the Adminstrative Committee on Coordination for 1991 (E/1992/11 and Add.1 and 2).

11. The Council considered the item at its 11th and 42nd meetings, on 30 June and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.11 and 42).

12. At the 11th meeting, on 30 June, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At that meeting, it heard introductory statements by the Chairman of the Committee for Programme and Coordination, Mr. Kees Spaans

(Netherlands), the Director of the Economic and Social Council Affairs and Inter-Agency Coordination Division and the Controller of the United Nations.

13. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Japan, the Russian Federation, Malaysia, Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77) and Algeria.

## Reports of coordination bodies considered by the Economic and Social Council

14. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, on the proposal of the President, the Council took note of the reports of coordination bodies (Council decision 1992/302).

## 2. <u>Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of</u> <u>Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples by</u> <u>the specialized agencies and the international</u> <u>institutions associated with the United Nations</u>

15. The Council considered the question of the implementation of the declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples by the specialized agencies and the international institutions associated with the United Nations at its substantive session (agenda item 6 (b)). It had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples by the specialized agencies and the international institutions associated with the United Nations  $(\lambda/47/281)$ ;

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on assistance to the Palestinian people (A/47/212-E/1992/54);

(c) Report of the Acting President of the Council on consultations held with the Chairman of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples and the Chairman of the Special Committee against Apartheid (E/1992/85).

16. The Council considered the item at its 37th to 39th and 42nd meetings, on 24, 27, 28 and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.37-39 and 42).

17. At the 37th meeting, on 24 July, the Council heard an introductory statement by the Chairman of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, Mr. Renagi Lohia (Papua New Guinea).

### Assistance to the Palestinian people

18. At the 38th meeting, on 27 July, the observer for Tunisia, on behalf of Algeria, Egypt, 4/ Iraq, 4/ Jordan, 4/ Lebanon, 4/ the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, 4/ Mauritania, 4/ Morocco, the Syrian Arab Republic, Tunisia 4/ and Yemen, 4/ introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.35) entitled "Assistance to the Palestinian people". Subsequently, Malaysia and Suriname joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

19. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, a statement of the programme budget implications of the draft resolution, submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 31 of the rules of procedure of the Economic and Social Council, was read out by the Secretary of the Council.

20. At the same meeting, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Ahmed Amaziane (Morocco), on the basis of informal consultations, orally revised the draft resolution by inserting the words "taking into account the assistance needs of the Palestinian people in the light of the developments in the region" at the end of operative paragraph 9.

21. The Council then adopted the draft resolution by a recorded vote of 52 to 1, with 1 abstention. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/58. The voting was as follows:

In favour: Algeria, Angola, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belarus, Belgium, Benin, Botswana, Brazil, Bulgaria, Burkina Faso, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Ecuador, Ethiopia, Finland, France, Germany, Guinea, India, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Kuwait, Madagascar, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Romania, Rwanda, Somalia, Spain, Suriname, Swaziland, Sweden, Syrian Arab Republic, Togo, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Yugoslavia, Zaire.

Against: United States of America.

Abstaining: Russian Federation.

22. Before the draft resolution was adopted, the representative of the United States of America and the observer for Israel made statements; after it was adopted, statements were made by the representative of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), the United States of America, the Russian Federation, Japan, Austria, Sweden, Finland, the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Syrian Arab Republic.

Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples by the specialized agencies and the international institutions associated with the United Nations

23. At the 39th meeting, on 28 July, the representative of Benin, on behalf of Algeria, Angola, Benin, Congo, 4/ Fiji, 4/ Guinea, Jamaica, Malaysia, Namibia, 4/ Papua New Guinea, 4/ Somalia, Tunisia, 4/ Uganda 4/ and Zambia, 4/ introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.38) entitled "Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples by the specialized agencies and the international institutions associated with the United Nations". The Islamic Republic of Iran, Suriname and Trinidad and Tobago subsequently joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

24. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Amaziane (Morocco), read out the following revisions which had been agreed upon during informal consultations:

(a) In the third preambular paragraph, the words "Assembly resolution 46/65 of 11 December 1991 and" were deleted after the words "including in particular";

(b) In the eighth preambular paragraph, the words "non-self-governing" were inserted before the words "small island Territories".

