- 21.1 The overall orientation of the programme is to foster comprehensive, equitable, integrated and sustainable development and economic and social cooperation in the region, and to maintain and strengthen economic relations between the member countries of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) and with other countries of the world. ESCWA is responsible for the implementation of the programme.
- 21.2 Policy direction for the programme is provided in Economic and Social Council resolutions 1818 (LV) and 1985/69, establishing ESCWA and amending its terms of reference in order to underscore the social functions of the Commission. Further direction is provided in Economic and Social Council resolution 2005/50, in which ESCWA was requested to provide support to member countries in realizing the Millennium Development Goals, including by building capacities to formulate policies, monitor the progress made, measure its impact and prepare regional reports. In addition, in its resolution 269 (XXIV), the Commission requested its Executive Secretary to increase coherence and synergy with other regional United Nations organizations and, through the Commission's lead role in the regional coordination mechanism, foster partnerships and cooperation with those organizations.
- 21.3 Acting in their dual role as regional arms of the United Nations and parts of their respective regional institutional landscape, ESCWA and the four other regional commissions will continue to pursue their common key objectives, namely, to foster economic integration at the subregional and regional levels, to promote the regional implementation of internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals, and to support regional sustainable development by contributing to bridging economic, social and environmental gaps in their respective member countries and subregions. In order to achieve these objectives, the regional commissions, through their convening power, will continue to generate multilateral dialogue, knowledge-sharing and networking at the regional level, and will work together to promote intraregional and interregional cooperation, both between themselves and through collaboration with other subregional and regional organizations.

- 21.4 The region has made varied progress in social development, especially in the education and health sectors. Some countries have developed mechanisms to invest surplus capital savings resulting from high energy prices, which have contributed to the acceleration of economic growth and social development. Political instability, foreign occupation and lack of adequate reform continue to influence economic performance in the countries of the region. Good governance is another area that requires urgent attention in order to ensure transparent and inclusive policymaking and implementation mechanisms for the effective delivery of public goods and services. Against this backdrop, the region remains in the grip of a widening gap in income and wealth distribution within, as well as between, countries.
- 21.5 Furthermore, it is envisaged that global climate change will have an adverse impact on the economic and social development of the region, especially when water and agricultural land become less available to fulfil the fundamental needs of its population. The poor and other vulnerable groups, including women and youth without employment, are expected to suffer most from adverse weather changes, in particular in conflict-stricken areas, further aggravating the instability of the region. In December 2007, the Council of Arab Ministers Responsible for the Environment (a subsidiary body of the League of Arab States) adopted a ministerial declaration on climate change which constitutes the basis for future actions and reflects their position in dealing with climate change issues. The Arab Ministerial Declaration stated that, while emphasizing that developed countries should fulfil their commitment to supporting developing countries, including Arab countries, in meeting climate change challenges, the Declaration affirmed the commitment of the Ministers, inter alia, to include policies to deal with climate change issues in all sectors within national and regional policies for sustainable development in a manner that harmonizes with sustained economic growth and efforts to eradicate poverty, and to adopt national and regional action plans dealing with climate change.
- 21.6 It is therefore essential for the region to enhance its collective efforts to address those critical issues through ESCWA-promoted regional integration initiatives. In order to accelerate regional economic integration, it is a fundamental necessity to promote intraregional trade and investment, integrate transport and communications infrastructure, harmonize trade and transport facilitation, and coordinate strategies and plans for the development of the information and communications technology sector within the framework of the Tunis Agenda for the Information Society, which was adopted at the World Summit on the Information Society (Tunis, 2005). Integrated social policies that balance economic development and social needs should also be pursued with insight and vigour.
- 21.7 The need to enhance statistical institutional capacity continues to be essential if countries in the region are to produce timely, reliable, comparable and increased gender-sensitive statistics for policy and programme formulation, and for monitoring the progress made towards the achievement of internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals. Monitoring of the effects of foreign occupation on economic and social development in the region is becoming increasingly important. As the regional arm of the United Nations, ESCWA will continue to advocate gender equality and the advancement of women, paying due attention to regional specificities and values. It will provide full support to member countries in their participation in the Beijing+15 review in 2010 and follow up on its outcomes. Throughout the programme, priority will be given to least developed and conflict-stricken countries.
- 21.8 In the biennium 2010-2011, ESCWA will pursue the programme objective by promoting economic and social integration at both the subregional and regional levels, and by fostering solidarity in the international political arena and global economy. Such regional integration will be scaled up to cover the Arab region through strategic partnerships with the Economic Commission for Africa Subregional Office for North Africa and with such regional and subregional organizations as the

