

### Standards of accommodation for air travel

### Report of the Secretary-General

#### Summary

The present report of the Secretary-General on the standards of accommodation for air travel is submitted in accordance with General Assembly resolutions 42/214, 45/248 A, 53/214, 63/268, 65/268, 67/254 A and 69/274 A and decisions 44/442 and 46/450, as well as decision 57/589, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit his report to it on a biennial basis. The present report provides information on standards of accommodation for air travel for the two-year period ended 30 June 2016 and comparative statistics for the two-year period ended 30 June 2014, as well as trend analyses for the past 10 years.

The report also provides information on some specific matters relating to air travel as requested by the General Assembly in its resolutions 67/254 A and 69/274 A.





#### I. Introduction

- 1. The United Nations standards of accommodation for air travel are governed by a series of General Assembly resolutions and decisions, including resolutions 42/214, 45/248 A, 53/214, 63/268, 65/268, 67/254 A and 69/274 A and decisions 44/442, 46/450 and 57/589. Pursuant to the discretionary authority vested in the Secretary-General to authorize exceptions to the standards of accommodation for air travel on a case-by-case basis, the Secretary-General promulgated administrative instruction ST/AI/2013/3, Amend.1 and Amend.2 for the purpose of implementing the various staff rules relating to the standards of accommodation for air travel and the exceptions thereto.
- 2. In the past, certain categories of exceptions to the standards have been established, including, but not limited to, the following: travel of eminent persons; travel of prominent individuals; travel under circumstances that have been deemed to be arduous or under which, for medical reasons, it has been deemed appropriate to upgrade the accommodation for air travel; security officials travelling with the Secretary-General, the Deputy Secretary-General and their spouses; security officials travelling with the President of the General Assembly; and travel under circumstances when the regular standard of accommodation is not available and it is considered prudent to authorize an upgrade.
- In its resolution 67/254 A, the General Assembly decided that, for official travellers below the level of Assistant Secretary-General, the standard of accommodation for air travel would be business class if a single-leg journey was 9 hours or more, and, for a multi-leg journey, if the combined travel time of the journey was 11 hours or more, including a maximum of two hours of connection time, provided that the journey to the next destination resumed within 12 hours. The Assembly also requested the Secretary-General to modify his administrative instructions on standards of accommodation for air travel so that the duration of a journey should be determined on the basis of the most economical route available, provided that the total additional time of the whole journey did not exceed the most direct route by four hours. The Assembly also endorsed, subject to the provisions of its resolution 67/254 A, the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions on proposals for more effective and efficient utilization of resources for air travel (A/66/739) and the report of the Advisory Committee on standards of accommodation for air travel (A/67/636), which included establishing economy class as the standard of accommodation for air travel for consultants and individual contractors, unless determined otherwise by the Secretary-General taking into account the circumstances of the traveller (e.g. health reasons and the interests of the Organization). In this regard, the Under-Secretary-General for Management promulgated an administrative instruction on official travel (ST/AI/2013/3, Amend.1 and Amend.2), which incorporated the decisions of the Assembly. The administrative instruction also included a change to the travel entitlement of all other authorized United Nations travellers, with the exception of those explicitly excluded from the policy in accordance with section VI, paragraph 20, of Assembly resolution 67/254 A.

- 4. In the same resolution, the General Assembly noted the increasing frequency and costs of exceptions to the standards of accommodation for air travel, and requested the Secretary-General to take action to limit the use of exceptions, to conduct an analysis of the trends in the use of exceptions and to present proposals for enhancing controls in that area no later than the sixty-ninth session of the Assembly. The Assembly also requested the Secretary-General to review the use of exceptions for the category of prominent persons and to report thereon. As additional time is required to review the matter, the Secretary-General requests to submit his proposals during the first resumed part of the seventy-third session of the General Assembly.
- 5. Detailed analyses and explanations of the movements in the number of the exceptions and the related additional costs for the different categories are provided in sections II, III and IV.
- 6. In section IV of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General (a) to report to the Assembly any new trends for making use of frequent flyer miles to improve the administration of travel; (b) to provide detailed updates on the implementation of the recommendations contained in the report of the Office of Internal Oversight Services on the comprehensive audit of air travel activities and related practices (A/67/695); (c) to submit comprehensive information on air travel activities; (d) to submit consolidated data on the gains achieved through the implementation of section VI of its resolution 67/254 A; (e) to submit comprehensive information on the effects of the implementation of Umoja in travel administration, including updated information, trends and analysis in all areas relating to air travel in the United Nations; and (f) an assessment of the United Nations standards of accommodation regarding class of air travel. The Secretary-General has reported on these matters in sections V to X of the present report.
- 7. The General Assembly endorsed the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its report (A/69/787) to request the Secretary-General to conduct further analysis of the lump-sum option, and to provide an updated proposal in the present report. As additional time is required to examine this matter, the Secretary-General proposes maintaining the lump-sum provision at 70 per cent of the least restrictive economy class fare until the first resumed part of the seventieth-third session of the General Assembly, when a final proposal will be submitted.

