Overall orientation

- 10.1 The legislative authority for the programme derives from General Assembly resolutions: resolution [56/227](#), whereby the Assembly decided to establish the Office of the High Representative for the Least Developed Countries, Landlocked Developing Countries and Small Island Developing States; resolution [65/280](#), whereby the Assembly endorsed the Istanbul Declaration and the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2011-2020; resolution [69/137](#), whereby the Assembly endorsed the Vienna Programme of Action for Landlocked Developing Countries for the Decade 2014-2024; resolution [59/311](#), whereby the Assembly endorsed the Mauritius Declaration and the Mauritius Strategy for the Further Implementation of the Programme of Action for the Sustainable Development of Small Island Developing States; and resolution [69/15](#), whereby the Assembly endorsed the SIDS Accelerated Modalities of Action (SAMOA) Pathway. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development (resolution [70/1](#)) supports the implementation of the above three programmes of action, all of which are integral to the Agenda. Furthermore, the 2030 Agenda contains a request that, in the context of the global follow-up and review processes of the Agenda, effective linkages be made with the follow-up and review arrangements of all relevant United Nations conferences and processes, including those on the least developed countries, small island developing States and landlocked developing countries.
- 10.2 The mandate of the programme covers five main elements:
- Mobilization and coordination of international support and resources for the effective implementation of: (i) the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2011-2020; (ii) the Vienna Programme of Action for Landlocked Developing Countries for the Decade 2014-2024; and (iii) the SIDS Accelerated Modalities of Action (SAMOA) Pathway;

Note: The following abbreviations are used in tables and charts: GS, General Service; OL, Other level; RB, Regular budget; USG, Under-Secretary-General.

- (b) Coherent and coordinated monitoring and follow-up of the three programmes of action;
 - (c) Awareness-raising and advocacy with respect to the three groups of countries (least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States) and their respective programmes of action;
 - (d) Reporting on the implementation of the programmes of action as effective tools for reaching the internationally agreed development goals in the groups of countries;
 - (e) Building effective linkages between the follow-up and review arrangements of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the three programmes of action.
- 10.3 The programme will also contribute to achieving the internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and in the outcomes of major United Nations conferences and international agreements, such as the Addis Ababa Action Agenda of the Third International Conference on Financing for Development, the Paris Agreement, adopted at the twenty-first session of the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, and the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030. It will mobilize international support in favour of its three groups of constituencies in the areas of capacity-building and increased technical and financial resources in promoting sustained growth and sustainable development. Gender mainstreaming and women's empowerment are an important dimension in the implementation of the three programmes of action.
- 10.4 The overall programme of work of the Office of the High Representative is designed around three interdependent and complementary subprogrammes, namely, subprogramme 1, Least developed countries, subprogramme 2, Landlocked developing countries, and subprogramme 3, Small island developing States.
- 10.5 The Office of the High Representative will use a combination of the following approaches and strategies:
- (a) Raising awareness and advocating that the concerns of the three groups of countries be placed high on the global development cooperation agenda, to maintain the focus on their special needs;
 - (b) Monitoring and follow-up to foster supportive policies in groups of countries in special situations and their development partners in accordance with their respective programmes of action and other internationally agreed development goals, including the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the Addis Ababa Action Agenda, the Paris Agreement and the Sendai Framework;
 - (c) Working with development partners, United Nations system organizations and other international and regional organizations, as well as parliaments and civil society, to promote the mainstreaming of priorities identified in each of the three programmes of action at the national level, enhancing coherence between global policies and national strategies;
 - (d) Supporting capacity-building of the three groups of countries towards the effective implementation of the programmes of action at the national level;
 - (e) Building partnerships towards the implementation of the three programmes of action and promoting South-South cooperation in various areas for the benefit of the countries in the three groups;

- (f) Reaching out to all stakeholders, including through partnerships with parliaments, civil society, foundations, the media, academia and the private sector, to enhance support for the three groups of countries;
- (g) Maximizing synergies among the three subprogrammes, given the commonalities of the problems and challenges of the countries in the three groups, including their structural weaknesses, their vulnerability to external shocks, the smallness of their economies, their marginal position in the world economy, their limited access to technology and their geographical disadvantages.

Overview of resources

10.6 The overall resources proposed for the biennium 2018-2019 for this section amount to \$10,649,400 before recosting, reflecting a decrease of \$113,600 (1.1 per cent) compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017. The proposed resource level provides for the full, efficient and effective implementation of mandates.