League of Arab States (LAS) and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC). The programme comprises seven interdependent subprogrammes that focus on four regional priority areas and three cross-cutting issues, which are set forth below:

- (a) Stimulating sustainable management of water, energy and other natural resources, with due consideration to climate change;
- (b) Promoting integrated social policies;
- (c) Stimulating sustainable economic development based on higher productivity and competitiveness and through regional integration and cooperation in a globalizing world;
- (d) Accelerating the development, adaptation, diffusion and use of advanced technology;
- (e) Enhancing statistical capacity development;
- (f) Promoting gender mainstreaming, the advancement of women and their effective participation and involvement;
- (g) Giving special consideration to people living in conflict-stricken countries.

21.9 ESCWA will carry out analytical and normative work, building on its accumulated knowledge and multidisciplinary expertise, which will be supported by the provision of technical cooperation. It will also facilitate multilateral dialogue, knowledge-sharing and networking on the outcome of the work of the Commission on national, regional and global development issues, with due consideration to the outcomes of the global meeting on South-South cooperation to commemorate the thirtieth anniversary of the Buenos Aires Plan of Action for Promoting and Implementing Technical Cooperation among Developing Countries. In pursuance of the United Nations global priority, gender mainstreaming will be promoted throughout the programme and within the Commission. Lessons learned from evaluation will serve as the basis for further improvement of the programme, in the light of the United Nations commitment to promote evaluation for enhancing learning and accountability.

21.10 It is expected that regional support provided by ESCWA will contribute towards the following:

- (a) Increased national capacity to formulate and implement pro-poor, inclusive economic and social policies and programmes, and tackle transboundary issues;
- (b) Improved provision of joint responses to multifaceted problems encountered by the countries of the region through the coordinated efforts and consolidated resources of United Nations entities;
- (c) Enhanced work of the Economic and Social Council and its functional commissions in the review and assessment of progress made in implementing the outcomes of United Nations conferences and summits in the economic, social and related fields;
- (d) Increased knowledge-sharing and South-South cooperation between the countries of the region and with countries in other regions, thereby promoting regional and interregional cooperation.

21.11 Consultations at the level of thematic clusters have taken place between concerned Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs entities, and are expected to lead to better coordination and more collaborative work in the economic and social sectors between programmes in major common work areas of the United Nations Secretariat. At the regional level, ESCWA will lead the regional coordination mechanism in identifying priority areas where the concerned United Nations entities could provide collective support for development interventions in the ESCWA region, as well as in the broader context of the Arab region.

