Overview

- 15.1 The Medium-Term Strategic and Institutional Plan was approved by the Governing Council of the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) during its twenty-first session in April 2007 through its resolution HSP/GC/21/1. The Plan seeks to sharpen the UN-Habitat programme focus, promote alignment and coherence, and strengthen its catalytic role for the coordinated implementation of the Habitat Agenda and human settlements-related internationally agreed development goals. This strategic framework has been revised to align it with the approved Plan, in accordance with resolution HSP/GC/21/2.
- 15.2 The approval of the Medium-Term Strategic and Institutional Plan will have short-, medium- and long-term implications for the strategic framework and the work programme and budget for 2008-2009 and beyond. They include minor adjustments, substantive changes and the introduction of new working methods to ensure sharpened focus, programme alignment and strengthened results-based management. These changes will necessarily take place over time owing to ongoing obligations and the predominantly earmarked nature of the budget.
- 15.3 Responsibility for human settlements is vested in UN-Habitat, which serves as the focal point for implementation of the programme within the United Nations system. The current mandate of UN-Habitat derives from the twin goals of the Habitat Agenda, resulting from the United Nations Conference on Human Settlements (Habitat II), which comprise “adequate shelter for all” and “sustainable human settlements development in an urbanizing world”. The mandate of the programme also derives from: resolution 3327 (XXIX), in which the General Assembly established the United Nations Habitat and Human Settlements Foundation; resolution 32/162, in which the Assembly established the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat); and resolution 56/206, by which the Assembly elevated the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat) to the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat). UN-Habitat is guided by its Governing Council, which reports every two years to the General Assembly through the Economic and Social Council and by a Committee of Permanent Representatives in Nairobi, which serves as a formal intersessional body. Important recent mandates derive from the Declaration on Cities and other Human Settlements in the New Millennium, which was adopted by the Assembly in its resolution S-25/2, other internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the United Nations Millennium Declaration, such as the target of achieving a significant improvement in the lives of at least 100 million slum-dwellers by the year 2020, and in the outcomes of the major United Nations conferences and international agreements since 1992, such as target 10 on water and sanitation of the Johannesburg Plan of Implementation. The aforementioned two targets were subsequently reaffirmed by the General Assembly in the 2005 World Summit Outcome, which highlighted slum prevention as a priority issue in human settlements. Additional mandates come from relevant legislative bodies regarding Agenda 21 (chaps. 7, 21 and 28) and relevant resolutions of the Governing Council of UN-Habitat.
- 15.4 The world urban population is currently expanding at the rate of about 70 million people per year. About 95 per cent of all urban growth is taking place in developing countries, where 1 billion people live in overcrowded and life-threatening slums. The main challenges are chaotic urban expansion, inadequate housing, lack of secure tenure, uncertain employment and lack of basic services, especially safe water and sanitation. Rapid urbanization in most developing countries is characterized by deterioration in shelter conditions for the urban poor, while conflicts and disasters compound the daunting task of creating sustainable human settlements. Central to meeting the challenge of urban poverty is the replacement of policies that foster social and physical exclusion with policies that recognize and respect the rights of all, especially women, people living in poverty and those belonging to vulnerable and disadvantaged groups, to an adequate standard of living for themselves and their families, including adequate food, clothing, housing, water and

sanitation, and the continuous improvement of living conditions. In consultation and cooperation with Governments, UN-Habitat develops and strengthens mechanisms for monitoring the impact of human settlements policies and programmes on the lives and livelihoods of women, men, youth and children in cities, especially those in low-income areas and slums.