Changes within and/or across section(s)

- 10.8 The proposal reflects the redeployment of resources between subprogrammes 1, 2 and 3, mainly in relation to the midterm reviews of the Istanbul Programme of Action, the Vienna Programme of Action and the Samoa Pathway.

Other changes

- 10.9 Resource changes reflect a reduction of \$113,600 made possible through efficiencies that the Office plans to bring about in the biennium 2018-2019. The proposed reduction is a result of the efforts of the Office to apply the anticipated Umoja efficiencies presented in the eighth progress report of the Secretary-General on the enterprise resource planning project (A/71/390) to individual day-to-day operations. The Umoja efficiencies set out in the eighth progress report were based on the Organization's experience with the system, anticipated future changes, including future roll-outs, a global review of end-to-end processes, the retirement of legacy systems and improvements to business process and planning capabilities. Efficiencies were expressed, inter alia, as the dollar value of a full-time equivalent, where applicable. Further information on the approach is provided in the foreword and introduction of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2018-2019. For the Office, the non-post reduction of \$113,600 reflects a \$6,000 reduction under executive direction and management and a \$107,600 reduction under the programme of work.

Extrabudgetary resources

- 10.10 One of the functions of the Office of the High Representative is to mobilize extrabudgetary resources for following up on the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action, the Vienna Programme of Action and the Samoa Pathway, as well as other initiatives for the least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States.
- 10.11 The resource mobilization efforts of the Office are guided by its donor strategy, anchored in the mandate of the Office and consisting of a series of project proposals. The strategy has been continuously updated and shared with potential contributors, including traditional donors and other development partners. The Office will continue to conduct bilateral consultations with those contributors during the biennium 2018-2019.
- 10.12 During the biennium 2014-2015, the Office raised \$3,856,000 for use in the bienniums 2014-2015 and 2016-2017. Those resources allowed the Office to carry out preparatory activities in the lead-up to the second United Nations Conference on Landlocked Developing Countries and the third International Conference on Small Island Developing States, as well as activities staged during those conferences. They also enabled the Office to continue its global campaigns and advocacy activities in support of the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action and to effectively engage all relevant stakeholders, including parliamentarians and representatives of the private sector, civil society and foundations, in the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action. In addition, the resources were used to finance the participation of national focal points from the least developed countries in the annual review meetings on the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action and other meetings and workshops organized by the Office.
- 10.13 In 2016, the Office raised \$613,700. The voluntary contributions enabled the Office to successfully organize the Comprehensive High-level Midterm Review of the Implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2011-2020, held in Antalya, Turkey, in May 2016. Those resources also allowed the Office to organize events that fostered global partnerships in support of the implementation of the Samoa Pathway and follow-up activities on the implementation of the Vienna Programme of Action.

- 10.14 For the biennium 2018-2019, the fundraising goal of the Office will be to mobilize \$3,000,000, comprising: (a) \$1,500,000 to cover the enhanced requirements relating to the follow-up of the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action and the outcome of its Comprehensive High-level Midterm Review; (b) \$1,000,000 to cover follow-up activities on the implementation of the Vienna Programme of Action, including the regional review meetings of the midterm review of the Vienna Programme of Action, expert group meetings, national workshops for mainstreaming the Vienna Programme of Action and other special events; and (c) \$500,000 to fund activities in support of (i) mainstreaming the Samoa Pathway in the work of the United Nations system; (ii) enhancing coherence on issues relating to small island developing States in United Nations processes; and (iii) furthering the Office's work on global partnerships for sustainable development in the small island developing States.