- 21.12 The overall resources proposed for the biennium 2010-2011 amount to \$65,883,200, reflecting a resource growth of \$1,164,500, or 1.8 per cent, compared with the revised appropriation for the biennium 2008-2009. The growth reflected in table 21.5 below, can be summarized as follows:
- (a) The decrease of \$3,400 under executive direction and management relates to non-post requirements;
 - (b) The increase of \$1,365,100 under the programme of work is the result of: (i) an increase of \$1,353,700 under posts related to the delayed impact of the establishment of six posts (1 P-4 in subprogramme 1, 1 P-4 in subprogramme 2, 1 P-4 in subprogramme 3, 1 P-5 and 1 National Officer in subprogramme 4, and 1 P-3 in subprogramme 5) in the biennium 2008-2009; and (ii) a marginal increase under non-post requirements (\$11,400);
 - (c) The decrease of \$197,200 under programme support is the net result of: (i) a decrease of \$210,400 under non-post resources related to the non-recurrent provisions under alteration of office space, office furniture and office automation equipment for six new posts established effective 2009 in the context of General Assembly resolution 63/260 on development-related activities; partially offset by (ii) a net increase of \$13,200 under posts related to the establishment of a National Officer post for facilities management and the abolition of a Local level post in Central Support Services in the Administrative Services Division.
- 21.13 During the biennium 2010-2011, expected extrabudgetary resources, amounting to \$7,796,500, would be utilized to complement resources from the regular budget to finance activities aimed at national capacity-building, including advisory service missions, training workshops and field projects. The reduction in the overall level of extrabudgetary resources is the result of the discontinuation of a contribution to ESCWA from the United Nations Development Group Iraq Trust Fund.
- 21.14 The issue of publications as a part of the programme of work has been reviewed in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as summarized below and as described in the output information for each subprogramme.

A. Policymaking organs

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$144,800

- 21.17 The Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia is comprised of 14 member States.
- 21.18 The session of the Commission, which reports to the Economic and Social Council, provides overall direction to the work of the secretariat. It meets once biennially for five working days, normally at its headquarters. As mandated by resolution 223 (XX) which was adopted on 27 May 1999 at the twentieth session of the Commission, the Preparatory Committee will meet prior to the plenary of the Commission to consider programmatic agenda items. Consequently, the twenty-sixth session will be convened in 2010, with a session comprising the Preparatory Committee Segment (3 days in 2010), followed by the Ministerial Plenary Segment (2 days in 2010).
- 21.19 The Technical Committee meets biannually to advise the ESCWA secretariat on the programmatic issues, including the draft strategic framework, the proposed programme of work, and follow-up on the implementation of the programme of work; mobilization of extrabudgetary resources; follow-up on the Commission's resolutions, and identifying emerging regional economic and social issues for the consideration of the Commission session. The Technical Committee was established pursuant to the decision of the Commission at its twenty-fourth session, with the aim of enhancing interaction and close consultation between the members of the Commission and its secretariat on substantive development issues.

- 21.20 The Commission has seven specialized subsidiary intergovernmental committees, six of them meet biennially and one meets annually.¹ During the biennium 2010-2011, the sequence and dates of their sessions and that of the Technical Committee will be as follows:
- (a) The eighth session of the Committee on Energy (subprogramme 1) (2 days in 2010);
 - (b) The ninth session of the Committee on Water Resources (subprogramme 1) (3 days in 2010);
 - (c) The eighth session of the Committee on Social Development (subprogramme 2) (3 days in 2011);
 - (d) The eleventh and twelfth sessions of the Committee on Transport (subprogramme 3) (3 days in 2010 and 3 days in 2011);
 - (e) The seventh session of the Technical Committee on Liberalization of Foreign Trade and Economic Globalization in the Countries of the ESCWA Region (subprogramme 3) (2 days in 2011);
 - (f) The ninth session of the Statistical Committee (subprogramme 5) (3 days in 2010);
 - (g) The fifth session Committee on Women (subprogramme 6) (3 days in 2011);
 - (h) The fifth meeting of the Technical Committee (2 days in 2010);
 - (i) The sixth meeting of the Technical Committee (2 days in 2010);
 - (j) The seventh meeting of the Technical Committee (2 days in 2011);
 - (k) The eighth meeting of the Technical Committee (2 days in 2011).
- 21.21 The Advisory Committee of Ambassadors meets twice a year to ensure the continued dialogue between the secretariat and member States. It is comprised of heads of diplomatic missions in the host country of the Commission, as well as a high-level representative of the host country. The Advisory Committee plays a consultative role and functions as a principal means of communications between member States and the ESCWA secretariat and among member States themselves on important matters requiring attention during the period between the biennial sessions of the Commission (1 day 2 times in 2010 and 1 day 2 times in 2011).
- 21.22 The total number of meetings of the legislative bodies amount to 35 meeting days.