- 15.5 The UN-Habitat programme consists of four strongly interlinked subprogrammes, namely: shelter and sustainable human settlements development; monitoring the Habitat Agenda; regional and technical cooperation; and human settlements financing. The interlinkages will be reflected in the close cooperation among the subprogrammes, with the global campaign on sustainable urbanization providing an entry point for all work programme activities.
- 15.6 The strategy of UN-Habitat in meeting its mandates rests upon four pillars that correspond to its four subprogrammes:
 - (a) Advocacy of agreed norms for improving the lives of poor people, particularly slum-dwellers, and building the capacity of central Governments and local authorities using as primary vehicles the global campaign on sustainable urbanization (subprogramme 1: Shelter and sustainable human settlements development);
 - (b) Information generation and knowledge management for assessing progress made in implementing the Habitat Agenda and monitoring human settlements conditions and trends, with a particular focus on slum formation and the living conditions of slum-dwellers (subprogramme 2: Monitoring the Habitat Agenda);
 - (c) Operational activities focusing on technical assistance and capacity-building to test methods and concepts to be scaled up and transferred and to provide feedback to policymakers at all levels (subprogramme 3: Regional and technical cooperation);
 - (d) Facilitating pro-poor financing of housing and urban infrastructure and services that contribute to sustainable human settlements development and the improvement of living conditions of slum-dwellers (subprogramme 4: Human settlements financing).
- 15.7 This strategic framework has incorporated the outcome of the strategic planning and institutional development exercise initiated in 2005. In addition, it has also taken into consideration the recommendations of an in-depth evaluation of the programme completed by the Office of Internal Oversight Services in 2005 (E/AC.51/2005/3) and endorsed by the Governing Council of UN-Habitat at its twentieth session, in 2005. The recommendations called for the strengthening of the programme's normative focus, greater cohesion among its advocacy, normative, monitoring and operational activities, and the broadening of the programme's funding base. The first phase of the exercise, carried out throughout 2006, focused on the development, through a consultative process, of the 2008-2013 medium-term strategic and institutional plan presented to the Governing Council at its twenty-first session in 2007. The plan identifies five substantive focus areas, each with an objective and corresponding indicators of achievement. These focus areas comprise: effective advocacy, monitoring and partnerships; participatory urban planning, management and governance; pro-poor land and housing; environmentally sound basic infrastructure and affordable services; and strengthened human settlements finance systems. A sixth focus area, excellence in management, was also identified. The five substantive focus areas form the basis of an enhanced normative and operational framework consisting of a strengthened partnership and networking strategy and an integrated programme of activities at the global, regional, national and local levels.
- 15.8 Some elements of the medium-term strategic and institutional plan reflected in the present document include the following:
 - (a) The strengthening of the programme's normative activities, spearheaded by a revitalized and integrated global campaign on sustainable urbanization, through its tightened relationship

with global programmes and their alignment with the Millennium Declaration target on slums (see para. 40 below);

- (b) The reallocation of urban and housing finance activities previously subsumed under subprogramme 2 (Monitoring the Habitat Agenda), and water, sanitation and infrastructure activities, previously under subprogramme 1 (Shelter and sustainable human settlements development), to subprogramme 4 (Human settlements financing) which seeks to ensure greater cohesiveness among substantively related activities;
 - (c) Preliminary revision of the expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement in line with the medium-term strategic and institutional plan.
- 15.9 UN-Habitat will continue to mainstream the gender perspective in human settlements issues and empower women. The programme's efforts in promoting women's access to shelter were further endorsed by the General Assembly in the 2005 World Summit Outcome (see resolution 60/1, para. 58) by guaranteeing women's free and equal rights to own and inherit property and ensuring security of tenure of property and housing.
- 15.10 The work of UN-Habitat is concentrated in developing countries, countries with economies in transition and in countries in need of effective post-conflict and post-disaster recovery and reconstruction. As the focal point for the implementation of the human settlements programme within the United Nations system, UN-Habitat will collaborate and cooperate with other United Nations organizations. Outside the United Nations, UN-Habitat will also cooperate with Governments, local authorities, international financial institutions, regional development banks, the private sector and other Habitat Agenda partners. A significant mechanism for cooperation with Governments and Habitat Agenda partners is the World Urban Forum, which is held every two years to address pressing human settlements issues. The next meeting of the Forum will take place in Nanjing, China, in October 2008.
- 15.11 Pursuant to the request by the General Assembly in its resolutions 56/253 and 57/292 to further strengthen the United Nations Office at Nairobi, proposals for strengthening the programme budget component of the Office are included in section 28G, Administration, Nairobi, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009. Those proposals include the establishment of 36 new posts (2 P-3, 1 National Officer and 33 local level) under the 2008-2009 proposed programme budget, out of which 34 posts (1 P-3 and 33 local level), are in place of those posts that are currently funded from extrabudgetary resources of UN-Habitat and UNEP to provide administrative services. The proposals would therefore result in releasing UN-Habitat and UNEP extrabudgetary resources from administrative activities for reprogramming for substantive activities.
- 15.12 The issue of publications has been reviewed as part of the programme of work. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as shown below in table 15.1 and as distributed in the output information for executive direction and management and for each subprogramme.

