Overview

- 4.1 General and complete disarmament under strict and effective international control remains the ultimate goal of all efforts exerted in the field of disarmament. The main responsibilities for disarmament lie with Member States. The United Nations, in accordance with its Charter, has a central role and primary responsibility in supporting Member States in this area.
- 4.2 The mandate for the programme derives from the priorities established in relevant General Assembly resolutions and decisions in the field of disarmament, including the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, the first special session devoted to disarmament (resolution S-10/2). The programme is also guided by the United Nations Millennium Declaration (see resolution 55/2) and takes into account other relevant resolutions of the United Nations. Weapons of mass destruction, in particular nuclear weapons, continue to be of primary concern to the Organization. Conventional disarmament, especially with regard to major weapons systems, small arms and light weapons and landmines, has received growing attention from the international community over the past few years.
- 4.3 Within the Secretariat, substantive responsibility for the programme is vested in the Office for Disarmament Affairs. The strategy of the Office in meeting the programme's objectives is designed around five subprogrammes and is based on its role in and responsibility for facilitating and encouraging, as appropriate, disarmament and non-proliferation measures at all levels. The Office will continue to assist Member States in promoting, strengthening and consolidating multilaterally negotiated principles and norms in all areas of disarmament and non-proliferation in all its aspects. It will support efforts of Member States in the areas of disarmament and non-proliferation in all its aspects in order to help maintain international peace and security and contribute to global efforts against terrorism. The Office will continue to promote and facilitate efforts for further implementation of the Programme of Action adopted at the United Nations Conference on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects, as well as practical disarmament measures. It will promote transparency, based on the principle of undiminished security for all, and confidence-building measures in the field of disarmament. Through its Regional Centres for Peace and Disarmament, the Office will assist Member States in promoting regional approaches to disarmament, non-proliferation in all its aspects and regional and international peace and security. It will also continue to contribute to efforts to enhance disarmament expertise in Member States, particularly in developing countries.
- 4.4 The Office will seek to achieve the objectives of the programme by facilitating the process of multilateral deliberation and negotiation. This will include providing substantive organizational support to the First Committee, the Disarmament Commission and other subsidiary bodies of the General Assembly, the Conference on Disarmament and its subsidiary bodies, review conferences and other meetings of parties to multilateral disarmament agreements, as well as to expert groups mandated by the Assembly. This will also include monitoring and assessing current and future trends in the field of disarmament, non-proliferation in all its aspects and international security.
- 4.5 The Office will continue to be a source of impartial and factual information on disarmament and security-related matters for Member States, organizations of the United Nations system, intergovernmental and regional organizations and non-governmental organizations and will expand its educational outreach programmes. Training and advisory services will continue to be provided, through the United Nations disarmament fellowship, training and advisory services programme and the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), to Member States, in particular developing countries, to enable them to enhance their expertise in disarmament, so that they may participate more effectively in international deliberating and negotiating forums. The Office will

also assist Member States in increasing understanding of the relationship between disarmament and development.

- 4.6 Gender mainstreaming will continue to be an integral part of the activities of the programme through the implementation of a gender plan of action aimed at raising awareness and increasing commitment to and capacity for gender mainstreaming in disarmament affairs.
- 4.7 The Department carries out its activities in cooperation with other departments and offices of the Secretariat, entities of the United Nations system and entities external to the United Nations, including treaty organizations, intergovernmental, interregional, regional and national organizations, non-governmental organizations and academic communities. Such cooperation includes the preparation of reports, participation in meetings, briefings, technical and substantive support and sharing of information and experience.
- 4.8 The expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement for the Office in the biennium 2008-2009 are detailed, together with resources under executive direction and management and the programme of work.
- 4.9 The issue of publications as a part of the programme of work has been reviewed in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as summarized in table 4.1 below and as described in the output information for each subprogramme.