Other information

- 10.15 The Office of the High Representative has sought to maximize efficiency by enhancing collaboration under its three subprogrammes. It has, for instance, established thematic clusters that cover all three subprogrammes. The cluster approach has enabled the Office to respond effectively to growing demand for the provision of evidence-based backstopping support to the least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States and to contribute to the work of the United Nations system on the follow-up and monitoring of global agendas, including the 2030 Agenda and the Addis Ababa Action Agenda.
- 10.16 The work of the Office to ensure system-wide coordination on issues relating to the least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States has been carried out effectively, especially with respect to mobilizing all agencies in support of the three programmes of action and leading the work of the three United Nations inter-agency consultative groups on least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States, of which the Office is either the convener or co-convener. The Office and several United Nations and other entities have jointly implemented, and continue to jointly implement, advocacy, capacity-building and resource mobilization activities. In addition, with a view to maximizing efficiency in the fulfilment of its mandates, the Office has increasingly made use of videoconferencing to facilitate consultations with and deliver outputs to Member States, entities of the United Nations and other bodies. The Office will continue to use videoconferencing and other information and communications technology tools.
- 10.17 Pursuant to General Assembly resolution [58/269](#), the resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation would amount to \$280,400 (equivalent to two work-months at the D-2 level, two work-months at the D-1 level, four work-months at the P-5 level and nine work-months at the P-4 level). The resources would provide for a discretionary self-evaluation of the Office's activities, as well as the mandatory self-assessment of whether the Office is on track towards achieving the results expected as proposed in the logical frameworks approved for 2018-2019.
- 10.18 Following a review of the publications pertaining to each subprogramme, it is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as summarized in table 10.6 and as distributed in the output information for each subprogramme.

A. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,633,500

- 10.19 The High Representative is responsible for the overall leadership and direction of the Office in the implementation of its mandates and approved programme of work. He engages in high-level consultations with Member States, entities of the United Nations system, multilateral and regional financial institutions and representatives of the private sector, civil society groups and academia; approves reports; and assists the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly in their reviews and assessments of the progress achieved in the implementation of the programmes of action for the three groups of countries.
- 10.20 The Office assists the High Representative in discharging his responsibilities and provides overall administrative support services for the programme of work. The Office is headed by a Director (D-2), who is responsible for its overall coordination and management and acts as deputy to the Under-Secretary-General.

10.24 The amount of \$2,633,500, reflecting a decrease of \$6,000 compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of six posts (1 Under-Secretary-General, 1 D-2, 1 P-5 and 3 General Service (Other level)), and non-post resources to support the implementation of the mandates under the programme.

10.25 Non-post resources amounting to \$623,200 would provide primarily for other staff costs, travel of staff and contractual services. The reduction of \$6,000, under supplies and materials, is attributable to efficiencies that the Office plans to bring about in 2018-2019.

- 10.31 The amount of \$6,190,300, reflecting a decrease of \$136,000 compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of 17 posts (1 D-1, 4 P-5, 6 P-4, 3 P-3 and 3 General Service (Other level)) and non-post resources to support the implementation of the mandates under the programme.
- 10.32 Non-post resources amounting to \$611,300 would provide primarily for other staff costs, consultants, travel of staff, and contractual services. The reduction of \$136,000, under other staff costs, consultants and travel of staff takes into account efficiencies that the Office plans to bring about in 2018-2019, including reduced requirements for travel of staff and consultants owing to increased use of in-house technical capacity, thereby leading to the redeployment of those resources to subprogrammes 2 and 3.

10.37 The amount of \$1,152,000, reflecting a net increase of \$10,600 compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of three posts (1 P-5, 1 P-4 and 1 P-3) and non-post resources to support the implementation of the mandates under the programme.

10.38 Non-post resources amounting to \$98,300 would provide primarily for consultants, experts and travel of staff. The net increase of \$10,600 reflects the slight upward adjustment of costs related to the organization of expert group meetings, with resources redeployed from subprogramme 3, as well as increased requirements for travel of staff for the preparation of the midterm review of the Vienna Programme of Action, with resources redeployed from subprogramme 1. These increases are partly offset by the reduced reliance on consultants as a result of increased use of in-house technical capacity, resulting in the redeployment of resources to subprogramme 3.

