Report of the Secretary-General

Summary

In conformity with General Assembly resolution [73/206](#), the present report provides an outline of the progress made by the Secretariat since the previous report ([A/73/190](#)) in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. The Assembly is invited to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in paragraphs 18 and 31.

I. Introduction

1. The present report has been prepared pursuant to General Assembly resolution [73/206](#). It provides information on the progress made by the Secretariat since the previous report ([A/73/190](#)) in updating the *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* and the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*. It examines the respective mandates and workflow in the preparation of these publications, in printed and electronic forms, and gives an overview of the available resources and existing modalities of cooperation with academic institutions, associate experts, temporary staff and consultants, as appropriate. The Assembly is invited to take action in the light of the conclusions drawn in paragraphs 18 and 31.

II. *Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs*

A. Mandate and preparation of supplements to the Repertory

2. *The Repertory of Practice of United Nations Organs* was originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution 796 (VIII) of 27 November 1953. Its purpose is to document the Organization's application and interpretation of each individual Article of the Charter of the United Nations, to form a legislative history contributing to the knowledge and understanding of the Charter as applied in the practice of the organs of the United Nations.

3. Bearing in mind the call made upon the Secretary-General, in paragraph 16 of General Assembly resolution [73/206](#), to address, effectively and on a priority basis, the backlog in the preparation of volume III of the *Repertory*, the Codification Division of the Office of Legal Affairs, acting as coordinator for the preparation of the *Repertory*, maintained regular contact with Peking University, where research and drafting of a study on Article 23 of the Charter of the United Nations for volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9 (1985–1999) continue. Studies on Article 33 of the Charter, prepared with the assistance of interns in the Codification Division, and on Article 49 of the Charter, prepared with the assistance of a consultant, are under review.

4. With regard to the preparation of studies for volumes III and IV of Supplement No. 10 (2000–2009), a study on Article 49 of the Charter for volume III, prepared with the assistance of a consultant, is under review. Two studies, on Articles 55 (c) and 56 for volume IV, are also under review by the responsible author department, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights. In addition, the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, with the assistance of a consultant, has completed the preparation of a study on Article 58 for volume IV, which it is currently finalizing. Work also continues in relation to studies on Articles 104 and 105 for volume VI, in preparation by the Office of the Legal Counsel in the Office of Legal Affairs.

5. Substantial progress has been made in relation to Supplement No. 11 (2010–2015), for which 12 studies, on Articles 12, 14 and 19 for volume II, Articles 27, 29, 34, 35, 40, 52 and 53 for volume III and Articles 99 and 103 for volume VI, were researched and drafted with the assistance of the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa. Two studies for volume IV, on Articles 55 (c) and 56, are still under preparation by the responsible author department, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights.

6. As is customary, the Department of Global Communications and the Dag Hammarskjöld Library played an important role in supporting the research phase for the *Repertory* studies.

7. During the period under review, a meeting of the Interdepartmental Committee on Charter Repertory, in which all units of the Secretariat involved in the preparation of the publication, as well as units that did not exist when annex I to this report was last drawn up, were invited to participate. The purpose of the meeting, held in September 2018, was to discuss the status of the publication and call for contributions. It served as an opportunity to engage in a dialogue with stakeholders involved in the preparation of *Repertory* studies, that the Codification Division, in its capacity as coordinator, intends to further pursue.

8. In addition, during the period under review, the Department for General Assembly Affairs and Conference Management published volume II of Supplements No. 8 (1989-1994) and No. 9 (1995-1999) in English and French. All studies included in that volume were accordingly posted on the *Repertory* website. The current status of the publication is thus as follows: 31 volumes have been published¹ and 13 have been finalized and submitted for translation and publication.² Consequently, from among the 57 volumes of which the publication as a whole (original *Repertory* and Supplements Nos. 1 to 11 thereto) should consist, work remains to be completed on 13 volumes, 6 of which pertain to Supplement No. 11 (2010–2015), and 4 to Supplement No. 10 (2000–2009), which are at different stages of preparation (see para. 4 above). The other three volumes on which work remains to be completed correspond to volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9.

9. Annex I to the present report identifies which Secretariat units are responsible for preparing *Repertory* studies on each of the individual Articles of the Charter. Annex II provides information on the status of the *Repertory*.