- 15.13 The overall resources required for the biennium 2008-2009 for this section amount to \$18,439,100 before recosting, reflecting an increase of \$149,700, or 0.8 per cent. The proposed changes, reflected in table 15.3 below, are summarized as follows:
- (a) An increase of \$7,000 under policymaking organs relates to non-post requirements to service the twenty-second session of the Governing Council of UN-Habitat during the biennium 2008-2009;
 - (b) An increase of \$669,900 under executive direction and management relates to post and non-post requirements. In particular, the increase relates to the reclassification of 1 D-1 post to D-2 for the New York office, and inward redeployment of 3 posts (1 P-5 Chief, Monitoring and Evaluation, 1 P-5 Chief, Information Section and 1 P-3 Information and Technology Officer). The increase is partly offset by the outward redeployment of 1 P-4 post to the Support Division to perform functions relating to programme and management oversight;
 - (c) A decrease of \$822,500 under programme of work, results from:
 - (i) A net decrease of \$1,323,000 for both post and non-post requirements under subprogramme 1, resulting from the outward redeployment of 6 posts (2 P-4, 1 P-3 and 1 P-2 Human Settlements Officers and 2 local level) to subprogramme 4;
 - (ii) A net decrease of \$1,375,000 for post and non-post requirements under subprogramme 2, resulting from the outward redeployment of 3 posts (1 P-5 Chief, Monitoring and Evaluation, 1 P-5 Chief, Information Section, and 1 P-3 Information and Technology Officer) to Executive direction and management, and 2 posts (1 P-4 and 1 P-3 Human Settlements Officers) to subprogramme 4. The decrease is partially offset by the full funding of 1 P-3 post approved in the biennium 2006-2007;
 - (iii) An increase of \$1,875,500 under subprogramme 4 arises from the inward redeployment of 2 posts (1 P-4 and 1 P-3 Human Settlements Officers) from subprogramme 2, and 6 posts (2 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2 Human Settlements Officers and 2 local level), including the branch, from the Water, Sanitation and Infrastructure Branch, previously under subprogramme 1.
- 15.14 During the biennium 2008-2009, expected extrabudgetary resources amounting to \$242,138,500, or 92.2 per cent of the total resources available to the programme, will supplement resources from the United Nations regular budget, estimated at 7.8 per cent. The extrabudgetary resources are used to finance technical cooperation activities, which are a central feature of the programme. The existing arrangements for intergovernmental review and management of those extrabudgetary funds provide for the Governing Council of UN-Habitat to approve biennial budgets governing the use of such extrabudgetary resources.
- 15.15 The monitoring and evaluation functions of UN-Habitat are managed and coordinated by the Monitoring and Evaluation Unit. The Unit, which is organizationally placed under executive direction and management, is tasked with the responsibility of improving monitoring and evaluation systems and coordinating monitoring and evaluation activities of UN-Habitat towards planned objectives, realizing the expected accomplishments and improving the organizational accountability of UN-Habitat. It is estimated that for the biennium 2008-2009, resources amounting to \$2,655,200, consisting of \$570,500 under the regular budget and \$2,084,700 under extrabudgetary resources, will be required to carry out the planned activities.
- 15.16 The estimated distribution of the total resources under this section for the biennium 2008-2009 is as shown, in percentage, in table 15.2 below.

A. Policymaking organs

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$42,200

- 15.17 In its resolution 56/206, the General Assembly transformed the Commission on Human Settlements into the Governing Council of UN-Habitat, a subsidiary body of the Assembly, with effect from 1 January 2002. The Governing Council reports to the Assembly through the Economic and Social Council and provides overall policy guidance, direction and supervision to UN-Habitat. The Committee of Permanent Representatives to UN-Habitat was also transformed into an intersessional subsidiary body of the Governing Council. The objectives, functions and responsibilities of the Governing Council are set out in Assembly resolution 32/162 and in paragraph 222 of the Habitat Agenda, which was adopted at Habitat II.
- 15.18 The Governing Council is composed of 58 Member States, which have a membership term of four years. It holds its regular sessions biennially at the headquarters of UN-Habitat in Nairobi. During the sessions, the Governing Council reviews the biennial programme of work of UN-Habitat, the budget of the United Nations Habitat and Human Settlements Foundation, as well as the operational activities that are carried out by UN-Habitat. The sessions bring together representatives of Member States as well as Habitat Agenda partners, which comprise local authorities, non-governmental organizations, the private sector, the Global Parliamentarians on Habitat, women's groups, Youth for Habitat, trade unions, professionals and researchers, foundations and academies of science. The Committee of Permanent Representatives normally meets eight times during a biennium, while its two working groups hold approximately

72 meetings in a biennium. The Governing Council, its intersessional subsidiary body, the Committee of Permanent Representatives and the Committee's two working groups are serviced by the secretariat of the Governing Council, External Relations and Inter-Agency Affairs Section of UN-Habitat.

- 15.19 The provision of \$42,200 covers overtime requirements for substantive servicing of the meetings of the Governing Council of UN-Habitat (\$34,600) and hospitality requirements during its biennial sessions (\$7,600).

