

Economic and social development in Africa

(Programme 14 of the biennial programme plan and priorities for the period 2008-2009)**

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Section 17A Regional commission

Overview

- 17A.1 The programme of work described below is based on programme 14, Economic and social development in Africa, of the biennial programme plan and priorities for the period 2008-2009. This programme is under the responsibility of the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA).
- 17A.2 The overall objective of the programme is to assist African countries to formulate and implement the policies and programmes that will lead to sustainable economic growth and social development, with particular emphasis on poverty reduction, as envisaged in the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD), as well as the internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the United Nations Millennium Declaration, and in the outcomes of other major United Nations conferences and international agreements since 1992.
- 17A.3 The mandate for the programme derives from Economic and Social Council resolution 671 A (XXV), by which the Council established the ECA. This mandate has been further elaborated in a number of resolutions of the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council as well as in resolutions 718 (XXVI), 726 (XXVII), 779 (XXIX) and 809 (XXXI) of ECA. Further mandates have emanated from NEPAD and the outcomes and decisions of global conferences, including the 2005 World Summit Outcome.
- 17A.4 Early in 2006, the new Executive Secretary of ECA reviewed the strategic directions, programmes, organizational structure, management and administrative processes of the Commission with a view to repositioning it so as to better respond to Africa's emerging challenges. The main outcome of the review process was considered by the ECA Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development at its annual meeting, in May 2006, which, by its resolution 844 (XXXIX), fully endorsed the new proposals for repositioning ECA. Furthermore, the African Union Summit, held in Banjul on 1 and 2 July 2006, adopted a decision (Assembly/AU/Dec.14 (VII)), by which it welcomed the commitment of the Executive Secretary of ECA to strengthening and repositioning the Commission to address Africa's development challenges and reaffirmed the role of the Commission as a key and necessary United Nations institution in Africa to assist and facilitate the work of the African Union (AU) and the regional economic communities. The Summit, in particular, called for the strengthening of the African Union Commission, the ECA and the African Development Bank (AfDB) partnership.
- 17A.5 A main feature of these challenges is the high prevalence of poverty in Africa. In a number of countries the process of socio-economic development has been disrupted by violent conflicts. The region has the highest proportion of people living on less than \$1 a day and it is the only continent not on track to meet the Millennium Declaration target of halving poverty by 2015. In order, therefore, to reduce the high incidence of poverty, African countries face the challenge of fashioning viable strategies to promote growth with equity and integrating their economies to overcome the limitations of fragmentation. Globalization poses risks for African countries, but can also bring them benefits, especially in the area of trade and investment. Stronger institutions and governance mechanisms are also central to overcoming these challenges.
- 17A.6 The dual role of the ECA as a regional arm of the United Nations and as part of the regional institutional landscape in Africa endows it with unique comparative advantages that enable it to make a significant contribution to the efforts of member States to address these challenges. Its strength derives from its role as the only United Nations agency mandated to operate at the regional and subregional levels to harness resources and bring them to bear on Africa's priorities.

- This is particularly important because the perspectives of AU and NEPAD are primarily regional and subregional. This comparative advantage is also reflected in the leadership role of the Commission in coordinating United Nations inter-agency support to NEPAD.
- 17A.7 The mandate and role of the Commission are consistent with and complementary to those of AU and AfDB, the two other continental organizations. The understanding in Africa is that AU will provide the political framework, while ECA acts as the technical arm and AfDB provides funding and financial backing. The cooperation among the three organizations will be further enhanced by the harmonization of their institutional machineries and a revived joint secretariat to promote joint programming of activities. The role of the subregional offices of the Commission is also to be enhanced to make them privileged partners of the regional economic communities, which will entail the signing of partnership agreements that contain multi-year programmes.
- 17A.8 The overall objective of a repositioned ECA for the period 2008-2009 will be to deploy its comparative advantage in support of continental efforts to overcome present challenges and to achieve sustained growth and development. The new programme directions will focus on the following two pillars:
 - (a) Promoting regional integration in support of the African Union vision and priorities. African countries have consistently affirmed their desire for closer integration in order to reap associated benefits, such as economies of scale, reduced transaction costs and improved infrastructural links. ECA will therefore focus on undertaking research and policy analysis on regional integration issues, building capacity and providing technical assistance to institutions driving the process of regional integration, in addition to working on a clear set of cross-border activities and initiatives;
 - (b) Meeting the special needs and emerging global challenges of Africa. It is generally recognized that Africa has special needs, which include attracting financial resources for development, obtaining debt relief, utilizing trade opportunities, adding value in production, combating HIV/AIDS and educating its people. These needs also take on special significance in the context of a rapidly changing global environment. The AU NEPAD programme presents a well-articulated framework for addressing the continent's development challenges, and the General Assembly, in its 2005 World Summit Outcome, reaffirmed the importance of coherent support for the programmes drawn up by African leaders within the framework of the New Partnership for Africa's Development.
- 17A.9 The two pillars of ECA work are to be conducted through 10 subprogrammes rearranged to avoid duplication of functions, promote complementarities, eliminate inconsistencies and place required emphasis on important sectors. The subprogrammes are focused on the following themes: trade, finance and economic policy; food security and sustainable development; governance and public administration; information and science and technology for development; economic cooperation and regional integration; gender and women in development; social development; subregional activities for development; statistics; and development planning and administration.
- 17A.10 The programme directions will be underpinned by the commitment to make ECA a knowledge-based organization at the cutting-edge of development thinking in the region and a motivating force behind a network of researchers, practitioners and policymakers engaged in the production, sharing and dissemination of knowledge. The knowledge management initiative will facilitate synergies across subprogrammes and underpin continuous improvement in performance and service standards that will in turn impact positively on the policies adopted by member States and regional economic communities.
- 17A.11 The repositioned ECA will seek to achieve identifiable outcomes and results with clear and measurable indicators of achievement. Key among the desired results are: progress towards

achieving the Millennium Development Goals, including poverty and gender equity; increased regional integration; development of productive sectors, including greater value-addition; increased integration into the global economy; improved macroeconomic policies and economic governance.