- 21.23 A provision of \$144,800 is required under: (a) temporary assistance for meetings to provide interpretation and translation services; and (b) general temporary assistance during the session of

the Commission, the sessions of its seven subsidiary intergovernmental committees and the biannual meeting of the ESCWA Technical Committee.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$3,746,200

- 21.24 Executive direction and management comprises the Office of the Executive Secretary and the ESCWA United Nations Information Services.
- 21.25 The Office of the Executive Secretary provides overall direction and integrated management, programme oversight, planning and coordination, as well as policy guidelines to the substantive divisions, the technical cooperation programme and other support services for the proper implementation of the work programme of ESCWA as mandated by the General Assembly, and the realization of United Nations system-wide policies and mandates. It ensures that ESCWA, as the regional arm of the United Nations, plays a major role in the economic and social development of the region, undertakes to translate issues of global importance into regional action as mandated by member States, and facilitates the articulation of the collective concerns of member countries by incorporating them into the global agenda. Moreover, the Office maintains effective and regular contact with representatives of member States, to exchange views on substantive issues of mutual concern, with the Executive Office of the Secretary-General and with the regional commissions coordination office in New York.
- 21.26 The Office of the Executive Secretary also ensures more coherence and effective collaboration and coordination between ESCWA and the rest of the United Nations Secretariat, especially among the five regional commissions, specialized agencies, funds and programmes. It will continue to strengthen cooperation and coordination with international and regional intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, especially with the League of Arab States and its subsidiary bodies.
- 21.27 The Office of the Executive Secretary is responsible for the functioning and servicing of the intergovernmental machinery of the Commission, including its biennial session and its subsidiary bodies, the ESCWA Advisory Committee of Ambassadors and the ESCWA Technical Committee.
- 21.28 The Office of the Executive Secretary also gives overall direction to services rendered by the ESCWA United Nations Information Services, whose core functions are to disseminate public information on the work of ESCWA throughout the region and to provide information services to the Office and the Divisions of ESCWA. The activities of ESCWA United Nations Information Services aim at increasing public awareness and understanding of the work conducted by the United Nations, in general, and ESCWA, in particular, and mobilizing public support for the increased role of ESCWA in the economic and social development of the region.

External factors

- 21.29 The Office is expected to achieve its objectives and accomplishments on the assumption that:
- (a) the political situation in the host country and the region does not deteriorate further;
 - (b) member Governments will actively participate in the formulation of the ESCWA programme of

work; (c) member countries have the capacity and will to reorient their economic and social structures and policies; and (d) national institutions will be willing to provide relevant and timely information.

Outputs

21.30 During the biennium 2010-2011, the following final outputs will be delivered:

- (a) Servicing of intergovernmental and expert bodies (regular budget):
 - (i) Planning and substantive servicing of the sessions of the Commission and its subsidiary bodies (54);
 - (ii) Planning and substantive servicing of the ESCWA Technical Committee (16);
 - (iii) Planning and substantive servicing of the meetings of the Advisory Committee of Ambassadors (8);
 - (iv) Ad hoc expert groups: planning and substantive servicing of an Arab “think tank” meeting (2);
- (b) Other substantive activities
 - (i) Recurrent publications: ESCWA annual report;
 - (ii) Seminars organized by the Secretariat: briefings/lectures to schools, universities and other visitors on the work of United Nations in general and ESCWA in specific;
 - (iii) Booklets, fact sheets, wall charts, information kits: brochures, pamphlets, leaflets, posters and other promotional material on ESCWA activities; electronic daily news in English and Arabic on the ESCWA website; information kit for the ESCWA Ministerial Session; and ESCWA Weekly News;
 - (iv) Press releases and press conferences: organization of press conferences and press briefings for the Executive Secretary and other senior officials as well as for the launching of flagship publications and major events; organization of press interviews for the Executive Secretary and other senior officials; preparation of press releases in English and Arabic on ESCWA meetings and activities and their dissemination to media throughout the region; and provision of media coverage for ESCWA meetings and activities;
 - (v) Special events: planning and servicing of the annual celebrations of United Nations Day;