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$4,014,000

- 15.20 Executive direction and management is under the responsibility of the Executive Director, whose office includes the Deputy Executive Director, the Monitoring and Evaluation Unit, Information Services and the UN-Habitat liaison offices in New York, Geneva and Brussels. The Executive Director provides overall direction and coordination in the management of the implementation of the organization's work programme and its relations with Member States, United Nations offices, programmes, funds, agencies and other UN-Habitat partners in coordinating the system-wide implementation of the Habitat Agenda, the Millennium Declaration targets and relevant paragraphs (paras. 56 (h) and 56 (m)), of resolution 60/1 on the 2005 World Summit Outcome.
- 15.21 A major new development for the biennium will be the implementation of the Medium-Term Strategic and Institutional Plan for 2008-2013 and a resource mobilization and communication strategy, as approved by the Governing Council at its twentieth session. During this and two subsequent bienniums, the Office of Executive Direction and Management will coordinate, drive and monitor all activities outlined in the Plan through a new set of policies, strategies and achievement indicators.
- 15.22 As called for at the twentieth session of the Governing Council, the implementation of the Plan, adopted at the twenty-first session, will focus on strengthening the UN-Habitat catalytic role in supporting efforts by Member States to implement the Habitat Agenda and the humans settlements-related Millennium Development Goals, sharpen the focus of the activities of UN-Habitat, forge alignment between normative and operational activities, and focus on pre-investment capacity-building to bring pilot initiatives to scale. The Executive Director will establish task forces for developing country strategies for One-UN pilot countries and other selected countries. An assessment of institutional arrangements and governance structure will be undertaken and a report

prepared for the twenty-second session of the Governing Council. A resource mobilization and communication strategy will considerably enhance the fund-raising activities of the Programme, through efforts to broaden its donor base and appeal.

- 15.23 The biennium will be marked by improved capacity and more rational use of resources in servicing the Governing Council, its subsidiary body, the Committee of Permanent Representatives, the regional ministers' meetings on housing and urban development that were established for Africa and Asia and the Pacific in the previous biennium, and the World Urban Forum. All these meetings form an integral part of the advocacy role of UN-Habitat in mainstreaming the Habitat Agenda and building awareness of the urbanization and urban poverty agenda. They will henceforth be centralized within Executive Direction and Management to ensure consistency and alignment between all subprogrammes and further leverage the work of the Global Campaign on Sustainable Urbanization.
- 15.24 The Monitoring and Evaluation Unit is responsible for monitoring the implementation of the work programme and evaluating the activities and outcomes of the programme. The Unit will monitor, evaluate and report on programme implementation, generate periodic progress reports on the implementation of the work programme, provide updates on the delivery of outputs, challenges encountered, results achieved, best practices identified and lessons learned. Self-evaluations will also be undertaken to determine the effectiveness and efficiency of projects/policies. Independent and other evaluations and reporting mechanisms will contribute to identifying best practices and lessons learned that will feed into the planning and programming of new programmes, projects and policies.
- 15.25 The Information Services Unit will continue to provide information, press and media outreach to the international community and all Habitat Agenda partners through the planning and organization of major global, regional and national media events, including the World Habitat Day and the World Urban Forum, the marketing of UN-Habitat publications through targeted marketing of publications and new products, such as subscription products to encourage repeat orders and partnerships with a wider network of publishers and booksellers. During the biennium, the Information Services Section will seek to maximize the impact of a new, focused results-based, Medium-Term Strategic and Institutional Plan for 2008-2013 and a Resource Mobilization and Communication Strategy to enhance the fund-raising activities of the programme, and to broaden the donor base and appeal of the programme.
- 15.26 The functions of UN-Habitat liaison offices in New York, Geneva and Brussels include coordination, harmonization and representation of the programme. The liaison offices will participate in the work of the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council and meetings of other intergovernmental bodies, interdepartmental and inter-agency meetings and provide substantive support in meetings and policy advice on human settlements, as well as carry out outreach activities. The UN-Habitat Office in New York has a representational status in New York and North America and carries out substantive representational tasks of the agency providing intellectual, policy, strategic and operational guidance through its participation in various bodies such as the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council, the Committee for Programme and Coordination, the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and other intergovernmental bodies. It provides substantive support and strategic policy advice on human settlements, and carries out outreach activities in collaboration with Habitat Agenda partners. As a full-fledged programme, UN-Habitat has become a member of the United Nations System Chief Executives Board for Coordination (CEB), the High-Level Committee on Programmes, the High-Level Committee on Management, the United Nations Development Group, the Executive Committee on Humanitarian Affairs, the Executive Committee of Economic and Social Affairs and other high-level inter-agency coordination mechanisms of the United Nations system. The

UN-Habitat New York Office will be responsible for substantive review of the policies and strategies of those high-level inter-agency coordination mechanisms and provide strategic advice to the Executive Director, and will represent the Executive Director in the high-level inter-agency coordination mechanisms and other intergovernmental meetings, maintain high-level liaison with the Permanent Missions and discuss sensitive and substantive issues including the United Nations reform. Accordingly, the New York Office is being strengthened in order to play a substantive and effective role and contribute to these high-level coordination mechanisms of the United Nations system and also the intergovernmental processes.