- 17A.12 ECA will continue to work to support the achievement of cross-cutting outcomes and results throughout its work programme, especially by continuing to mainstream gender concerns across subprogrammes and supporting measures related to improved governance, appreciable postconflict development and a more human rights-based approach to development. In its resolution 60/235, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit to the Assembly at its sixty-first session, a comprehensive plan of action to strengthen the regional offices of ECA, based on the recommendations of the Office of Internal Oversight Services (A/60/120). The Secretary-General, in the annex to his report (A/61/471), outlined the revisions to subprogramme 7, which proposed a separate subprogramme of work for each of the five ECA subregional offices. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its report (A/61/544) commented that the General Assembly may wish to note the actions already taken to implement the OIOS recommendations concerning the programme and administrative management of the subregional offices of ECA. The General Assembly by its resolution 61/234 noted with appreciation the steps taken to define the role and mission of the subregional offices so as to address the recommendations made by the Office of Internal Oversight Services, hence the proposals in this proposed programme budget for 2008-2009 reflect separate components under subprogramme 7 that are specific to each subregional office. In accordance with General Assembly resolution 58/269, the revised subprogramme 7, Subregional activities for development, as presented in the present proposed programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009 will be submitted for the review of the Committee for Programme and Coordination at its forty-seventh session.
- 17A.13 ECA will deliver on the expected outcomes and results by improving the quality of the services that it provides in the area of knowledge generation, sharing and networking; advocacy and consensus-building; and advisory services and technical cooperation. Accordingly, the Commission will continue to undertake research and policy analysis to support informed decision-making and policy formulation in the region and assist the process of consensus-building on major international initiatives. Demand-driven advisory services will also be used to help to improve regional capacity to design and implement development policies. The Commission will ensure the high quality of its outputs by incorporating quality assurance processes in its delivery model. This will ensure relevance, responsiveness to client needs and accountability for compliance with stipulated processes and standards.
- 17A.14 The programme will leverage its comparative strengths by the strategic use of its partnerships to harness resources, ensure coherence, build synergies and avoid duplication of efforts. To that end, the Commission will continue to build on its existing partnerships with AU, AfDB, regional economic communities and African civil society and private sector organizations. At the same time, bilateral partners that have supported ECA work will be actively engaged for fund-raising, the sharing of experiences and joint delivery of services. In addition to current developed country partners, ECA will contribute to South-South cooperation by extending its active partnerships to other developing country regions.
- 17A.15 Inter-agency coordination and collaboration among United Nations agencies working in Africa will be strengthened through the regional consultation meetings of the United Nations agencies convened by ECA in support of NEPAD priorities. ECA will continue to be involved in the work of the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs as the main vehicle for ensuring policy and operational coherence in the context of the World Summit Outcome. It will also collaborate in

- this regard with the United Nations Development Group entities in strengthening the links between normative and operational activities of the United Nations system.
- 17A.16 The expected accomplishments and indicators of achievement of the programme for the biennium 2008-2009 are detailed, together with regional resources under the programme of work as well as under Executive direction and management.
- 17A.17 The issue of publications as a part of the programme of work has been reviewed in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as summarized in table 17A.1 and as described in the output information for each subprogramme.

- 17A.18 The overall resources under this section amount to \$107,524,700, before recosting, reflecting a growth of \$1,829,100, or 1.7 per cent, compared with the revised appropriation for the biennium 2006-2007. The increase is mainly the result of the implementation of the revised subprogramme 7, which proposed a separate subprogramme of work for each of the five subregional offices, and the newly created subprogrammes 9, Statistics, and 10, Social development, in response to ECA resolution 844 (XXXIX) on repositioning ECA to better respond to Africa's priorities. The proposed increase in resources are directed towards increased operational activities, improved information and communication technology systems and expanded training opportunities, which is summarized below:
 - (a) An increase of \$3,257,200, under Executive direction and management consisting of: (i) an increase of \$3,136,900 under post resources due to the establishment of 1 new P-4, Economics Affairs Officer, in the Office of the Executive Secretary, to support the coordination of subregional activities of the five subregional offices (\$181,000) and the inward redeployment of 16 posts (7 Professional and 9 General Service/Other level) of the Overall Management Section, under Programme support, to a renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management, under Executive direction and management, in line with the views expressed by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its report A/54/7 (para. V.4) to standardize the presentation of regional commissions programme budgets (\$2,955,900); and (ii) an increase of \$120,300 in non-post resources for overtime; and travel of staff; resulting from the inward redeployment from Programme support to the renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management;
 - (b) An increase of \$1,964,800, under programme of work, consisting of: (i) an increase of \$1,564,500 under post resources due to the establishment of 8 new P-4 posts, for Economics Affairs Officers, distributed among the five subregional offices (1 P-4 post for subregional activities for development in North Africa, 2 P-4 for West Africa, 1 P-4 for Central Africa, 2 P-4 for East Africa, and 2 P-4 for Southern Africa) to lead the delivery of operational activities of the ECA subregional offices (\$1,448,000); and to the establishment of 5 local

level posts for Information Assistants, 1 for each of the five subregional offices, to support the enhanced mandate of the subregional offices (\$116,500); and (ii) a net increase of \$400,300 in non-post requirements, relating, inter alia, to increases for other staff costs; consultants and experts; travel of staff; general operating expenses; and other operational needs; and offset by, a decrease for contractual services. Redeployment of 12 posts (9 Professional and 3 General Service/Other level) from subprogramme 6, Gender and women in development, to subprogramme 10, Social development, in response to the establishment of a new subprogramme 10 as part of the biennial programme plan for the biennium 2008-2009 is also proposed;

