PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1992-1993

REVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS AND DECISIONS ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT ITS TENTH SPECIAL SESSION

Request for subvention to the Institute resulting from the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the United

Nations Institute for Disarmament Research contained in document A/47/345

Note by the Secretary-General

- 1. In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 3 of article VIII of the statute of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), $\underline{1}$ / the recommendation by the Board of Trustees of the Institute for a subvention for 1993 of \$220,000 from the regular budget of the United Nations is hereby transmitted to the General Assembly for approval.
- 2. The Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, adopted the 1993 draft programme of work and proposed budget estimates of the Institute (A/47/345, annex II). The Board recalled that, at its forty-sixth session, the General Assembly had approved an appropriation of \$440,000 under section 5, Disarmament, as a subvention to UNIDIR from the regular budget of the United Nations for the biennium 1992-1993. Accordingly, an amount of \$220,000 has been earmarked for the year 1992 and the remaining \$220,000 for 1993. In keeping with the observation of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (ACABQ) that,

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notwithstanding the inclusion of that amount in the programme budget for the biennium 1992-1993, a formal request for a subvention for 1993 would have to be made to the General Assembly, the Board recommended a subvention from the regular budget of the United Nations amounting to \$220,000 for 1993.

- 3. Should the General Assembly decide to approve the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, no additional appropriation would be required for the United Nations programme budget for the biennium 1992-1993.
- 4. In accordance with General Assembly resolution 44/201 B, section IV, entitled "Subvention from the regular budget to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research", the Secretary-General is requested, <u>inter alia</u>, "to report annually to the General Assembly on the situation of the Institute". In this connection it should be noted that the financial situation of the Institute is as follows:
- (a) Funds available at the beginning of 1992 amounted to \$357,100, including the operating cash reserve of \$192,600.
- (b) The total 1992 income from voluntary contributions (\$573,500), public donations (\$6,200), interest (\$20,000), miscellaneous sources (\$37,600), and subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$220,000) is estimated at \$857,300. This figure shows a decrease of \$184,400 over the estimates given in 1991, due mainly to a decrease in governmental contributions in non-convertible currencies. The breakdown of voluntary contributions pledged for and received in 1992 is provided in annex I to the present document.
- (c) The total 1992 expenditure is estimated at \$1,091,900, which includes a provision of \$38,900 for programme support costs and shows a downward revision of \$122,800 in the light of the reduced funds available. The breakdown of 1992 revised estimated expenditure is provided in annex II to the present document.
 - (d) Funds available at the end of 1992 are estimated at \$122,500.
- 5. ACABQ in its report on the draft programme and proposed budget of UNIDIR for 1993 requested information on tied contributions to be made available to the Institute in 1992 and 1993. In this regard it should be noted that the Institute will continue to receive in 1992 and 1993 voluntary contributions tied to specific projects. It is estimated that from 75 to 80 per cent of such contributions would be applied to the substantive costs of the projects, while between 20 and 25 per cent would go towards administrative costs of the Institute. Annexes III and IV provide a detailed list of 1992 and 1993 voluntary contributions which are tied to specific projects.
- 6. In the report of the Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters in its capacity as Board of Trustees of UNIDIR (A/47/345, annex II), the members of the Board "were particularly appreciative of the vigorous fund-raising efforts of the Director which had doubled the amount of contributions in convertible

currency and broadened the base of financial support for the Institute", but, at the same time recognizing the increasing difficulty in guaranteeing the financial viability of UNIDIR, the Board "expressed the view that the annual subvention from the regular budget of the United Nations would continue to be needed in order to assure the independence of the Institute". The Secretary-General concurs with the observations made by the Board.