25. The Council then adopted the draft resolution by a recorded vote of 35 to 11, with 8 abstentions. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/59. The voting was as follows:

- In favour: Algeria, Angola, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Benin, Botswana, Brazil, Burkina Faso, Chile, China, Colombia, Ecuador, Ethiopia, Guinea, India, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Jamaica, Kuwait, Madagascar, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Rwanda, Somalia, Suriname, Swaziland, Syrian Arab Republic, Togo, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, Yugoslavia, Zaire.
- <u>Against</u>: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Poland, Romania, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America.
- <u>Abstaining</u>: Argentina, Australia, Belarus, Canada, Finland, the Russian Federation, Spain, Sweden.

26. Before the draft resolution was adopted, the representative of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community) and France made statements; after it was adopted, statements were made by the representatives of the Russian Federation and Australia.

#### 3. International cooperation in the field of informatics

27. The Council considered the question of international cooperation in the field of informatics at its substantive session (agenda item 6 (c)). It had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Secretary-General on international cooperation in the field of informatics (E/1992/55);

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on harmonization and improvement of United Nations informatics systems for optimal utilization and accessibility by all States (E/1992/78).

28. The Council considered the item at its 37th, 40th and 42nd meetings, on 24, 30 and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.37, 40 and 42).

29. At the 37th meeting, on 24 July, the Council held a general discussion on the item and heard introductory statements by the Director of the Electronic Services Division of the Office of General Services and the representative of the Department of Economic and Social Development.

30. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan, the Syrian Arab Republic and Benin and the observer for Israel. The observer for Palestine also made a statement.

31. At the same meeting, the representatives of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the United Nations Development Programme also made statements. The observer for the Inter-Press Service International Cooperative, a non-governmental organization in consultative status with the Council, category I, also made a statement.

## The need to harmonize and improve United Nations informatics systems for optimal utilization and accessibility by all States

32. At the 40th meeting, on 30 July, the observer for Hungary, 4/ on behalf of Argentina, Australia, Austria, China, Colombia, Egypt, 4/ Finland, Hungary, 4/ Israel, Lebanon, 4/ the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, 4/ Mexico, Morocco, Myanmar, 4/ Norway, 4/ Pakistan, Poland, the Republic of Korea, 4/Romania, the Russian Federation, Sri Lanka, 4/ Sweden, Switzerland 4/ and Turkey, introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.37) entitled "The need to harmonize and improve United Nations informatics systems for optimal utilization and accessibility by all States". Subsequently, Malaysia and the Philippines joined in sponsoring the draft resolution, and the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya withdrew its sponsorship.

33. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Amaziane (Morocco), on the basis of informal consultations, orally revised operative paragraph 2 of the draft resolution by replacing the words "<u>Reiterates</u> the urgent need for representatives of States to be actively associated with and as far as possible properly represented on the respective executive and governing bodies of the concerned United Nations institutions" by the words "<u>Reiterates</u> the urgent need for representatives of States to be closely consulted and actively associated with the respective executive and governing bodies of the concerned United Nations".

34. The Director of the Economic and Social Council Affairs and Inter-Agency Coordination Division made a statement. The representative of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland also made a statement. 35. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft resolution, as orally revised. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/60.

#### C. REVITALIZATION OF THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL

36. The Council considered the question of the revitalization of the Economic and Social Council at its substantive session (agenda item 7). It had before it the report of the Secretary-General on the revitalization of the Economic and Social Council (E/1992/86).

37. The Council considered the item at its 32nd, 34th and 42nd meetings, on 20, 21 and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.32, 34 and 42).

38. At the 32nd and 34th meetings, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At the 32nd meeting, on 20 July, the Director of the Economic and Social Council Affairs and Inter-Agency Coordination Division made an introductory statement.

39. At the same meeting, the representative of Sweden made a statement.

40. At the 34th meeting, on 21 July, statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), Austria, the Russian Federation, the United States of America, China, Mexico, Australia, Brazil, Poland, Japan and Colombia and the observers for Cyprus, Kazakhstan and Norway (on behalf of the Nordic countries).

# Report of the Secretary-General on the revitalization of the Economic and Social Council

41. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, on the proposal of the President, the Council took note of the report of the Secretary-General on the revitalization of the Economic and Social Council (Council decision 1992/303).

#### D. PROGRAMME AND RELATED QUESTIONS

42. The Council considered programme and related questions at its substantive session (agenda item 8). It had before it the following documents:

(a) Relevant chapters of the proposed revisions to the medium-term plan for the period 1992-1997 ( $\lambda/47/6$ );

(b) Report of the Committee for Programme and Coordination on the first part of its thirty-second session (A/47/16 (Part I)). 3/

43. The Council considered the item at its 36th, 39th and 41st meetings, on 22, 28 and 30 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.36, 39 and 41).