- (c) A net decrease of \$3,297,200 under Programme support consisting of: (i) a decrease of \$2,955,900 under post resources due to the outward redeployment of 16 posts (7 Professional and 9 local level) from the Overall Management Section, under Programme support, to the renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management, under Executive direction and management (\$2,955,900); and (ii) a net decrease of \$341,300 under non-post resources consisting of decreases as a result of redeployments to Executive direction and management for the renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management and to the subregional offices; and reductions mainly for general operating expenses and other operational needs, partly offset by increases under rental and maintenance of premises and other staff costs.
- In the biennium 2008-2009, the projected extrabudgetary resources of \$72,663,200, mobilized from mostly bilateral sources under agreements between the Commission and global and regional institutions and organizations concerned with African development, will supplement the regular budget to finance technical cooperation activities in the broad priority areas, including building capacity for meeting the United Nations Millennium Development Goals; integrated water resources management; improving good governance systems; harnessing information and communications technology for socio-economic development; strengthening capacity for trade negotiations; integrating gender concerns into development policies and programmes; and providing support to member States and the regional economic communities in the implementation of NEPAD. The projected increase in extrabudgetary resources compared to the current biennium is based on expected results from the ECA repositioning exercise and the placement of an appropriate extrabudgetary resources mobilization strategy that envisions extrabudgetary resources will greatly improve in the biennium 2008-2009.
- Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269 of 23 December 2003, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation are estimated at \$1,339,900. This amount includes \$817,800 under the programme budget and \$522,100 financed from extrabudgetary resources.
- 17A.21 It will be recalled that in his note to the General Assembly (A/61/758), the Secretary-General submitted his comments on the recommendations contained in the report of the Redesign Panel on the United Nations system of administration of justice (A/61/205), and identified the time and resources needed to implement the recommendations of the Panel. The proposed resource redeployments and growth sought by the Secretary-General in his note have not been incorporated under the present budget section. In resolution 61/261 of 4 April 2007, the General Assembly decided to establish a new, independent, transparent, professionalized, adequately resourced and decentralized system of administration of justice, and further requested the Secretary-General to report on resources required for the implementation of that resolution as a matter of priority at the second part of its resumed sixty-first session, and to further report on issues identified in the resolution regarding the establishment of the new system of administration of justice no later than the early part of the main part of its sixty-second session. Following consideration, decisions of the General Assembly on those reports and the related resource proposals would be incorporated in the

budget appropriation at the time of adoption of the programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009 in December 2007.

17A.22 The percentage distribution of total resources under this section for the biennium 2008-2009 is shown in table 17A.2.

A. Policymaking organs

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$588,600

17A.23 By its resolution 826 (XXXII) of 8 May 1997 regarding the reform of the intergovernmental machinery of ECA, the Commission established the structure and functioning of its intergovernmental machinery, comprising the Conference of African Ministers responsible for Economic and Social Development and Planning and its Technical Committee of the Whole, as well as the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, convened biennially in alternate years, and seven functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission. At its thirty-fourth session, in

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2001, the Commission decided that those Conferences should be merged and henceforth should meet annually. The two subsidiary organs, the Committee on Industry and Private Sector Development and the Committee on Natural Resources and Science and Technology, were discontinued and the related issues are dealt with by the Committee on Trade and Regional Cooperation and Integration and the Committee on Sustainable Development. Two new Committees, the Committee on Governance and Popular Participation and the Committee on Statistics, now form part of the subsidiary machinery of the Commission.

Organs dealing with overall development issues

Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and its Committee of Experts

- 17A.24 The Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development provides legislative mandate and policy guidance to the work of the Commission, considers and endorses the work programme of the ECA secretariat, serves as a forum articulating the position of Africa on development issues on the agenda of the United Nations, and decides on the recommendations of its subsidiary bodies and of the Executive Secretary.
- 17A.25 Since 2001, the Conference of Ministers has met on an annual basis. The Committee of Experts meets prior to the Conference and provides technical support to the Conference. The Bureau of the Commission includes a representative from each of the five subregions of the continent, namely, North Africa, East Africa, Southern Africa, West Africa and Central Africa. It consists of a chairman, three vice-chairmen and a rapporteur.

Annual subregional ministerial conferences

17A.26 The five subregional ministerial conferences meet annually and report to the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development. They oversee the overall formulation and implementation of the programme of work and priorities of the respective subregional offices, make recommendations on issues concerning economic and social development in their respective subregions, as well as on the promotion and strengthening of subregional economic cooperation and integration.

Functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission

Committee on Women and Development

17A.27 The role of the Committee on Women and Development, as an advisory forum of experts and policymakers, is to provide guidance to the Commission in its work on the importance of gender and women in development. It also provides a platform for advocacy and for assessing follow-up and implementation by African Governments of the global and regional platforms for action for the advancement of women. In particular, it addresses issues relating to the economic empowerment of women, protection of their legal and human rights and improved access to education and health. It meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Development Information, Science and Technology

17A.28 The Committee aims to strengthen the role of the Commission in assisting its member States in developing their national information and communication infrastructure as well as integrating science and technology in their development programmes and strategies by bringing together experts and policymakers to advise it in these areas. The members of the Committee include experts from such fields as planning, information and communications technology, geoinformation systems and science and technology. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Food Security and Sustainable Development

17A.29 The Committee serves as a forum of experts that provides advice to the Commission in the interlinked areas of food security and environment. In this regard, it provides a platform for advocacy and assessment of follow-up activities by Governments of African countries to regional and global plans of action, such as the relevant decisions and outcomes of the World Summit on Sustainable Development. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Human and Social Development

17A.30 The mission of the Committee is to promote human and social development in African countries. The Committee conducts development and follow-up activities pertaining to global conferences and regional action programmes. It reviews major trends and issues of regional interest regarding human and social development. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Trade, Regional Cooperation and Integration

17A.31 The Committee promotes the implementation of measures designed to strengthen economic cooperation and integration among African countries. It coordinates and harmonizes economic policies among African countries as a prerequisite for accelerating regional economic integration. In view of the importance of trade in regional cooperation and integration, the Committee also focuses on intra-African and international trade. It comprises experts in the field of international trade and integration drawn from Governments and the private sector. It meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Governance and Popular Participation

17A.32 The objective of the Committee is to provide guidance on the establishment of an enabling environment for sound economic and corporate governance in Africa. The Committee focuses on interventions needed to enhance democratic governance practices, promote the adoption of human rights international standards, improve post-conflict management, mainstream the role of civil society and encourage the private sector development. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Statistics

- 17A.33 The Committee, composed of experts and policymakers in the field of statistics, is responsible for providing strategic directions to the work of the Commission on statistical development in Africa. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.
- 17A.34 With the exception of the Commission, which meets in a seven-day annual session, all intergovernmental organs of the Commission meet for a duration of from three to six days.