- 4.10 The overall level of resources for the Office for Disarmament Affairs for the biennium 2008-2009 amounts to \$20,580,700, at 2006-2007 rates, reflecting growth of \$109,200 (0.5 per cent). The growth in table 4.3 can be summarized as follows:
 - (a) The net decrease of \$5,100 under policymaking organs relates to non-post costs for travel and is based on current expenditure patterns;
 - (b) The net decrease of \$322,300 under executive direction and management relates to the redeployment of a P-4 post to subprogramme 5;
 - (c) The net increase of \$493,800 under programme of work relates to:
 - (i) A net decrease of \$49,300 under subprogramme 2 resulting from a reduction in non-post requirements for consultants owing to completion of the report on the issue of missiles in all its aspects;
 - (ii) A net increase of \$566,500 under subprogramme 3 reflecting the delayed impact of the new P-5 post established in the biennium 2006-2007 and additional non-post requirements owing to substantive support to more ad hoc expert group meetings;
 - (iii) A net decrease of \$238,200 under subprogramme 4 for non-post requirements owing to completion of the work of the panel of government experts on the question of verification in all its aspects;

- (iv) A net increase of \$214,800 under subprogramme 5 resulting from the inward redeployment of a P-4 post from executive direction and management and an increase for travel of staff, mainly for the Directors of the Regional Centres for Peace and Disarmament;
 - (d) The decrease of \$57,200 under programme support for non-post requirements is attributable to reduced requirements for communication costs, office equipment and supplies.
- 4.11 The estimated extrabudgetary resources, amounting to \$10,027,400, include the amount of \$4,388,900 for the Trust Fund for UNIDIR.
- 4.12 By its resolution 61/257, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit to it, as soon as possible following the appointment of the High Representative for Disarmament Affairs, a report, in accordance with established procedures, on the financial, administrative and budgetary implications arising from the appointment of the High Representative and the implementation of the mandates assigned to the Office for Disarmament Affairs. Accordingly, those implications have not been included in the present budget proposal. Decisions of the Assembly following consideration of the requested report would be incorporated at the time of adoption of the programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009 in December 2007.
- 4.13 Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation activities would amount to \$134,000, \$128,100 of which will be funded from the regular budget and \$5,900 from extrabudgetary resources.
- 4.14 The percentage distribution of resources under this section is as shown in table 4.2.

A. Policymaking organs: Conference on Disarmament

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$44,400

- 4.16 The Conference on Disarmament was set up in accordance with paragraph 120 of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly (resolution S-10/2) as the single multilateral disarmament negotiating forum of the international community. Following the expansions of its membership in 1996 and 1999, the Conference is open to the five nuclear-weapon States and 60 other States, including key militarily significant States. In addition, every year some 40 non-member States are invited, upon their request, to participate in its work. The Conference on Disarmament conducts its work by consensus, adopts its own rules of procedure, rotates its presidency among all its members every four weeks, adopts its own agenda taking into account the recommendations made to it by the Assembly and the proposals presented by the members of the Conference, and submits a report to the Assembly annually, or more frequently, as appropriate. The Conference divides its 24-week annual session into three parts and, if necessary, continues its negotiations on priority issues between sessions. Meetings may thus take place during six to nine months each year.
- 4.17 Pursuant to paragraph 120 (c) of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, the Secretary-General, following consultations with the Conference on Disarmament, appoints the Secretary-General of the Conference, who also acts as his Personal Representative, to assist the Conference and its Presidents in organizing the Conference. As requested by the Assembly in its resolution 34/83 L, the Secretary-General provides staff, as well as the assistance and services needed by the Conference and any subsidiary bodies that it might establish, in accordance with the arrangements contained in its rules of procedure. The secretariat of the Conference consists of officers of the Conference secretariat and Conference Support Branch (Geneva) of the Office for Disarmament Affairs.
- 4.18 The Conference on Disarmament successfully concluded the negotiation of the Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on Their Destruction (1992) and the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty (1996), with the participation of all five nuclear-weapon States and other militarily significant States. The Conference is currently conducting a comprehensive review of the priorities on the contemporary international disarmament agenda.

- 4.19 The non-post resources provide for travel of Geneva-based officials to attend meetings of the General Assembly and its subsidiary bodies as well as other consultations and meetings hosted at Headquarters. The reduction (\$5,100) is based on the pattern of expenditures.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,684,100

- 4.20 Executive direction and management of the programme consists of the Office of the High Representative and the Office of the Director.
- 4.21 The Office of the High Representative is responsible for the implementation of the programme of work, as well as for the overall direction, supervision and management of the Office for Disarmament Affairs, including its financial and administrative activities. The High Representative provides the Secretary-General with advice and support on all disarmament and related security matters, represents him in that respect, as required, and provides authoritative analysis and assessment of developments in the field of disarmament, non-proliferation in all its aspects and international security for policy guidance and decision-making purposes.
- 4.22 In the exercise of his/her responsibilities, the High Representative is assisted by the Director, who acts as deputy and assumes charge of the Office for Disarmament Affairs in the absence of the High Representative. The Director provides support to the High Representative on executive direction and management of the Office for Disarmament Affairs; ensures efficient coordination and the delivery of the programmatic mandates of the Office for Disarmament Affairs; and advises the High Representative and makes recommendations on all substantive, organizational, administrative, personnel and budgetary matters. The Office of the Director is responsible for coordinating the work of the Office for Disarmament Affairs and its outputs. The Director is accountable to the High Representative.

