**Programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001**

### **Request for a subvention to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research resulting from the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute on the work programme of the Institute for 2001**

**Note by the Secretary-General**

#### *Summary*

In accordance with the provisions of the statute of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR) (see General Assembly resolution 39/148 H, annex, art. VIII, para. 3), the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR for a subvention of \$213,000, for the year 2001, from the regular budget of the United Nations is hereby transmitted to the General Assembly for approval. A related provision to fund this subvention has already been appropriated under section 4 of the programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001.

1. The Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), approved for submission to the General Assembly the programme of work and proposed budget of the Institute for 2001 (see A/55/349, para. 27). The Secretary-General transmitted to the General Assembly the report of the Director of UNIDIR containing the estimated resource requirements included in the aforementioned budget (A/55/267, annex II). The present report, reflecting the updated estimates that have since been provided by the Institute to the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, is submitted to the General Assembly for its approval of the subvention of \$213,000 from the regular budget of the United Nations.

2. In its report, the Board noted with regret that for several years the subvention received from the United Nations had not been adjusted for inflation. The Board requested that, in view of the importance of the United Nations subvention to the operations of the Institute, the matter should be kept in review.

3. The programme budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2000-2001, under section 4, Disarmament, contains a provision of \$426,000 representing the United Nations subvention to UNIDIR for 2000-2001. Notwithstanding the inclusion of the necessary provision in the programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001, a formal request for a subvention of \$213,000, for the year 2001, is submitted to the General Assembly, in keeping with established procedure.

4. Under section IV of General Assembly resolution 44/201 B of 21 December 1989, entitled "Subvention from the regular budget to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research", the Secretary-General is required to report annually to the General Assembly on the situation of the Institute. In this context, it is reported that the financial situation of the Institute is as follows:

(a) Funds available at the beginning of 2000 amounted to \$840,800. This figure includes \$134,500 required as an operating cash reserve for 2000;

(b) Total income for 2000 is estimated at \$1,361,500, from the following sources: voluntary contributions and public donations (\$1,128,500), interest income (\$20,000) and the subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$213,000). The details of revised 2000 estimates and estimated 2001 contributions from voluntary sources are provided in annexes I and II;

(c) Total 2000 revised estimated expenditure is \$1,154,500, including a provision of \$44,800 for programme support costs. Requirements for the year 2001 are estimated at \$1,252,800, inclusive of \$43,300 for programme support costs and \$130,000 for operating cash reserves. The breakdown of 2000 revised estimated expenditures and of estimated resource requirements for the year 2001 is provided in annex III;

(d) Available funds at the end of 2000 are estimated at \$1,047,800, including an operating cash reserve of \$134,500.

5. Should the General Assembly decide to approve the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, no additional provision would be required under section 4, Disarmament, of the programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001, as resources have already been appropriated pursuant to the request in paragraph 4.28 of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2000-2001.<sup>1</sup>