17A.35 The resource requirements in the amount of \$588,600, reflecting a decrease of \$95,700, provide for the continuation of non-post resources, including temporary assistance for meetings, overtime,

communications and supplies expenses for servicing the sessions of the Commission and its subsidiary bodies. The decrease relates to reduced requirements for temporary assistance for meetings and contractual services.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$9,039,100

- 17A.36 Executive direction and management comprises the Office of the Executive Secretary, the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management and the Information and Communication Service.
- 17A.37 The Office of the Executive Secretary provides overall strategic direction and leadership for the efficient management and effective implementation of the ECA programme of work while ensuring the optimal use of resources. The Executive Secretary and the Deputy Executive Secretary work in mutual support to provide strategic directions, policy guidance and leadership to the formulation of regional strategies and programmes in line with the priorities of NEPAD and the Millennium Development Goals.
- The Office maintains and manages effective partnerships and collaboration with major African continental organizations in particular, the African Union and the African Development Bank, the regional economic communities as well as other key stakeholders in order to promote synergies in policies and activities on major regional development issues and concerns for Africa. It fosters African ownership and policy consensus-building on emerging and urgent development issues facing the continent, and promotes policy advocacy on Africa in the international community. The Office promotes the effective coordination of the role of the United Nations in Africa by maintaining regular consultations with organizations of the United Nations system working in Africa to promote concerted action on United Nations-system activities in the region. It also strengthens collaboration with the other regional commissions with a view to sharing experiences, and coordinating and harmonizing actions on issues of mutual and collective interest.
- 17A.39 The Office of the Executive Secretary also provides policy direction to the organization of the annual session of the Commission and ensures effective implementation of action emanating from resolutions and decisions of the Commission, the Economic and Social Council and other intergovernmental organizations, with particular emphasis on the priorities of NEPAD and the Millennium Development Goals. It provides policy guidance to the five ECA subregional offices to ensure that they are responsive to the needs of member States and their major intergovernmental institutions, including the regional economic communities. In addition, it ensures that there are effective synergies between them and ECA substantive divisions at Headquarters. Furthermore, the Office oversees special initiatives such as the African Development Forum, Partners Forum, the mutual accountability process, and the Africa/Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development high-level policy forums designed to reinforce the work of the Commission and thus provide further impetus to Africa's development agenda. The Office also plays a critical leadership and oversight role in terms of ECA support to the African Peer Review Mechanism and the overall NEPAD process. It leads the resource mobilization efforts of the Commission in the context of the ECA partnership agenda, and ensures that resources mobilized are put to effective use to advance development of Africa.
- 17A.40 The Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management provides leadership to the Commission's coherent programme planning and implementation process and the preparation of programme budget proposals. The Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management will also coordinate, guide and supervise the ECA extrabudgetary technical cooperation programme and its relevant fund-raising activities. In addition, the Office will be responsible for developing and

implementing a quality-enhancement system to ensure the delivery of high-quality outputs and activities.

17A.41 The Information and Communications Service provides drafting, editing, dissemination and communication advice and services for ECA corporate and divisional activities; facilitates communications between ECA and its key constituents and regional and international partners as well as the media; raises awareness of ECA policy positions on Africa's core development challenges and the steps needed to address them; and disseminates ECA work to stakeholders and partners.

- 17A.44 The resource requirements under posts estimated at \$8,314,200, reflecting an increase of \$3,136,900, provides for 39 posts as described in table 17A.7 above. The increase of \$3,136,900 results from: (a) establishment of 1 new P-4 post for an Economics Affairs Officer, in the Office of the Executive Secretary to assist the Executive Secretary and Deputy Executive Secretary in providing full oversight of the work being undertaken in ECA subregional offices. More specifically, the work of the Programme Officer will help in coordinating the effective implementation, monitoring of and reporting on the new ECA subregional offices-driven programming framework to ensure that ECA programme activities take into account the enhanced role of subregional offices; (b) the inward redeployment of 16 posts (7 Professional and 9 local level) from the Overall Management Section, under Programme support, to the renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management, under Executive direction and management, in line with the views of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its report (A/54/7, para. V.4) to standardize the format of the presentation of the budgets of the regional commissions.
- 17A.45 The amount of \$724,900 for non-post requirements reflects an increase of \$120,300. The increase of \$120,300 is due largely to the needs for travel of staff.
- The extrabudgetary resources of \$4,800,000, to be provided through the United Nations Trust Fund for African Development, bilateral agreements, and programme support will be used, inter alia, to: organize two Big Tables (high policy gathering with the participation of the AU, OECD, UNDP and the Bretton Woods institutions) and one African Development Forum; support the joint review of development effectiveness undertaken by the ECA in collaboration with the OECD; further enhance the partnership between the ECA and its key stakeholders; enhance knowledge content in its operations and outputs; provide knowledge services to partners and clients; focus activities in becoming a centre of excellence on knowledge about African development; develop a customized, user-friendly and flexible financial information management system; and design a web-based application portal to provide relevant information to donors and partners on the management of ECA technical cooperation activities.