44. At the 36th meeting, on 22 July, the Council held a general discussion on the item and heard a statement by the representative of the Office of Programme Planning, Budget and Finance.

Summary records of sessional committees, the regional commissions and other subsidiary bodies of the Economic and Social Council

45. At the 39th meeting, on 28 July, the President of the Council, on behalf of the members of the Bureau, introduced a draft decision (E/1992/L.36) entitled "Summary records of sessional committees, the regional commissions and other subsidiary bodies of the Economic and Social Council".

46. At the 41st meeting, on 30 July, the Council adopted the draft decision. For the final text, see Council decision 1992/288.

47. The representative of the Philippines made a statement before the draft decision was adopted.

## E. SPECIAL ECONOMIC, HUMANITARIAN AND DISASTER RELIEF ASSISTANCE

48. The Council considered the question of special economic, humanitarian and disaster relief assistance at its substantive session (agenda item 9). It had before it the following documents:

(a) Report of the Secretary-General on assistance to Yemen
 (\lambda/47/283-E/1992/83);

(b) Report of the Secretary-General on the Office of the United Nations Disaster Relief Coordinator (A/47/288-E/1992/94);

(c) Report of the Secretary-General on assistance for the reconstruction and development of Lebanon  $(\lambda/47/291-E/1992/95)$ .

49. The Council considered the item at its 12th, 35th, 36th, 38th, 41st and 42nd meetings, on 1, 21, 22, 27, 30 and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.12, 35, 36, 38, 41 and 42).

50. At the 12th, 35th and 36th meetings, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At the 12th meeting, on 1 July, it heard introductory statements by the Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and the Associate Administrator of the United Nations Development Programme.

51. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Turkey, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community) and the observer for Croatia. The representative of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, a non-governmental organization in consultative status with the Council, category I, also made a statement. The representative of Yugoslavia made a statement in exercise of the right of reply. 52. At the 35th meeting, on 21 July, the Council heard further introductory statements by the Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs, the Under-Secretary-General for Political Affairs and the representative of the Regional Bureau for Arab States of the United Nations Development Programme.

53. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), Canada, China, Australia, Bangladesh, Chile and the United States of America. Statements were also made by the representatives of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. The Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs also made a statement.

54. At the 36th meeting, on 22 July, statements were made by the representatives of Brazil, Austria, Yugoslavia, Japan, the Russian Federation and Mexico and the observers for Yemen, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Denmark (on behalf of the Nordic countries) and Lebanon. Statements were also made by the representative of the United Nations International Drug Control Programme and the Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs.

#### Assistance for the reconstruction and development of Lebanon

55. At the 38th meeting, on 27 July, the representative of Kuwait, on behalf of Algeria, Egypt, 4/ France, Jordan, 4/ Kuwait, Lebanon, 4/ Pakistan and the Syrian Arab Republic, introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.31) entitled "Assistance for the reconstruction and development of Lebanon". Subsequently, Italy, Morocco, Spain and Suriname joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

56. At the 41st meeting, on 30 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Guerrero (Philippines), read out a revision which had been agreed upon during informal consultations, whereby in operative paragraph 2, the words "to report to the Economic and Social Council" were replaced by the words "to inform the Council".

57. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft resolution as orally revised. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/42.

58. After the draft resolution was adopted, the representative of Lebanon made a statement.

#### Assistance to Yemen

59. At the 38th meeting, on 27 July, the representative of Algeria, on behalf of Algeria, Iraq, 4/ Suriname, the Syrian Arab Republic, Tunisia 4/ and Yemen, 4/ introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.33) entitled "Assistance to Yemen". Subsequently, Brazil, Colombia, Egypt, 4/ the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, 4/ Malaysia and Morocco joined in sponsoring the draft resolution, which read as follows:

#### "The Economic and Social Council,

"<u>Taking note</u> of the report of the Secretary-General on assistance to Yemen (A/47/283-E/1992/83), "<u>Recognizing</u> the social and economic challenges for Yemen, arising from the merging of the two parts of that country, the returning migrant workers and the increasing number of refugees from Somalia,

"1. <u>Welcomes</u> the Round-table Conference for Yemen, which was held at Geneva on 30 June and 1 July 1992;

"2. <u>Urges</u> the international community to actively contribute to the policy discussions and coordination process initiated by that Conference and, in particular, to the sectoral follow-up meetings and the next round-table conference, scheduled for late 1993;

"3. <u>Calls upon</u> all Governments and regional and international organizations to extend all possible assistance to Yemen so that it may overcome the difficulties arising from the above-mentioned challenges."

60. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July 1992, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Guerrero (Philippines), introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.41) submitted on the basis of informal consultations held on draft resolution E/1992/L.33.

61. At the same meeting, the Council adopted draft resolution E/1992/L.41. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/61.

62. In the light of the adoption of draft resolution E/1992/L.41, draft resolution E/1992/L.33 was withdrawn by the sponsors.

63. After the draft resolution was adopted, the observer for Yemen made a statement.

# F. REPORT OF THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

64. In accordance with Council resolution 1623 (LI) of 30 July 1971, the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees is transmitted to the General Assembly without debate, unless the Council decides otherwise at the specific request of one or more of its members or of the High Commissioner at the time of the adoption of its agenda.

65. At the 38th meeting, on 27 July, the representative of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees made a statement on the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

66. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, the Council took note of the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (E/1992/59). 5/ See Council decision 1992/304.

## G. ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW SUBSIDIARY BODIES OF THE COUNCIL 6/

67. The Council considered the question of the establishment of new subsidiary bodies of the Council at its substantive session (agenda item 21). It had before it a note by the Secretary-General on the proposed consolidated mandates of the new subsidiary bodies, including the draft provisional agendas for the first session of the Commission on Science and Technology for Development and the first session of the Committee on New and Renewable Sources of Energy and on Energy for Development and the draft provisional programme of work for the first session of the Committee on Natural Resources (E/1992/76).

68. The Council considered the item at its 32nd, 34th, 38th and 42nd meetings, on 20, 21, 27 and 31 July 1992. An account of the discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (E/1992/SR.32, 34, 38 and 42).

69. At the 32nd and 34th meetings, the Council held a general discussion on the item. At the 32nd meeting, on 20 July, it heard introductory statements by the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development and the Director of the Division of Economic and Social Council Affairs and Inter-Agency Coordination.

70. At the 34th meeting, on 21 July, statements were made by the representatives of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Economic Community), Austria, the Russian Federation, the United States of America, China, Mexico, Australia, Brazil, Poland, Japan and Colombia and the observers for Cyprus, Kazakhstan and Norway (on behalf of the Nordic countries).

71. At the 38th meeting, on 27 July, the representative of Pakistan (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77), introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.32), entitled "Establishment of new subsidiary bodies of the Economic and Social Council", which read as follows:

"The Economic and Social Council,

"Reaffirming General Assembly resolution 46/235 of 13 April 1992,

"Reaffirming also its decision 1992/218 of 30 April 1992,

"<u>Taking note</u> of the note by the Secretary-General on the proposed consolidated mandates of the new subsidiary bodies of the Council (E/1992/76),

"<u>Bearing in mind</u> that these new subsidiary bodies will contribute to the efforts of the international community towards sustainable development,

"2. <u>Approves</u> the draft provisional agendas and programmes of work for the first sessions of those bodies, as contained in that note;

"3. <u>Invites</u> the General Assembly, in accordance with paragraph 9 of the annex to its resolution 46/235, to consider, at its forty-seventh session, any relevant institutional changes and recommendations made by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at its eighth session and by the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development regarding, in particular, the Committee on Natural Resources and the Committee on New and Renewable Sources of Energy and on Energy for Development."

72. At the 42nd meeting, on 31 July, the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. Amaziane (Morocco), introduced a draft resolution (E/1992/L.40), submitted on the basis of the informal consultations held on draft resolution E/1992/L.32.

73. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution E/1992/L.40. For the final text, see Council resolution 1992/62.

74. In the light of the adoption of draft resolution E/1992/L.40, draft resolution E/1992/L.32 was withdrawn by the sponsors.

2. The 1st meeting was opened by the President of the Economic and Social Council for 1991, Mr. Hocine Djoudi (Algeria). Upon election, the President of the Council for 1992, Mr. Darko Silovic (Yugoslavia), made a statement.

#### A. BUREAU OF THE COUNCIL

3. Pursuant to paragraph 2 (k) of resolution 1988/77, the Council met on 27 January for the purpose of electing its Bureau.

4. At the 1st meeting, on 27 January, the Council elected, by acclamation, Mr. Darko Silovic (Yugoslavia) President of the Council for 1992. The Council also elected, by acclamation, Mr. Juan Somavía (Chile), Mr. Vieri Traxler (Italy) and Mr. Ahmed Amaziane (Morocco) Vice-Presidents of the Council.