### II. Travel of delegations

- 8. In accordance with General Assembly resolution 42/214, payment of first-class accommodation for air travel is limited to the heads of delegations of the least developed countries travelling to the regular and special sessions of the Assembly. During the period from 1 July 2014 to 30 June 2016, nine first class trips were approved at a cost of \$127,600, compared with 15 trips at a cost of \$207,673 during the period from 1 July 2012 to 30 June 2014.
- 9. As shown in figure I, the number of trips and hence the total cost for the travel of delegates of the General Assembly have been decreasing over time as fewer requests have been received from the least developed countries.

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



Figure I

10. As shown in figure II, the average cost per trip has been rising steadily, from \$10,124 for the July 2006-June 2008 period to \$14,178 for the July 2014-June 2016 period. This pattern is consistent with the global industry trend of an increase in first-class airfares.




—□—Number of trips



# III. Travel of the President of the General Assembly

- 11. To strengthen the ability of the President of the General Assembly to effectively and efficiently discharge the responsibilities of the Office of the President, the Assembly, by its resolution 53/214, decided that its President, consistent with the approved programme budget, should have full authority to use the funds provided in the budget for the Office. During the July 2014-June 2016 period, only one first-class trip was taken, at an additional cost of \$3,534, during the two-year period ended 30 June 2016, compared with four trips, at an additional cost of \$31,983, during the two-year period ended 30 June 2014. Detailed information on the first-class travel authorized by the President of the General Assembly is provided in annex VI to the present report.
- 12. The number of first-class trips taken by the President of the General Assembly and funded from the regular budget has decreased steadily, from six in the July 2006-June 2008 period to only one in the July 2014-June 2016 period. The additional cost per trip during the reporting period ended 30 June 2016 decreased to \$3,534, compared with \$7,996 during the previous reporting period. This can be attributed to the shorter itinerary per trip as compared with the four trips for the previous reporting period (see figures III and IV).

First-class travel of the President of the General Assembly



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

#### IV. Exceptions authorized by the Secretary-General


- 13. In its resolution 42/214, the General Assembly authorized the Secretary-General to exercise his discretion in making exceptions to allow first-class air travel on a case-by-case basis. Such discretionary authority is also exercised in accordance with section 4.8 of administrative instruction ST/AI/2013/3 when, in the opinion of the Secretary-General, special circumstances warrant exceptions to the standards of accommodation for air travel. In exercising such authority, the Secretary-General takes into consideration, among other things, the following:
- (a) A request for travel class upgrade on account of medical reasons should be submitted only when there is reason to expect that travel in a lower class would have a direct and significant harmful effect on the health of the traveller. All such requests should first be submitted to the Director of the Medical Services Division and must include sufficient documentation to establish, to the satisfaction of the Secretary-General, that a travel upgrade would prevent such harm. Advanced age alone is not considered sufficient justification for granting an exception;
- (b) Owing to the exigencies of service, a traveller may be required to travel on a particular date, when the regular standard of accommodation for air travel is not available. Cases may also arise when flights with the regular standard of accommodation are not available and the cost of daily subsistence allowance while the traveller waits for the next available flight would be greater than the cost of the higher standard of accommodation. The Secretary-General retains the discretion to decide, on a case-by-case basis, whether these factors amount to "special circumstances" within the meaning of ST/AI/2013/3, Amend.1 and Amend.2;
- (c) A traveller is considered an eminent person if he or she is a current or former Head of State or Government;
- (d) A traveller is considered a prominent person if he or she is a current or former cabinet minister, or in the opinion of the Secretary-General, is a significant

international figure in the political, scientific, economic, humanitarian or cultural arenas who is providing his or her services to the Organization;

- (e) Where a traveller, after completing a full day's work, is required, owing to the exigencies of service, to travel through the night in order to resume work and/or attend a high-profile meeting in another location on the following morning or immediately upon arrival, such a case may be deemed an arduous journey. However, it is advisable to avoid such instances through proper advance travel planning. The Secretary-General retains the discretion to decide, in each particular case, whether the related factors amount to "special circumstances" within the meaning of ST/AI/2013/3, Amend.1 and Amend.2.
- 14. As shown in figure V, the number of trips and the total additional cost of the exceptions authorized by the Secretary-General for the Secretariat have increased steadily. The promulgation of administrative instruction ST/AI/2013/3, which increased the travel time needed for a traveller to qualify for business class and made economy class the standard accommodation for air travel for consultants, individual contractors and other non-staff providing services to the Organization, resulted in more requests for exceptions in the July 2014-June 2016 period, especially for the category of prominent persons. A large number of prominent persons provide their services to the Organization: by participating in substantive meetings; as members of technical and advisory committees; and by providing input at high-level panels at no cost to the Organization. It is important to note that, in some cases, prominent persons were not treated as exceptions under the previous travel policies since they were eligible for the same standards of accommodation as staff members.