- 17A.50 The resource requirements of \$5,862,500 for posts will provide for the continuation of 26 posts. - 17A.60 The resource requirements of \$5,784,300 for posts will provide for the continuation of 27 posts. An amount of \$312,500 for non-post requirements reflects a decrease of \$73,000, largely due to external printing resulting from the increased use of technological advances in the ECA publication process.
- 17A.61 The extrabudgetary resources of \$8,000,000, provided through UNDP and bilateral agreements, will be used to continue assistance to member States through the good governance project and the

African Governance Report, with a view to applying objective criteria for measuring and monitoring good governance in Africa. 17A.65 The resource requirements of \$4,524,800 for posts will provide for the continuation of 26 posts. Non-post resources in the amount of \$243,800, reflecting a decrease of \$41,900, will provide for overtime, consultants and experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The decrease relates to resources for external printing which will not be required in the 2008-2009 biennium owing to increased use of in-house printing for ECA publications.

Extrabudgetary resources of \$8,000,000, provided through bilateral agreements, will meet the needs of member States, regional economic communities, NEPAD, the African Union as well as the ECA subregional offices, especially in the area of outreach such as organizations of exhibitions and production of outreach materials and implementation of field projects. - 17A.75 The resource requirements of \$3,036,300 for posts, which includes a decrease of \$2,927,000, will provide for the continuation of 13 posts. The decrease in posts results from the outward redeployment of 12 posts (9 Professional (2 P-5, 2 P-4, 4 P-3 and 1 P-2) and 3 local level) to subprogramme 10, Social development, arising from the establishment of a new subprogramme 10 as part of the revised strategic framework for the biennium 2008-2009 (A/61/6/Rev.1, programme 14). The General Assembly by its resolution 61/234 recalled its request to the Secretary-General in paragraph 12 of its resolution 60/235 to submit a comprehensive plan of action to strengthen the subregional offices, and noted with appreciation the steps taken by the Secretary-General in his report (A/61/471) to define the role and mission of the subregional offices so as to address the recommendations made by the Office of Internal Oversight Services (A/60/120). As reported in annex II to the Secretary-General's report (A/61/471), the expected accomplishments and all other elements of the logical framework are specific to a subregional office. The five ECA subregional offices, with which responsibility lies for implementation of the components of the subprogramme, are located in: (i) Rabat, Morocco, for North Africa; (ii) Niamey, Niger, for West Africa; (iii) Yaoundé, Cameroon, for Central Africa; (iv) Kigali, Rwanda, for East Africa; and (v) Lusaka, Zambia, for Southern Africa. Coordination of the subregional offices rests with the Office of the Executive Secretary of ECA.

17A.108 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) policy and decision makers are committed to addressing human and social development issues; (b) member States are committed to the outcomes of regional and international agreements on employment, population, health, international migration and other related social policy areas; (c) there is broad political support for and commitment to poverty reduction and the Millennium Declaration and the priorities of NEPAD; and (d) there is support from development partners.

Outputs

- 17A.109 During the biennium 2008-2009, the following final outputs will be delivered:
 - (a) Servicing of intergovernmental and expert bodies (regular budget):
 - (i) Substantive servicing of meetings: the first session of the Committee on Human and Social Development (4);
 - (ii) Parliamentary documentation: annual progress report on the Millennium Development Goals and poverty reduction strategies in Africa (2); progress report on the International Conference on Population and Development + 15 (1); report to the Committee on Human and Social Development on recent social developments in Africa (1);
 - (iii) Ad hoc expert groups: assessing and monitoring progress on human and social development in African countries (2); regional meeting to review progress towards the Millennium Development Goals in African countries (1); the role of subnational jurisdictions in achieving the Millennium Development Goals in Africa (1); youth employment opportunities in Africa (1);
 - (b) Other substantive activities (regular budget/extrabudgetary):
 - (i) Recurrent publications: report on international migration (1); report on youth employment opportunities in Africa (1); the African Human and Social Development Report (1);

17A.110 The resource requirements in the amount of \$2,927,000 for posts results from the redeployment of 2 P-5, 2 P-4, 4 P-3, 1 P-2 and 3 local level posts from subprogramme 6, Gender and women in development, in relation to the restructuring of ECA, which resulted in the establishment of a new subprogramme 10 as approved in the biennial programme plan for the biennium 2008-2009 (A/61/6/Rev.1, programme 14). Non-post resources of \$577,000 reflect an increase of \$196,700 related largely to the redeployment of resources from subprogramme 1, Trade, finance and economic development, and subprogramme 6, Gender and women in development, to provide for, inter alia, consultants and experts; travel of staff and contractual services.

17A.111 The provision of extrabudgetary resources (\$4,051,100) is for operational activities designed to strengthen the capacity of member States to address social development issues in the areas of poverty, population, health, youth employment, and international migration. The activities of the subprogramme will include preparation, production and dissemination of reports on various social issues; field projects on enhancing knowledge-sharing on poverty reduction strategies and Millennium Development Goals; establishment of an African Regional Employment Network; training workshop and regional meetings; provide technical and functional support to the meeting of the follow-up committee of the Dakar/Ngor Declaration, and the regional review of the International Conference on Population and Development + 15; and enhancement of the capacity of member States in poverty, social policy, population and housing censuses analyses through fellowship programmes.

D. Programme support

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$36,200,800

- 17A.112 Programme support services encompass the functions and structures relating to: management and development of human resources; publications and conference management; documentation, archive and record management; finance, library and management of central support services, including general services, information technology services, facilities management and the United Nations Health-Care Centre under the Division of Administration. The Division of Administration of a repositioned ECA will provide for clear reporting lines, with the objective of having greater focus, synergy and the attainment of results.
- 17A.113 The Division of Administration will continue to provide the above services to the ECA secretariat, its five subregional offices, and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning; and coordinate with United Nations agencies based in Ethiopia on the United Nations Common House

and compound management. In particular, ECA will undertake promotion of the use of United Nations Health-Care Centre-Addis Ababa by boosting its marketing strategies and activities, including development and revision of its charge rates. Other activities will include provision of conference services, interpretation and verbatim reporting services; translation and editorial services; text processing, desktop publishing, proofreading and referencing services; documentation, reproduction, publication and distribution services; commercial and procurement services; travel management services; shipping and transportation services; protocol and visa services; stores, property and inventory management services; facilities management (including maintenance and new construction projects); library, and information and communication technology services.