6. At the 10th meeting, on 29 June, the Council elected, by acclamation, Mr. Robert Mroziewicz (Poland) President of the Council for 1992 to replace Mr. Darko Silovic (Yugoslavia), who had resigned.

7. The Economic Committee, at its 1st meeting, on 29 June, elected, by acclamation, Mr. Mohamed Mudzakir Sinon (Malaysia) and Mr. Selim Yenel (Turkey) Vice-Chairmen of the Committee.

8. The Social Committee, at its 1st meeting, on 29 June, elected, by acclamation, Mr. Luis Fernando Jaramillo (Colombia) Vice-Chairman of the Committee.

9. At its 6th meeting, on 15 July, the Social Committee elected, by acclamation, Mr. Ileka Atoki (Zaire) Vice-Chairman of the Committee.

16. In accordance with section III, paragraph 5, of the annex to General Assembly resolution 45/264 of 13 May 1991, the Council held a resumed organizational session on 29 and 30 April. At its 4th meeting, on 29 April, it had before it the annotated provisional agenda of the resumed organizational session (E/1992/36).

17. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the agenda of the resumed organizational session (see annex I to the present report).

18. The Council also had before it a draft decision (E/1992/L.17) entitled "Programme of work for the substantive session of 1992 of the Economic and Social Council", submitted by the Acting President on the basis of informal consultations.

19. At the 6th meeting, on 30 April, the representative of Austria made a statement.

20. At the 7th meeting, on 30 April, following explanatory remarks made by its Secretary, the Council adopted the draft decision. For the final text, see Council decision 1992/217.

21. At the 6th meeting, on 30 April, the Council had before it a draft decision (E/1992/L.19) entitled "Reconvening of the resumed organizational session for 1992 of the Economic and Social Council", submitted by the Vice-President of the Council, Mr. José Lino Guerrero (Philippines), on the basis of informal consultations. The Vice-Chairman introduced and orally revised the draft decision.

22. At the same meeting, the Council adopted the draft decision as orally revised. For the final text, see Council decision 1992/219.

23. Pursuant to its decision 1992/219, the Council resumed its organizational session for 1992 on 28 and 29 May.

# CONCLUDING STATEMENT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL ON THE COORDINATION SEGMENT OF THE COUNCIL

1. On the basis of a review of the statements made and the dialogue that took place at the coordination segment, and taking into account the views expressed during informal consultations, the following recommendations have emerged addressed to the Secretary-General and the organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system for enhancing the coordination and coherence of the assistance programmes and activities of the system.

#### A. Eradication of poverty

The Administrative Committee on Coordination (ACC) should undertake this task.

3. ACC should review the existing arrangements and mechanisms for system-wide coordination in the area of poverty and modify them, as appropriate, to encompass poverty issues more comprehensively than at present.

4. The policies and activities of the United Nations system relating to the eradication of poverty should be guided by internationally agreed upon strategies and goals, such as those contained in Agenda 21, the International Development Strategy for the Fourth United Nations Development Decade, the World Declaration on the Survival, Protection and Development of Children, the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s and the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the 1990s.

#### 2. At the country level

5. Eradication of poverty is an essential element of sustainable and human-centred development. Governments have the responsibility to define national priorities and should play the lead role in coordinating United Nations assistance for poverty eradication. The organizations of the system should provide assistance to developing countries, as required, to enhance their institutional capacity for policy formulation and coordination on the implementation of programmes.

6. In all countries where the Government so chooses, a common specific strategy should be developed on ways in which the organizations of the United Nations system can work together to help alleviate poverty. This should be based on national priorities and focus on key areas. It should build upon and complement the respective country programmes of the United Nations organizations and promote links with bilateral donors, other multilateral organizations, the regional commissions and non-governmental organizations. Such a strategy should be prepared under the overall leadership of the Resident Coordinator.

7. All relevant institutions should collaborate in fostering popular participation at the national, regional and local levels in development planning and poverty reduction programmes and projects.

8. Coordinated approaches, taking fully into account the activities of other relevant organizations, should be devised for data collection and the development of social indicators to facilitate shared analysis and assessment of country situations, drawing as far as possible on existing data sources. The Statistical Division of the Department of Economic and Social Development of the United Nations Secretariat and other statistical units of the system should work together towards this end.

