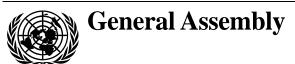

Views received from Governments in accordance with paragraphs 5 (c) and 6 (b) of General Assembly resolution 62/13

Germany

- 1. Germany would like to present its views on General Assembly resolution 62/13, entitled "Objective information on military matters, including transparency of military expenditures", in accordance with paragraph 6 (b).
- 2. Germany continues to consider objective information on military matters, including transparency of military expenditures, a significant element for building confidence and enhancing better understanding among States. The standardized reporting system on military expenditures is an important instrument in this respect.
- 3. Participation in the standardized reporting system has increased almost steadily since the instrument was first implemented in 1981, reaching its highest annual numbers in 2002 and 2006, with 82 national submissions. However, participation has stagnated since 2002, with approximately 80 national submissions per year. Efforts to raise the profile of the standardized reporting system, especially at the regional and subregional levels, and to increase participation should therefore further be strengthened. In this regard, Germany welcomes the initiative taken by the Office for Disarmament Affairs in 2009 to organize a regional workshop in Dakar.
- 4. The increase in worldwide military spending since 1999 underlines the need for a strong and efficient reporting system on military expenditures. Germany therefore welcomes the fact that resolution 62/13 requests the Secretary-General to establish a group of governmental experts, on the basis of equitable geographical representation, to review the operation and further development of the Standardized Instrument for Reporting Military Expenditures, commencing in 2010, taking into account the views expressed by Member States on the subject and the reports of the Secretary-General on objective information on military matters, including transparency of military expenditures, and to transmit their report to the General Assembly for consideration at its sixty-sixth session.
- 5. Germany considers that the work of the group of governmental experts should include a review of procedures and of the implementation and efficiency of the reporting system, including an investigation into barriers to the participation of Member States. The outcome of the review should include proposals to facilitate greater and more regular participation. Efforts to improve the reporting system should lead to reliable, comparable and user-friendly data. Proposals such as improving the questionnaire, establishing an electronic database, evaluating reports on a regular basis, reconsidering requirements for the United Nations Secretariat and enhancing public information on the reporting system should be examined. Germany is committed to actively support the work of the group of governmental experts and hosted an initial brainstorming seminar in May 2009 in preparation.

Germany will also continue to participate actively in all appropriate forums to discuss transparency on military expenditures as a means to contribute to increased overall transparency and confidence among the Member States of the United Nations and thus, to the objective of an overall reduction in military expenditures, in the interest of strengthening global peace and security.