- 15.29 The amount of \$3,505,800 for posts, including an increase of \$647,500, would provide for the 14 posts reflected in table 15.7. The increase relates to the reclassification of 1 post from the D-1 level to D-2 for the New York office, and inward redeployment in the Nairobi office of 3 posts (1 P-5 Chief, Monitoring and Evaluation, 1 P-5 Chief, Information Section and 1 P-3 Information and Technology Officer) from subprogramme 2. The increase is partly offset by the outward redeployment of 1 P-4 Programme and Management Oversight Officer to the Support Division.
- 15.30 The amount of \$508,200 for non-post resources, including an increase of \$22,400, would provide for, largely: other staff costs, travel of staff, general operating expenses and other operational requirements. The increase in non-post resources relates primarily to the realignment of requirements relating to the post movements described above.

Subprogramme 1

Shelter and sustainable human settlements development

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$5,310,900

- 15.31 The Shelter and Sustainable Human Settlements Development Division will be responsible for the implementation of subprogramme 1. This division will take the lead on the implementation of focus areas 2, Promotion of participatory urban planning, management and governance, and focus area 3, Promotion of pro-poor land and housing, and also contribute to the other three focus areas as they are all cross-cutting. The main strategy of the subprogramme, consisting of global advocacy, will be spearheaded by the fourth session of the World Urban Forum, the Global

Campaign on Sustainable Urbanization, the development of the global sustainable urban development network, and supported by global programmes. The campaign will be aligned with efforts to attain the Millennium Declaration Goal 7, targets 9, 10 and 11. The strategy for implementing the programme of work is as follows:

- (a) The subprogramme will seek to mobilize all Habitat Agenda partners to enhance the global visibility and impact of urban issues to achieve the goal not only of slum upgrading, but also slum prevention, in order to realize more sustainable urban development. The Global Campaign on Sustainable Urbanization will serve as an entry point to the implementation of the Habitat Agenda and link operational and normative activities at all levels through the development and implementation of an Enhanced Normative and Operational Framework. Particular focus will be placed on new forms of urban planning, as integral parts of sustainable development, good urban governance, and as cost-effective ways to achieve slum prevention and upgrading, as emphasized in paragraph 56 (m) of General Assembly resolution 60/1, the 2005 World Summit Outcome.
- (b) During the biennium, UN-Habitat will strengthen its strategic partnership with local authorities and their associations, in particular with United Cities and Local Governments, provide advisory services and carry out advocacy work. The New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) cities programme and similar programmes from other regions will be further developed and promoted as a means of contributing towards the Millennium Declaration Goals.
- (c) The global programmes, which include normative, capacity-building and knowledge management activities on secure tenure, housing and property rights, land and property administration, urban environmental management, urban governance, including decentralization, disaster prevention and management and safer cities, will be carried out within the context of the campaign, in support of the Enhanced Normative and Operational Framework, thereby assisting in translating normative work into practical real-life processes at the national and community levels.
- (d) The capacity at the national and local levels to undertake effective planning, management and delivery of shelter, land, infrastructure and services will be supported by dedicated training and capacity-building programmes and institutional strengthening. As a response to the Decade of Education for Sustainable Development, the links with universities will be increased and Habitat Partner Universities named. A special feature of the strategy will be to focus on the role of women and youth, community-based organizations as active participants and beneficiaries in the efforts to improve shelter conditions, urban governance and access to basic services.

- 15.34 The requirements of \$4,835,800 would provide for the 22 posts reflected in table 15.10. This amount reflects a decrease of \$1,193,400 arising from the outward redeployment of 6 posts (2 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2 Human Settlements Officers and 2 local level) from the Water, Sanitation and Infrastructure Branch previously under subprogramme 1 to subprogramme 4 in line with the medium-term strategic and institutional plan. The amount of \$475,100 for non-post resources would provide for, inter alia, consultants and experts, travel of staff, general operating expenses and other operational requirements.