9. The Bretton Woods institutions and the other organizations of the United Nations system should collaborate more closely to ensure that poverty alleviation and human development goals, including the advancement of women and the protection of children and other vulnerable groups, are incorporated, as appropriate, into their programmes as well as in the design and implementation of structural adjustment programmes.

10. The analytical capacity within the United Nations system needs to be more closely linked with country-level operational capacities of the system. The Secretary-General should explore ways in which these links could be more effectively forged.

#### 3. Other recommendations

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11. The Secretary-General should report to the Economic and Social Council at its substantive session of 1993, under a single agenda item, on the progress made in implementing these recommendations.

## B. <u>Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)/acquired</u> <u>immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS)</u>

#### 1. At the global level

12. Based on the global strategy for the prevention and control of AIDS, organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system should provide coordinated assistance to developing countries for medium-term plans of national AIDS programmes and ensure a multisectoral response to the pandemic, including efforts for its prevention and control, and the mitigation of its social and economic consequences through the involvement of all sectors of government and society.

13. The global strategy was endorsed as the overall policy framework for coordination of HIV/AIDS activities at all levels. United Nations funds and agencies should consult the World Health Organization (WHO) on strategies for controlling HIV and on the monitoring of control measures, whether or not they are undertaken through the health sector.

14. Effective coordination of HIV/AIDS-related activities should be pursued at the global and national levels and the recommendations made by the WHO Global Programme on AIDS (GPA) Management Committee to establish an AIDS coordination forum at the global level to function as an inclusive consultative mechanism for developing countries, the United Nations system, other intergovernmental organizations, bilateral donors and non-governmental organizations working on AIDS should be further developed along the lines recommended by the GPA Management Committee. A joint proposal should be made by concerned agencies, bodies and organs to the Committee at its ordinary meeting in November 1992.

15. Policy-making at all levels should take into account the changing patterns and effects of the epidemic and the effectiveness of potential interventions to tackle them. Constant evaluation is therefore needed to ensure that policies and strategies remain relevant.

16. The Inter-Agency Advisory Group on AIDS (IAAG), the primary coordinating body for the United Nations system, should be strengthened in order to ensure effective information exchange, discussion of common concerns and coordination of operational activities.

17. The WHO/UNDP Alliance to Combat AIDS should be recognized as a framework for the coordination of external support to national AIDS programmes. WHO should explore the possibility of establishing similar arrangements with other United Nations organizations and bodies.

18. The organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system should develop, in a coordinated manner, measures to tackle the development implications of HIV/AIDS, including research, studies and programmes on prevention, as well as on the socio-economic consequences of the pandemic, with a view to assisting developing countries in formulating policies for mitigating its negative socio-economic impact.

## 2. At the country level

19. The organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system should continue the work under way, along the lines recommended by the GPA Management Committee, to develop detailed proposals on mechanisms for country-level coordination that would strengthen the coordination capacity of the host Government, increase the impact of donor contributions to HIV/AIDS work at the country level, in the health sector and beyond, better enable Governments to request assistance from the organizations of the United Nations system, reflecting the comparative advantage and capacity of each organization and contribute to the development of the public and private sector capacity for HIV/AIDS work at the national level.

20. Greater efforts should be made by the organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system and bilateral donors to support national AIDS programmes and strengthen their capacity to mobilize all possible national resources, and drawing upon and including all levels of government, political and social authorities, the private sector, non-governmental organizations and community-based organizations in a working partnership. 21. Effective in-country coordination of technical assistance should be made a priority objective for all funds and agencies providing assistance for HIV/AIDS activities. The role of the Resident Coordinator should be strengthened in this regard. Governing bodies should request funds and organizations should report regularly on the extent to which coordination objectives set by governing bodies are being achieved within specified countries. Procedures to rectify the situation should be agreed upon if there is evidence that these objectives are not being met.

22. The organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system should make renewed and coordinated efforts with Governments to counter social stigmatization and discrimination against those affected by HIV/AIDS, their families and those with whom they live, and people considered to be at risk of infection.

## 3. Other recommendations

23. The process of dialogue between Governments and the organs, organizations and bodies of the United Nations system initiated at the present session of the Council should be continued. The Secretary-General should invite the Director-General of the World Health Organization, in close collaboration with other appropriate bodies of the United Nations system, to report, through the Secretary-General, to the Council at its substantive session of 1993, under a single agenda item, on the progress made in implementing these recommendations and on the status of the coordination of HIV/AIDS-related activities, including the socio-economic aspects at both the country and the global levels.