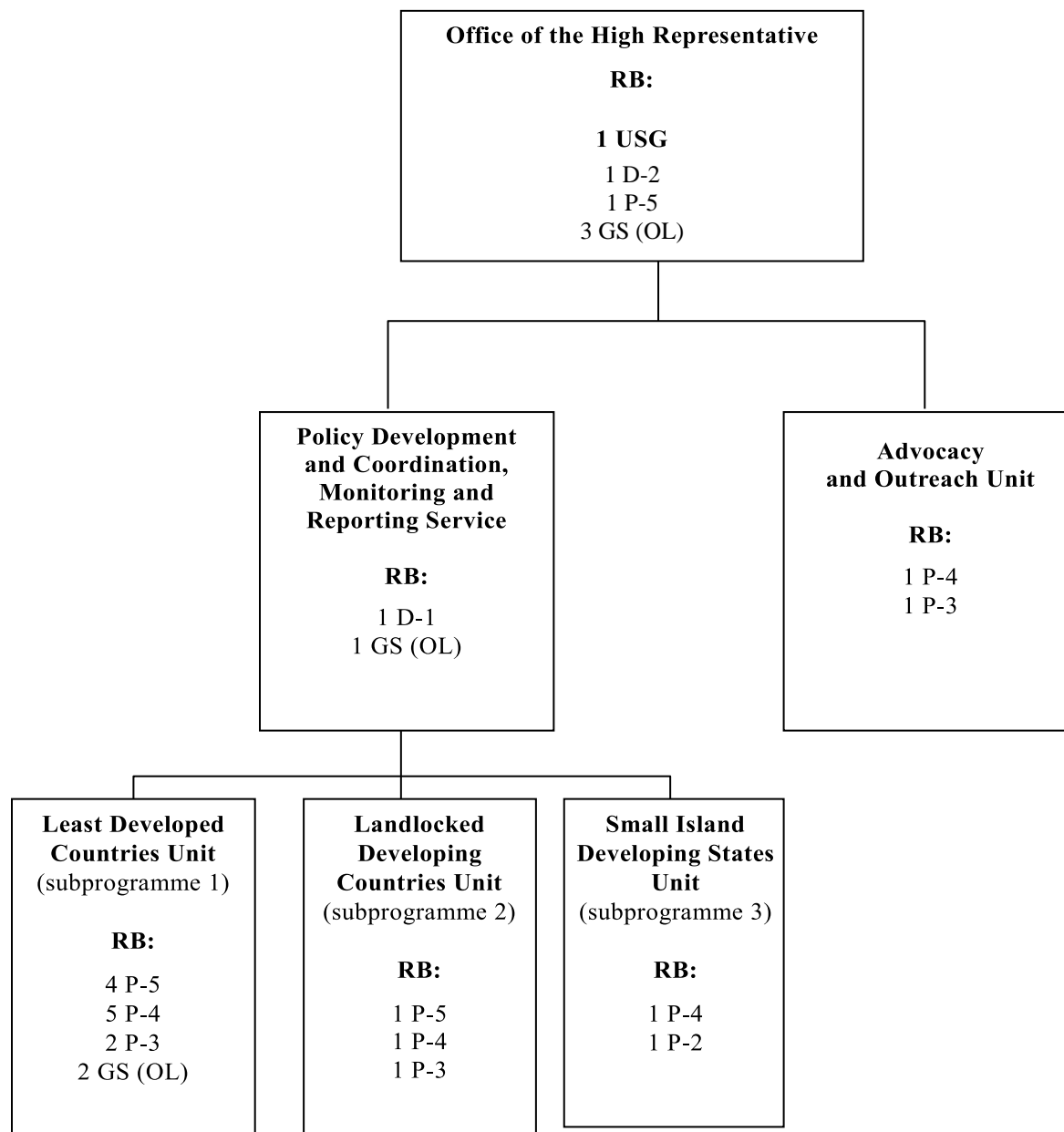

10.43 The amount of \$673,600, reflecting a net increase of \$17,800 compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of two posts (one P-4 and one P-2) and non-post resources to support the implementation of the mandates under the programme.

- 10.44 Non-post resources amounting to \$78,100 would provide primarily for consultants, experts and travel of staff. The net increase of \$17,800 reflects increased requirements for consultants and travel of staff in relation to the preparations for the midterm review of the Samoa Pathway, using resources redeployed from subprogrammes 1 and 2. The increase is partly offset by the redeployment to subprogramme 2 of resources for experts.

Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (A/70/7)

The Advisory Committee notes from the information provided that 7 out of the 10 new posts approved for the biennium 2014-2015 have not yet been filled and that some of them are still in the early stages of recruitment. The Advisory Committee is concerned at this long delay (para. IV.39).

The Advisory Committee expects that the increased technical capacity provided by the new posts will translate into reduced reliance on consultants (para. IV.44).

The Advisory Committee expects that information on proposed resource requirements under each section of the proposed programme budget should always be presented at a level of detail that facilitates the General Assembly's consideration of each component or subprogramme within the section (para. IV.46).

At the time of preparing the present report, only 2 posts out of the 28 approved posts were vacant.

The increased number of outputs in the proposed programme of the Office will be delivered using the increased technical capacity provided by the posts and without additional consultancy resources.

Resource requirements under each section of the proposed budget are given in detail in the present report.