Exceptions approved for the United Nations Secretariat




15. Figure VI shows that, during the reporting period July 2014-June 2016, the average additional cost per trip for the Secretariat increased to \$2,769, compared with \$2,276 for the reporting period July 2012-June 2014. This increase can be

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attributed to the global trend of increasing airfares for first and business classes, owing in large part to the added cost of security measures, fuel surcharges and other operating expenses, which have been passed on to travellers.






16. An exception is also granted where the traveller provides close protection security services to the President of the General Assembly, the Secretary-General or the Deputy Secretary-General and their spouses or to any other official authorized to travel on behalf of the Secretary-General as his personal representative. As shown in figure VII, during the two-year period ended 30 June 2016, there were 93 trips, at an additional cost of \$530,565, compared with 93, at an additional cost of \$472,914, for the reporting period ended 30 June 2014.



17. As shown in figure VIII, the average additional cost per trip for security officers during the reporting period July 2014-June 2016 was \$5,705, compared with \$5,085 for the previous reporting period. This increase can be attributed to the global trend of increasing first-class and business-class airfares.

- 21. A summary of the exceptions authorized in respect of the United Nations affiliated entities during the two-year period ended 30 June 2016 is contained in table 5, and a summary of those authorized during the two-year period ended 30 June 2014 is shown in table 6. Details of exceptions authorized during the period under review for the United Nations Development Programme, the United Nations Children's Fund, the United Nations Population Fund, the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women, the United Nations Institute for Training and Research, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, the United Nations Environment Programme, the United Nations Human Settlements Programme, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda, the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change are contained in annexes VII-XVIII.
- 22. Figures IX and X show that, for the United Nations affiliated entities, the number of trips increased to 334 during the two-year period ended 30 June 2016, compared with 252 in the previous reporting period. The total additional cost increased to \$731,401, compared with \$743,389 for the previous reporting period. The average additional cost per trip decreased to \$2,190 during the two-year period ended 30 June 2016, compared with \$2,950 for the previous reporting period. This decrease could be attributed to the efforts made by the entities in making advance travel bookings.

Figure IX Exceptions approved for the United Nations affiliated entities




# V. Use of frequent flyer miles

- 23. In section IV, paragraph 7, of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to continue to monitor industry best practices in the area of frequent flyer miles and to report to the Assembly on any new trends for making use of frequent flyer miles to improve the administration of travel.
- 24. The Secretariat continues to monitor best practices across all areas of travel, including through participation in two travel management networks: the Inter-Agency Travel Network and the Travel Services Benchmark Network. The Inter-Agency Travel Network is a technical working group composed of travel managers from 75 international organizations such as the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, Inter-American Development Bank, the International Atomic Energy Agency, the International Civil Aviation Organization,

International Criminal Court, International Fund for Agricultural Development, International Labour Organization, International Monetary Fund, INTERPOL, North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, United Nations Development Programme, United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, United Nations Children's Fund, United Nations Industrial Development Organization, World Food Programme, World Health Organization, World Intellectual Property Organization, the World Bank and the United Nations Secretariat. The Travel Services Benchmark Network is an industry group composed of travel managers from 15 organizations (almost exclusively from the private sector) including ABB, Allstate, Boeing, Dell, Johnson and Johnson, Merck, Microsoft, RELX, Siemens, United Technologies Corporation, Dow, Honeywell, Rio Tinto, the World Bank and the United Nations Secretariat.

