ANNEX

Statement issued by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs
of Kazakhstan on 11 August 1997

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs is authorized to state that the Government of the Republic of Kazakhstan adopted a decision on 6 August 1997 proclaiming a ban on the export of anti-personnel mines, including the re-export and transit thereof.

Kazakhstan shares the international community's growing concern at the vast numbers of victims caused throughout the world by the use of anti-personnel mines. At present some 110 million mines in more than 70 countries continue to maim and kill civilians every day. It is for this reason that anti-personnel mines have been called "delayed-action weapons of mass destruction".

This serious problem of global significance can only be solved through joint international action to limit the use of, and access to, anti-personnel mines and, ultimately, to ban their use altogether.

This unilateral moratorium by Kazakhstan supports the relevant resolutions of the United Nations General Assembly and constitutes an expression of Kazakhstan's commitment to strengthening international peace and security.