Subprogramme 2

Monitoring the Habitat Agenda

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$5,051,900

- 15.35 The responsibility for implementing this subprogramme lies with the Monitoring and Research Division. The core work of subprogramme 2 falls within medium-term strategic and institutional plan focus area 1, i.e., Effective advocacy, monitoring and partnerships, although in terms of substantive content, the work of the subprogramme is cross-cutting and contributes to all the other medium-term strategic and institutional plan substantive focus areas.
- 15.36 In implementing the programme of work, the subprogramme will be working in close collaboration with Habitat Agenda partners and establishing national and local urban observatories to engage in a coordinated and systematic effort in:
- (a) Collecting, collating, analysing, documenting and disseminating global and national data and evidence-based information on human settlements conditions and trends, including indicators, best practices, good policies and enabling legislation, for assessing progress towards achieving the goals of the Habitat Agenda as well as those of the Millennium Declaration as set forth in General Assembly resolution 55/2, especially on slums, safe drinking water and sanitation and use of such data and information for programme formulation;
 - (b) Identifying, developing, testing, disseminating, promoting and mainstreaming new and innovative policies and strategies on the five focus areas identified in the medium-term strategic and institutional plan, including urban planning and management, urban economic development, urban-rural development linkages, urban poverty reduction and employment generation, gender and women's empowerment and strategic partnerships and youth;
 - (c) Raising awareness of the role and capacity of public-private partnerships for upscaling pro-poor shelter and related infrastructure;
 - (d) Promoting the transfer and exchange of lessons learned from best practices on a north-south and south-south basis, with particular focus on city-to-city cooperation;
 - (e) Disseminating results and findings through various publications, including the two flagship reports: the Global Report on Human Settlements and the State of the World's Cities report.

- 15.39 The amount of \$4,530,400 for post requirements reflects a decrease of \$1,337,600 resulting from: (a) outward redeployment of three posts (1 P-5 Chief, Monitoring and Evaluation, 1 P-5 Chief, Information Section and 1 P-3 Information and Technology Officer) to realign the functions of these posts with their activities, which are within the responsibility of Executive Direction and Management; and, (b) outward redeployment of two posts (1 P-4 Human Settlements Officer and 1 P-3 Human Settlements Officer) to subprogramme 4 in order to strengthen and streamline the functions of human settlements financing within UN-Habitat mentioned in paragraph 15.5 (b) above. The amount of \$521,500 in non-post resources reflects a corresponding decrease of \$37,400 associated with the above-mentioned outward redeployment of posts, and would provide for largely: consultants and experts, travel of staff, contractual services, general operating expenses and other operational requirements.

Subprogramme 3

Regional and technical cooperation

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$1,533,300

- 15.40 The Regional and Technical Cooperation Division will implement this subprogramme. The Division will focus its efforts on the normative and operational functions. The normative functions include setting of standards, proposing norms and principles and providing examples of best practices and good policies built on experience gained at the country level. In implementing the medium-term strategic and institutional plan, the Regional and Technical Cooperation Division

will address all five substantive focus areas at the country and regional levels. The strategy for implementing the objective includes:

- (a) The operational activities consist of technical assistance in policy formulation, capacity-building programmes and demonstration projects that support the normative work of UN-Habitat in developing countries and countries with economies in transition, at the request of Governments. The enhanced normative and operational framework will be implemented through a phased roll-out based on country demand, clear engagement criteria and regular evaluations. National UN-Habitat programme managers will continue to support normative and operational activities and contribute to the monitoring and implementation of the Habitat Agenda, as well as the relevant Millennium Development Goals at the national and local levels. Clear criteria will be established for country-level activities and deployment of Habitat Programme Managers, taking note of the geographical balance and provision of adequate resources. To strengthen country-level operations, UN-Habitat will ensure that all Habitat Programme Managers have sound knowledge of sustainable urbanization issues and capacity to support Governments and other partners at the local level as members of United Nations country teams. In addition, Habitat Programme Managers will act as country-level catalysts for the implementation of the medium-term strategic and institutional plan, including the Enhanced Normative and Operational Framework, especially in One-UN pilot countries hosting Habitat Programme Managers. Their role will be particularly crucial in the light of paragraph 22 (a) of resolution 60/1, the 2005 World Summit Outcome, in which the General Assembly calls for the adoption of comprehensive national development strategies for achieving internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Declaration Goals. In addition, major emphasis will be put on the exchange of policy experiences within regions and subregions and on regional monitoring;
- (b) Regional offices will coordinate activities carried out at the regional and country levels and contribute to the knowledge management strategy in close collaboration with all four subprogrammes. They will backstop operational activities at the country level, continue to build capacity in disaster prevention and management and ensure a rapid and effective response where there are post-conflict crises and disasters, as appropriate.
- (c) Women, youth, older persons and persons with disabilities are expected to be active participants and beneficiaries of the programmes and projects implemented under the subprogramme.

