## I. INTRODUCTION

1. At its forty-seventh session, the General Assembly adopted resolution 47/39 of 30 November 1992, entitled "Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction", which reads, inter alia, as follows:

"The General Assembly,

"...

"Welcoming the invitation of the President of the French Republic to participate in a ceremony to sign the Convention in Paris on 13 January 1993,

"1. Commends the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction, as contained in the report of the Conference on Disarmament;

"2. Requests the Secretary-General, as Depositary of the Convention, to open it for signature in Paris on 13 January 1993;

"3. Calls upon all States to sign and, thereafter, according to their respective constitutional processes, to become parties to the Convention at the earliest possible date, thus contributing to its rapid entry into force and to the early achievement of universal adherence;

"4. Also calls upon all States to ensure the effective implementation of this unprecedented, global, comprehensive and verifiable multilateral disarmament agreement, thereby enhancing cooperative multilateralism as a basis for international peace and security;

"5. Also requests the Secretary-General to provide such services as may be requested by the signatory States to initiate the work of the Preparatory Commission for the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons;

"6. Further requests the Secretary-General, as Depositary of the Convention, to report to the General Assembly at its forty-eighth session on the status of signatures and ratifications of the Convention."

2. Pursuant to the resolution, the Secretary-General, in his capacity as Depositary of the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction, opened the Convention for signature in Paris on 13 January 1993. The signing ceremony was held in Paris from 13 to 15 January 1993 and 130 Governments signed the Convention at that time. The Convention is open for signature at United Nations Headquarters, New York.

3. As at 15 August 1993, the Convention had been signed by 148 States, and 4 States had ratified it. The status of signatures and ratifications of the

Convention for the period under review, that is from 13 January to 15 August 1993, is indicated in section II of the present report.

1. Upon signature, the Governments of Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Portugal, Spain and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland made, mutatis mutandis, the following declaration:

"As a Member State of the European Community, the [name of State] will implement the provisions of the Convention on the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons, in accordance with its obligations arising from the rules of the Treaties establishing the European Communities to the extent that such rules are applicable."

2. Upon signature, the Government of China made the following declaration:

[Original: Chinese]

"I. China has consistently stood for the complete prohibition and thorough destruction of all chemical weapons and their production facilities. The Convention constitutes the legal basis for the realization of this goal. China therefore supports the object and purpose and principles of the Convention.

"II. The object and purpose and principles of the Convention should be strictly abided by. The relevant provisions on challenge inspection should not be abused to the detriment of the security interests of States Parties unrelated to chemical weapons. Otherwise the universality of the Convention is bound to be adversely affected.

"III. States Parties that have abandoned chemical weapons on the territories of other States Parties should implement in earnest the

relevant provisions of the Convention and undertake the obligation to destroy the abandoned chemical weapons.

"IV. The Convention should effectively facilitate trade, scientific and technological exchanges and cooperation in the field of chemistry for peaceful purposes. All export controls inconsistent with the Convention should be abolished."
