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PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1986-1987

REVIEW OF **THE** IMPLEMENTATION OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS AND DECISIONS ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT ITS **TENTH** SPECIAL SESSION:

PREVENTION OF NUCLEAR WAR

Climatic effects of nuclear war, including nuclear winter

Programme budget implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.1/41/L.36/Rev.1

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

#### A. Requests contained in draft resolution

- 1. At its **41st** meeting, on 12 November 1986, the First Committee adopted by a recorded vote of 119 to 1, with 10 abstentions, the draft resolution contained in **document A/C.1/41/L.36/Rev.1.** A statement of the programme budget implications of the draft resolution was before the Committee in document **A/C.1/41/L.79.**
- 2. Under the terms of operative paragraph 3 of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.1/41/L.36/Rev.1, the General Assembly would once again request the Secretary-General, with the assistance of a group of consultant experts chosen by him, bearing in mind the advisability of wide geographical representation and of their qualifications in a broad range of scientific fields, to carry out a study on the climatic and potential physical effects of nuclear war, including nuclear winter, which would examine, inter alia, its socio-economic consequences. This study would take into account the Secretary-General's compilation and the source documents from which it was prepared, together with any other scientific studies that might be relevant.

- 3. In operative paragraph 4 of the draft resolution, the General Assembly would request the Secretary-General to transmit such study to the General Assembly in due time for consideration at it8 forty-third session, in 1988.
- 4. By it8 resolution 40/152 G of 16 December 1985, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General, inter lia, to carry out a 8tudy on the same subject and to transmit the study to the General Assembly for consideration at it8 forty-second session in 1967. By decision of the Assembly at it8 resumed fortieth session, the study was deferred as one of the economy measures proposed by the Secretary-General.

## B. Relationship of proposed requests to approved programme of work

5. The activities proposed would fall under chapter 1, Political and security Council affairs, programme 2, Activities of the Department for Disarmament Affairs, subprogramme 3, Studies on disarmament, of the medium-tern plan for the period 1984-1989 and in section 2B, Department for Disarmament Affairs, of the approved programme budget for the biennium 1986-1987, and of the proposed programs budget for the biennium 1988-1989, programme element 3.2 of subprogramme 3, Studies on disarmament, which cover8 the preparation for and execution of various studies requested by the General Assembly.

### C. Activities by which the proposed request would be implemented

- 6. Should the General Aaaeably adopt the draft resolution, the Secretary-General, in order to implement operative paragraph 3, would establish a group of consultant experts. To reflect a wide geographical representation and drawn from a broad range of appropriate scientific fields, thr Group would be comprised of up to 12 expert8.
- 7. The Group would hold three sessions in 1987 and 1988 as follows:
  - (a) One-week session (6-10 April 1987) in New York;
  - (b) Two-week 8eaaion (November/December 1987) at Geneva;
  - (c) Two-wok session (April 1988) in New York.
- 8. With regard to the second e88ion, it is noted that in accordance with General Assembly resolution 40/243 (sect. I, pars. 7), no ub8idiary organ of the Assembly may meet at United Nations Headquarters during a regular session of the Assembly. Consequently, the second session of the Group would, therefore, have to be convened at Geneva.
- 9. It is assumed that the related conference services would be provided for the session8 on the following basis:
- (a) The Group would hold two meeting8 a day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon;

- (b) Interpretation would be provided in the six official languages of the General Assembly;
- (c) There would be a total of 400 page8 (eight documents) of documentation to be issued in the six official languages.
- 10. The Secretary-General would authorize payment of travel coats and subsistence allowance for the expert8 participating in the e8aiona.
- 11. To assist the Secretariat in addressing the scientific and technical issues involved in the study, it is estimated that six months of consultancy ervices would be required. The consultant would be an individual well versed in the scientific investigations that have been carried out into the nuclear winter phenomenon and able to present the fact8 and assumption8 in a cleat and knowledgeable written manner. The consultant would be expected to prepare a discussion paper for the first session of the Group and subsequently help to prepare the successive drafts of the Group's report as the work proceeded and to attend the emionm as necessary.
- 12. It is envivaged that the Secretary of the Group will be appointed from the staff of the Department for Disarmament Affairs in New York. In order for the Secretary to attend the Group's session in Geneva, provision for travel and subsistence allowance costs of \$3,800 would be needed.

#### D. Modification8 required in the approved programme of work

13. The activities of the proposal involving the permanent staff of the Department for Disarmament Affair8 fall under section 2B, ● ♦᠒□□□⅓□⊙■■ 3.2, of the approved programme budget for the biennium 1986-1987 and of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989. Consequently, no modifications to that programme element are required.

#### E. Additional requirement at full cost

14. The requirements to undertake the activities contained in paragraphs 6 to 12 above are as follower

#### F. Potential for absorption

15. No **programme element** under any mubproyramme within section 2B (Department for **Disarmament Affairs**) of the approved programme budget for the biennium 1986-1387 is **proposed** for curtailment, postponement or termination to implement the draft resolution.

## G. Request for additional appropriation

16. Following the adoption of General Aemembly resolution 40/152 G, an appropriation of \$125,700 warn approved under section 2B of the budget for the biennium 1986-1987. Of this amount, \$88,800 related to requirements in 1986 and \$36,900 to requirement in 1987. Within this provision for 1986 (\$88,800) an amount

of \$69,000 was committed to meet the **Organization's** funding **shortfal'** in 1986. It will be recalled that the first two **sessions** of the Expert Group in 1986 were deferred as indicated in paragraph 4 above.

- 17. On that **basis**, the additional appropriation under **sec**:**ion** 2B of the programme budget for the biennium **1986-1987** required to **meet** the 1987 requirements detailed in paragraph 14 above is estimated at \$41,100, broken down between ad hoc expert groups (\$37,300) and travel of staff (\$3,800). The 1988 requirements would **be** dealt with in the context of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989.
- 18. Estimates of confer ence-mer vicing costs are provided on the assumption that no part of the conference-mervicing requirements would be made available from existing resources. 'Swards the close of the present session of the General Arsembly, a consolidated statement of conference-servicing requirements will be submitted, through which net additional resources will be requested, in the light of the calendar of conferencea for the year 1987 as finally approved by the General Assembly.