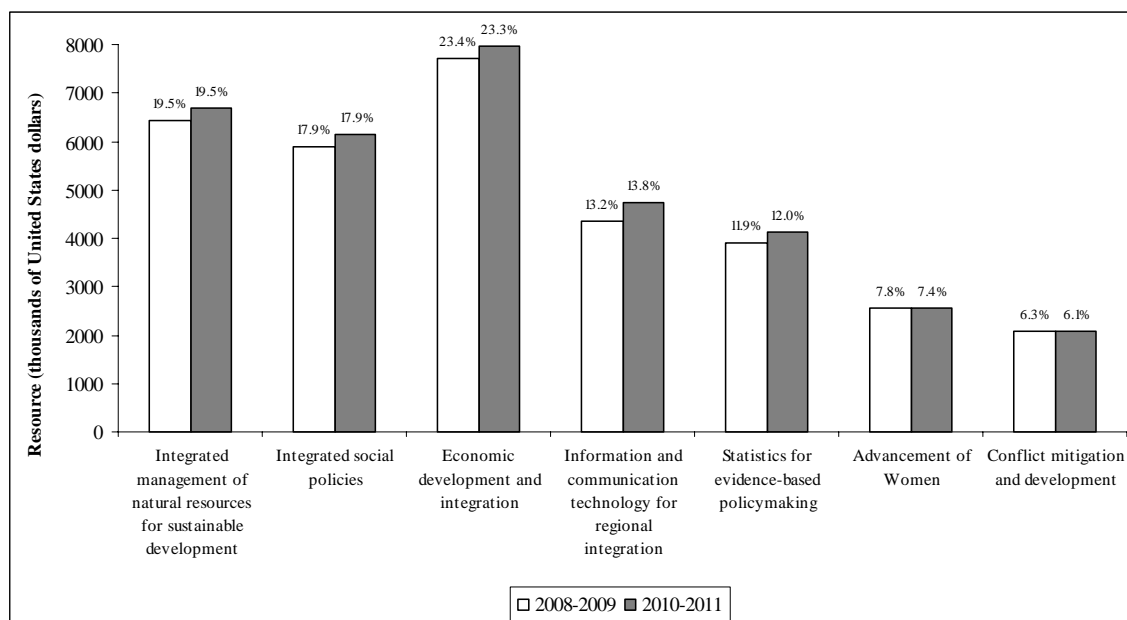

- 21.36 The amount of \$6,279,000 under posts, reflecting an increase of \$257,000, would provide for the continued funding of 25 posts (15 Professional and above, and 10 Local level) as indicated in the table above. The increase relates to the delayed impact of one P-4 post established effective January 2009 in the context of General Assembly resolution 63/260 on development-related activities.
- 21.37 The related non-post requirements of \$406,200 would be required for other personnel costs, consultants, expert group meetings and travel of staff.

- 21.43 The requirements for non-post resources in the amount of \$392,600 would provide for other personnel costs, consultants, expert group meetings and travel of staff.