- 25. In order to provide the General Assembly with a comprehensive update with regard to frequent flyer miles, the Secretariat collected information on the topic from the two travel networks during October 2016.
- 26. Further to a request for information from the Inter-Agency Travel Network, responses were obtained from a total of 13 organizations. Of the 13 organizations, 3 combine corporate frequent flyer mile programmes and airline (discount) agreements in their travel programmes, although it should be noted that only one of those three has a corporate frequent flyer mile agreement in place with more than one airline. All 13 organizations allow travellers to collect miles obtained from official travel and utilize them for personal travel.
- 27. A similar low level of implementation of corporate frequent flyer programmes in the public sector is also seen in the private sector. None of the Travel Services Benchmark Network organizations collects frequent flyer miles at the corporate level or manages a programme of this type.
- 28. These public and private sector organizations generally maintain that managing a corporate frequent flyer mile programme is uneconomical as the costs of managing such a programme more than outweigh any associated benefits. The Secretariat notes that this current trend is consistent with previous reviews and findings on the matter, and, in this regard, reference is made to the comprehensive review performed by an independent consultant in 2012 (see A/66/676, section IV).
- 29. Implementing such a programme at United Nations Headquarters would involve managing frequent flyer mile programmes with the more than 70 airlines most frequently used for official travel. Moreover, frequent flyer miles can typically be redeemed only for a limited number of seats on given flights, limiting the practical utility for business travel, which may often be last minute and/or subject to itinerary changes. One further complicating factor within the United Nations is the need to take into consideration the various funding sources miles earned by one funding source may not necessarily be spent by another. The prospect of administering a corporate frequent flyer programme in the United Nations thus becomes increasingly complex, and management of such a scheme would require the deployment of significant additional resources.

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- 30. Negotiated airline agreements providing upfront discounts on market air fares have none of these disadvantages. For this reason, such agreements are typically preferred to corporate frequent flyer mile programmes by the larger private and public sector organizations comparable in size to the Secretariat.
- 31. Pursuant to the endorsement by the General Assembly in section VI, paragraph 2, of its resolution 67/254 A of the conclusions and recommendations in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, all staff of the Secretariat are instructed not to use, for personal travel, any frequent flyer miles gained as a result of conducting official business on behalf of the Organization, and are encouraged to use such frequent flyer miles for official travel, where feasible (see A/66/739, paragraph 11). For the reasons set out above, the Organization relies on the integrity of staff in the usage of miles earned through official travel.
- 32. The Secretariat has reiterated this expectation in a revised information circular on travel.

# VI. Implementation of the recommendations contained in the report of the Office of Internal Oversight Services on the comprehensive audit of air travel activities and related practices

- 33. In section IV, paragraph 9, of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly emphasized the importance of implementing all the recommendations contained in the report of the Office of Internal Oversight Services on its comprehensive audit of air travel activities and related practices (A/67/695), and requested the Secretary-General to provide detailed updates on their implementation in the context of future reports on the subject.
- 34. The report of the Office of Internal Oversight Services contained a total of 22 recommendations. Annex XXII of the previous report of the Secretary-General on the standards of accommodation for air travel (A/69/643 and Corr.1) contains an earlier update on the recommendations. However, at that time, in a number of cases, full implementation of the recommendations was dependent upon the implementation of Umoja. Subsequently, the Umoja travel module was implemented across cluster 3 and 4 entities in June and November 2015, respectively. An update to the recommendations, where applicable, is therefore provided in this section.
- 35. Financial business intelligence reports are being prioritized and delivered on a regular basis. The full capacity for detailed and comprehensive reports now exists. Work is ongoing to make priority reports available as soon as possible.
- 36. Monitoring of compliance with the directive on advance purchase of tickets for air travel has been further improved through the introduction of a business intelligence report. The report replaces the quarterly reporting process whereby inputs from departments and offices at the United Nations Headquarters, offices away from headquarters and peacekeeping missions were manually consolidated.
- 37. The Office of Central Support Services continues to work with airline partners to consolidate local and regional agreements into global ones, where possible and in the best interests of the Organization, and actively promote such agreements across

Secretariat travel processing offices. In total, six such global agreements have been negotiated and five more are in progress. It should be noted that global discounts remain unusual in the travel industry. Often, the most attractive discounts continue to be available at the local and/or regional levels.

- To enable Secretariat offices to utilize the services of travel processing offices across the Secretariat, the Office of Central Support Services introduced a cost recovery mechanism, in the form of a fixed service fee, in April 2016. The mechanism enables Secretariat offices to purchase air tickets at locations where the Organization can obtain the best value for money, while simultaneously allowing travel processing offices to utilize the income generated from the service fee and apply it towards increasing resource levels or meeting any other costs related to the particular transaction (such as overtime). The implementation of the mechanism is at an early stage and has proved to be a challenge as the service fee, for the time being, can only be collected manually and post facto, which in practice has limited its implementation. It is expected that implementation will significantly increase with the introduction of a Umoja enhancement allowing for the cost recovery service fee to be collected upfront as part of the Umoja travel request. A truly global model is however expected only after the implementation of the proposed Global Service Delivery Model framework in which a limited number of regional travel processing offices would finalize travel arrangements originating from within their regions, irrespective of the office funding the travel. Such regional travel processing offices will be best positioned to leverage the full volume of consolidated air travel data available through the Umoja module while negotiating with local or regional airlines.
- 39. In a pilot phase, the current fare auditing practice at the United Nation Headquarters is being amended. The Office of Central Support Services is in the process of contracting an independent third party to conduct regular fare audits of the travel agency at United Nation Headquarters. With this additional control in place, the work of the Travel and Transportation Section will shift from upfront concurrent auditing of air fares to post facto monitoring and "spot checks" of travel requests, thus allowing the Travel Unit to focus on higher value added activities such as complex travel and business process analysis. If the pilot phase proves successful, this process will be implemented across other Secretariat travel processing offices.
- 40. With a further enhancement to the Umoja travel module to distinguish credit memos, the Organization will be in a better position to monitor refunds arising from cancelled or unused air tickets. If a ticket needs to be changed or cancelled during the approval process, the travel processing office is responsible for recording a refund due to the Organization. Once a traveller confirms, as part of his or her expense report, that there is a partially or fully unused ticket available, the system generates a notification to the relevant travel processing office, which records the refund due in the system. Requesting the actual refund from the vendor is an offline process and the actual refund is credited to the Organization through the invoice upload file. With this process in place the Organization will be in a better position to report the amounts that have been received and those that are still outstanding. Work on the necessary system enhancement and business intelligence report to extract data recorded in Umoja related to requested refunds is ongoing.