- 4.23 The amount of \$2,604,400, representing a decrease of \$322,300, provides for the continuation of five posts in the Professional category and above and three posts in the General Service category as well as non-post resources for temporary assistance, overtime and travel of staff. The decrease is attributable to the redeployment of one P-4 post to subprogramme 5, Regional disarmament, to strengthen the capacity of the subprogramme in advocacy and outreach of activities in support of regional disarmament, in particular for developing project proposals, as well as resource mobilization strategies and tools.

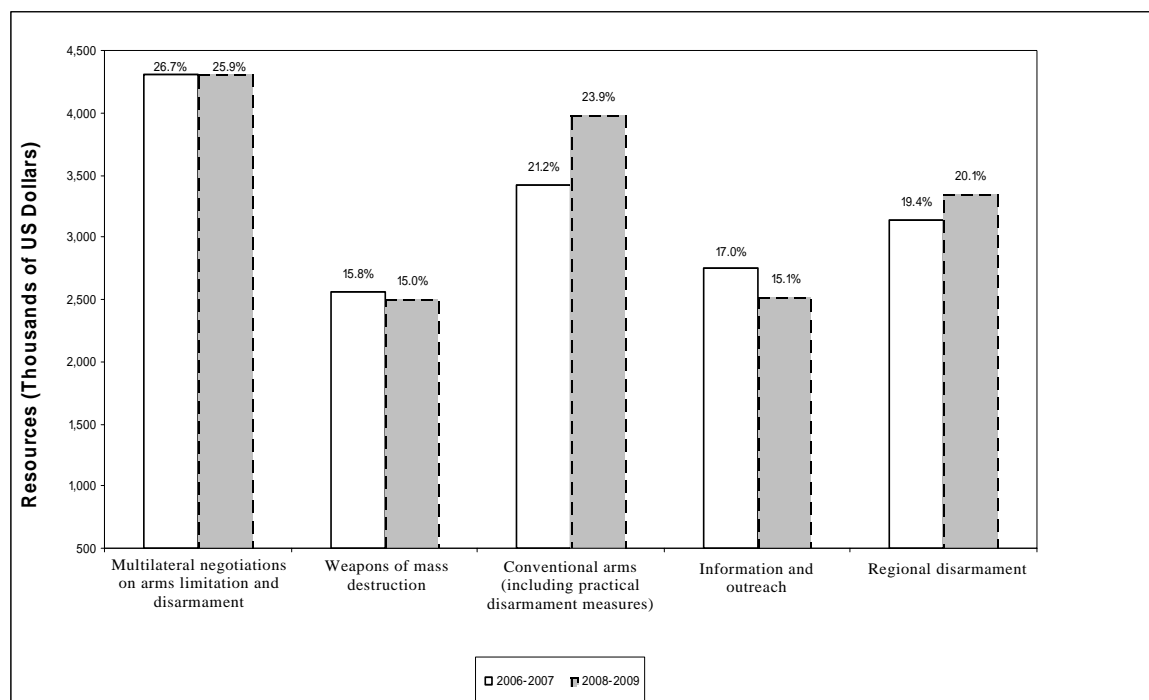

Subprogramme 1

Multilateral negotiations on arms limitation and disarmament

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$4,307,600

- 4.24 The subprogramme is implemented by the Conference on Disarmament Secretariat and Conference Support Branch in Geneva, which will continue to provide substantive and organizational support to the Conference on Disarmament and to the conferences and meetings of States parties to multilateral arms limitation and disarmament agreements. The Branch will also assist Member States, in particular developing countries, in the enhancement of expertise in the field of arms limitation and disarmament through the implementation of the United Nations fellowship, training and advisory services programme. The end-users of this subprogramme are Member States, States parties to multilateral disarmament agreements, intergovernmental organizations and institutions involved in arms limitation and disarmament.

- 4.25 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) the political environment will be supportive of disarmament efforts; (b) political developments relating to international peace and security will be conducive to facilitation of negotiations of new arms limitation and disarmament agreements; (c) negotiating parties will exercise the necessary degree of flexibility and accommodation in addressing their respective security concerns; (d) Member States will be willing to implement the recommendations, resolutions and decisions of relevant meetings and conferences; and (e) national institutions will be supportive of mainstreaming gender in disarmament, peace and security.