 - (i) Economic and Social Council: parliamentary documentation: reports on the economic and social repercussions of the Israeli occupation on the living conditions of the Palestinian people in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including Jerusalem, and of the Arab population of the occupied Syrian Golan (2);
 - (ii) Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia: parliamentary documentation: report on the impact of conflict or political crisis on the socio-economic development in the ESCWA region;
 - (iii) Ad hoc expert group meetings on: approaches for sustainable development under crisis conditions: conflict and the Millennium Development Goals; and good governance and management of public services under conflict or political instability: follow-up;
- (b) Other substantive activities (regular budget):
 - (i) Recurrent publications: trends and impact in conflict settings (Issue 2);
 - (ii) Non-recurrent publications: impact of the food security crisis on ESCWA member countries;
 - (iii) Booklets, fact sheets, wall charts, information kits: brochure on the socio-economic conditions in the occupied Palestinian territory (2); fact sheets on the socio-economic situation in the region's least developed countries; and information kits on selected ESCWA substantive activities related to areas in conflict or political instability;
 - (iv) Special events: International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People (2);
 - (v) Technical material: contribution to ESCWA Public Administration Network (PAN) website on activities on public administration and governance in the Arab region, ESCWA being the regional node of United Nations Public Administration and Finance (UNPAN) for the Arab countries (2); maintenance and updating of the ESCWA home page on conflict mitigation and development; situation analysis addressing socio-economic developments in the region's least developed countries; and working paper on emerging socio-economic issues under conditions of conflict or political instability;
 - (vi) Contribution to joint outputs: contribution and participation in the Division for Palestinian Rights of the Secretariat meetings on the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People; substantive contribution to United Nations country teams' strategy and priorities in Iraq, Lebanon, the Sudan, Yemen and Palestine; and substantive coordination and contribution to the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development Unit on Palestine;
- (c) Technical cooperation (regular budget/extrabudgetary):

- (i) Training courses, seminars and workshops: workshops on promoting decentralization in the ESCWA region: capacity-building on governance;
- (ii) Field projects: building the capacity for good governance to enhance development in crisis-afflicted countries; carob agroforestry in sustainable livelihoods and conservation in Lebanon; promoting good governance practices: capacity-building for local governance in Iraq; and supporting peaceful coexistence and communal harmony among adolescents in Iraq through non-formal education.

- 21.72 The amount of \$1,975,000 would provide for the continued funding of eight posts (5 Professional and above, and 3 Local level) as indicated in the table above.
- 21.73 Non-post resources of \$112,200, reflecting an increase of \$2,600, would provide for other personnel related costs, consultants, expert group meetings and travel of staff.
- 21.74 Extrabudgetary resources of \$4,000,400 would be used for technical cooperation activities such as workshops and field projects, to enable member countries to mitigate the negative impact of conflict or political instability on their socio-economic development, and to enable them to provide basic public services to their societies under those conditions. The projected decrease in extrabudgetary resources is a result of the completion of the United Nations Development Group-Iraq Trust Fund projects, partly offset by increased funding for new projects.

D. Programme support

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$27,685,600

- 21.75 Programme support comprises the Administrative Services Division, and the Programme Planning and Technical Cooperation Division.

Outputs

- 21.76 The outputs of the Administrative Services Division include the following:
- (a) Overall administration and management: advising the Executive Secretary on all administrative, management, and organizational matters; provision of policy guidelines and coordination of the central common services; representation of the United Nations in negotiations with the host country on various issues relating to implementation of the

headquarters agreement; and providing managerial oversight of the Security Service at ESCWA;

- (b) Human resources management: recruitment and placement; provision of staff administration and staff welfare services; training; career development and upgrading of substantive skills; staff-management relations, provision of medical services and legal advice; and succession planning, in cooperation with programme managers, focusing on gender issues;
- (c) Budgetary and financial services: provision of guidance, coordination and support services to programme managers in the preparation of programme budget proposals and performance reports; overall control of utilization of programme budget and extrabudgetary resources; provision of accounting services and financial disbursements, including payroll, vendors, per diem and other entitlements; coordination of the Integrated Management Information System (IMIS); formulation of administrative responses and monitoring of follow-up to the reports of various oversight bodies, such as the Board of Auditors, the Joint Inspection Unit and the Office of Internal Oversight Services; review and analysis of proposals relating to extrabudgetary financing; preparation of memorandums of understanding; and negotiation, monitoring and implementation of cost-sharing arrangements with the various United Nations agencies;
- (d) Information technology, communications and systems: provision of information technology services and infrastructure and standardization of software and hardware; provision of in-house programming services to all substantive divisions in order to ensure compatibility with the existing technology, as well as to establish a centralized control management system of the Local Area Network; provision of videoconferencing; and enhancement of the ESCWA Internet and Intranet sites;
- (e) Central support services: administration of the implementation of the headquarters agreement between the United Nations and the host Government; facilities management and maintenance; provision of commercial and procurement services; transportation, logistic and travel services; liaison with Government officials of the host country; provision of postal services; maintenance of central registry and archives system; and store and inventory management;
- (f) Conference services: provision of conference services to the policymaking organs of ESCWA and other intergovernmental meetings held under its auspices, including the preparation and coordination of official meetings; provision of interpretation, verbatim reporting, translation, editorial services; documentation and publication services; and secretarial and technical support;
- (g) Library services: provision of library services and information to staff, member States, United Nations libraries and depository libraries and other clients, including the acquisition of publications, databases; indexing of ESCWA documents on the Official Documents System to make them available to Internet users; and developing library Internet and Intranet web pages.