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- 41. As a result of the implementation of the Umoja travel module, manual processing of travel requests has been reduced. Umoja has introduced the concept of employee self-service, whereby travellers can submit travel requests directly into the system, replacing a paper form that was subsequently entered into a legacy information technology system by administrative personnel. Umoja implementation has streamlined the approval process by reducing the number of approvals required from 8-12 (depending on the duty station) to 3. The vendor ticket payment process has been largely automated by the introduction of automatic invoice-matching functionality. In instances where there is no change in the expense report as compared with the original travel request, approval of the expense claim is also automated. It should be noted that, while significant progress has been achieved in reducing manual effort across the end-to-end process for travel, the workload for the travel processing office has increased significantly with the introduction of the Umoja travel module. This is due to the numerous additional data fields that need to be recorded in the system, such as carrier information for airline negotiations, itinerary information in International Air Transport Association format for greenhouse gas reporting and refund information for securing refunds. An increase of over 50 per cent in the workload was anticipated in the original Umoja change impact documents, which has recently been confirmed by travel managers, on the basis of their experience since the deployment of Umoja.
- 42. The standard statement of work template for travel management services contracts in peacekeeping missions has been finalized and implemented, ensuring a standard and consistent approach for procuring and managing travel agencies. The same template may be used by non-peacekeeping offices (i.e. offices away from headquarters, the economic commissions, etc.) to establish their travel management contracts. Coordination among travel managers is now well established. The Office of Central Support Services continues to host monthly videoconferences relating to the travel business process and policy issues with travel managers from offices away from headquarters, regional commissions and peacekeeping missions. A second monthly videoconference was introduced that specifically focuses on technical issues related to the Umoja travel module. The audience for these videoconferences has been extended beyond travel managers to include travel and shipment approvers (certifying officers), Human Resources partners and other relevant travel stakeholders. The Office now hosts an annual conference for Secretariat travel managers, the second of which took place in October 2016. The conferences provide a platform for travel managers in the Secretariat to raise and discuss issues of mutual interest and learn from experiences and best practices from across the Organization.
- 43. The Secretariat has undertaken an assessment of the lump sum option to ensure that the assumptions are still valid and that the option is still justified on the basis of established criteria. For this purpose, data was obtained from United Nations Headquarters, offices away from Headquarters and larger peacekeeping missions, which together represent the vast majority of field mission travel volume, to compare the actual lump sums paid against the theoretical costs that the Organization would have incurred had staff members exercised their alternative entitlement of ticket, terminal expenses and related shipment arranged for by the Organization. For each entity, a random sample of 10 travel authorizations for each of the top 10 lump sum destinations in the entity were requested for the period July

2014-June 2015, totalling 100 data points per entity, where applicable. The data from nearly 1,300 staff members (or their family members) shows that the average lump sum amount paid to an eligible staff member (or a family member) was \$2,019 compared with a total of \$2,560 for the combination of ticket, terminal and shipment. The lump sum is thus approximately \$541 (21 per cent) cheaper for the Secretariat than the alternative option. It should also be noted that the administrative overhead is less when processing a lump sum requirement as compared with when the Organization makes all the arrangements for home leave, family visits or education grants. While this is not taken into consideration as such in the periodic assessment, it further supports the conclusion that the use of the lump sum option should be encouraged, as it results in a lower cost for the Secretariat.