17A.114 In addition, during the 2008-2009 biennium, the Division of Administration will continue to play a pivotal role in supporting the ECA secretariat, subregional offices and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning, as well as the collocated United Nations agencies, in the framework of the new United Nations reform structure and initiatives, serving to enhance the effectiveness of the programme of work, staff productivity and administrative decision support. The domains of knowledge management and telecommunications have become highly critical and are required to support the growing need for robust, reliable and secure data communications with United Nations Headquarters in New York, the five offices in the subregions and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning, within the region and globally.

Outputs

- 17A.115 During the biennium 2008-2009, the following outputs will be delivered:
 - (a) Administrative Support Services: provision of authoritative interpretation of financial policy and procedures, financial reporting, accounting policies and systems; modernization and integration of financial systems, the improvement of financial reporting and strengthening accountability within the Commission;
 - (b) Human resources management: recruitment and placement; staff administration to administer conditions of service of ECA staff, including the staff of the five ECA subregional offices; staff services, including reviewing and processing of a range of entitlements and benefits; career development activities designed to strengthen the skills and competency of the staff; Health-Care Centre; staff/management relations;
 - (c) Conference services, which in the repositioned ECA, have clustered conference and language servicing, publications, documentation and reproduction under one umbrella forming the Publications and Conference Management Section to provide the following services: meetings, interpretation and verbatim reporting services; translation and editorial services; documentation and publication services, including text processing;
 - (d) Library services: provision of enhanced information and knowledge management support to the ECA programme by leveraging its information resources, services, systems and links; and by promoting the use of emerging techniques and strategies in information and knowledge services through the development of digital and virtual library platforms and networks;
 - (e) Technical cooperation management: the activities include management of extrabudgetary resources; support in the mobilization of technical assistance and financial resources for technical cooperation projects, including review and finalization of project documents and preparation of specific grant agreements in line with donor specifications; continuous backstopping to projects, including writing of ad hoc papers and development policy. Other activities include managing the processing and reporting of all field and extrabudgetary

- accounts, monitoring and recording of pledges from member States and various donors, and preparation of the related financial statements;
- (f) Information technology services: provision of the overall computing, telecommunications, office automation, support for the ICT infrastructure, software and hardware support and services that will fully satisfy the evolving requirements of ECA, its five subregional offices and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning; provision also of ICT services to collocated United Nations organizations, and support their ICT operational requirements in accordance with the United Nations common services agreement;
- (g) Integrated Management Information System (IMIS): the transformation of technology in the context of IMIS made possible by applying information and communication technologies by: enabling decision-making and administrative processes to become more effective; facilitating the sharing of ECA institutional knowledge and information; providing substantive divisions with tools to carry out more effectively their programme of work; and providing higher-quality services to staff, organs and bodies of ECA and assure data security;
- (h) Central support services: coordinate the preparation of the ECA procurement plan and manage implementation of the procurement process in a transparent and cost-effective manner; travel, logistics and transportation services, including the management of all the Commissions' travel activities as they relate to official travel of staff, dependants, participants and all others on official travel status to ECA; facilities management (including maintenance) through the provision of operation and maintenance services; archives and records management through the effective preservation of institutional memory and facilitation of seamless access to information needed for decision-making, knowledge management, evidence, programme analysis, and activity reporting; and administration and monitoring of commercial activities.

17A.116 The resource requirements of \$23,021,600 for posts will provide for 232 posts and reflect a decrease of \$2,955,900, which is the result of the outward redeployment of 1 D-1, 2 P-5, 4 P-4 and 9 local level posts, to Executive direction and management, to provide for the staffing of the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management. The amount of \$13,179,200 for non-post requirements reflects a net decrease of \$341,300, which is due to: decreases for travel of staff redeployed to Executive direction and management for the renamed Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management; contractual services due to reduced requirements for external printing arising from technological advances in ECA publications process; general operating expenses due in part to redeployment of resources to ECA five subregional offices, partly offset by

increases mainly under rental of premises due to extensive maintenance requirements related to various civil, mechanical, electrical installations, carpentry and metal works, utilities, communications; and furniture and equipment.

Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (A/60/7 and Corr.1)

The Committee requests that the proposals of the joint staff-management team and the actions taken in response to these proposals be reported in the next performance report (para. V.17).

ECA has taken note of the recommendation made by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions. The Joint Advisory Committee working group established in 2005 submitted its recommendation to the Executive Secretary. The recommendations, inter alia, include (i) profiles of all staff on general temporary assistance to be updated to assess them against available regular budget and extrabudgetary posts; (ii) Directors of Divisions to consider qualified staff funded from general temporary assistance for any vacancies; (iii) use income generated from other sources to accommodate staff funded from general temporary assistance performing functions in income generating areas; (iv) consideration of the special needs of the subregional offices. By concerned action by all concerned, ECA has been able to reduce the number of staff funded from general temporary assistance. The Executive Secretary has requested all Programme Managers to identify as much of the programme support funds as possible so that the number can be further reduced with a view to eventually enabling ECA to use general temporary assistance only in strictly temporary circumstances.

The Committee was informed that during 2006-2007 biennium, ECA will continue to strengthen its in-house printing capabilities for higherquality printing and will also direct efforts and resources towards making publications available electronically. The Committee requests that progress in this regard be reported in the next proposed programme budget of ECA (para. V.19).