21.77 The outputs of the Programme Planning and Technical Cooperation Division include the following:

- (a) Planning, monitoring and evaluation: provision of guidance and support to the substantive divisions in the formulation of the biennial programme plan, programme budget, including regular budget and extrabudgetary technical cooperation proposals, taking into account the global requirements and the emerging regional development issues, and in the implementation and evaluation of their programme of work, including programme performance reporting;

- (b) Programme coordination: provision of policy guidelines to the substantive offices with a view to: (i) ensuring the mainstreaming of internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals, into the ESCWA programme; (ii) promoting multidisciplinary approach and collaborative activities; and (iii) improving the coherence between analytical, normative and operational activities; and coordination and liaison with the other Executive Committee for Economic and Social Affairs entities, other United Nations and non-United Nations intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations for joint programming, with the aim of landscaping regional perspectives in pursuing the internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals, and providing regional support to national capacity development in this regard;
- (c) Management of technical cooperation activities: provision of policy guidance and support to the substantive offices in the formulation, monitoring and evaluation of their respective technical cooperation programmes and projects, including those projects funded from the Development Account; management of the Regular Programme of Technical Cooperation and Development Account, and coordination with the Department of Economic and Social Affairs in this respect; facilitation of networking and knowledge management on ESCWA technical cooperation; provision of proactive support to partnership development and resource mobilization within the context of the ESCWA Technical Cooperation Strategy; and promotion of information and communication support and promotional initiatives on technical cooperation programmes and technical cooperation development.