- 44. The updated administrative instructions on excess baggage, shipments and insurance, (ST/AI/2015/1 and ST/AI/2016/4) introduced in March 2015 and July 2016 respectively, include the entitlements previously contained in former staff rule 107.21.
- 45. In the context of the implementation of the new common system compensation package approved by the General Assembly in its resolution 70/244 in December 2015, particularly the changes to the relocation shipment entitlements including the maximum amounts of the relocation grant lump sum as proposed by the International Civil Service Commission in its annual report A/70/30, the Secretariat, together with other organizations of the United Nations common system, is currently reviewing whether and how to adjust the current lump sum amounts, including whether a geographical "zoning" approach would be appropriate and cost-effective for the Organization. Coordination with other funds and programmes and specialized agencies of the common system is crucial in order to ensure that staff members enjoy similar conditions of service regardless of which United Nations system entity employs them.

# VII. Comprehensive information on air travel activities and the effects of the implementation of Umoja in travel administration

- 46. In section IV, paragraph 10, of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly recalled paragraphs 32-34 of the report of the Advisory Committee (A/69/787), and requested the Secretary-General to provide in his next report comprehensive information on air travel activities.
- 47. In section IV, paragraph 14, of the same resolution, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit to the Assembly, in his next report, comprehensive information on the effects of the implementation of Umoja in travel administration, including updated information, trends and analysis in all areas relating to air travel in the United Nations.
- 48. As the Umoja travel module also provides comprehensive information on air travel activities, a consolidated response to the above-mentioned requests of the General Assembly is being provided in the present report. The Secretary-General is pleased to be able to present to the General Assembly comprehensive information on air travel activities for the first time. This comprehensive information is based on

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data from the Umoja travel module, extracted through the business intelligence module.

- 49. The Umoja travel module has been deployed in a phased manner. It was piloted in the United Nations Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH) in July 2014. After a successful pilot phase, it was rolled out to cluster 3 entities in June 2015. In November 2015, cluster 4 entities, including the United Nation Headquarters, also went live with the module.
- 50. At this stage, all travel across the Secretariat is processed through the Umoja travel module, with the exception of that of national staff and uniformed personnel serving in peacekeeping missions, who will be included once the module has been sufficiently stabilized.
- 51. The phased approach to implementing Umoja needs to be borne in mind when reviewing the comprehensive information, in particular across years. Clearly data cannot be compared across years in a situation where different parts of the Secretariat have been implementing the Umoja travel module at different times. Comparability will improve going forward, as the module goes live fully at the Secretariat.
- 52. While still facing challenges related to continued stabilization and business process change management, the effects of the implementation of Umoja in travel administration have been generally positive (see para. 41 above for an overview of the benefits related to travel). Where applicable, these have been included in the overall Umoja benefits case.
- 53. The use of a common platform (Umoja travel) makes possible new organizational structures. With 59 travel processing offices in Umoja, travel remains fragmented, limiting the reduction of expenditures on travel, consistent policy application, support requirements and the introduction of new technologies such as online booking tools. A proposal for a future more centralized travel structure has therefore been included in the report of the Secretary-General on the global service delivery model (A/71/417).
- 54. One unexpected effect, however, has been the increased support requirements resulting from the introduction of the employee self-service concept (see para. 41 above). Since the implementation of Umoja, about 11,000 of the total of 116,000 support tickets and work orders raised in the iNeed system related to travel. This new support requirement places a significant burden on the Office of Central Support Services since travel resources have not been increased to be commensurate

with the new roles and support demanded of the process owner. Internal relocation of resources has not occurred, despite the fact that the workload for travel resources overall has increased significantly as a result of Umoja travel, as noted above. Scarce resources are also affecting other areas, such as business intelligence reporting and analysis, impacting the process owner in his or her ability to fully leverage the potential of the Umoja system.

- 55. The Umoja Travel module is a highly customized module in relation to the "standard" SAP travel module. Customization was undertaken to meet all aspects of the policies and reporting requirements related to travel in the Secretariat. However, it has become apparent that this high level of customization is negatively impacting the efficient functioning of the Umoja travel module. In particular, cross-functional integration issues (e.g. between the travel module and the finance module) persist, requiring specialized support. Around 10 per cent of all issues reported from the task force established following the cluster 3 and 4 deployments are related to travel. While much progress has been made in addressing the most pressing issues, work on the stabilization of the module continues.
- 56. Development of the travel business intelligence environment is ongoing. The first reporting environment was delivered by mid-2016, with support from Umoja and the Office of Information and Communications Technology. During testing, further requirements have been identified. These are currently being delivered and tested. It is expected that business intelligence reports will become available to end users in a phased manner during 2017.
- 57. Accordingly, the Secretary-General is pleased to present to the General Assembly in the following paragraphs updated information on air travel activities as requested in paragraphs 32-34 of the report of the Advisory Committee (A/69/787).
- 58. It must be noted that the tables below and the related annexes are based on data in Umoja from July 2014 to June 2016. As specific parts of the Secretariat implemented Umoja in a phased manner throughout that period, it is not possible to compare data meaningfully across reporting years.