The Commission has completed the first phase of strengthening its in-house printing capabilities to meet the need for quality production of documents and publications. The Commission print shop has now been upgraded almost to the level of other print shops in the United Nations system; more improvement will be planned during the second phase. As a result of this, the following has been accomplished:

Brief description of the recommendation

Action taken to implement the recommendation

- (a) The Commission documents and those from other United Nations agencies based in Addis Ababa are now being printed internally in the most cost-effective, efficient and timely manner, particularly from the quality point of view.
- (b) Internally, to have conformity; branding; and documents layout, size, colour, printing and print finishing with the ultimate aim of improving quality, and reduce transaction cost, the Commission has integrated the publishing and printing functions offering one-stop service in all production services from data processing through printing to dissemination.
- (c) To keep abreast of new technology and maintain improvement on quality of publications with reduced lead time, the Commission aims at improving the technical skills of staff by constant training and deploying a Professional post to this area.

Requirements for travel of staff, estimated at \$1,736,600 (before recosting) remain unchanged from 2004-2005, but nonetheless, in the view of the Advisory Committee, remain high. As discussed in paragraph V.5 ..., the investments in ICT and videoconferencing infrastructure should lead to less travel, especially between ECA and its regional offices and to destinations outside of Africa (see A/58/7, para V.18). The Committee reiterates its view that, given the high cost of travel in the region, with each trip budgeted at a minimum of \$2,000, efforts to limit travel should be pursued vigorously. The Committee requests that progress in this regard be reported in the next proposed programme budget of ECA (para. V.20).

ECA has undertaken efforts to reduce travel of staff and increase the use of teleconferencing and videoconferencing. The travel of staff in the biennium 2006-2007 is expected to reflect a reduction by approximately 13.9 per cent over the 2004-2005 biennium.

Brief description of the recommendation

Action taken to implement the recommendation

The Committee reiterates its opinion that there is a potential for considerable efficiency and productivity gains, as well as for cost savings under temporary assistance for meetings for translation, interpretation, proofreading and editorial services. It requests once again that ECA explore all opportunities for sharing the spare capacity that may be available at other duty stations at a given time and that it report on progress in this area in the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009 (para. V.22).

United Nations Office at Nairobi: The ECA has from October 2004 to June 2006 addressed 22 requests to United Nations Office at Nairobi for interpretation services for selected meetings. Of the 22 requests, United Nations Office at Nairobi could provide the services of about only 6. In addition, it was very difficult to secure a full team. ECA reimburses the cost of travel and daily susbsistence allowance only. No salary is involved. United Nations Office at Nairobi has not been able to provide translation work for ECA because they do not have the capacity. Rather ECA translation requests addressed to United Nations Office at Nairobi are outsourced by United Nations Office at Nairobi, ECA reimburses United Nations Office at Nairobi the translation fees plus charges, which has become costly. ECA will continue its collaboration with United Nations Office at Nairobi.

United Nations Office at Geneva: Since 2004 ECA has been securing the services of a seasoned United Nations Office at Geneva French Reviser for preparation of its major conferences (Conference of Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and various African Development Forum meetings).

Although ECA reimburses to United Nations Office at Geneva the reviser's salary for the period he is assigned to the Commission, including travel cost, there is a substantial gain in terms of quality and timeliness of work produced, including compliance with United Nations language standards.

United Nations Headquarters: ECA also started a translators/revisers exchange programme with Headquarters in 2004. This allows translators and revisers to be exposed to the working environment and be familiar with the terminology of the subject matters covered by both duty stations.

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Brief description of the recommendation

Action taken to implement the recommendation

Report of the Board of Auditors

(A/61/5, vol. I, chap. II)

The Administration agreed with the Board's recommendation that the Economic Commission for Africa, in consultation with United Nations Headquarters, reconsider its service charge policy in respect of discounts given (para. 334).

The Board recommends that the Economic Commission for Africa finalize and implement the proposed adjustment to its price list for conference rooms and offices and annually revise the prices accordingly (para. 338).

The Administration agreed with the Board's recommendation that the Economic Commission for Africa, in coordination with United Nations Headquarters, market the conference centre among Member States and United Nations offices and agencies in order to optimize its utilization. It also agreed with the Board's recommendation that the Commission undertake a feasibility study of the potential usage of the conference centre and present the report to United Nations Headquarters for consideration (para. 341).

A new charge policy has been adopted and was implemented in January 2007. Based on the new policy, United Nations Conference Centre — Addis Ababa has ceased to apply discounts previously given to United Nations agencies.

The adjusted price list for conference rooms, offices and equipment has been in force and applied at United Nations Conference Centre — Addis Ababa since January 2007. These rates will continue to be revised in accordance with the market demand with a mandatory biannual review.

- (a) It is to be noted that the utilization rate of United Nations Conference Centre Addis Ababa has increased significantly subsequent to this audit recommendation. The utilization rate as of 31 December 2006 was over 60 per cent as compared to 42 per cent in 2005. Aggressive marketing efforts were undertaken and still continue in the following directions:
 - (i) Liaison with the Ethiopian Government through the International Organizations Directorate at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to promote the United Nations Conference Centre — Addis Ababa among Member States during the General Assembly as well as United Nations agencies, offices and funds;
 - (ii) Direct and constant contact with big clients and regular clients including regional offices of United Nations agencies based in Addis Ababa to attract more statutory and regional conferences;
 - (iii) Planned activities with Addis Ababa Tourism Commission to optimize the utilization of United Nations Conference Centre — Addis Ababa by marketing Addis Ababa as a conference city.

