

Destruction of 4,092 landmines by Zimbabwe Defence Forces on 15 November 2000

The Zimbabwe Defence Forces (ZDF) destroyed 4,092 anti-personnel landmines on 15 November 2000. The destruction was witnessed by ambassadors, high commissioners and representatives of international organizations and various non-governmental organizations.

ZDF destroyed 3,846 PLMD6 and 246 R2M2 anti-personnel mines. Only 500 PLMD6 and 200 R2M2 anti-personnel mines were retained for training purposes.

The Parliament of Zimbabwe approved the Anti-Personnel Mines (Prohibition) Bill 2000 on Thursday, 2 November 2000. The bill now awaits endorsement by His Excellency the President of the Republic of Zimbabwe.