Outputs

- 4.26 During the biennium 2008-2009, the following final outputs will be delivered:

- 4.31 The amount of \$2,506,100 will provide for the continuation of six posts in the Professional category and above and two General Service posts. The non-post resources will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts, and travel of staff. Conventional arms (including practical disarmament measures)

- 4.32 The Conventional Arms Branch is responsible for the implementation of the subprogramme. The subprogramme will continue to face challenges and responsibilities stemming from the conclusion of the negotiations concerning the development of an international instrument to enable States to identify and trace, in a timely and reliable manner, illicit small arms and light weapons; the continuing implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects; the operation of the Coordinating

Action on Small Arms mechanism; follow-up to the recommendations of the Group of Governmental Experts to consider further steps to enhance international cooperation to prevent, combat and eradicate illicit brokering in small arms and light weapons; the continued progress towards universal participation in the United Nations Register of Conventional Arms and the standardized instrument for reporting military expenditures; support to the High-level Steering Group on Disarmament and Development; the substantive servicing of governmental expert groups and other meetings in the area of conventional arms; and an increase in requests for assistance from Member States.

- 4.36 The amount of \$2,737,200 will provide for the continuation of 10 posts and reflects the delayed impact of the new P-5 post (\$178,100) established in the biennium 2006-2007. The non-post requirements, reflecting an increase of \$388,400, will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts, and travel. The growth relates to (a) general temporary assistance for substantive support to the groups of governmental experts on an arms trade treaty and on ammunition, and to the preparations for the third biennial meeting of States to consider the implementation of the Programme of Action on small arms and light weapons; and (b) consultants and experts resulting from additional requirements owing to an increase in the number of expert group meetings from six in the biennium 2006-2007 to nine in the biennium 2008-2009, partially offset by the discontinuation of the non-recurrent requirements approved for the biennium 2006-2007 for the Group of Governmental Experts on the United Nations Register of Conventional Arms.

Information and outreach

- 4.37 The subprogramme is implemented by the Information and Outreach Branch, which will continue to provide objective, impartial and up-to-date information on multilateral disarmament issues and activities to its end-users: Member States, States parties to multilateral agreements, intergovernmental organizations and institutions, departments and agencies of the United Nations system, research and educational institutions, civil society, especially non-governmental organizations, the media and the general public.

- 4.38 Outreach activities carried out under this subprogramme cover all aspects of multilateral disarmament, with emphasis on the Office's substantive priority areas of weapons of mass destruction and conventional weapons, in particular small arms and light weapons. The Branch will continue to carry out information and education activities in coordination with the other branches and departments, most notably the Department of Public Information, as well as with civil society organizations, especially non-governmental and academic organizations. Special attention will continue to be focused on fostering implementation by Governments, other United Nations organizations and civil society organizations of the recommendations of the 2002 United Nations study on disarmament and non-proliferation education, and on increasing the Branch's own activities in this regard. The subprogramme will continue to expand its use of the electronic medium for dissemination and exchange of information with specialized web pages and e-mailing lists.

- 4.41 The amount of \$2,511,400, reflecting an increase of \$238,200, will continue to provide for eight posts and non-post resources for other staff costs, consultants and experts, and travel. The decrease in non-post resources (\$238,200) is mainly attributable to the completion of the work of the Panel of Government Experts on Verification in All Its Aspects emanating from General Assembly resolution 59/60.

Subprogramme 5

Regional disarmament

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$3,345,700

- 4.42 It has been generally recognized that regional disarmament could play a vital role in promoting and enhancing international efforts towards global disarmament. Accordingly, this subprogramme is aimed at promoting and strengthening regional and subregional initiatives with a view to promoting and strengthening international peace and security.
- 4.43 The subprogramme will be implemented by the Regional Disarmament Branch, comprising the Regional Activities Unit in New York, the Regional Centre for Peace and Disarmament in Africa, the Regional Centre for Peace and Disarmament in Asia and the Pacific and the Regional Centre for Peace, Disarmament and Development in Latin America and the Caribbean.