Brief description of the recommendation

Action taken to implement the recommendation

- (b) The organizations authorized to use United Nations Conference Centre Addis Ababa were reviewed during the visit of the Assistant Secretary-General/Department for General Assembly and Conference Management to ECA in August 2006. United Nations entities, accredited Embassies, Ethiopian Government institutions, the African Union Commission, accredited nongovernmental organizations as well as reputable corporations are given access to hold meetings at United Nations Conference Centre Addis Ababa. This has led to a significant increase in the use of the United Nations Conference Centre facilities.
- (c) A major repositioning and restructuring exercise was undertaken in ECA during most of 2006, which led to the establishment of the Publication and Conference Management Division. This was followed by the redeployment of staff commission-wide in August 2006. This restructuring of ECA was mentioned in final report of the Assistant Secretary-General/Department for General Assembly and Conference Management of 6 September 2006 on his mission to Nairobi and Addis Ababa.
- (d) Further to the ongoing marketing operations, the feasibility study on the potential usage of United Nations Conference Centre Addis Ababa shall be conducted at a second stage towards the end of 2007 or early 2008.

The Administration agreed with the Board's recommendation that the Economic Commission for Africa, in consultation with the other regional commissions, United Nations Headquarters and the United Nations Development Group, develop policies and guidelines to foster regional interagency coordination among the United Nations agencies. The Board also recommends that the Economic Commission for Africa participate in all United Nations country team meetings, which serve as a platform for sharing information and hence would minimize the risk of duplication of effort

The annual regional consultation meetings currently serve as the main coordinating mechanism for United Nations agencies working in Africa. It carries out its activities in support of NEPAD through a cluster arrangement, working closely with the African Union, regional economic communities and the NEPAD secretariat. One way of strengthening the existing coordination mechanism is to develop clear guidelines to promote joint planning and synchronization of work programme cycles and priorities, with due regard to the

(para. 368).

The Board recommends that the Economic Commission for Africa follow up with the concerned agencies and organizations the outstanding rentals for 2004. The Board also recommends that the Economic Commission for Africa include in the memorandums of understanding a clause that specifies the payment terms as well as a penalty clause in respect of late rental payments (para. 581).

Discussions were held with United Nations agencies. The resulting recommendation is being gradually implemented. With regard to the penalty clause, advice from the Office of Legal Affairs pending.



ECA is of the opinion that the annual letter sent to the United Nations agencies is sufficient (as it contains all the details required) for the purpose. However, with effect from 2007, the agencies will be required to sign the letter ascertaining agreement and acceptance of the

Some mechanism has already been put in place for undertaking common services, such as travel, Internet provision, satellite services and access to global private networks of sister organizations; videoconference facilities; telephony, desktop maintenance; IT training; LAN management and administration; Lotus Notes and corporate mail services; wireless MAN. A major challenge, however, is coordinating common procurement since many of the agencies rely on their headquarters for their procurement. Nevertheless, ECA will endeavour to pursue this with the United Nations country team.



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Section 17B Regional Commissions New York Office

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$1,685,800

17B.1 The Regional Commissions New York Office serves as the focal point for all aspects of the substantive and operational activities of the five regional commissions with departments, offices and programmes at United Nations Headquarters. It also maintains regular contact, on behalf of the regional commissions, with permanent missions of States Members to the United Nations, relevant intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, liaison offices of organizations of the United Nations system and the public in New York. The Office acts as the global coordinating secretariat for the cooperative and interregional activities among the regional commissions; services the meetings of the Executive Secretaries and provides support to the functions of the current Coordinator of the regional commissions. It provides the commissions with analysis and synthesis of developments as they occur during intergovernmental and inter-agency meetings held at Headquarters, as well as policy recommendations relating to these developments. The Office provides substantive and representational activities to the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council relevant to the work of the regional commissions. Through its participation in these global intergovernmental meetings, the Office ensures that the mandates and activities of the regional commissions, which address a wide variety of economic and social issues, are taken into account in the deliberations and recommendations of the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council and their subsidiary bodies. It participates in inter-agency and inter-secretariat meetings such as the United Nations System Chief Executives Board for Coordination (CEB), the United Nations Development Group and the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs and their subsidiary bodies to ensure effective representation of all the regional commissions and relevant United Nations organizations, including the funds and programmes and the specialized agencies.

Outputs

- The Office represents the five regional commissions at Headquarters at intergovernmental, interagency and inter-secretariat meetings; acts as a channel of information among the regional commissions, Headquarters, permanent missions of Member States in New York and the general public; and acts as a coordinating secretariat for interregional cooperation, including as a clearing house for the development account project proposals of the commissions and in support of the role of the current Coordinator of the regional commissions. The Office in line with the Economic and Social Council mandate in its resolution 1998/46 publishes a biennial newsletter in print and on the United Nations website, which is circulated to delegations, relevant entities within the United Nations and funds, programmes and agencies of the United Nations system, other relevant institutions and the general public.
- 17B.3 The Office is responsible for the preparation of the annual report of the Secretary-General on regional cooperation in the economic, social and related fields, which is submitted to the Economic and Social Council at its substantive session. The report combines three separate annual reports mandated by the Council.

17B.4 The amount of \$1,685,800, comprises: (a) \$1,576,300 for six posts in the Regional Commissions New York Office, reflecting a net decrease of \$22,800, resulting from (i) the establishment of a new P-3 post as of 2009 with responsibility to follow up and address a cluster of economic and sustainable development-related issues and the implementation of the global United Nations conferences; carry out necessary substantive research and analysis; ensure that lessons learned from recent global findings and policy guidelines relating to economic and sustainable development are shared and disseminated to the regional commissions; promote the effective implementation of the provisions of Economic and Social Council resolution 1998/46, annex III; provide support to intergovernmental bodies; represent the regional commissions, as appropriate, at intergovernmental and inter-agency meetings; prepare joint inputs of the regional commissions to global reports, as necessary; provide substantive servicing of meetings and support to the production and publication by the Office of the biannual newsletter "Regional Commissions Development"; and advise and prepare analytical reports of developments and resolutions; and (ii) the abolition of one General Service (Principal level) post in the light of streamlining operations and application of information technology leading to redistribution of existing functions of the post and need for greater professional capacity; and (b) an amount of \$109,500 for related non-post requirements, including, inter alia, travel of staff, general operating expenses and furniture and equipment.
