#### 3. Paragraph 36

#### The paragraph should read

36. The unspent balance was attributable primarily to (a) lower than projected requirements for special measures for international staff following the earthquake, and (b) reduced requirements for hazardous duty station allowances, owing to the higher average vacancy of 13.9 per cent compared to 9 per cent budgeted and the absence of staff from the mission area due to various measures following the earthquake. The unspent balance was offset partly by higher requirements related to the implementation of new contractual arrangements approved in General Assembly resolution 63/250, and payments to staff who remained eligible for mission subsistence allowance as well as transitional arrangements for mission subsistence allowance for personnel on assignment prior to 1 July 2009.

#### 4. Paragraph 39

#### The paragraph should read

39. The unspent balance was attributable primarily to higher average vacancy rates of 28.2 per cent for international staff and 6.3 per cent for national staff compared to 5 per cent budgeted for both categories, resulting in reduced requirements for salaries and hazardous duty station allowances.