B. Availability of *Repertory* studies on the Internet

10. Studies from 44 complete volumes, including the 13 volumes in processing for publication, are available on the United Nations website for the *Repertory* (<http://legal.un.org/repertory>). Advance versions of several studies on individual Articles for volume III of Supplements Nos. 7 to 9, as well as a considerable number of studies for Supplement No. 10 that have been finalized and are awaiting completion of the respective volumes, continue to be made accessible on the website. This is indeed also done for newly completed studies for Supplement No. 11. The electronic version of the *Repertory* includes a full-text search feature, providing users with the opportunity to search all the studies instantaneously for any word or combination of words in the three languages of the publication (English, French and Spanish).

11. Currently, all studies available in English are on the Internet, and most of them are also available on the Internet in French and Spanish. Finalized studies awaiting publication are placed on the Internet in the language in which they have been prepared (English for most of them and French for some of them). The Secretariat will continue to make available electronically all three language versions of the finalized *Repertory* studies.

C. Cooperation with academic institutions and sponsoring of associate experts

12. The well-established cooperation for the past nine years with the Faculty of Law at the University of Ottawa contributed to the preparation of 12 studies, on Articles 12, 14 and 19 for volume II, Articles 27, 29, 34, 35, 40, 52 and 53 for volume III and Articles 99 and 103 for volume VI of Supplement No. 11 (see para. 5 above).

13. With a view to revitalizing cooperation with academic institutions and pursuing a diverse geographical spread, the Codification Division, acting as coordinator for the preparation of the *Repertory*, continued to call upon permanent missions to the United Nations to identify academic institutions that may be interested in contributing to the preparation of studies. In the past biennium, the Codification Division has had preliminary contacts with four universities: two in the South Pacific region, one in the Latin American and Caribbean region and one in the Western European and other States region. The Codification Division continued to invite academic institutions to which members of the International Law Commission are affiliated to consider contributing to the preparation of studies. As previously mentioned, this led to the establishment of a framework of cooperation with Peking University in 2018 (see para. 3 above).

14. Further, consistent with paragraph 14 of resolution [73/206](#), in which the General Assembly reiterated its call for the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of, inter alia, the *Repertory*, the Codification Division made an appeal to all permanent missions to the United Nations by a note verbale dated 7 January 2019. To this date, the appeal has led to preliminary contacts with representatives of the Latin American and Caribbean region.

D. Trust fund

15. In its resolution [73/206](#), the General Assembly reiterated its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund established pursuant to its resolution [59/44](#), in order to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*. Accordingly, a note verbale was sent to all permanent missions to the United Nations, reminding them of the possibility of making voluntary contributions to the trust fund and inviting them to bring the question of funding for the *Repertory* to the attention of private institutions and individuals that might wish to assist in that regard. The Secretary-General welcomes with appreciation the contributions to the trust fund received from Azerbaijan (\$10,000), Cyprus (\$2,280), Iraq (\$5,000) and Qatar (\$10,000) since the issuance of the previous report of the Secretary-General on 19 July 2018. The fund balance, as at 30 June 2019, was \$64,651.

16. During the period under review, a consultant financed through the trust fund completed the preparation of a study on Article 58 for volume IV of Supplement No. 10 (2000–2009), as indicated in paragraph 4 above. The further use of consultants for the preparation of studies pertaining to volumes that are nearing completion is envisaged. Additional contributions to the trust fund are therefore strongly encouraged, so as to allow the Secretariat to continue to eliminate the backlog in the *Repertory*.

E. Recommendations of the Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization

17. The Special Committee on the Charter of the United Nations and on the Strengthening of the Role of the Organization considered the question of the *Repertory* and the *Repertoire* at its session held from 19 to 27 February 2019. In paragraph 77 of its report ([A/74/33](#)), the Special Committee recommended, with regard to the *Repertory*, that the General Assembly should commend the Secretary-General for the progress made in the preparation of studies, including the use of the internship programme of the United Nations and cooperation with academic institutions for that purpose; encourage Member States to identify academic institutions that have the capacity to contribute to the preparation of studies for the *Repertory* and to provide the contact details of such institutions, and in this regard welcome the initiative of the Secretariat to invite academic institutions to which members of the International Law Commission are affiliated to consider contributing to the preparation of studies; note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*; reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory*, as well as the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions, and encourage the continued updating of the website for the *Repertory*; note with concern that the backlog in the preparation of volume III of the *Repertory*, although slightly reduced, had not been eliminated, and call upon the Secretary-General to address that issue effectively and on a priority basis, while commending the Secretary-General for progress made in reducing the backlog; and reiterate the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertory*.