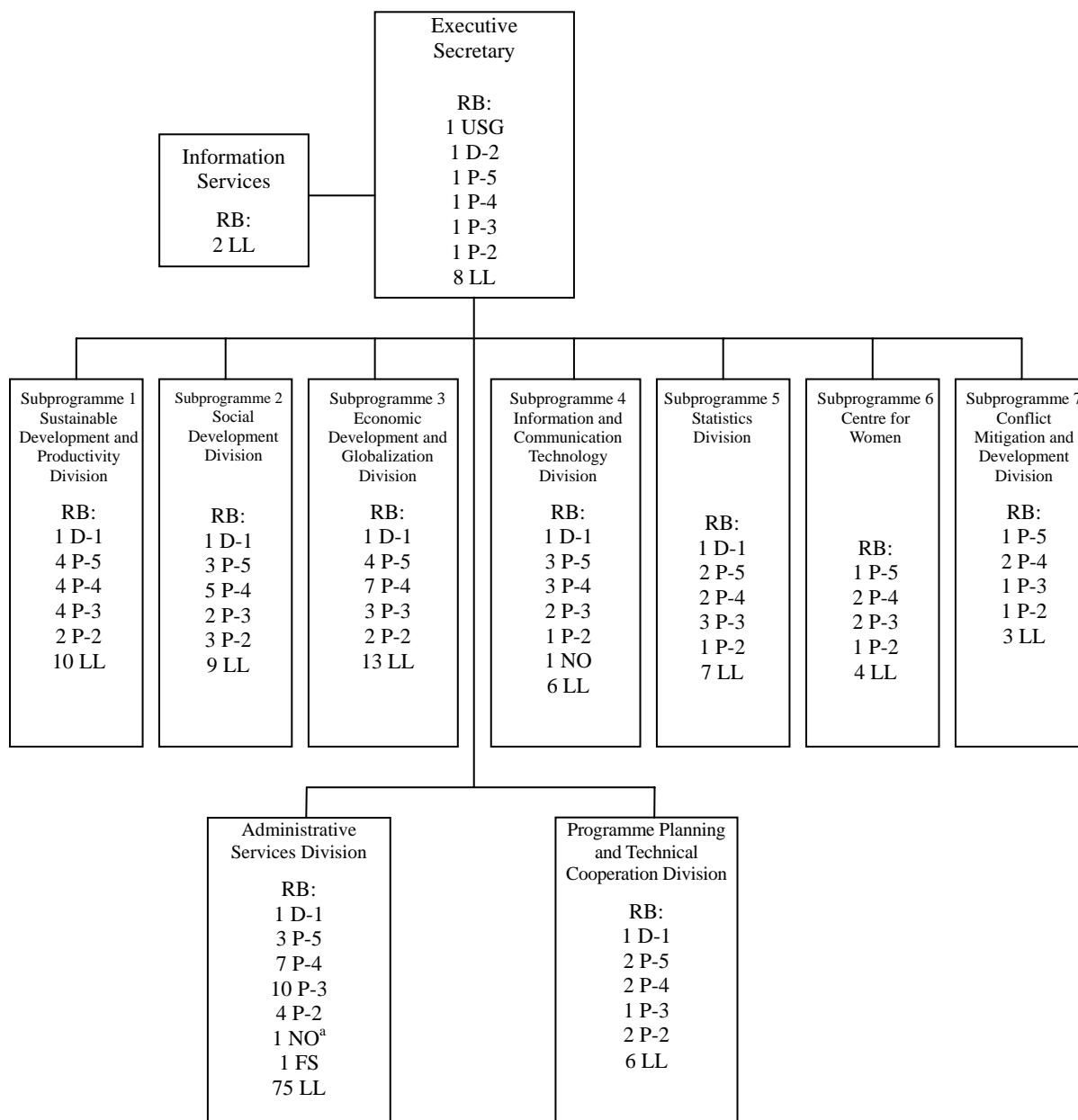
- 21.78 The amount of \$19,999,400 under posts, reflecting an increase of \$13,200, provides for the funding of 116 posts (33 Professional and above, and 83 Local level, Field service and National Officer) as indicated in the table above. The net increase is the result of the abolition of one Local level post and the establishment of one National Officer post for facility management in the Central Support Services in the Administrative Services Division. The proposed establishment of the National Officer post responds to a need for good knowledge of the local business conditions and environment, fluency in the local language, and a good understanding of local policies and regulations. The proposal for National Officer is submitted bearing in mind the view expressed by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its first report on the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2008-2009 (see A/62/7 and Corr.1, para. 41).
- 21.79 Requirements under non-post resources of \$7,686,200, reflecting a decrease of \$210,400, include inter alia, (a) other personnel related costs; (b) consultants to provide for specialized legal expertise, and for strengthening monitoring and evaluation systems; (c) travel of staff; (d) general operating expenses; and (e) contribution to the ESCWA Joint Medical Services Unit. The reduced

requirements relate to the non-recurrent provision under alteration of office space, office furniture and office automation equipment for the six new posts established effective 2009 in the context of General Assembly resolution 63/260 on development-related activities.

- 21.80 Extrabudgetary resources of \$543,000 would provide for services in support of technical cooperation activities. The projected decrease in the level of resources reflect the overall reduction in the anticipated level of extrabudgetary resources made available to ESCWA during the biennium 2010-2011 resulting in lower programme support income.