Subprogramme 4

Human settlements financing

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,191,500

- 15.44 Responsibility for this subprogramme rests with the United Nations Habitat and Human Settlements Foundation, anchored in the Human Settlements Financing Division. In the implementation of the medium-term strategic and institutional plan, the Human Settlements Financing Division will take on focus area 5, Strengthening human settlements finance systems, and focus area 4, Environmentally sound basic urban infrastructure and services, as the principal areas of work and relate them to all the other focus areas. The strategy for implementing the objective includes:
- (a) Initiating a four-year programme on experimental reimbursable seeding operations for low-income housing and infrastructure in the context of other global financing bodies, together with the appropriate institutional arrangements, operational procedures and guidelines, including those required for the establishment of experimental reimbursable seeding operations and other innovative financial mechanisms, building upon the instruments and networks of the Water and Sanitation Trust Fund and the Slum Upgrading Facility, for more effective mobilization of resources, from the public and private sectors, for shelter and related infrastructure in developing countries and in countries with economies in transition, with special focus on the needs of slum-dwellers and low-income groups and on the implementation of the Millennium Declaration target on slum upgrading and paragraph 56 (m) of the 2005 World Summit Outcome (resolution 60/1) on slum prevention;
 - (b) Preparing terms of reference for a steering and monitoring committee for experimental reimbursable seeding operations and other innovative operations for financing pro-poor housing, infrastructure and upgrading initiatives;
 - (c) Establishing a working group with existing financial institutions, relevant United Nations bodies and other operators to identify and assess, inter alia, risks, preconditions, methodologies and other tools for innovative finance arrangements;
 - (d) Providing technical assistance and targeted seed capital through the Slum Upgrading Facility of the Foundation to develop and support mechanisms for mobilizing domestic savings and capital to improve the availability of affordable housing, adequate shelter and infrastructure in developing countries and in countries with economies in transition. At the request of Governments, providing technical advice and facilitating peer exchanges designed to advance national policy frameworks, regulatory reforms and institutional arrangements that Member States can use to enable private banks, insurance companies, micro-finance institutions, and community-based savings and credit organizations to finance affordable housing and related infrastructure — thus leveraging limited public investment and official development assistance;
 - (e) Promoting pro-poor investment in water and sanitation through strategic partnerships among key stakeholders, including community organizations, municipalities, private sector utility operators, financial institutions, non-governmental organizations and central governments, drawing upon the Water for African Cities and Water for Asian Cities programmes designed to strengthen the capacity of cities to improve coverage at the municipal level. Major focus will be placed on strategies that are owned locally and on activities designed to strengthen the political will to adopt pro-poor investment policies and regulations. The Water and Sanitation Trust Fund will be used as a tool to leverage and improve aid effectiveness from donor sources to field-test investment designs for long-term sustainability;

- (f) Working with the World Bank Group, regional development banks, other development banks, the private sector, United Nations agencies and other relevant partners to link the normative and technical cooperation activities of UN-Habitat with the investment portfolios of the financing institutions, and to mobilize finance from international sources to play a catalytic and preparatory role in leveraging domestic investment for slum upgrading and other pro-poor human settlements development.

- 15.47 The amount of \$2,026,200 for post resources, reflecting an increase of \$1,730,900 would provide for the continuation of one P-4 post and the inward redeployment of two posts (1 P-4 and 1 P-3) from subprogramme 2 in order to strengthen and streamline the functions of human settlements financing within UN-Habitat as well as the inward redeployment of 6 posts (2 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2, 2 local level) from the Water, Sanitation and Infrastructure Branch previously under subprogramme 1 to subprogramme 4 in line with the medium-term strategic and institutional plan. The amount of \$165,300 for non-post resources reflecting an increase of \$144,600 associated with the above-mentioned inward redeployment, would provide for primarily: travel of staff, general operating expenses and other operational requirements.

D. Programme support

- 15.48 The implementation of the programme of work will be supported through a number of services, including human resources planning, financial management and programme planning and coordination. Programme support services are provided by the Programme Support Division, programme management officers in the regional offices of UN-Habitat and the Division of Administrative Services of the United Nations Office at Nairobi.

- 15.49 The amount of \$295,300 for post resources would provide for one P-4 Programme and Management Oversight Officer being redeployed from Executive direction and management to address the issue outlined in General Assembly resolution 59/264, particularly to strengthen the

internal control framework, harmonizing the administrative mechanism that would systematically act upon the findings and recommendations of oversight bodies and improving financial reporting. This redeployment is in line with the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in A/60/7 and Corr.1, paragraph IV.47, that the requirement for a post to carry these functions be carried out through redeployment or a redistribution of responsibilities. All other requirements would be met from extrabudgetary resources.