F. Conclusions

18. With regard to the *Repertory*, in the light of the foregoing, the General Assembly may wish:

(a) To note the current status of the publication, including the progress made in the preparation of *Repertory* studies and in their posting on the Internet in three languages (English, French and Spanish);

(b) To consider the recommendations of the Special Committee (see para. 17 above) concerning the use of the internship programme of the United Nations and the cooperation with academic institutions for the preparation of studies; the identification of academic institutions having the capacity to contribute to the preparation of studies for the *Repertory*; the initiative of the Secretariat to invite academic institutions to which members of the International Law Commission are affiliated to consider contributing to the preparation of studies; the voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the elimination of the backlog in the *Repertory* so as to further support the Secretariat in carrying out the effective elimination of that backlog; the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis, and at no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication; the call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions, the continued updating of the website for the *Repertory* and the call to continue to address effectively and on a priority basis the elimination

of the backlog in volume III of the *Repertoire*; and the reiteration of the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertoire*;

(c) To note the progress made towards the elimination of the backlog through the utilization of the trust fund; and to strongly encourage States to make additional contributions to the trust fund.

III. *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*

A. Mandate and preparation

19. The *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, originally mandated by the General Assembly in its resolution 686 (VII) of 5 December 1952, provides a record of the evolving practice and procedure of the Security Council in the framework of the Charter of the United Nations and the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council. Most recently, by its resolution 73/206, the General Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report dated 18 September 1952 (A/2170).

20. In paragraph 11 of resolution 73/206, the General Assembly commended the Secretary-General for the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire*. In paragraph 15, the Assembly called upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the *Repertoire* and making it available electronically in all its language versions.

21. In the past year, pursuant to the mandate provided by the General Assembly, the Secretariat has made significant progress in the preparation of the Supplements to the *Repertoire*. The focus of the work of the Secretariat during the period under review has been the completion of the twentieth Supplement, covering the years 2016 and 2017, and the preparation of the twenty-first Supplement, covering the year 2018.

22. The Secretariat completed the twentieth Supplement to the *Repertoire* in the third quarter of 2018. The advance version of the Supplement has been posted on the website, while the completed, edited version is expected to be made available online and in hard copy in the last quarter of 2019. The Secretariat also commenced the preparation of the twenty-first Supplement, which will cover a one-year period instead of the multi-year period covered in previous Supplements to the *Repertoire*. At the time of writing, all 10 parts of the twenty-first Supplement are nearing completion and it will be made available in its advance form during the third quarter of 2019.

23. Drawing on the efficiencies gained over the past several years, the Secretariat is currently in the process of adapting its working methods to enable the contemporaneous coverage of the practice of the Security Council, a milestone in the 67 years of the history of the *Repertoire*. As a result, the Secretariat has initiated the preparation of the twenty-second Supplement, covering the year 2019, in parallel to its work on the drafting and completion of the twenty-first Supplement.

24. In order to ensure the sustainability of the significant progress made in updating the *Repertoire* and the new contemporaneous approach to its preparation, the Secretariat has continued to optimize the limited resources available through efficiency-enhancing initiatives, namely the introduction of new technologies and the employment of additional human resources. Specifically, the Secretariat has continued its work on the development of a modern, secure, web-enabled database application which is being rolled out in a phased manner, according to the availability of resources, and which would allow for the progressive automation of data collection and the enhancement of data analysis, thereby significantly facilitating the research

and drafting of the *Repertoire*. Furthermore, the training of staff and the increased use of the internship programme have also enhanced the capacity of the Secretariat to expedite these efforts, while maintaining the highest standards of accuracy and quality control. The various offices within the Secretariat vested with the complex responsibility of editing, translating, indexing and publishing the Supplements to the *Repertoire* have also achieved progress on ensuring the most efficient coordination and division of labour as part of this process.