#### Travel volume, frequency and purpose

59. Table 7 provides an overview of the number of trips per travel category for the period from July 2014 to June 2016. These figures include all modes of travel, such as commercial aircraft, United Nations aircraft, train, motor vehicle, etc.

63. Costs are broken down into "ticket" costs and "other" costs. The "other" category include all non-ticket expenses, such as daily subsistence allowance, terminal expenses, etc. The system does not currently allow for a detailed

breakdown of actual non-ticket expenses, as these are recorded in a consolidated manner only in the finance module.

64. For a detailed breakdown of cost by Umoja business area, see annex XXI.

#### Compliance with advance purchase policy

65. Table 10 provides an overview of volume on commercial aircraft, and compliance with the advance purchase policy directive for the period July 2014-June 2016.

- 66. Within the main official travel category, compliance steadily increased, from 25 per cent in 2015 to 32 per cent during the first half of 2016. The entitlement travel and Human Resources travel categories are showing similar, positive trends, and are currently at 52 per cent and 31 per cent respectively. Given the limited scope of the Umoja travel module deployment in the second half of 2014 (i.e. MINUSTAH pilot only), this data has not been considered in analysing compliance trends.
- 67. Compliance with advance purchase policy has been adversely affected by the transition to the Umoja travel module. Official travellers, travel administrators and approvers have taken time to become sufficiently familiarized with the new module and the related workflow and business processes. Prior to deployment of the various clusters, so-called "blackout" periods of one to two weeks were implemented, during which no transactions could be recorded in either the legacy system or the Umoja module. Upon "go-live", these transactions were retroactively recorded in Umoja, often close to or after the travel date. In addition, the various system issues that have affected the travel module since deployment have resulted in delays in the travel approval process.
- 68. Over time, compliance is expected to improve as a result of increased proficiency on the part of system users and further stabilization of the Umoja travel module. However, better planning would be required to achieve significant improvement at the departmental level. For an overview of compliance by Umoja business area, see annex XXII.

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69. To allow comparison of the compliance rates in respect of advance purchase of tickets achieved in the Secretariat with those of other organizations, industry benchmarks from Inter-Agency Travel Network organizations are provided in annex XXIII. While improving compliance with the average of the "low" compliance group should be possible, performing at the level of the "medium" and "high" compliance organizations may be challenging, given the unique, emergency response nature of many departments of the Secretariat. "Medium" and "high" compliance organizations typically have more stable and predictable travel patterns.

# VIII. Consolidated data on the gains achieved through the implementation of section VI of its resolution 67/254 A

- 70. Pursuant to section IV, paragraph 13, of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit consolidated data on the gains achieved through the implementation of section VI of its resolution 67/254 A.
- 71. The revised travel policy (ST/AI/2013/3) was introduced in August 2013. In the additional information and clarification provided to the Advisory Committee and the Fifth Committee following the previous report of the Secretary-General on standards of accommodation for air travel (A/69/643), the Office of Central Support Services reported an 8.9 per cent decrease in average ticket price for travel arranged by United Nations Headquarters in 2014. Unfortunately, Secretariat-wide statistics were not available at the time.
- 72. The Office of Central Support Services has meanwhile collected information on the average ticket price from 2013 to 2014 from the larger Secretariat travel processing offices. Collectively, these offices represent approximately 80 per cent of Secretariat air travel, and are therefore deemed to be a representative sample. In 2014, the average ticket price across these offices decreased by 6.1 per cent.
- 73. As the new travel policy went into effect during the third quarter of 2013, it can be assumed that the revised travel policy is the main underlying factor for the observed year-on-year decrease in average ticket price.
- 74. It should, however, be noted that the "one-off" savings achieved as a result of the implementation of the revised travel policy in 2013 can be expected to be maintained, but that further savings should not be expected from this policy revision. The average ticket price development for 2015 and beyond has again been dependent on wider industry pricing developments.
- 75. As the overall expenditure on travel is impacted by many factors, including changing travel patterns, business requirements and price levels, it would not be meaningful to continue to calculate the impact of the 2013 revised travel policy in future years.