The central mandate of the Geneva office is representing UN-Habitat at the United Nations Office at Geneva and in the specialized organizations and agencies based at Geneva. In this context it participates in inter-agency coordination mechanisms and task forces and in the preparation of major global conferences. The office promotes the effective implementation of the Memorandum of Understanding signed with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, International Labour Organization, United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, and the International Strategy for Disaster Reduction. It is actively participating in the activities of the Economic Commission for Europe Committee on Human Settlements. It also liaises with the United Nations Office in Vienna. It promotes UN-Habitat campaigns on secure tenure and good urban governance and promotes the Habitat Agenda. Having become a member of the Executive Committee on Humanitarian Affairs in June 2004, UN-Habitat has become increasingly engaged with the humanitarian agencies as made evident in its involvement in Flash Appeals for the Tsunami-affected countries and the South Asia earthquake, particularly with regard to the shelter sector. It also works in collaboration with humanitarian agencies in Afghanistan, the occupied Palestinian territories, Somalia and Kosovo on shelter and local governance issues. It is heavily involved in the restructuring of the humanitarian sector led by the Inter-Agency Standing Committee. UN-Habitat is taking on various issues such as housing, land and property in the new cluster response system. It is clear that this engagement, which is a response to the humanitarian system's acknowledgement of the contribution of UN-Habitat, requires an effective and a continuing agency presence in Geneva.

The Brussels office, on the other hand, mainly deals with the European Union entities, the Government of Belgium and northern

European bilateral donors and the African, Caribbean and Pacific institutions. Its major functions are to raise the profile of urban issues generally and UN-Habitat in particular within the European Union and with bilateral donors in northern Europe, which constitute the majority of the extrabudgetary funding base of UN-Habitat. As urban issues do not receive the prominence that the urban crisis facing most of the developing world requires, the funding that UN-Habitat needs to carry out its mandate needs to be vigorously solicited.

The Monitoring and Evaluation Unit, located in executive direction and management, has the functions of monitoring changes made during the biennium in the programme of work set out in the programme budget approved by the General Assembly and objective evaluation of the relevance, effectiveness, efficiency, quality, and impact of the outputs produced by the organization.

The Monitoring and Research Division is responsible for implementing subprogramme 2, and monitors globally progress made by countries, cities and towns towards the realization of the Habitat Agenda and Millennium Development Goals.

The Monitoring and Evaluation Unit therefore focuses on the impact of the internal activities undertaken by UN-Habitat, while the Monitoring and Research Division focuses on activities of countries and cities in the implementation of the Habitat Agenda.

Two tools are being used to evaluate the usefulness of UN-Habitat publications:

- (i) Review of publications in international journals. Publications are submitted to many policy-oriented academic and professional journals for review. Reports summarizing the journal reviews, by publication, are prepared for submission to the UN-Habitat Board of Directors with actual reviews annexed. For the *Global Report on Human*

Settlements, reports are submitted to the Advisory Board for Global Research Network on Human Settlements for discussion.

(ii) Capturing of user feedback through short questionnaires or feedback cards. The responses are analysed at least 12 months after the release and dissemination of each publication and a report prepared for submission to the Board of Directors. For the *Global Report on Human Settlements*, user feedback reports submitted to the Global Research Network on Human Settlements Advisory Board.

Additionally, launch of the *Global Report on Human Settlements* will take place during sessions of the UN-Habitat Governing Council, as a special event, while one of the launches of the *State of the World's Cities* report will take place during sessions of the World Urban Forum, also as a special event. Question-and-answer discussions, involving the media, will be part of these launches. Reports capturing the ideas from these discussions will be prepared for submission to the Board of Directors.

UN-Habitat established a new publications policy in 2004, which governs the planning, editorial control, production, marketing, sales and distribution of the agency's publication. In line with this policy, the agency established a Publications Board, which approves all substantive technical publications to ensure that thematic balance and relevance to the mission of UN-Habitat. The Board also monitors the implementation of the publications programme, particularly those publications that appear in the Governing Council approved work programme.

To assist the Board and author departments, a computerized Publications Management System has been implemented to keep track of workflows from planning, editing, design, production, and cost of all publications and to produce management reports. In addition, a

new Publications Marketing and Sales System has been implemented on the UN-Habitat public website, which allows clients to review and rate the agency's publications as a way of providing feedback to author sections. The new system also improves access to publications by enabling clients to download electronic versions of many publications and indicating in which libraries and bookshops the agency's publications can be found. Furthermore, the agency features some of its popular publications on Amazon.com and has subscribed to the Google print service, which ensures wider visibility of its publications.

UN-Habitat elects to exhibit only at venues and events which are relevant to the agency's issues. Where possible, for instance, at the World Urban Forum, the evaluation of the events always includes an evaluation of the exhibition. The agency has continued to improve the quality of exhibition material and showcases its publications at most exhibitions with increasing success. One way of measuring this success is the volume of sales of publications and promotional materials, which at the latest World Urban Forum amounted to \$9,400 over five days, which is over 3.5 times the amount achieved two years earlier in 2004. Feedback from participants at the World Urban Forum III on this exhibition was extremely positive, with several suggestions for taking the same exhibition to other venues as a way of raising awareness of urban issues.