B. Availability of *Repertoire* studies on the Internet

25. In line with its aim to provide contemporaneous coverage of the practice of the Security Council, the Secretariat continued to make available advance versions of the Supplements to the *Repertoire* on the website immediately upon their completion. The website also offers a broad range of information resources such as tables, graphs and statistical information reflecting the latest information on the practice of the Council, including on the mandates of peacekeeping operations and special political missions and the three cross-cutting agenda items, namely, the protection of civilians in armed conflict, children and armed conflict, and women and peace and security. As in previous years, early in January 2019 the Secretariat made available on the website the 2018 “Highlights of Security Council practice”, which provides an annual review of the activities and statistical information on the evolving practice of the Council as it relates to its agenda, meetings, missions, decisions, voting patterns and subsidiary bodies. The past four editions of the Highlights have relied on a new technological platform for the publication of data, which has also been used to showcase the monthly statistics of the Council.

26. In the past year, the Secretariat has continued to explore the use of modern technologies with a view to enhancing these tools, in particular to improve visualization and user interaction with the information available through them. In December 2018, with the generous support of the Netherlands, the Secretariat launched a newly revamped Security Council website in all six official languages. The *Repertoire* section of the new website offers up-to-date information regarding all past and current items on the agenda of the Council and its subsidiary organs. The Secretariat is currently working on further enhancing the available content, search functionalities, visualizations and structure commensurate with the new layout of the website.

27. The Secretariat has continued to fulfil its advisory role through the provision of information in response to questions relating to the procedural and constitutional practice of the Security Council and its subsidiary organs. During the reporting period, the Secretariat received a large number of such queries from Member States, officials of the United Nations system and representatives of other international organizations, non-governmental organizations, academic scholars and researchers, and the private sector. In addition, the Secretariat has provided quality research and analysis for internal policy development and reports, as well as undertaken several outreach programmes and contributed to the familiarization of new Council members with respect to the evolving procedure, practice and working methods of the Council.

C. Publication in language versions (print and electronic)

28. Pursuant to General Assembly resolution [55/222](#), in which the Secretary-General was requested to publish the *Repertoire* in all six official languages, the twelfth to nineteenth Supplements (1993–2015) have been made available on the *Repertoire* section of the Security Council website in the remaining official

languages. The twentieth Supplement (2016–2017) is scheduled to be made available by the end of 2019 in all six official languages. The Department for General Assembly Affairs and Conference Management continues to make every effort to ensure that the Secretariat is able to publish and post the latest Supplements to the *Repertoire* in the six official languages as soon as they are available.

D. Resources

29. The preparation and publication of the *Repertoire*, as well as the maintenance of its website in all official languages, would not have been possible without the continuing support of the General Assembly. In an environment of financial constraint, voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* remain a critical element for sustaining the progress made thus far and improving accessibility to the practice of the Security Council, as well as maintaining the website.

30. The infusion of extrabudgetary resources has enabled the Secretariat to retain the services of temporary staff assisting in the preparation of the *Repertoire*. Since the previous report, contributions to the trust fund have been received from Argentina, China, Ireland, Poland and Singapore. In addition, Italy and the Republic of Korea have contributed by sponsoring two associate experts in the Security Council Practices and Charter Research Branch who have made invaluable contributions to advancing the work on the *Repertoire*. In order to sustain the progress achieved to date, the Secretary-General calls on Member States to further support the work of the Secretariat in updating the *Repertoire* through voluntary contributions to the trust fund and the sponsoring of associate experts.

E. Conclusions

31. **With respect to the *Repertoire of the Practice of the Security Council*, in the light of the foregoing, and the recommendations made by the Special Committee at its session held from 19 to 27 February 2019 (see [A/74/33](#)), the General Assembly may wish:**

- (a) **To note the progress made towards updating the *Repertoire*;**
- (b) **To note with appreciation the contributions made by Member States to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire*;**
- (c) **To reiterate its call for voluntary contributions to the trust fund for the updating of the *Repertoire* and the sponsoring, on a voluntary basis and with no cost to the United Nations, of associate experts to assist in the updating of the publication;**
- (d) **To call upon the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards updating the publication and making it available electronically in all its language versions;**
- (e) **To reiterate the responsibility of the Secretary-General for the quality of the *Repertoire*, and to call upon the Secretary-General to continue to follow the modalities outlined in paragraphs 102 to 106 of his report dated 18 September 1952 ([A/2170](#)).**