# IX. Assessment of the United Nations standards of accommodation regarding class of air travel

- 76. In section IV of its resolution 69/274 A, the General Assembly endorsed the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee (A/69/787), which, among other things, recommended the Secretary-General to provide an assessment of the United Nations standards of accommodation regarding class of air travel and, if warranted, make proposals in that regard.
- 77. To provide the General Assembly with a comprehensive update with regard to standard of accommodation, the Secretariat has collected information on the topic from the Inter-Agency Travel Network and Travel Services Benchmark Network groups during October 2016.
- 78. Responses from a total of 13 Inter-Agency Travel Network organizations indicate that the average threshold for these public sector organizations for business-class travel is 6.4 hours' travel time, with the minimum being three hours and the maximum being nine hours.
- 79. The responses from the Travel Services Benchmark Network organizations indicate that they have a similar threshold for business-class travel: the average threshold is 6.8 hours' travel time, with the minimum being 5 hours and the maximum being 12 hours.
- 80. It should be noted that the calculation of travel time differs according to the organization. Some organizations take stopovers into account, whereas others consider travel time equal to flight time.
- 81. The vast majority of organizations continue to offer business class as the appropriate standard of accommodation in cases where the travel time exceeds a predefined threshold. Only two of the Inter-Agency Travel Network organizations consider a so-called "premium economy" to be the appropriate standard of accommodation in such circumstances. This is presumably due to the wide variability in and availability of premium economy products offered by the airlines, which can range from complimentary meals only to limited additional legroom. The premium economy product is not consistently available from all airlines. Within a single airline, availability can differ not only between routes, but even within routes depending on the aircraft. The premium economy product is therefore typically not yet considered a substitute for the business class product.
- 82. Like the Secretariat, other organizations appear to offer a premium economy product as standard to travellers who voluntarily downgrade from a higher standard of accommodation.
- 83. The airlines continue to enhance the standards of accommodation other than basic economy class, and it is proposed to periodically re-assess the standards of accommodation to ensure that the travel policy of the Secretariat remains in line with wider industry developments.

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### X. Lump-sum option

- 84. In its resolution 67/254 A, the General Assembly decided that the Secretary-General should, as an interim measure pending the outcome of a review to be concluded in 2015, revise the provision for determining the travel-related lump-sum payment to 70 per cent of the least restrictive economy class fare. The General Assembly also requested the Secretary-General to include, in his report on the standards of accommodation for air travel to be submitted to the Assembly at its sixty-ninth session, an analysis of the impact of the implementation of that provision and to make further proposals on modifying the lump-sum scheme. The information requested was provided in paragraphs 19 to 30 of annex XXII to the report of the Secretary-General (A/69/643 and Corr.1), in which the Secretary-General proposed, among other things, maintaining the lump-sum provision at 70 per cent of the least restrictive economy class airfare until a further proposal was submitted based on additional experience gained and the analysis thereof.
- 85. The General Assembly in its resolution 69/274 A took note of the report of the Secretary-General, and endorsed the related recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions contained in paragraphs 22 to 24 of its report (A/69/787). In particular, the Advisory Committee was of the view that wider use by staff of the lump-sum option should be encouraged, and recommended that further analysis be conducted with a view to finding the right balance between the efficiencies that might be gained through a further decrease in the lump-sum payment and the higher costs resulting from a decrease in staff willing to use the lump-sum payment option, including administrative costs for issuing tickets, and to report on the outcome of the analysis in the next report of the Secretary-General. The study was also to factor in and provide an estimate for the reduced administrative workload related to the use of the lump-sum payment option.
- 86. Further analysis performed by the Secretariat for the period from June 2014 to June 2015 prior to the deployment of Umoja showed that, on average, the use of the lump sum option under the current scheme represented a cost reduction of approximately 21 per cent per traveller as compared with the total costs of the ticket option (ticket, terminal expenses, and shipment costs). Yet the preliminary analysis of available Umoja travel data for January-August 2016 shows that the rate of acceptance of the lump-sum payment option has decreased from the previously reported 93 per cent to 74 per cent, the remaining 26 per cent of staff opting for the provision of tickets and related benefits by the Organization, thereby costing the Organization more money.
- 87. Given that the collection and analysis of Umoja travel information became possible only in 2016 and taking into account that staff members may undertake home leave travel only once every 24 months, a comprehensive analysis has not been possible at the time of preparing the present report. It is therefore the intention of the Secretary-General to continue to review the implementation of the lump-sum payment option on the basis of the Umoja travel data, including an analysis of the higher administrative costs (as well as higher direct costs) resulting from a decrease in the number of staff willing to use the lump-sum option, and include any future proposals for change in his next report on the standards of accommodation for air

travel to be submitted to the General Assembly at the first resumed part of its seventy-third session.

88. The Secretary-General will also coordinate with other organizations of the United Nations common system to explore the possibility of preserving the coherence of the common system on travel policies, although it should be noted that most of the organizations continue to provide a more generous lump sum option, based on 75 to 80 per cent of the full unrestricted economy class fare (as noted in paragraph 21 of annex XXII to the previous report of the Secretary-General on standards of accommodation for air travel (A/69/643).
