Corrigendum

1. Paragraph 12

The first sentence *should read*

With the closure of the United Nations Observer Mission in Georgia (UNOMIG) in 2009, the transition of the United Nations Integrated Office in Burundi (BINUB) to the United Nations Office in Burundi (BNUB), the closure of MINURCAT at the end of 2010, the reconfiguration of the United Nations Mission in Kosovo (UNMIK) in 2009 and of the United Nations Stabilization Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (MONUSCO) in 2010, current deployment figures stand at 13 peacekeeping operations and one special political mission, with approximately 124,000 field personnel and an aggregate annual operating budget of approximately \$7.7 billion.

2. Paragraph 77

The first sentence *should read*

Strategic planning guidance has assisted the field missions and the police and other law enforcement agencies in Chad, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Haiti, Kosovo, Liberia, the Sudan and Timor-Leste in developing their police reform and development operations planning and assessment.



3. Paragraph 99

The fifth sentence *should read*

Vacancy rates for international staff decreased from 21.9 per cent as at 31 December 2009 to 21.3 per cent as at 31 December 2010; during the same period, the challenge in addressing vacancy rates was compounded by a number of factors, including security ceilings and difficult living and working conditions in certain missions and evolving needs for specialized expertise and skills.

4. Paragraph 105

The first sentence *should read*

As part of the implementation of the global field support strategy, the financial framework for mission start-up or expansion has been strengthened through approval by the General Assembly of access to up to \$100 million from the Peacekeeping Reserve Fund and up to \$50 million of the strategic deployment stocks without replenishment until the appropriation of funding for a new or expanding mission; this has led to more robust financing of new operations without additional funding from Member States.

5. Paragraph 121 (b)

The subparagraph *should read*

Approve the renaming of the Peacekeeping Best Practices Section to the Policy and Best Practices Service.