- 4.46 The amount of \$3,345,700, reflecting a growth of \$214,800, will provide for 10 posts and non-post resources for other staff costs, consultants and experts, and travel, in particular relating to support for meetings of the Standing Advisory Committee on Security Questions in Central Africa. The growth is related to the inward redeployment of a P-4 post from executive direction and management and an increase for travel, mainly for the Directors of the Regional Centres to participate in meetings, partially offset by a decrease in the provision for consultants and experts owing to lower requirements in connection with the convening of the ministerial and other meetings of the Standing Advisory Committee.

D. Programme support

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$1,195,000

- 4.47 The Executive Office provides support services to the Office for Disarmament Affairs in connection with personnel, budgetary and financial administration, resource planning and use of common services, together with administrative support to policymaking organs and other meetings, as required.

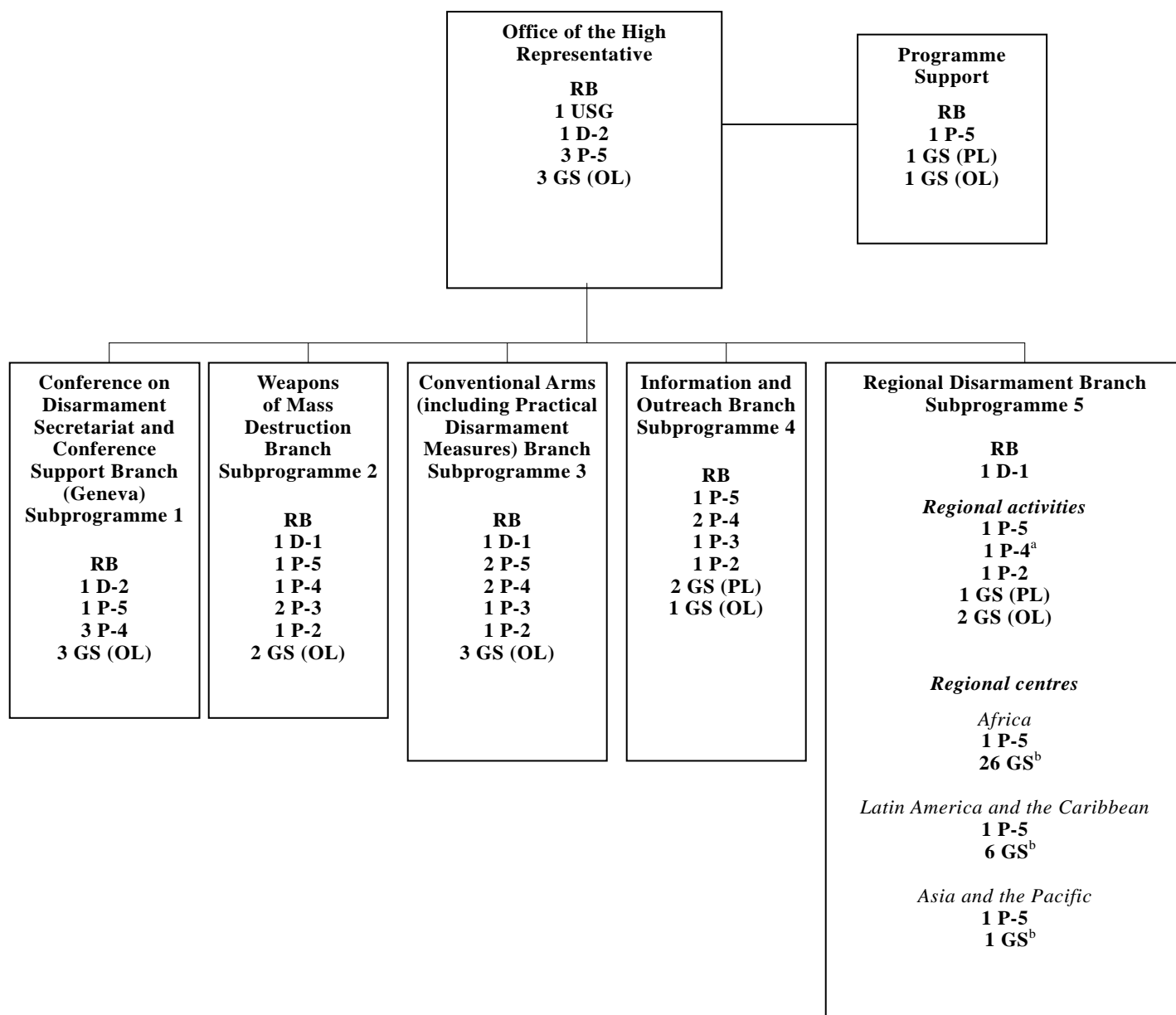
